Overview

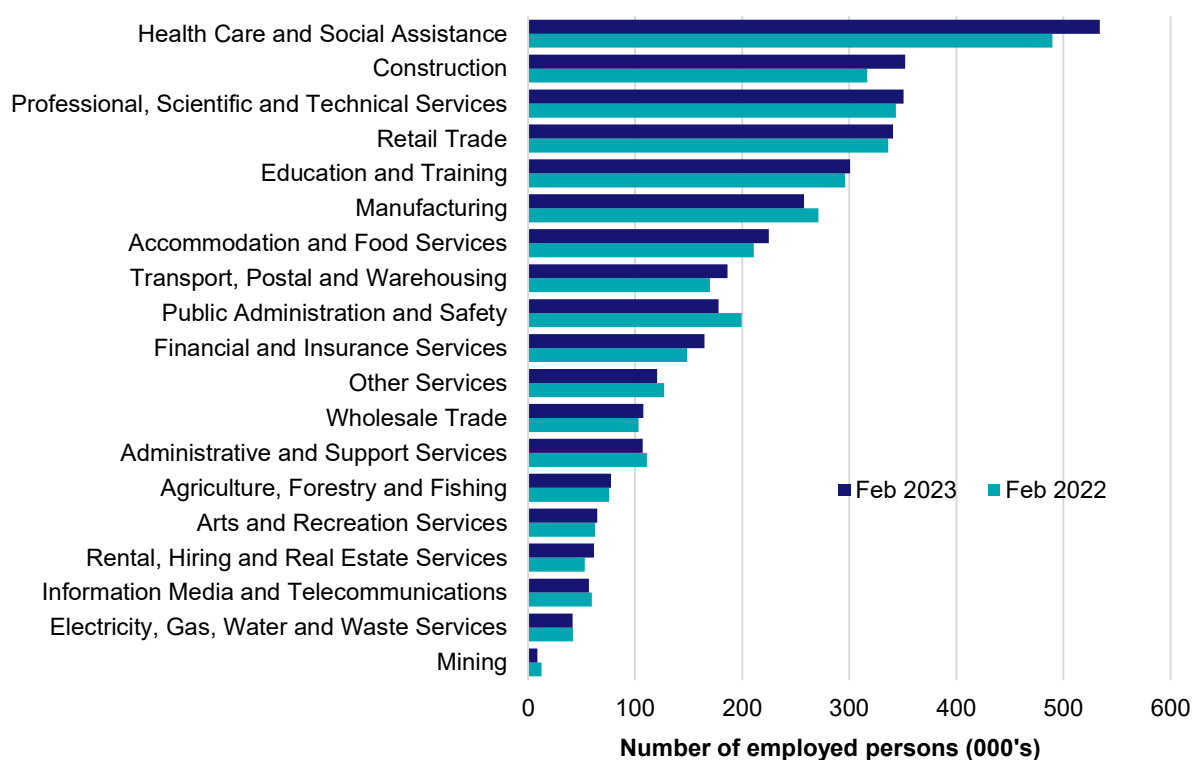
In February 2023, there were around 3,538,500 people employed in Victoria. The 5 largest employing industries in Victoria were Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Retail Trade and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 53% of all employment.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 9.1% to stand at 534,200
- Construction rose by 11.2% to stand at 352,300
- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services rose by 2.1% to stand at 350,900.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Victoria, 55% of workers were employed full-time; 78% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 41. Around 72% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Melbourne.

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022

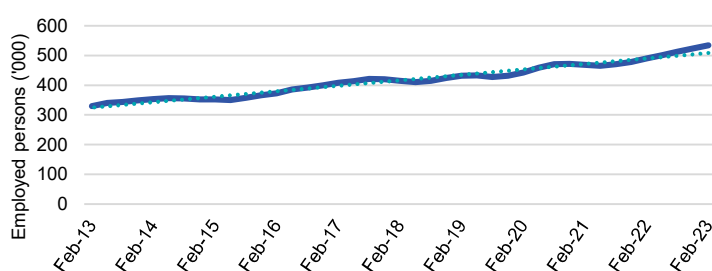

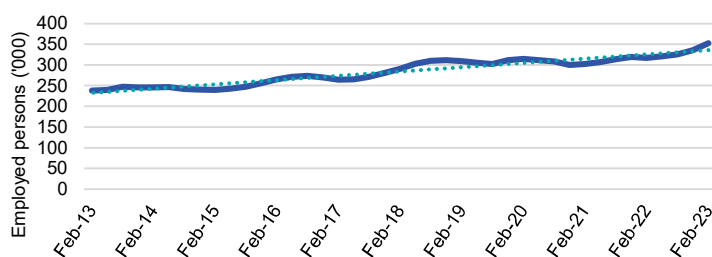

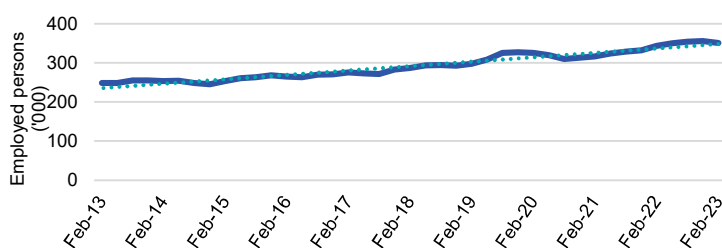

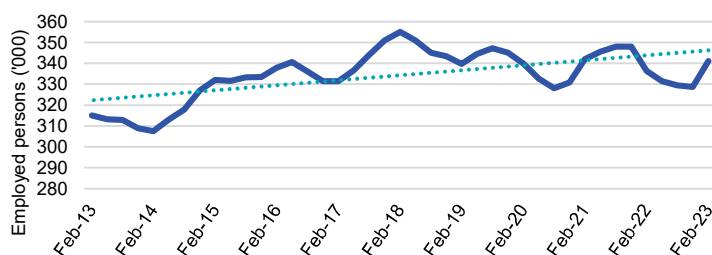

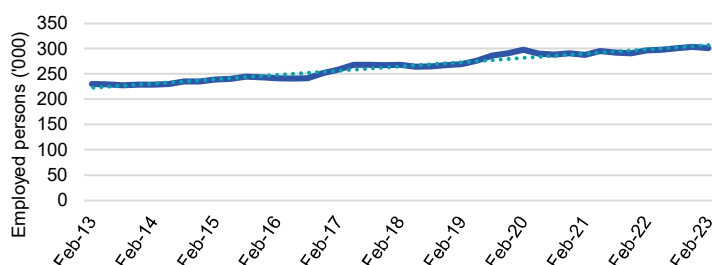

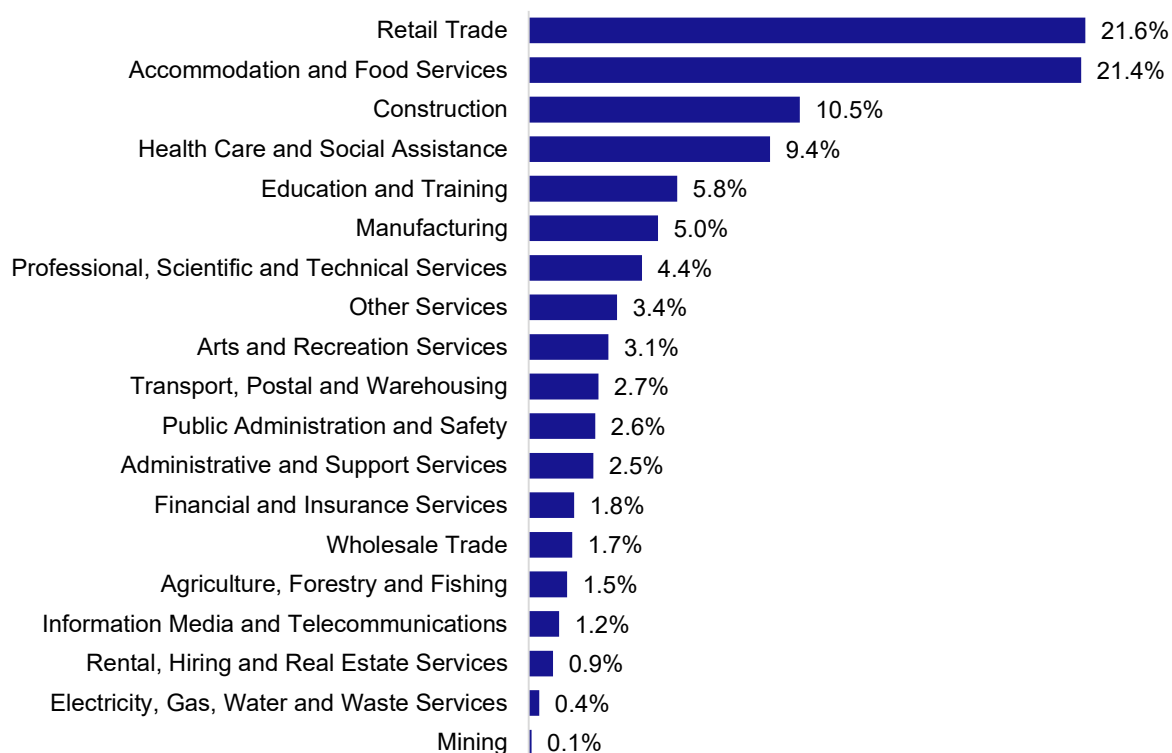

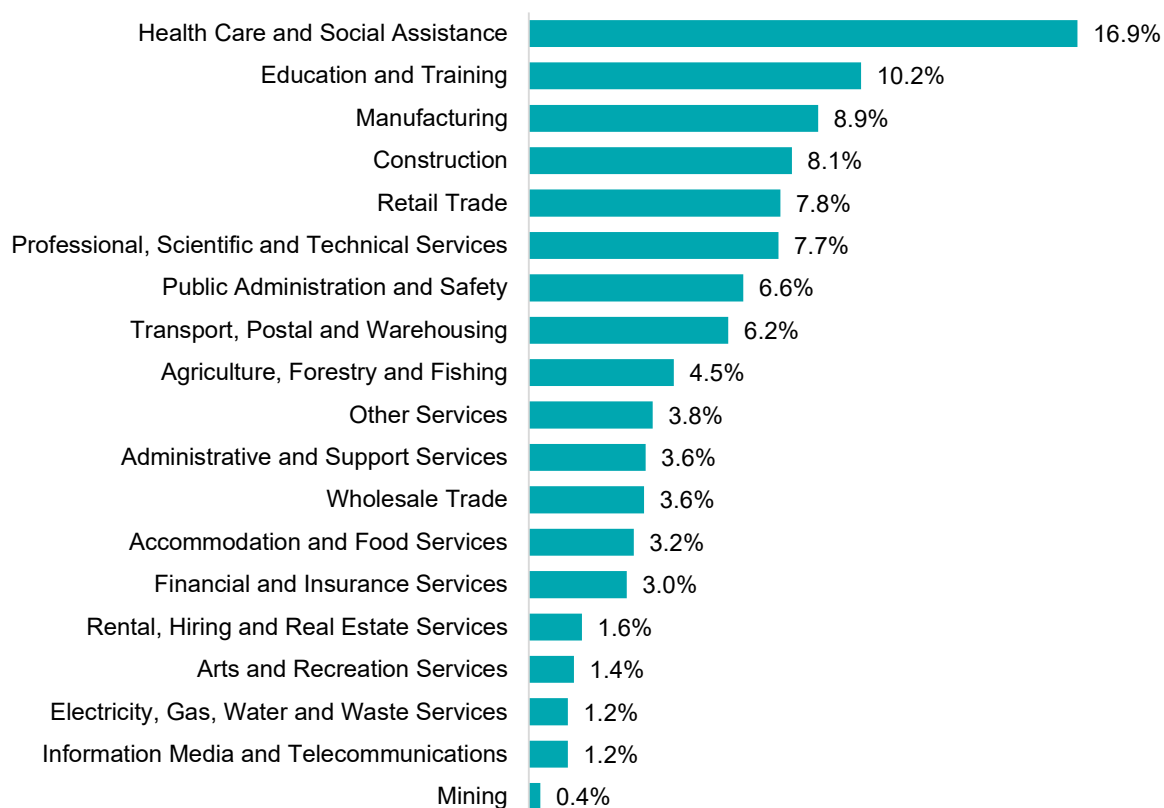

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



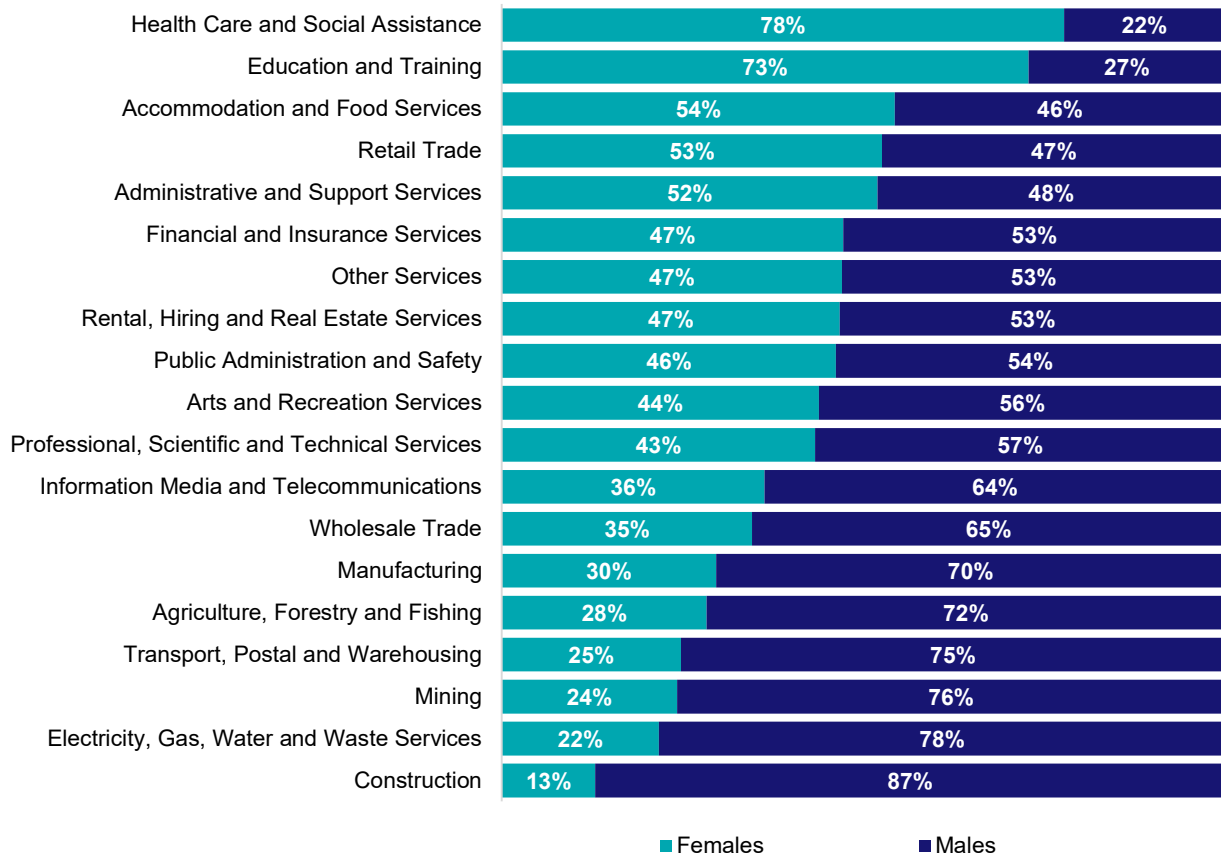

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



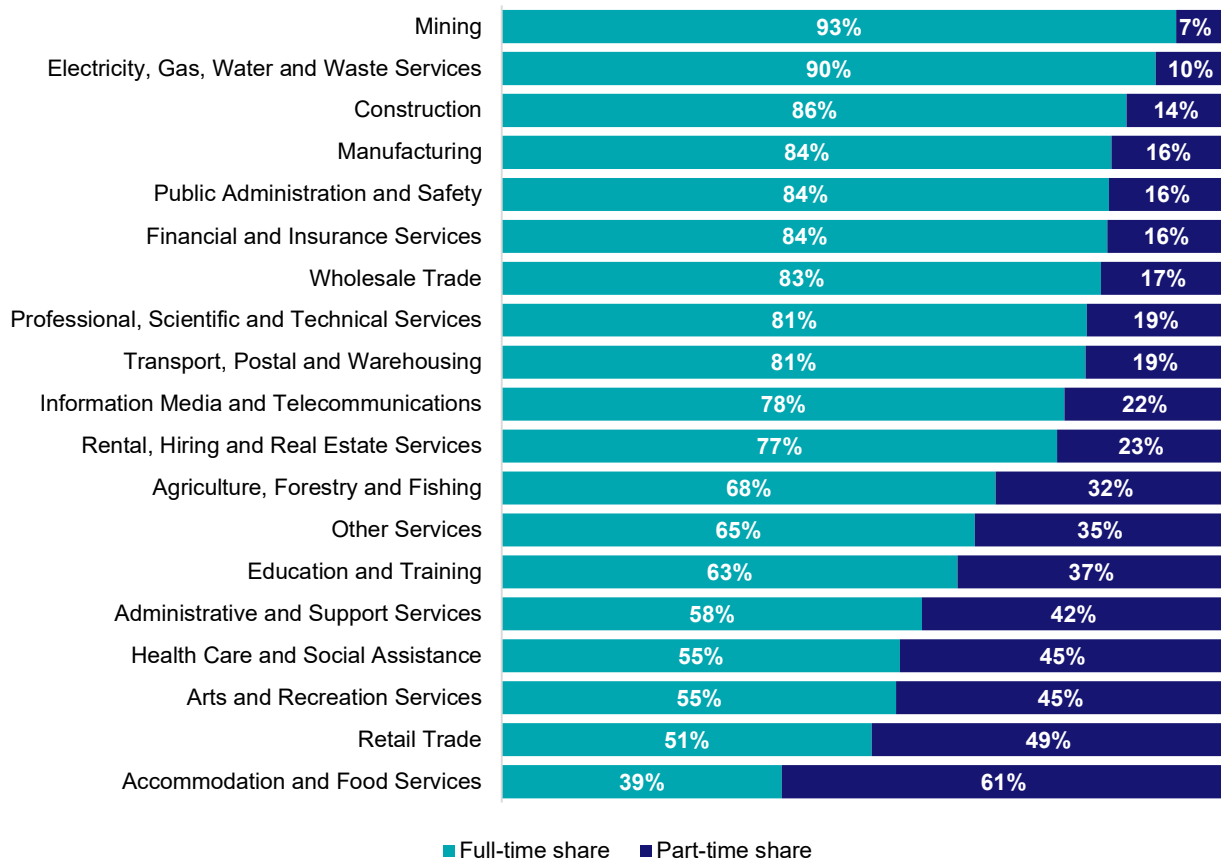

Overview

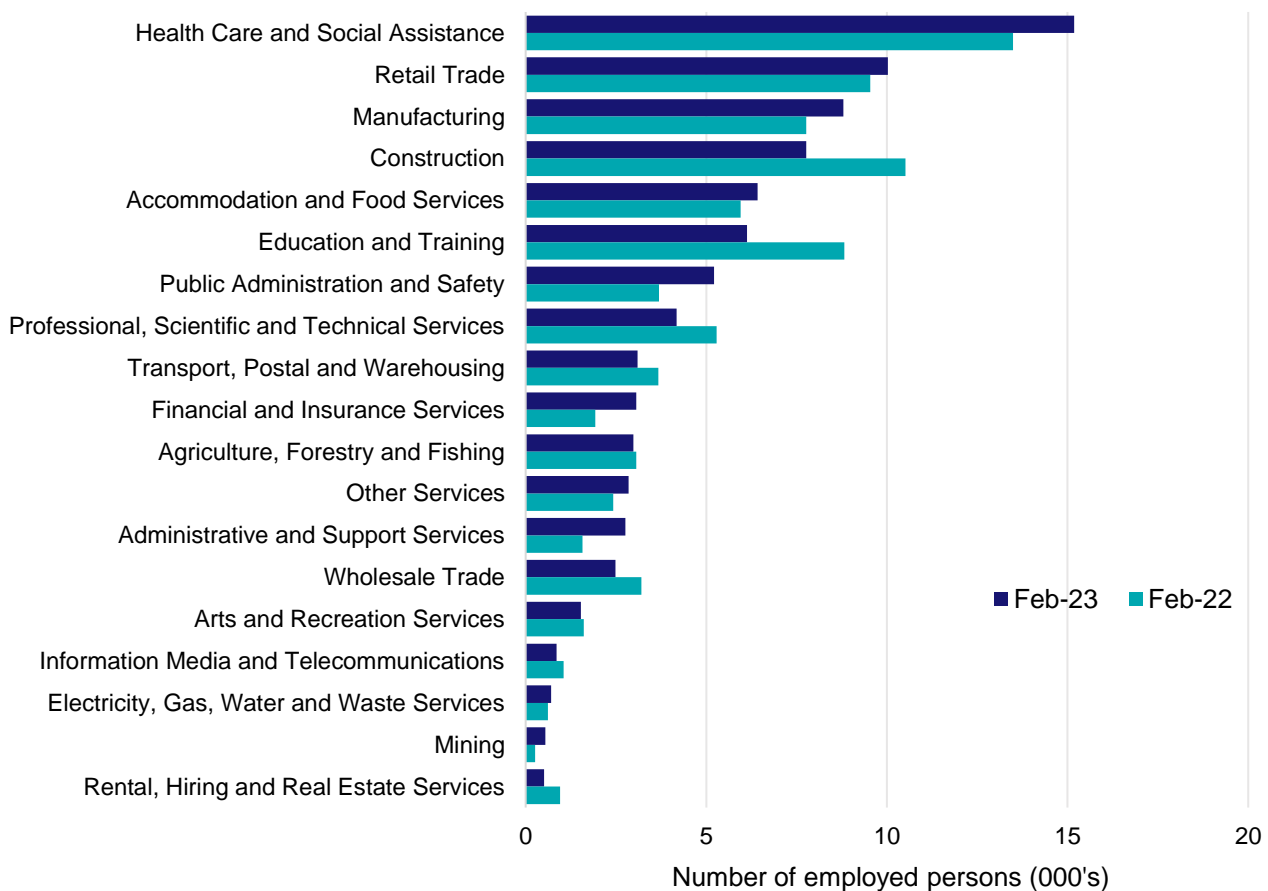
In February 2023, there were around 85,100 people employed in the Ballarat Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Manufacturing, Construction, and Accommodation and Food Services. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 12.5% to stand at 15,200
- Retail Trade rose by 5.1% to stand at 10,000
- Manufacturing rose by 13.2% to stand at 8,800.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Ballarat Employment Region, 53% of workers were employed full-time; 67% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 44.

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



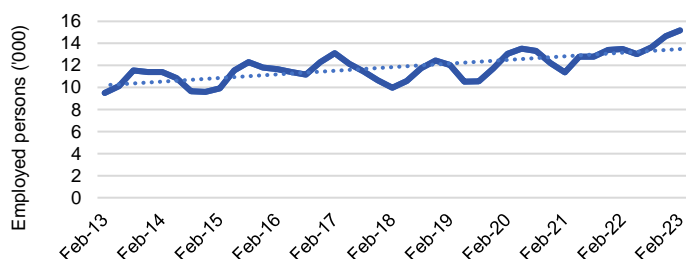

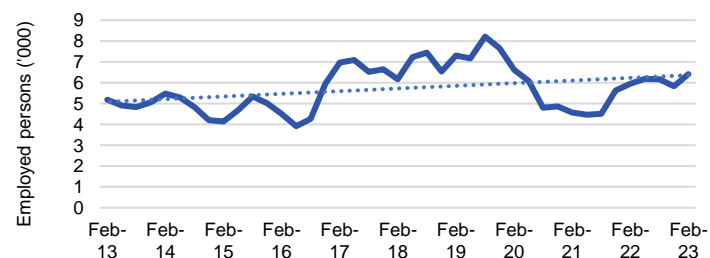

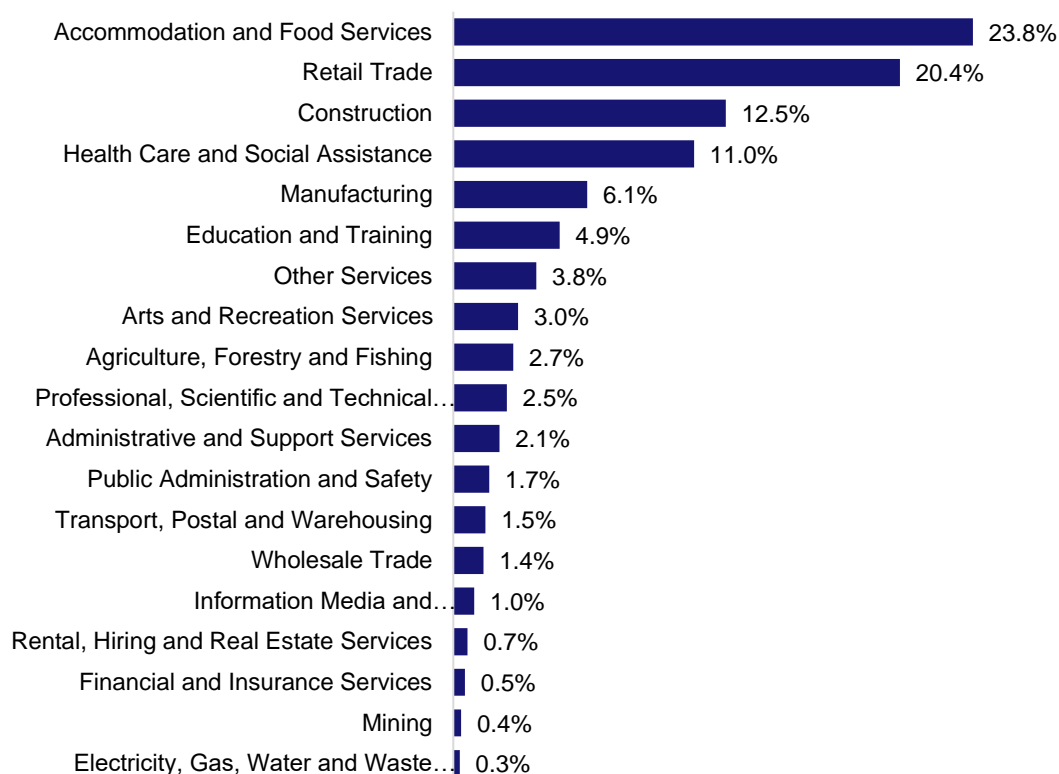

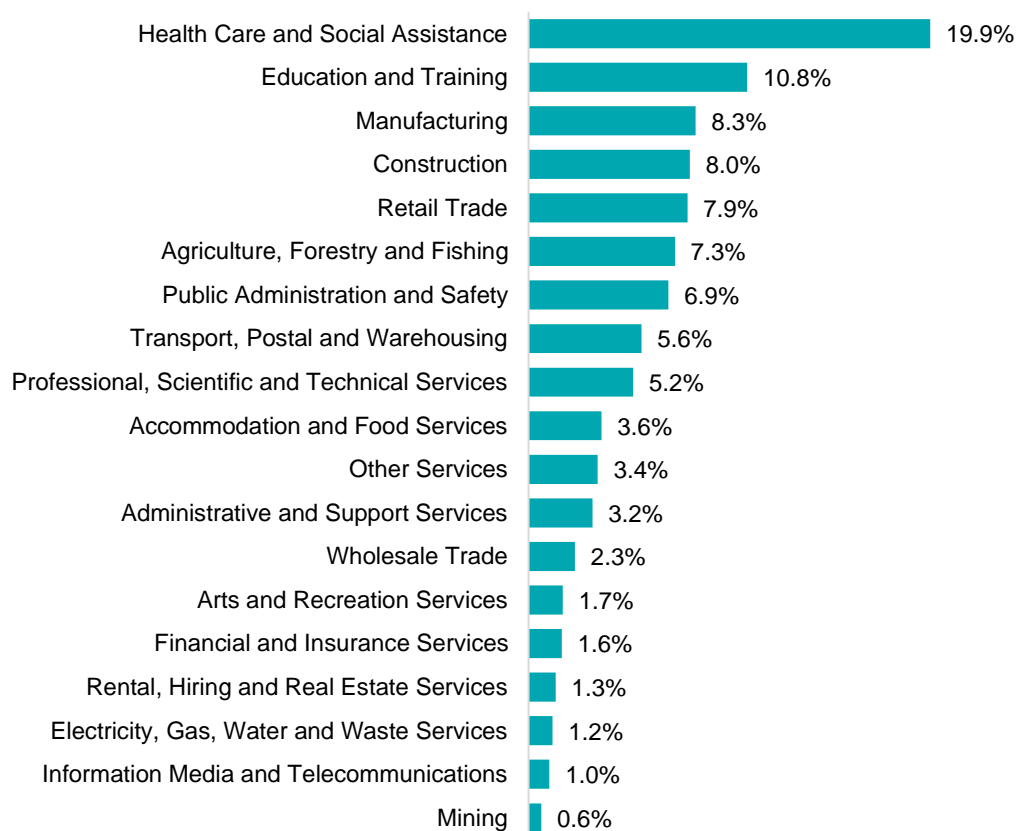

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



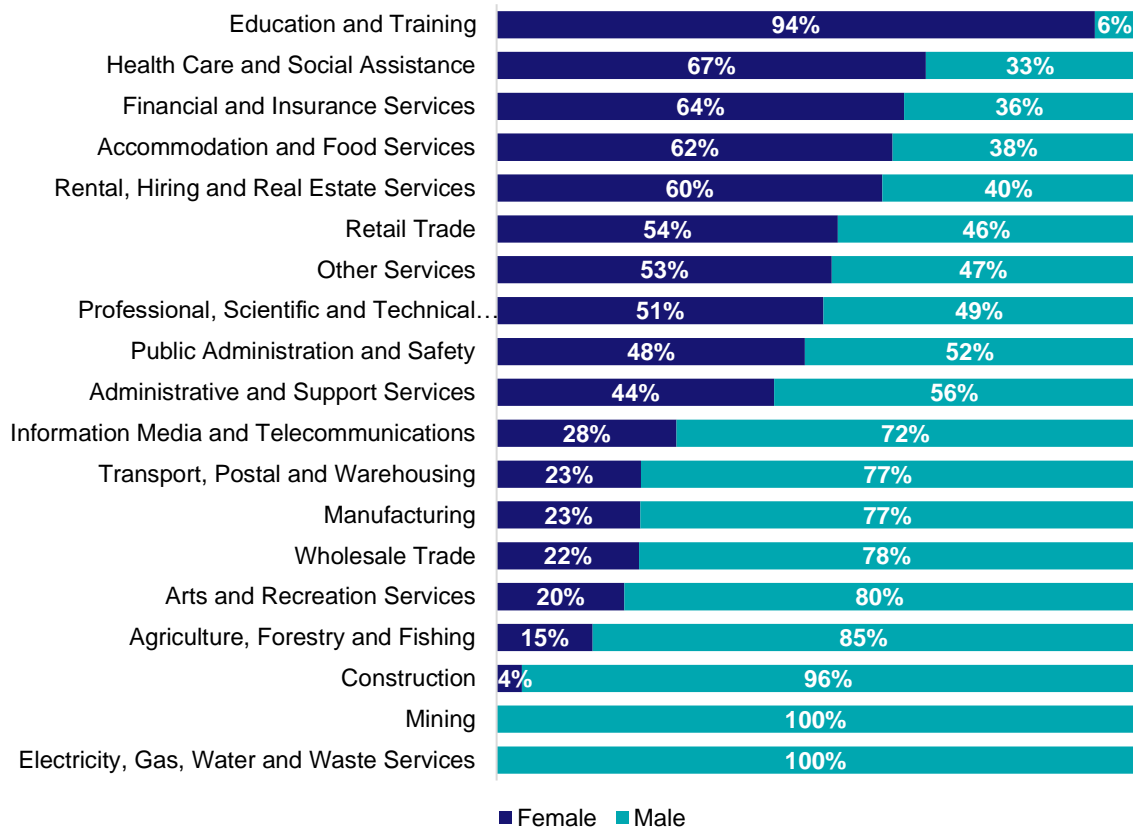

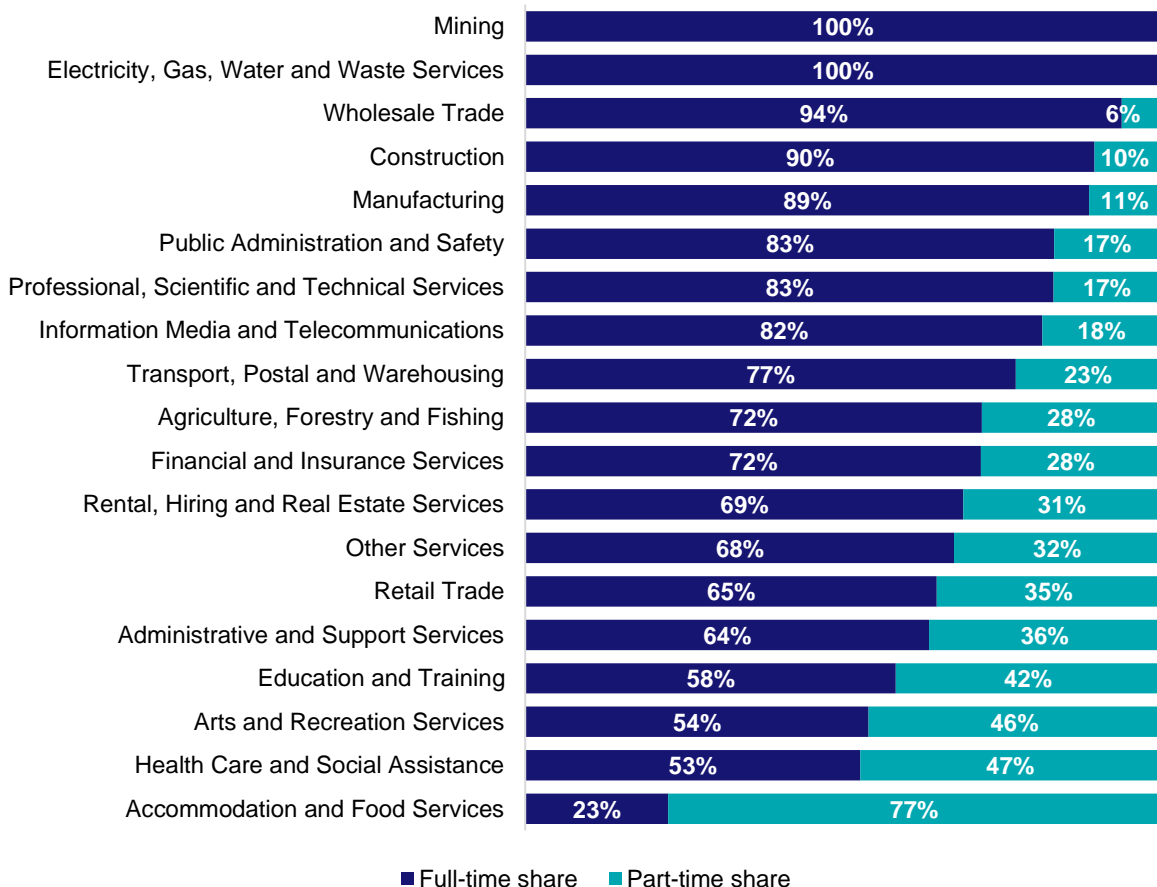

Overview

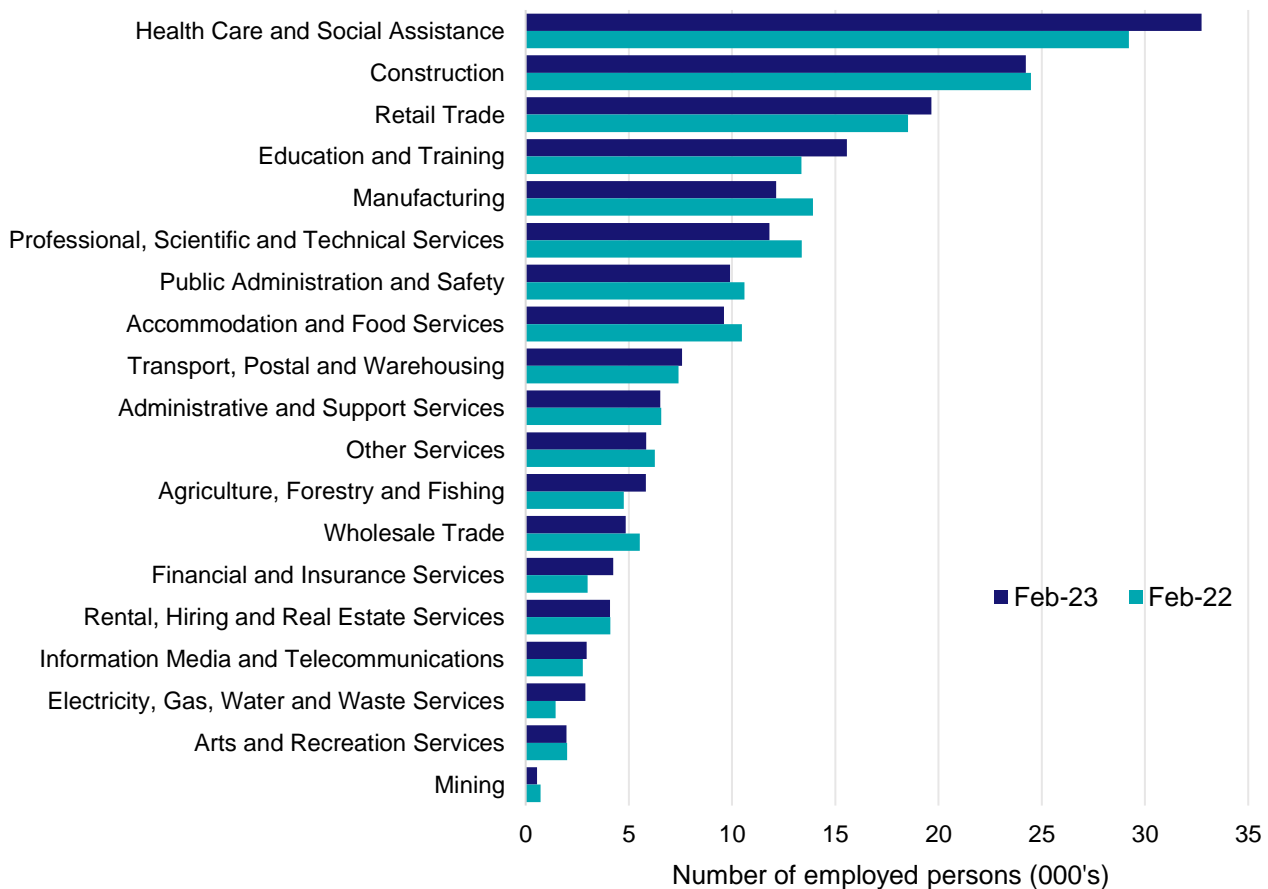
In February 2023, there were around 182,900 people employed in the Barwon Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Retail Trade, Education and Training, and Manufacturing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 12.1% to stand at 32,700
- Construction fell by 1.0% to stand at 24,200
- Retail Trade rose by 6.1% to stand at 19,700.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Barwon Employment Region, 54% of workers were employed part-time; 77% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 42.

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



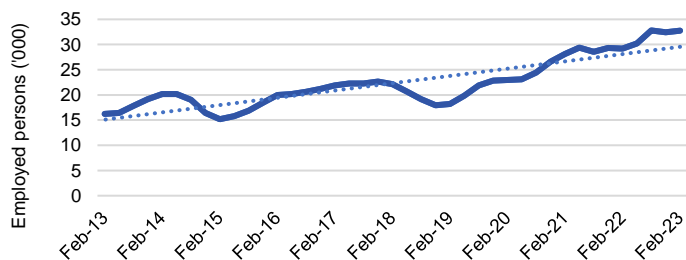

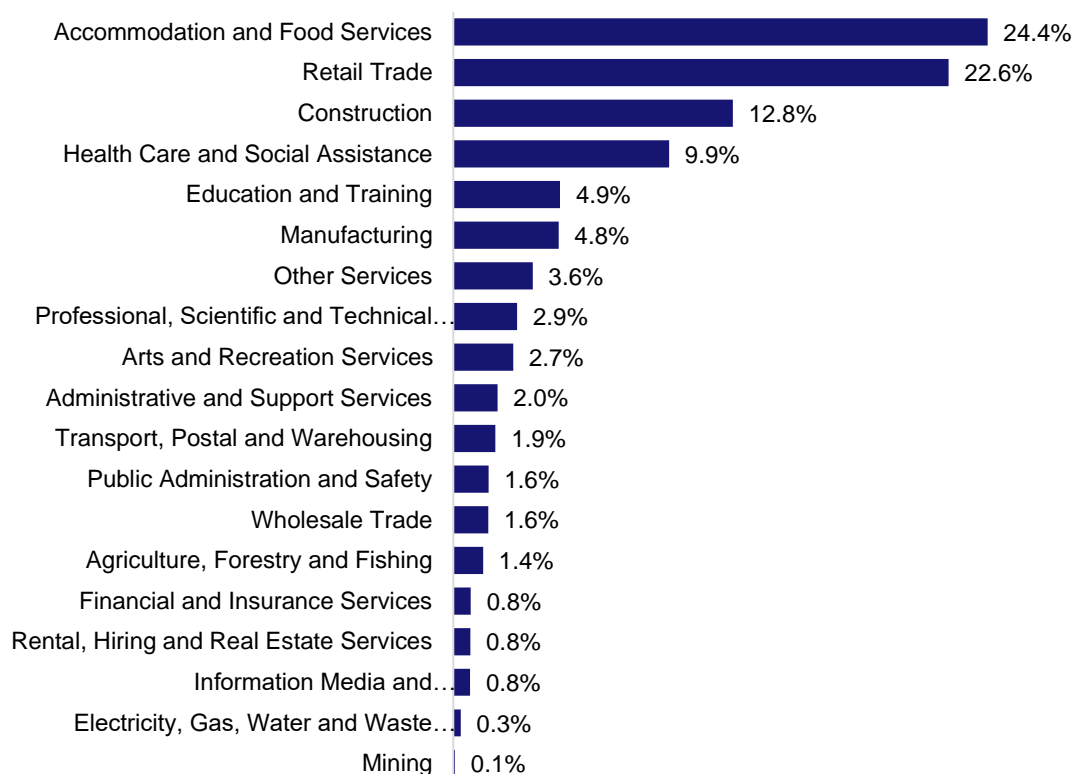

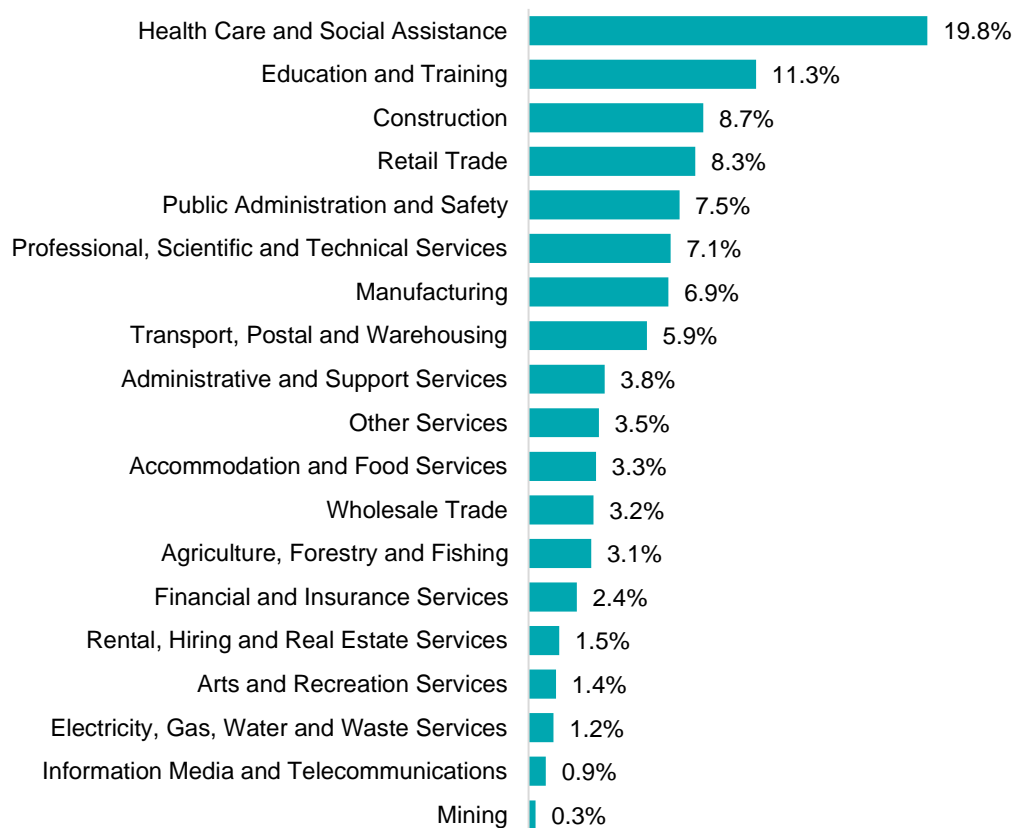

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



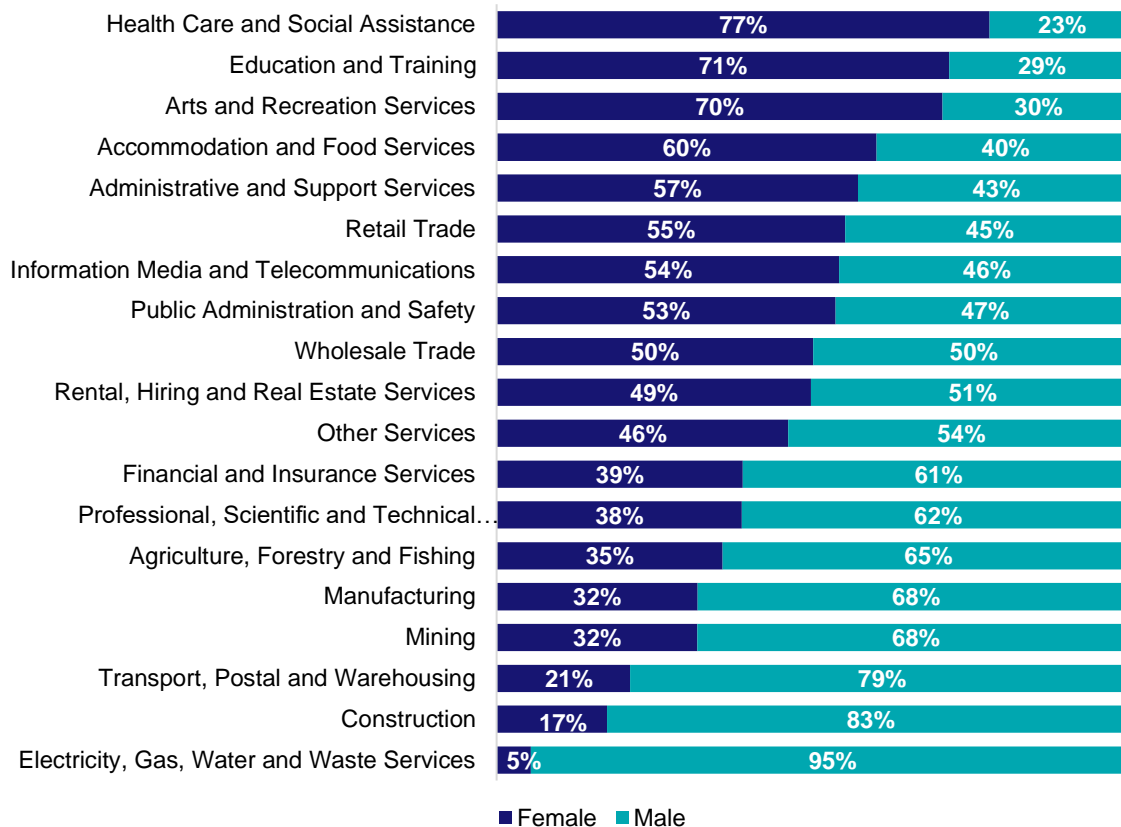

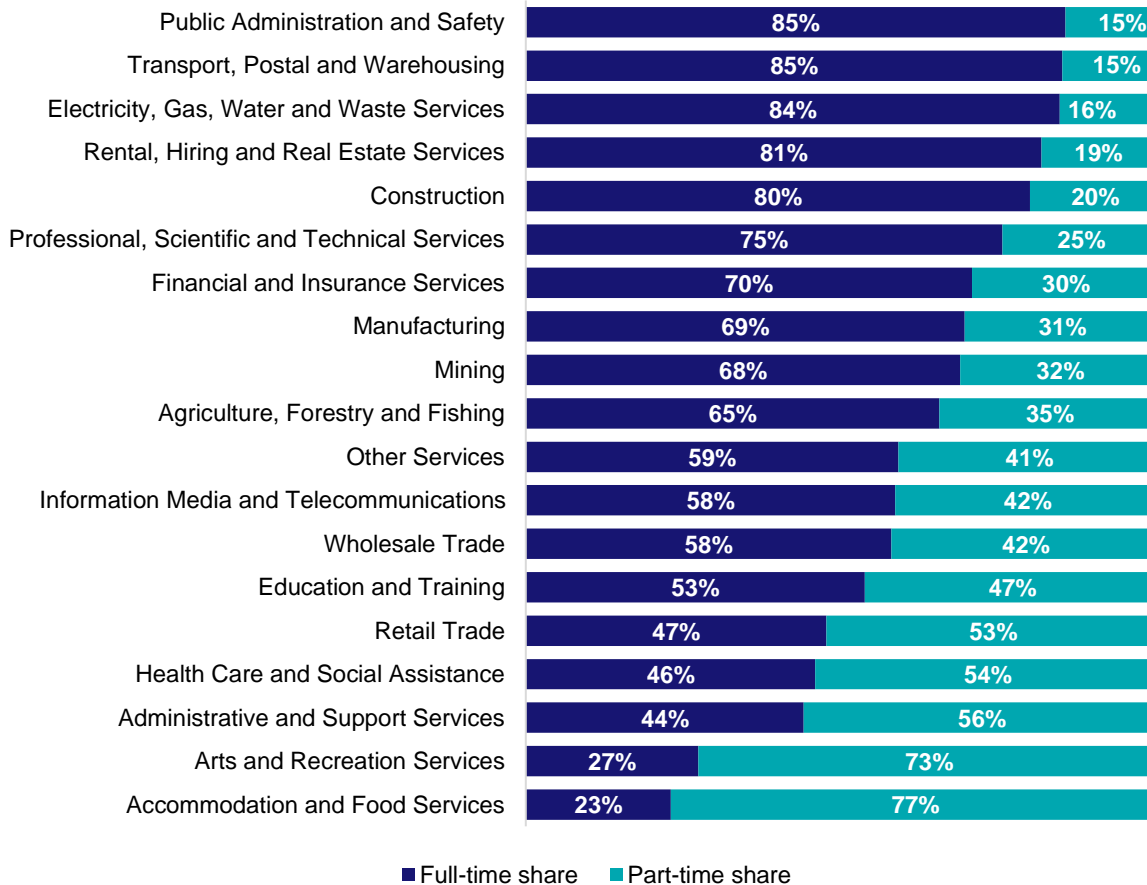

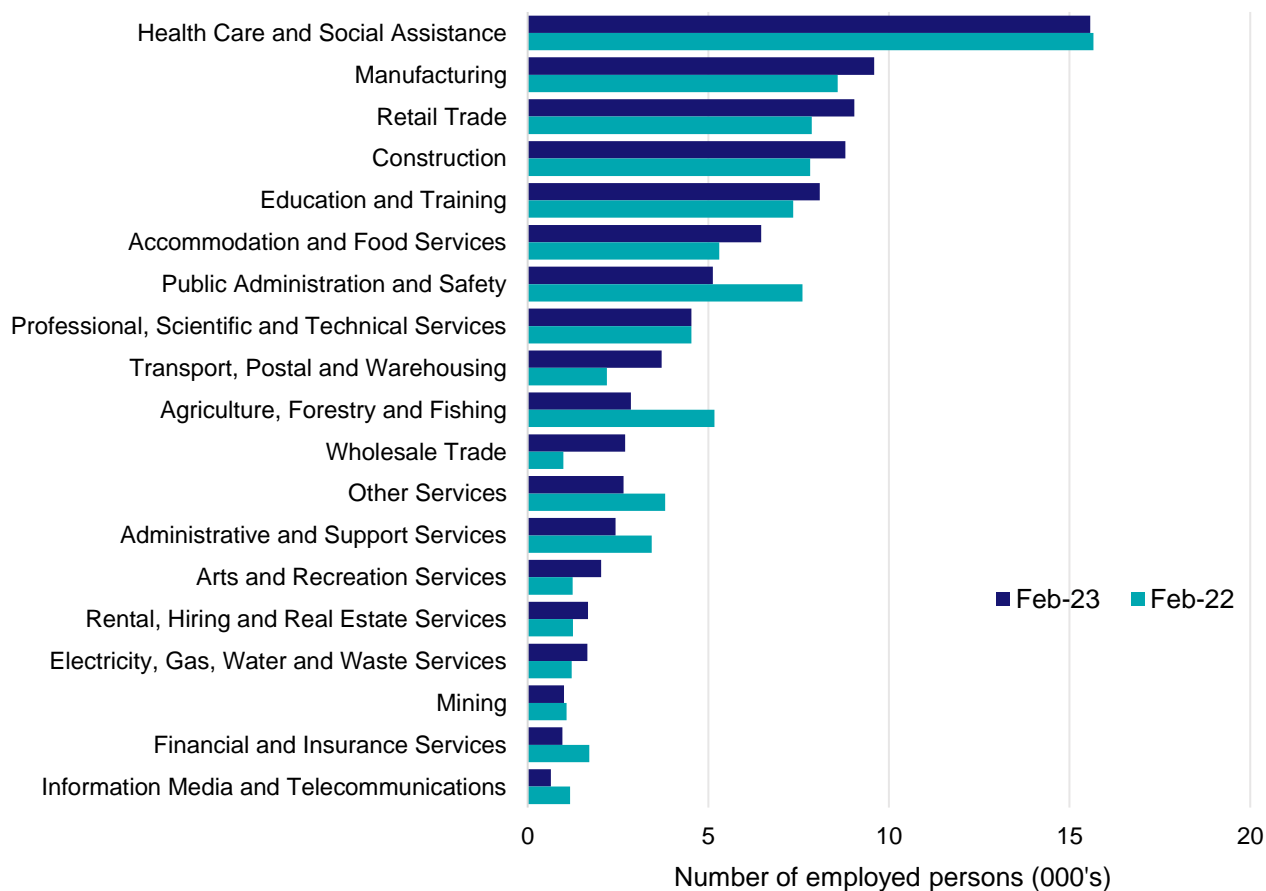

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



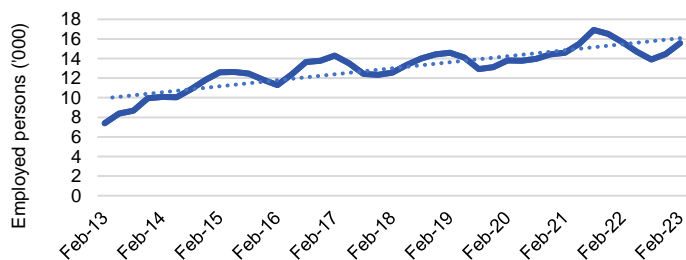

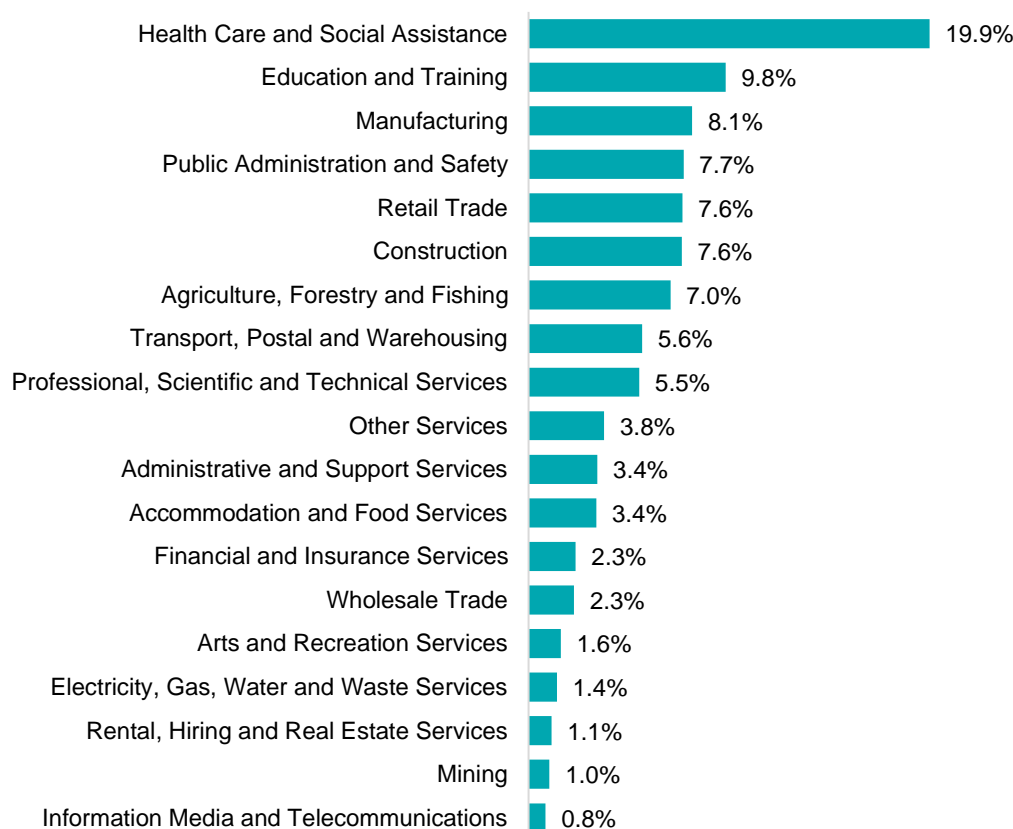

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



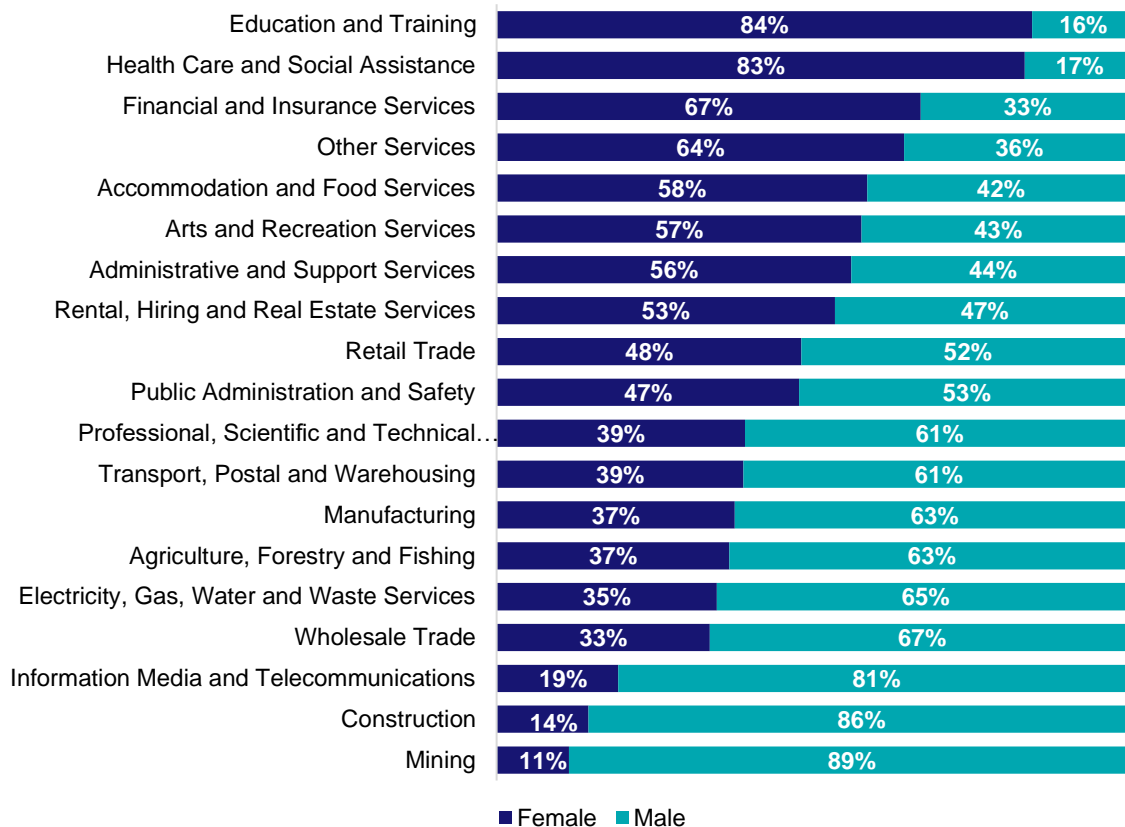

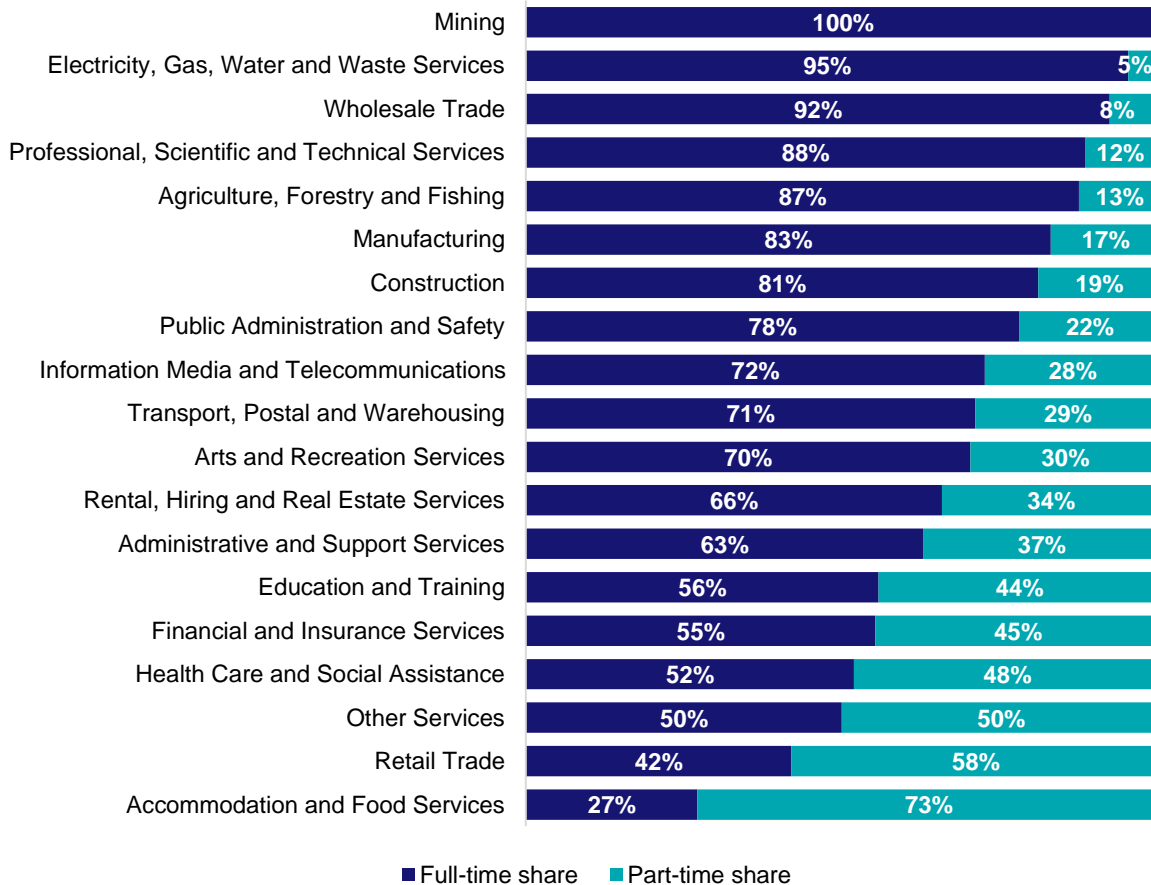

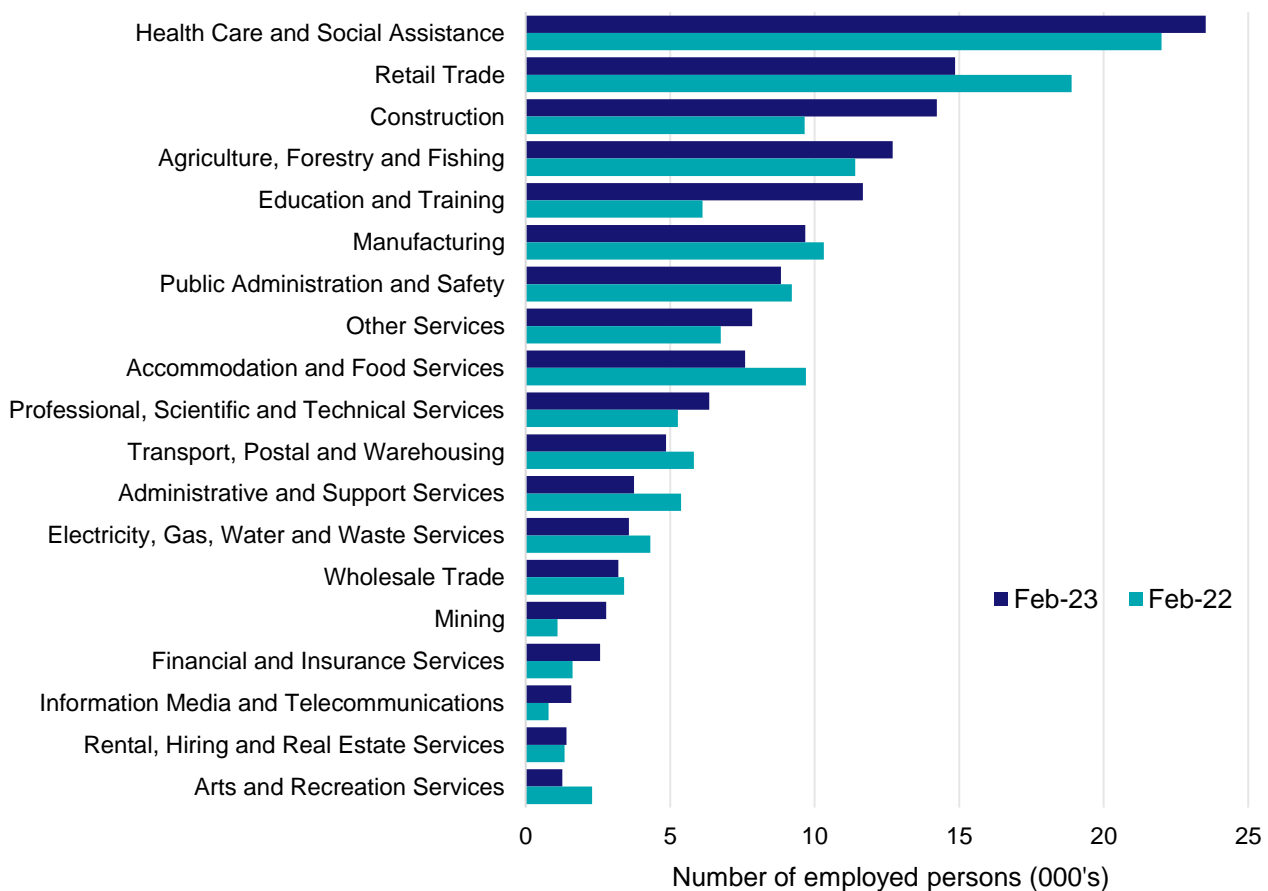

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



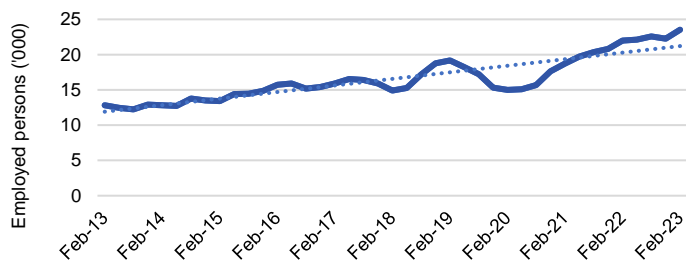

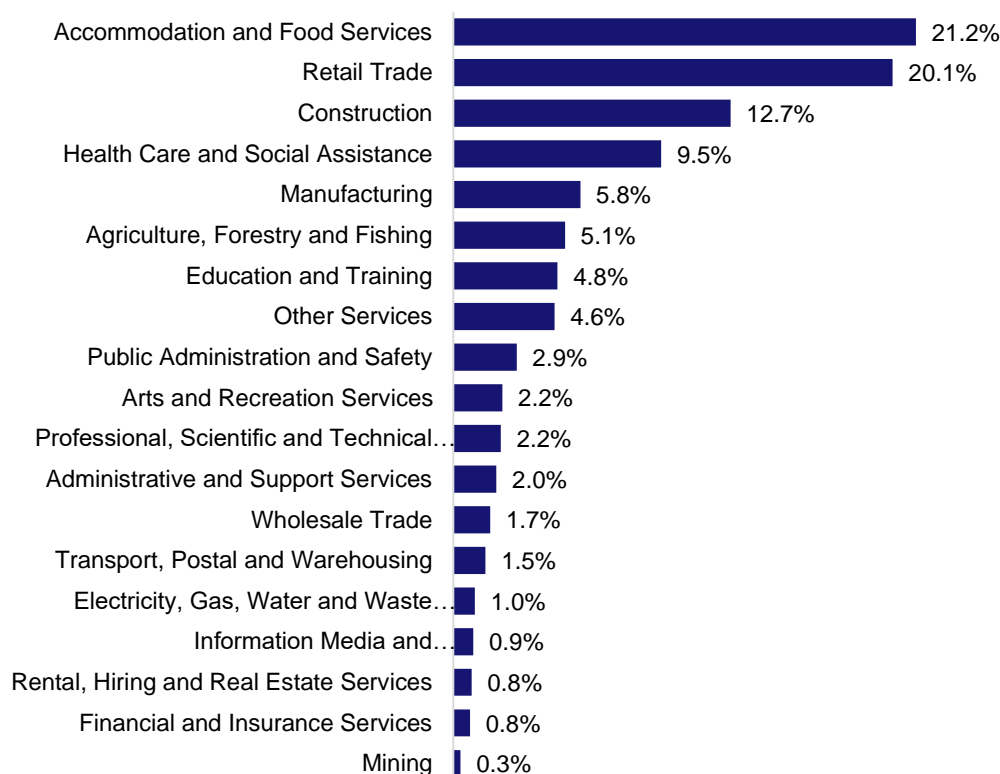

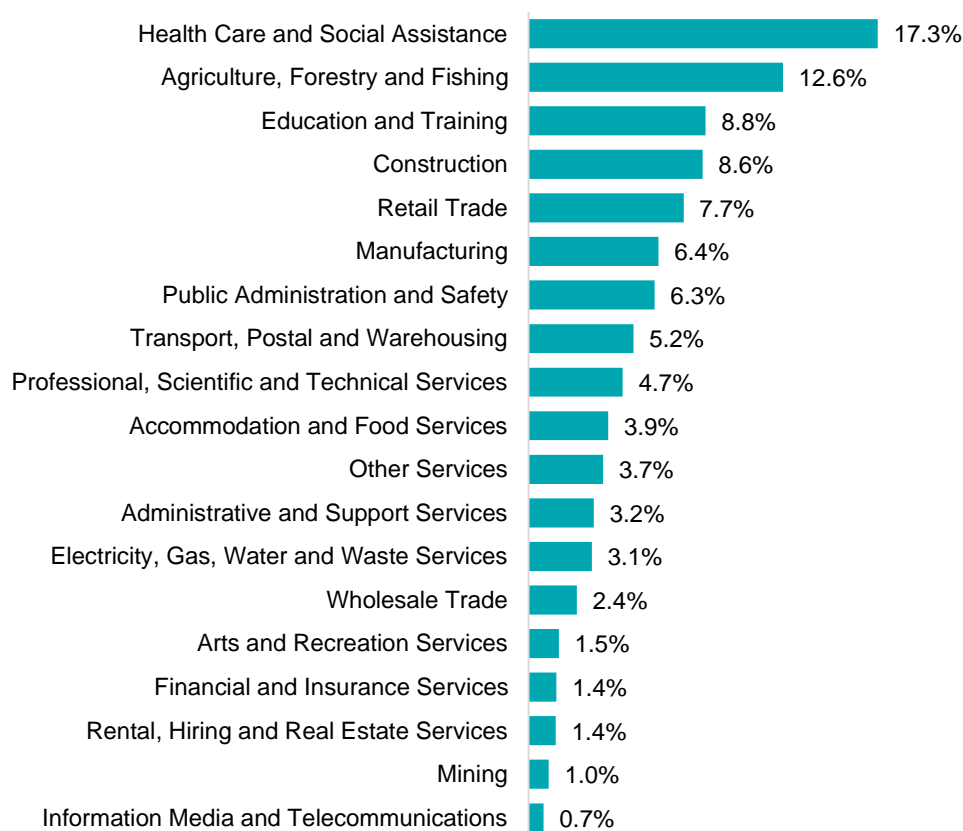
Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



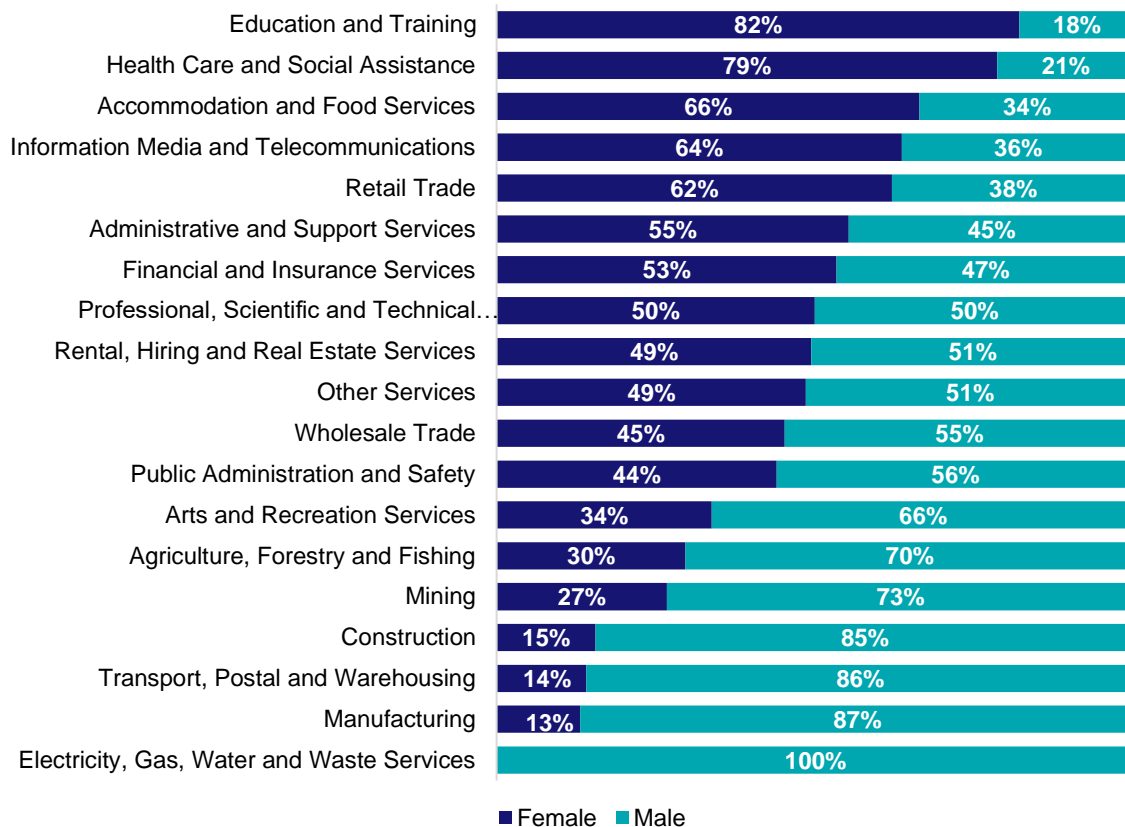

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



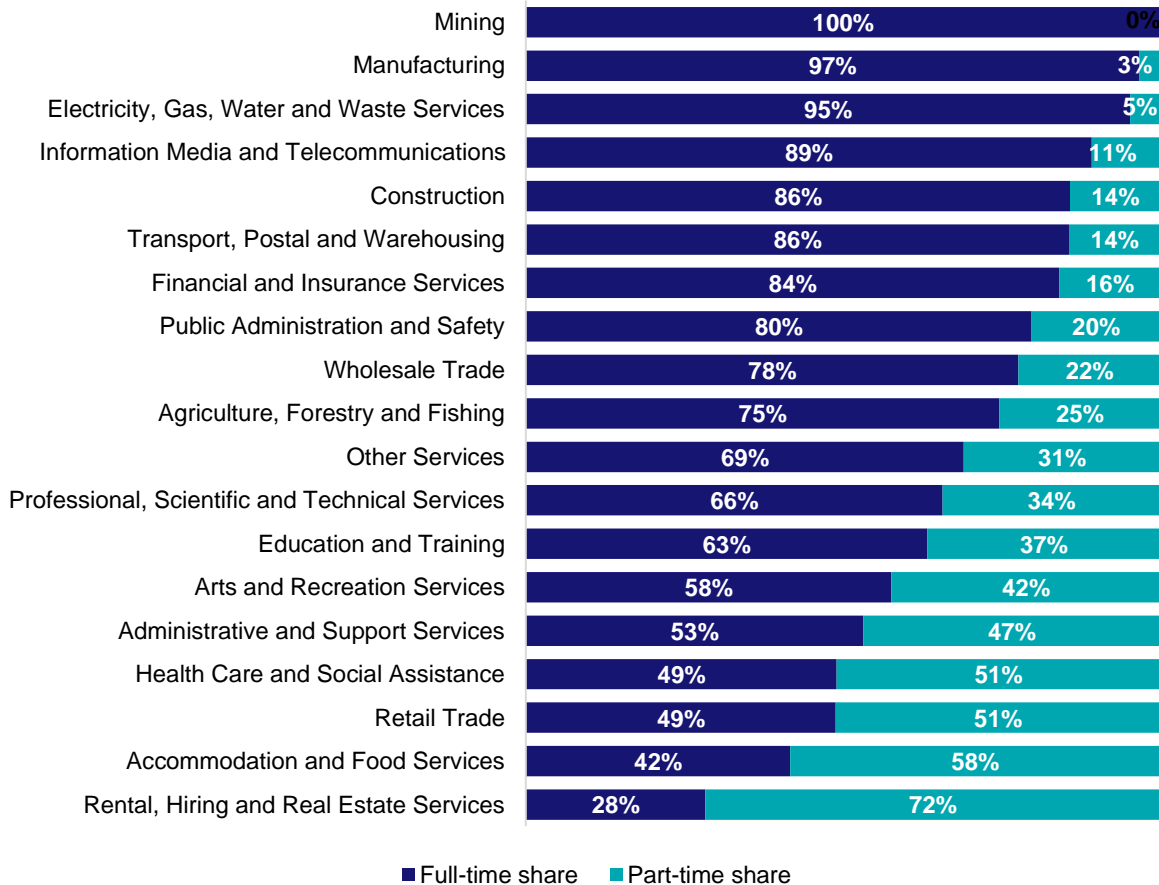

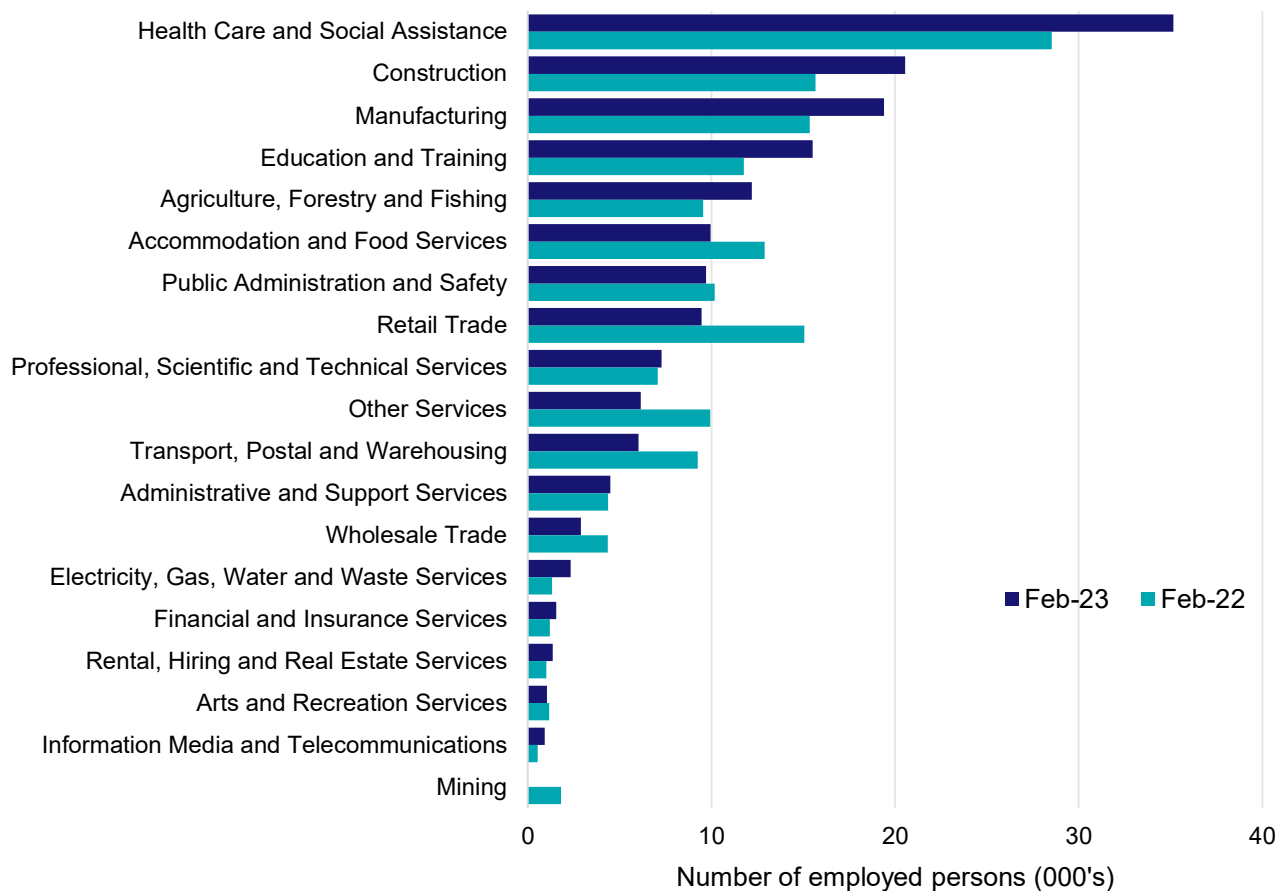

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



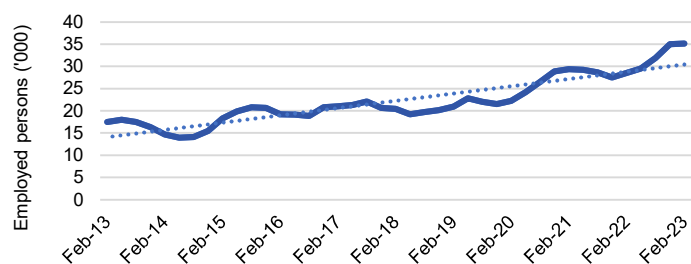

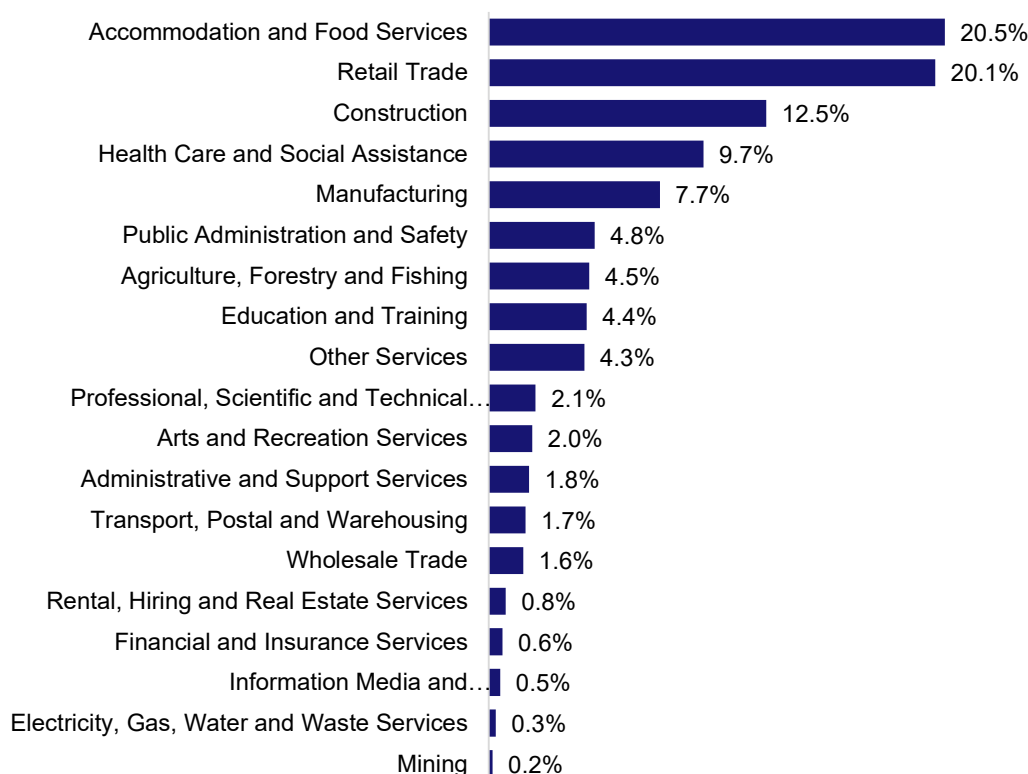

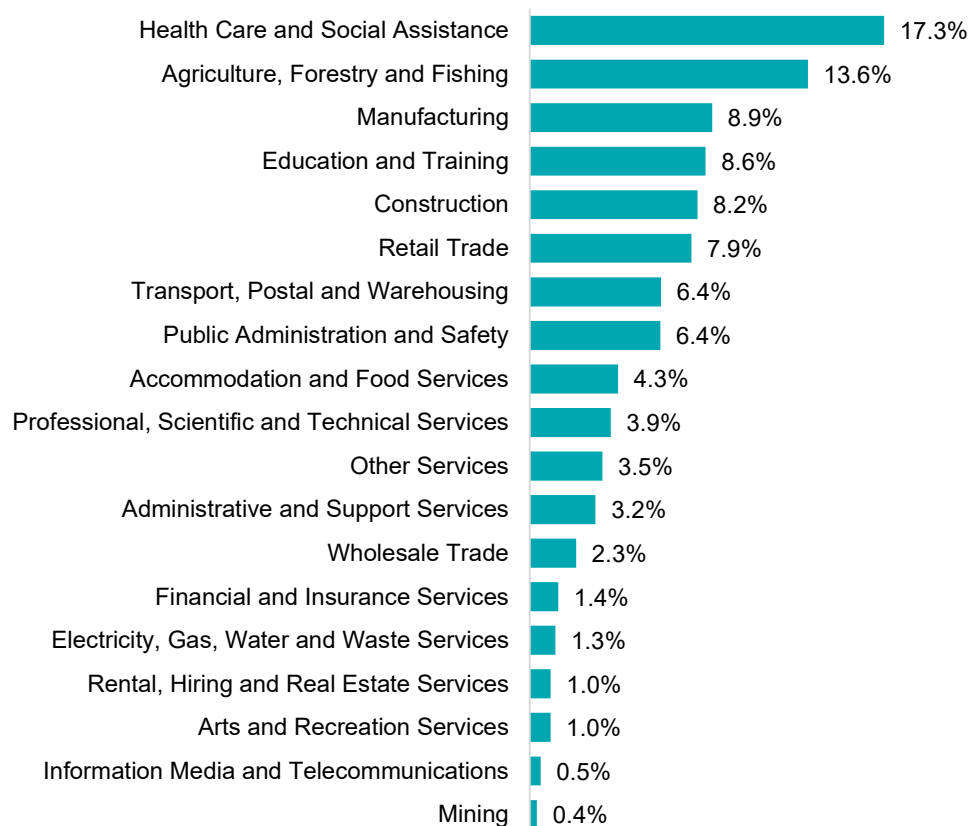

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



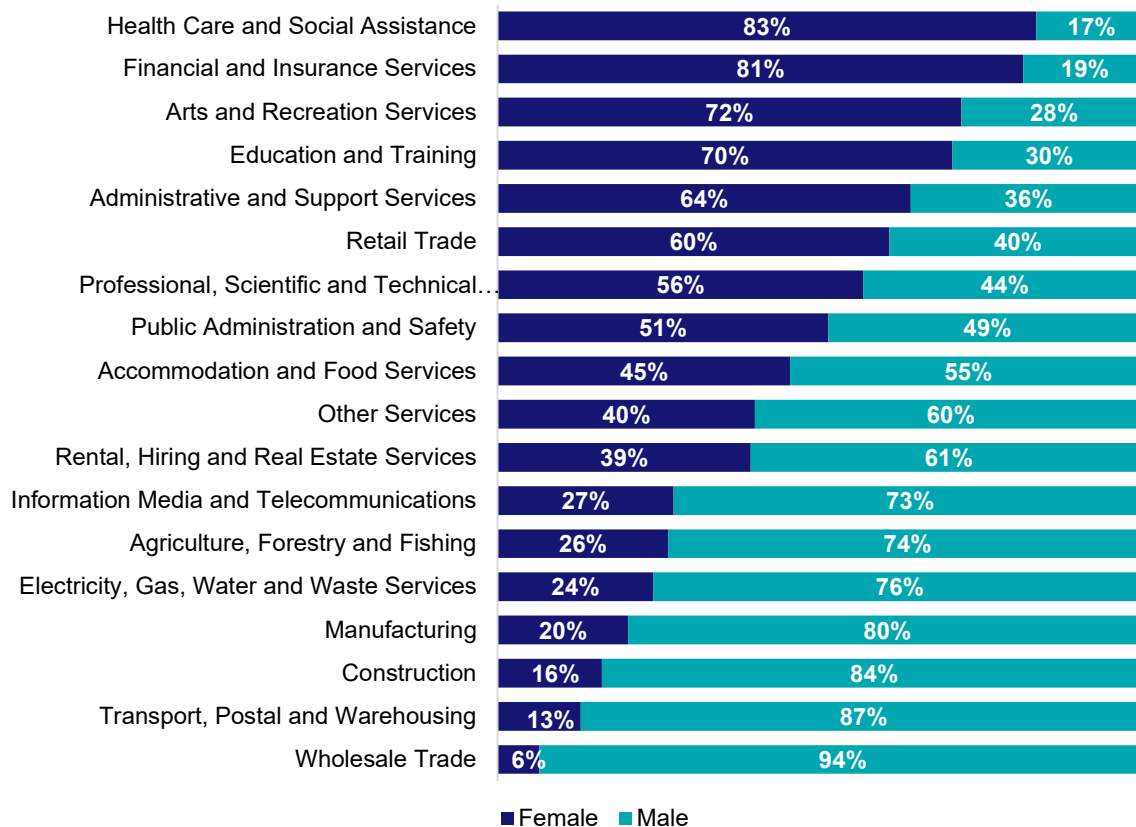

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



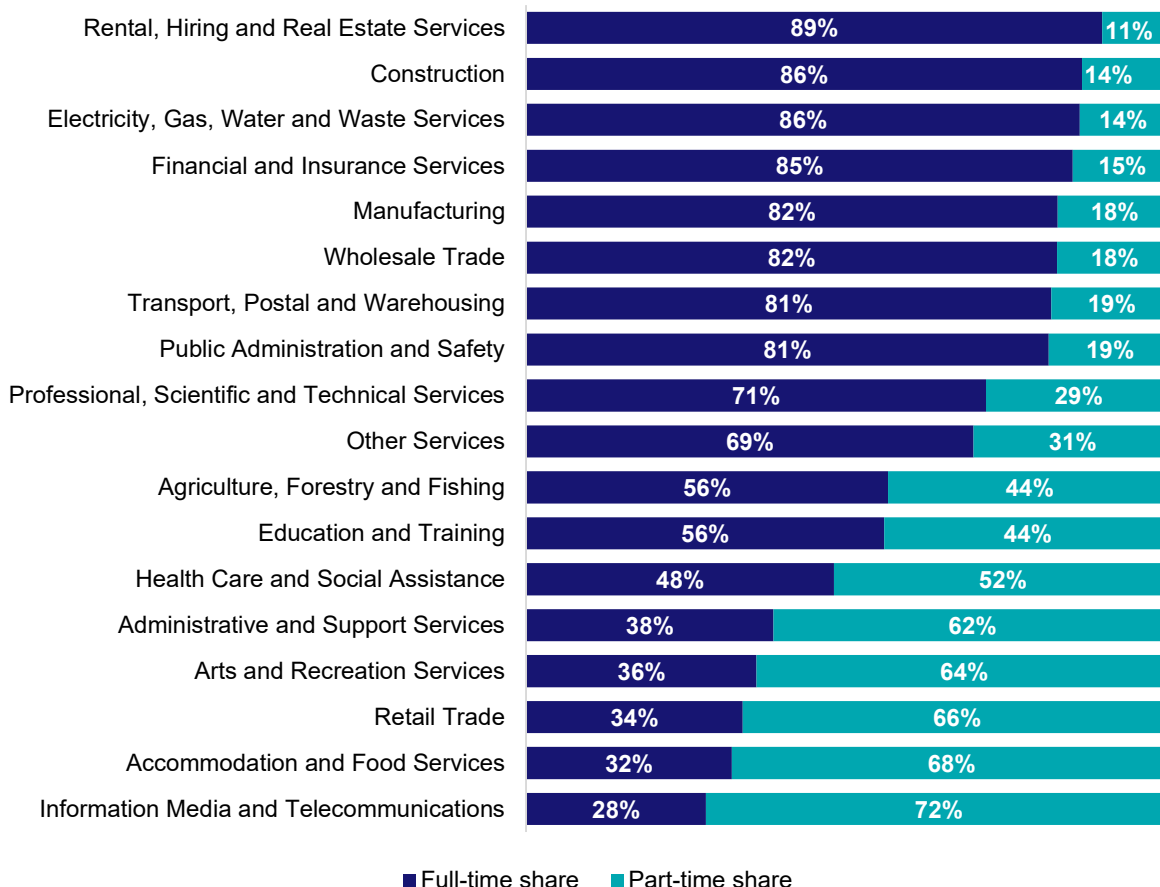

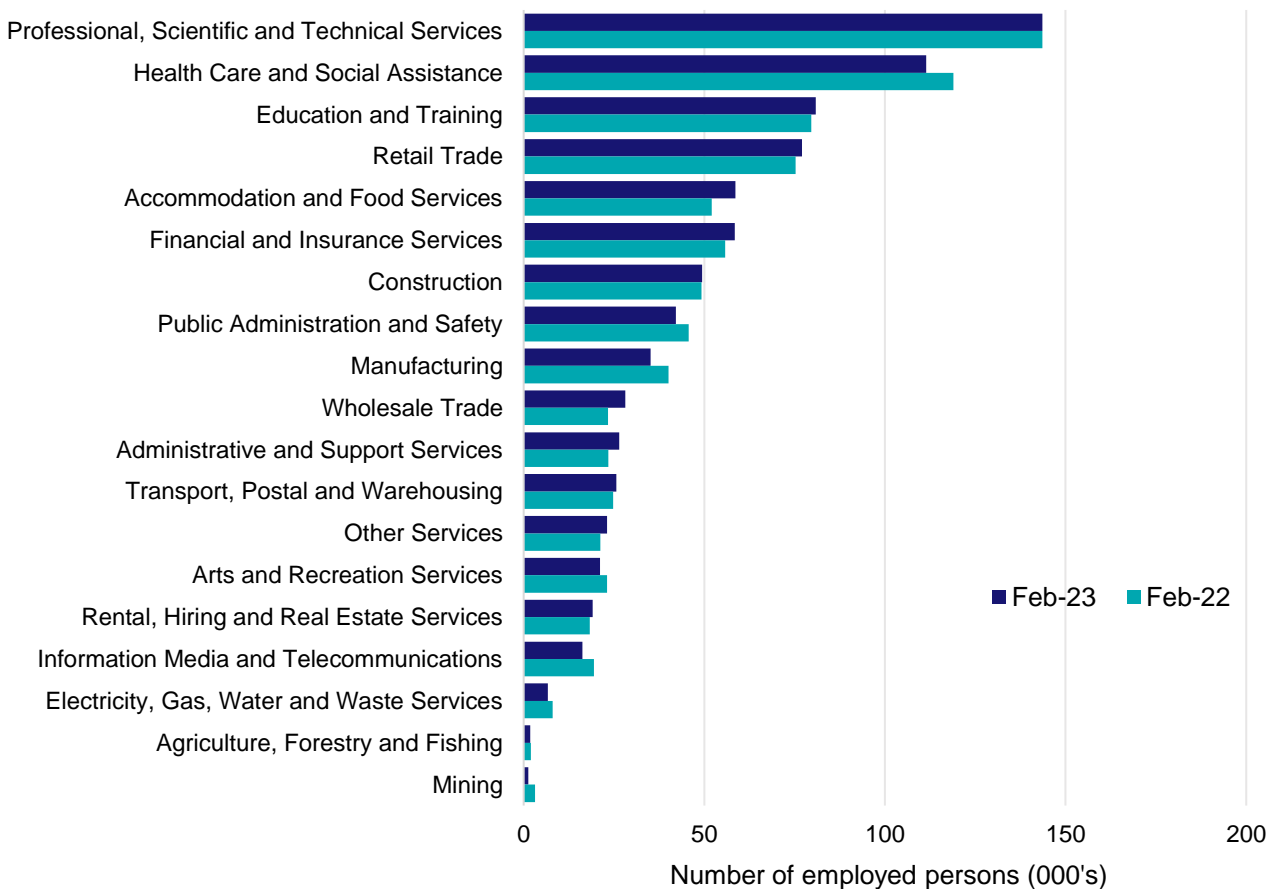

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



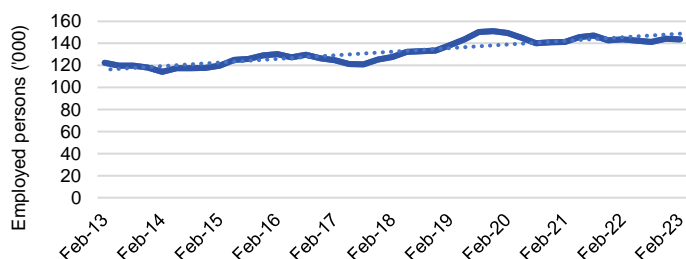

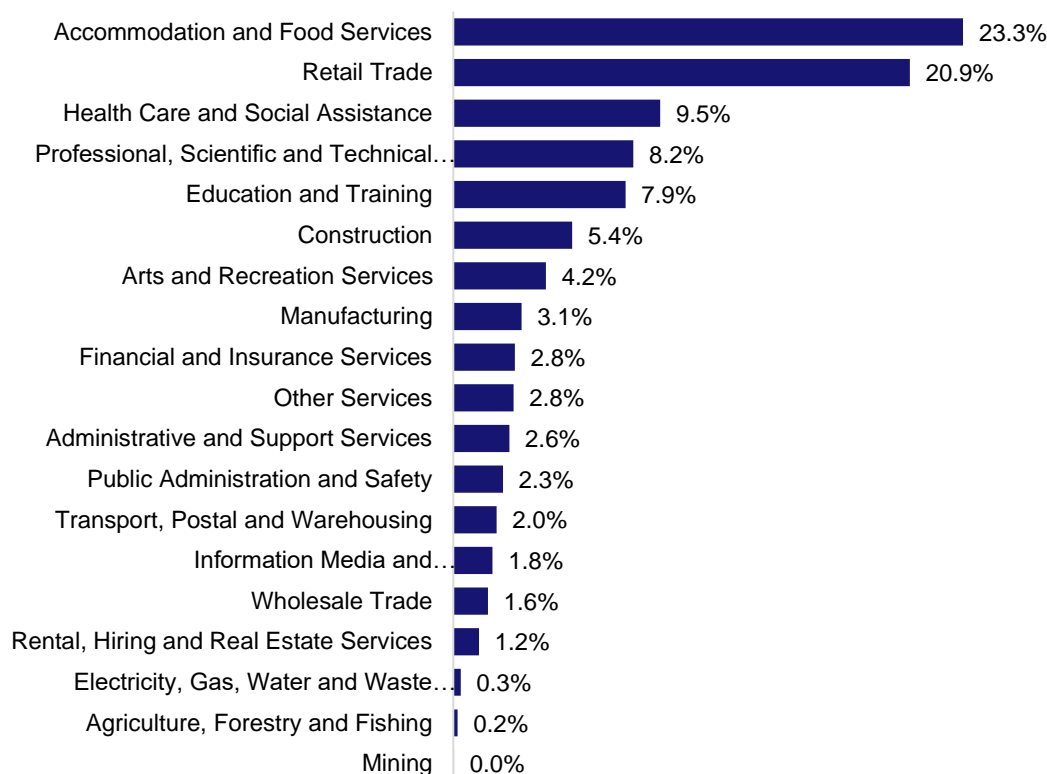

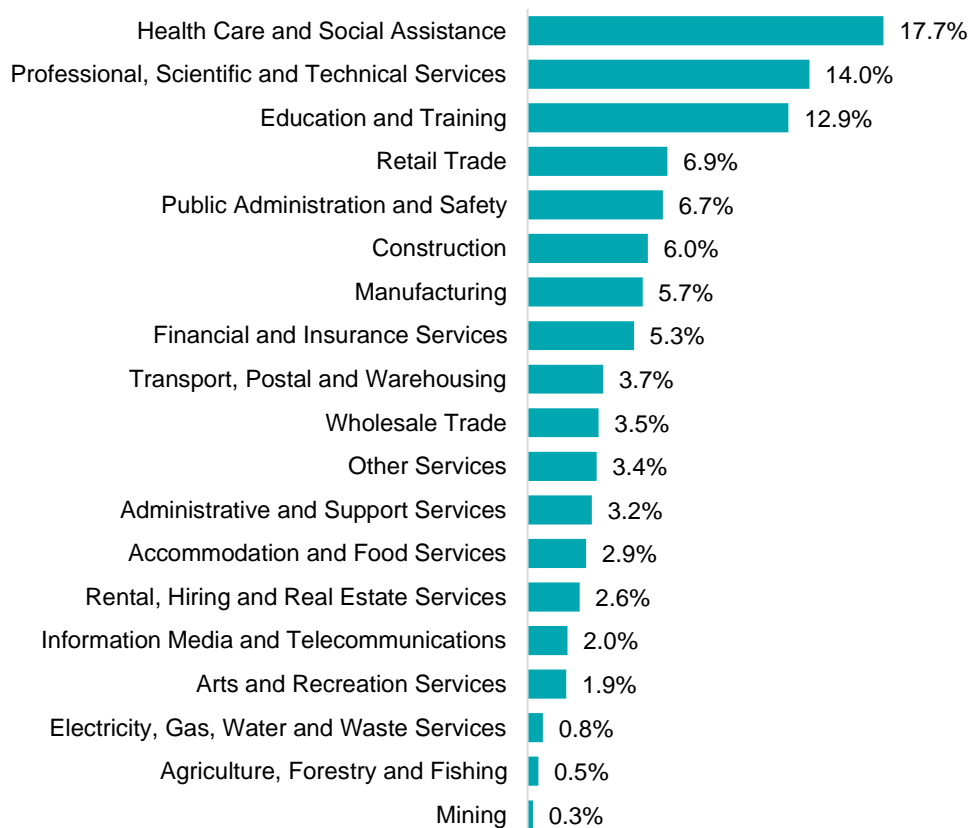

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



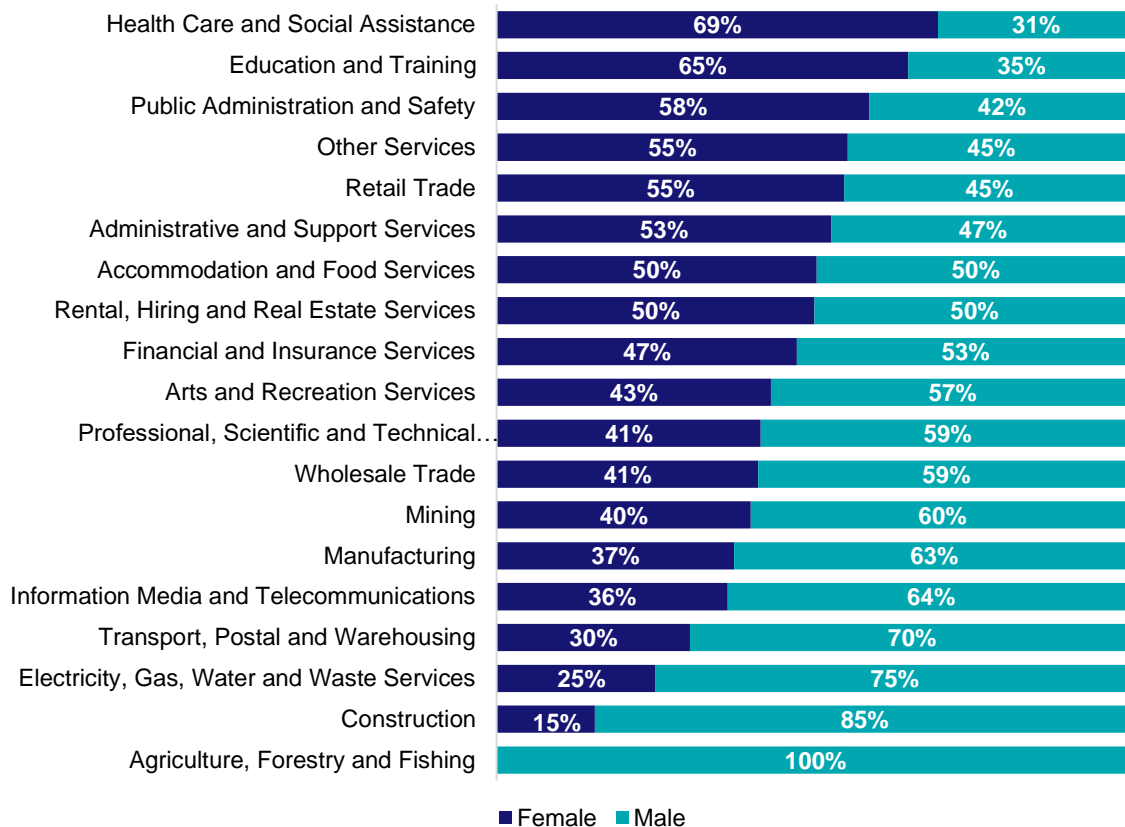

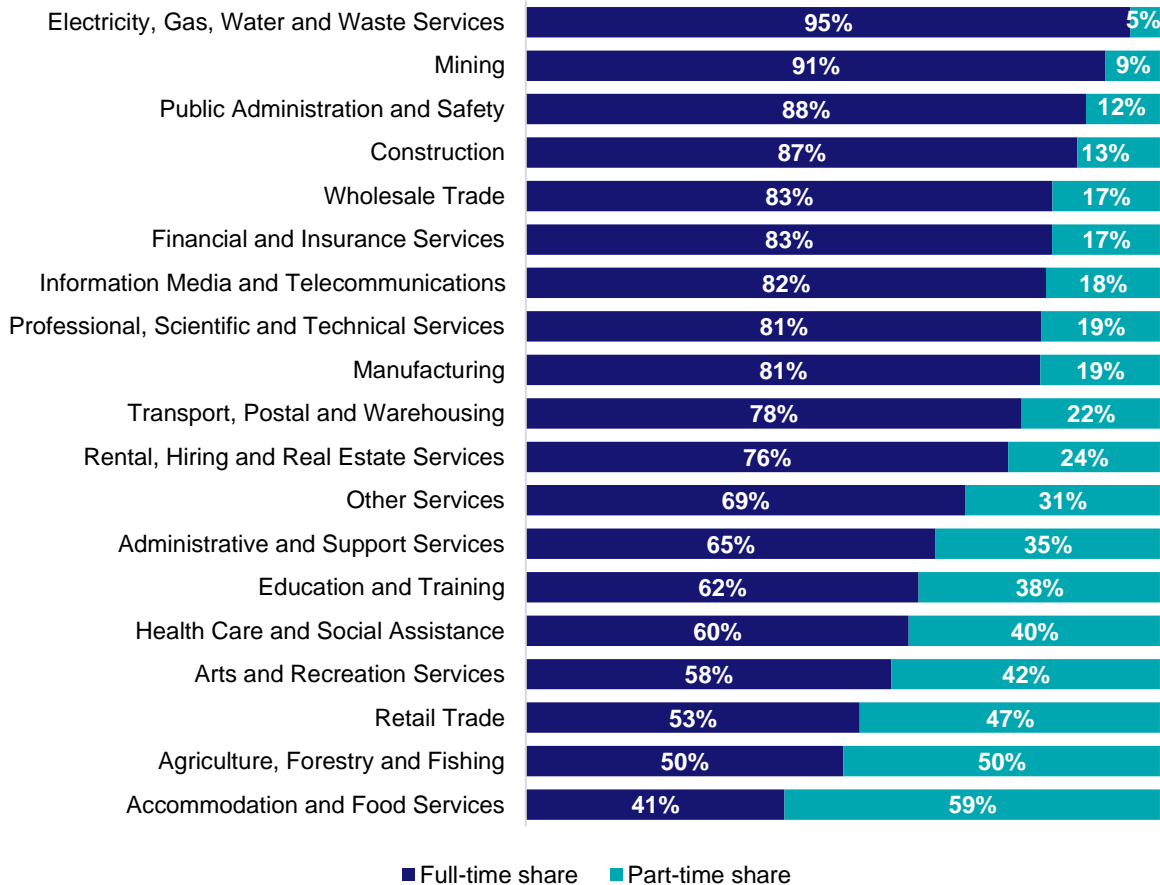

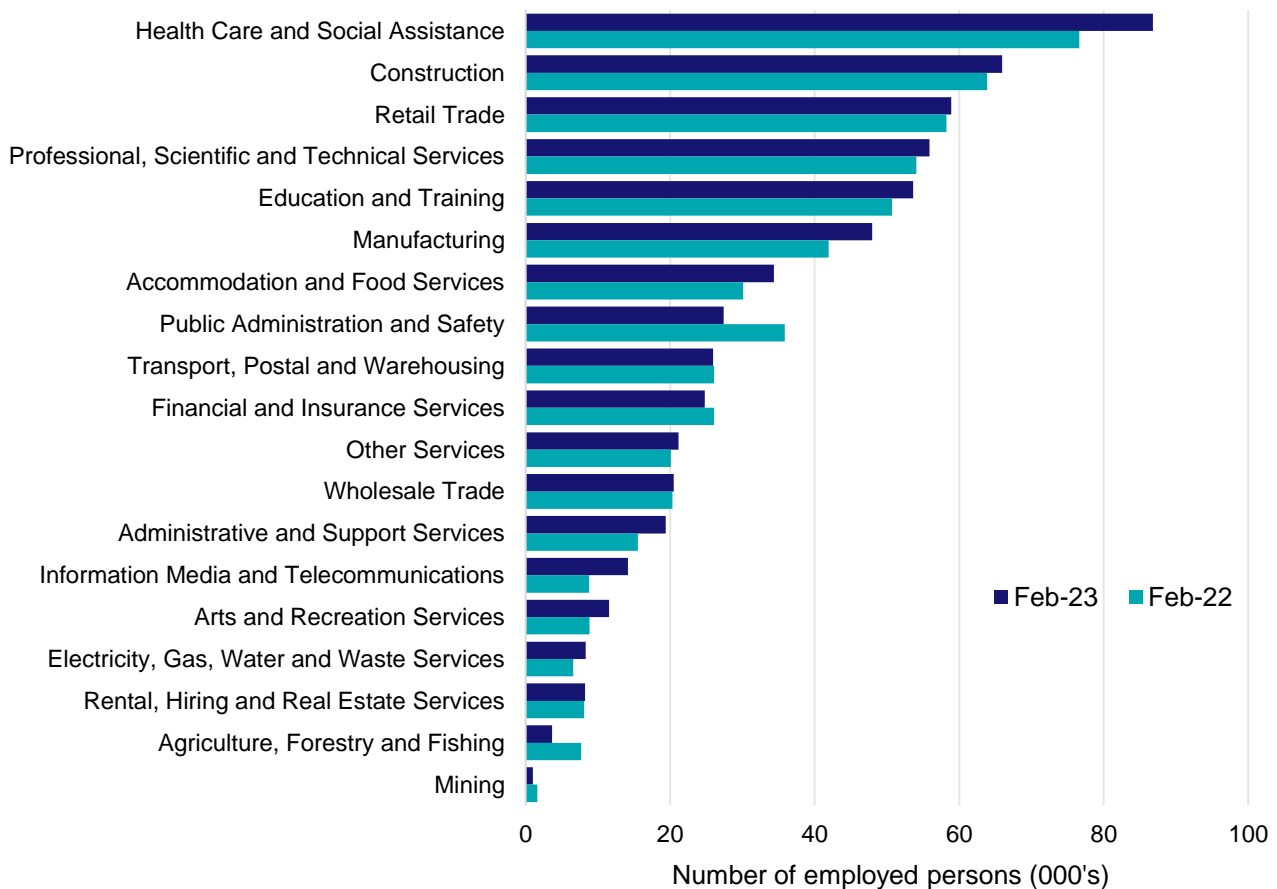

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



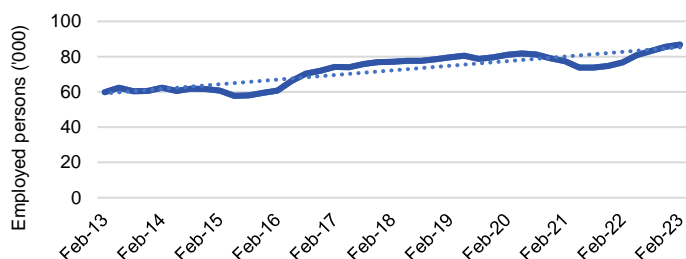

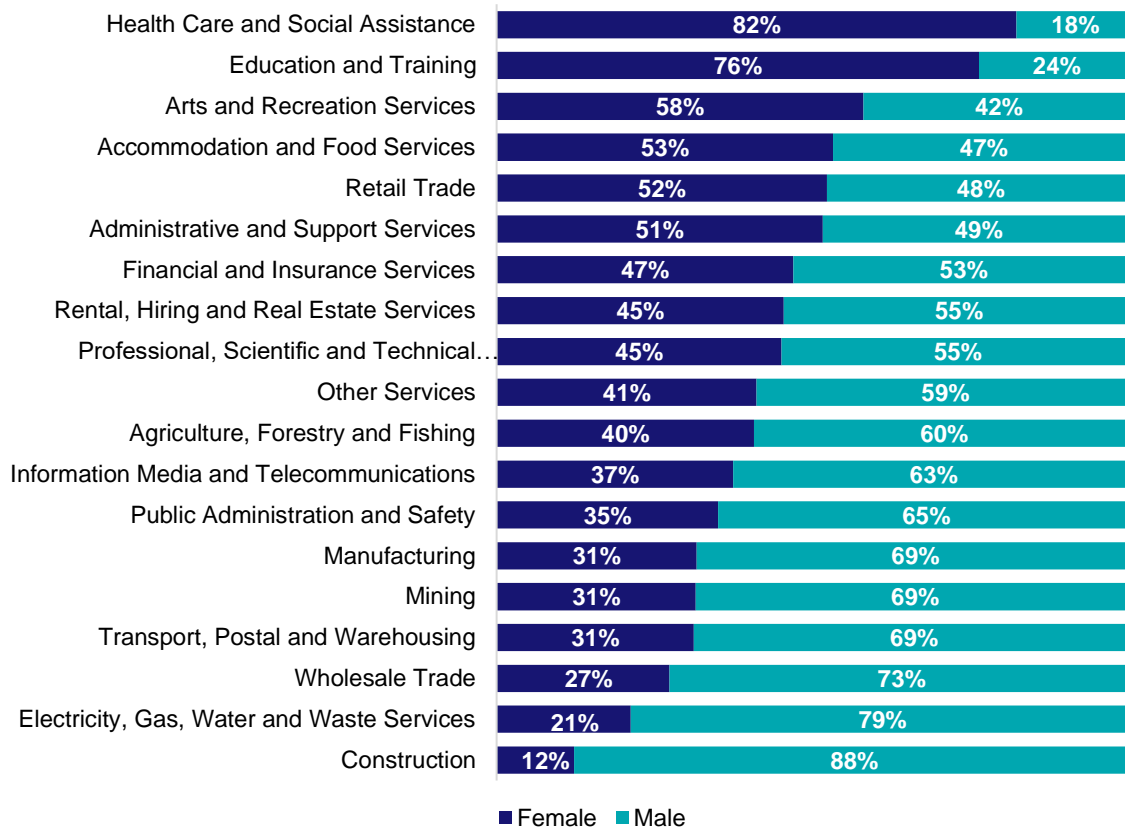

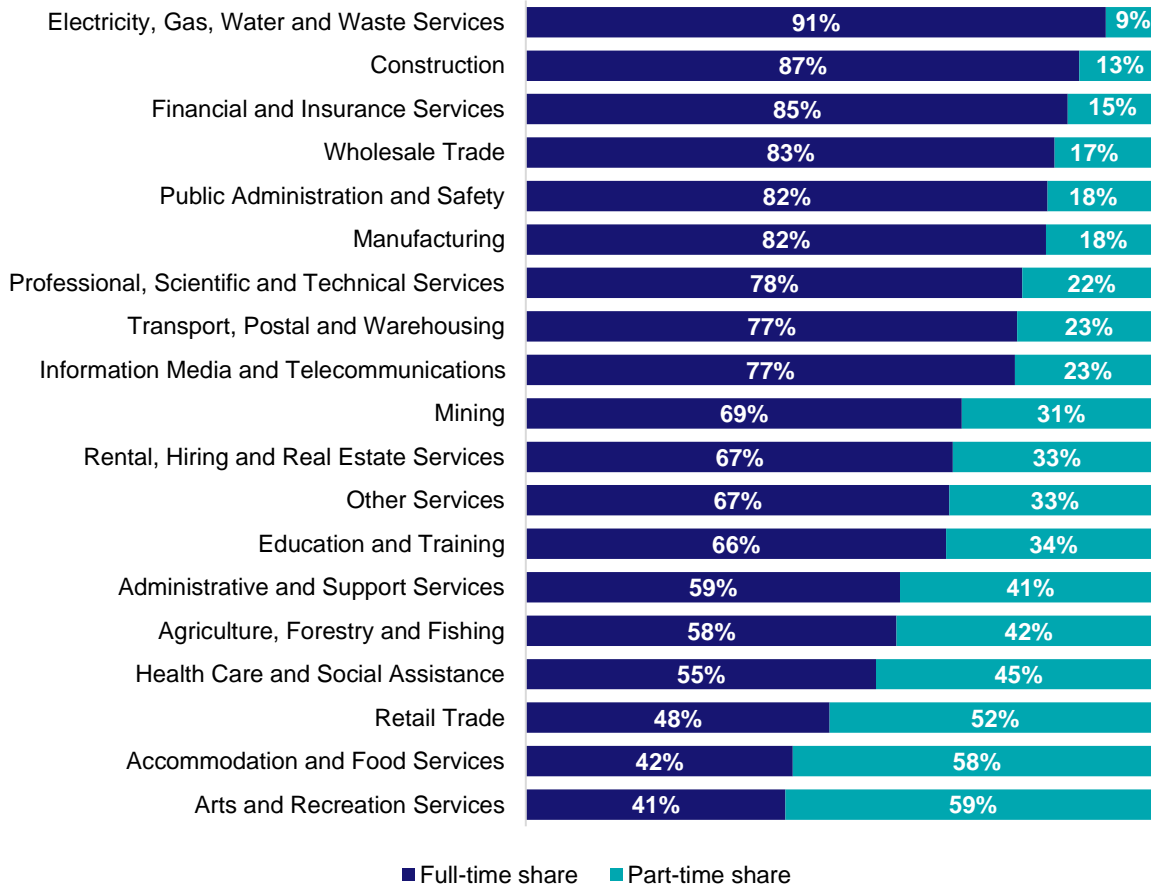

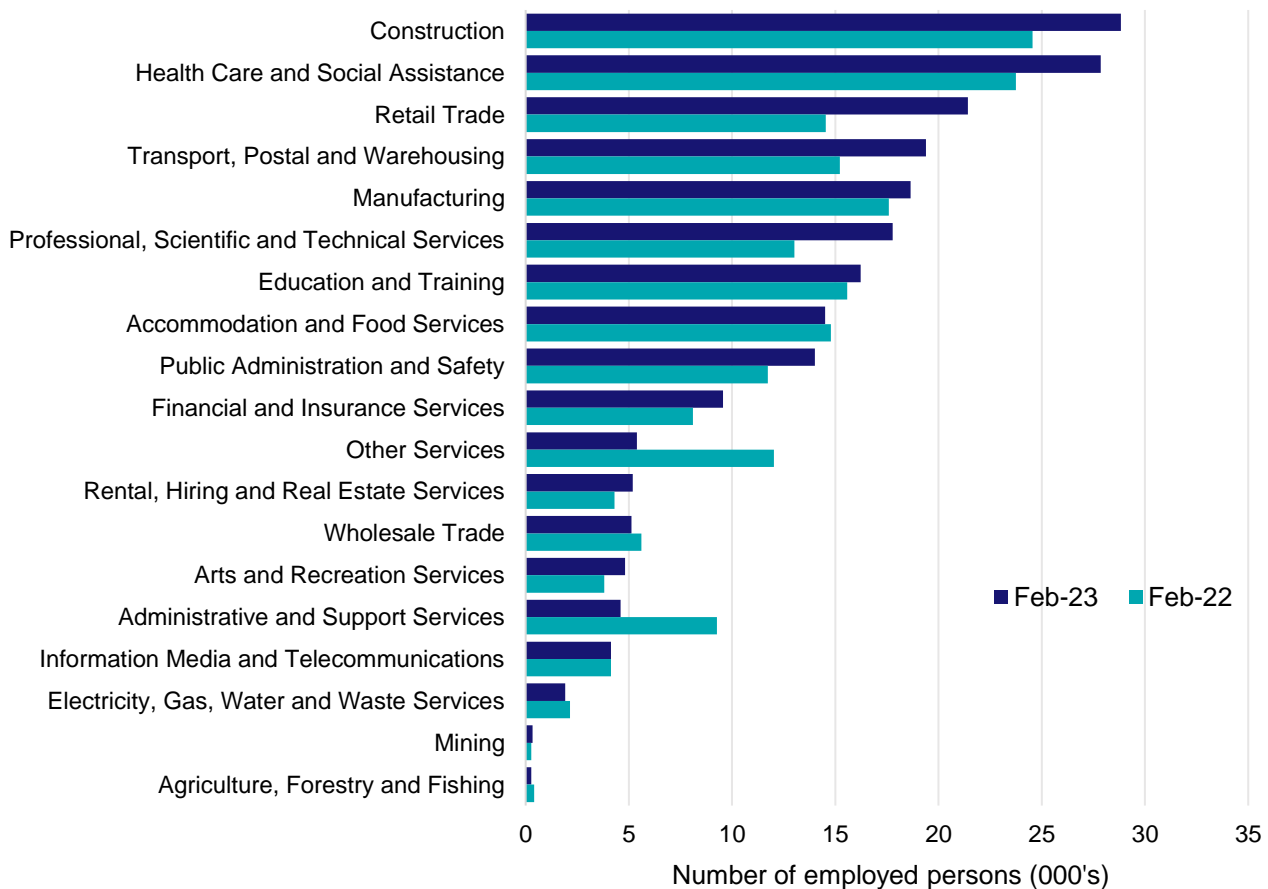

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



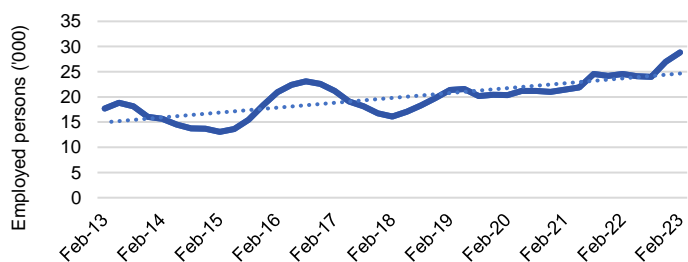

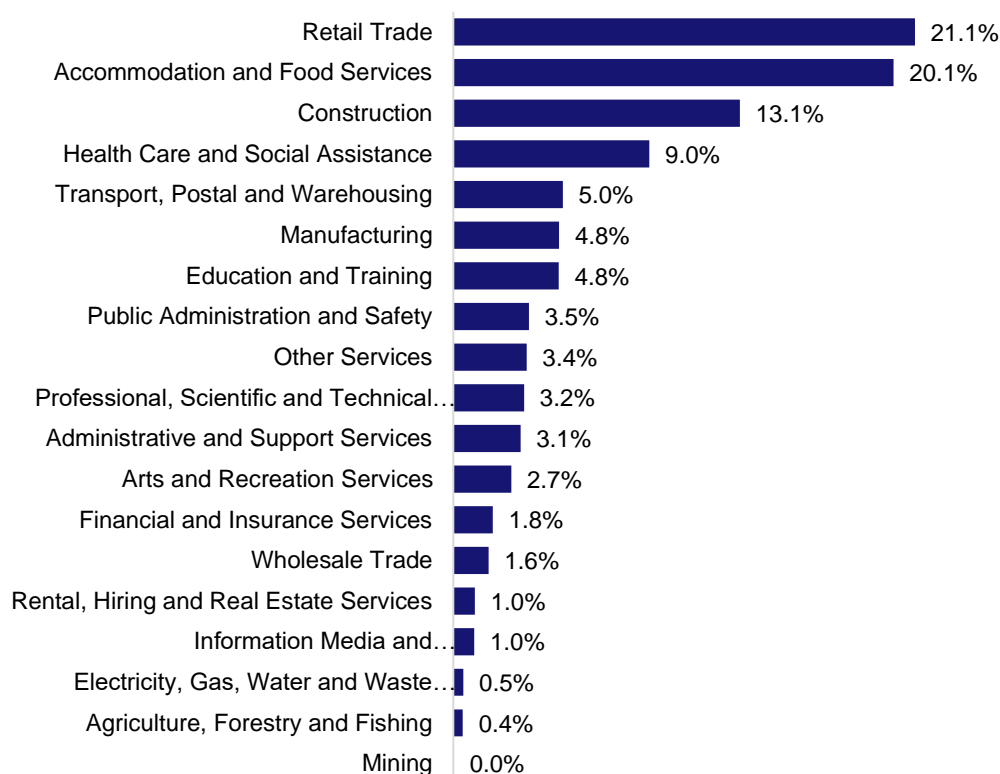

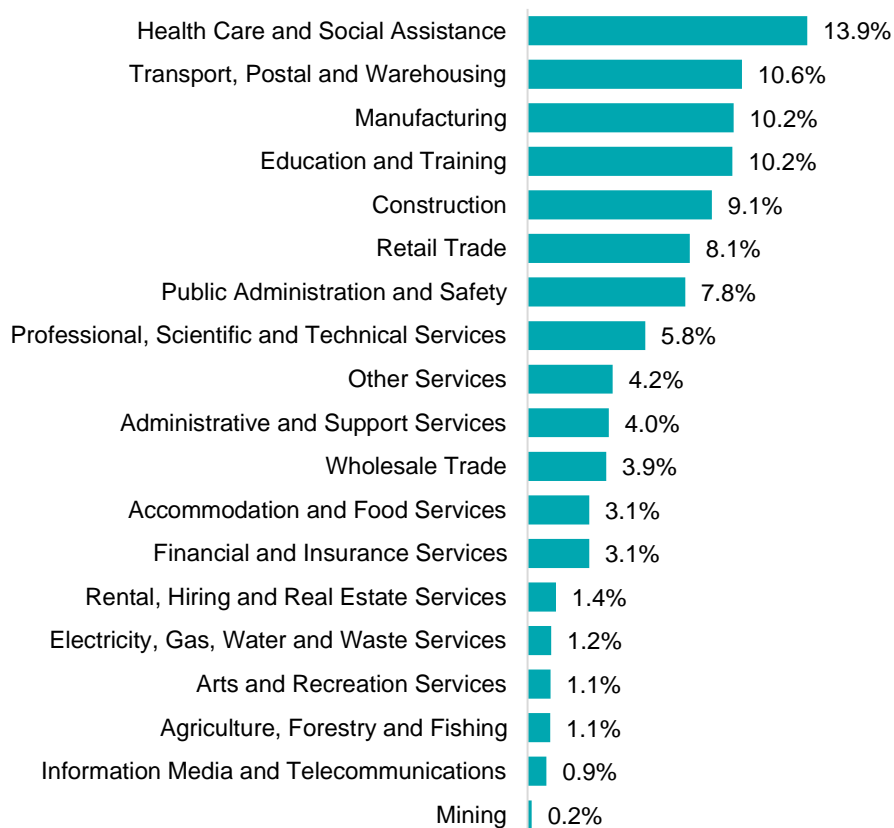

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



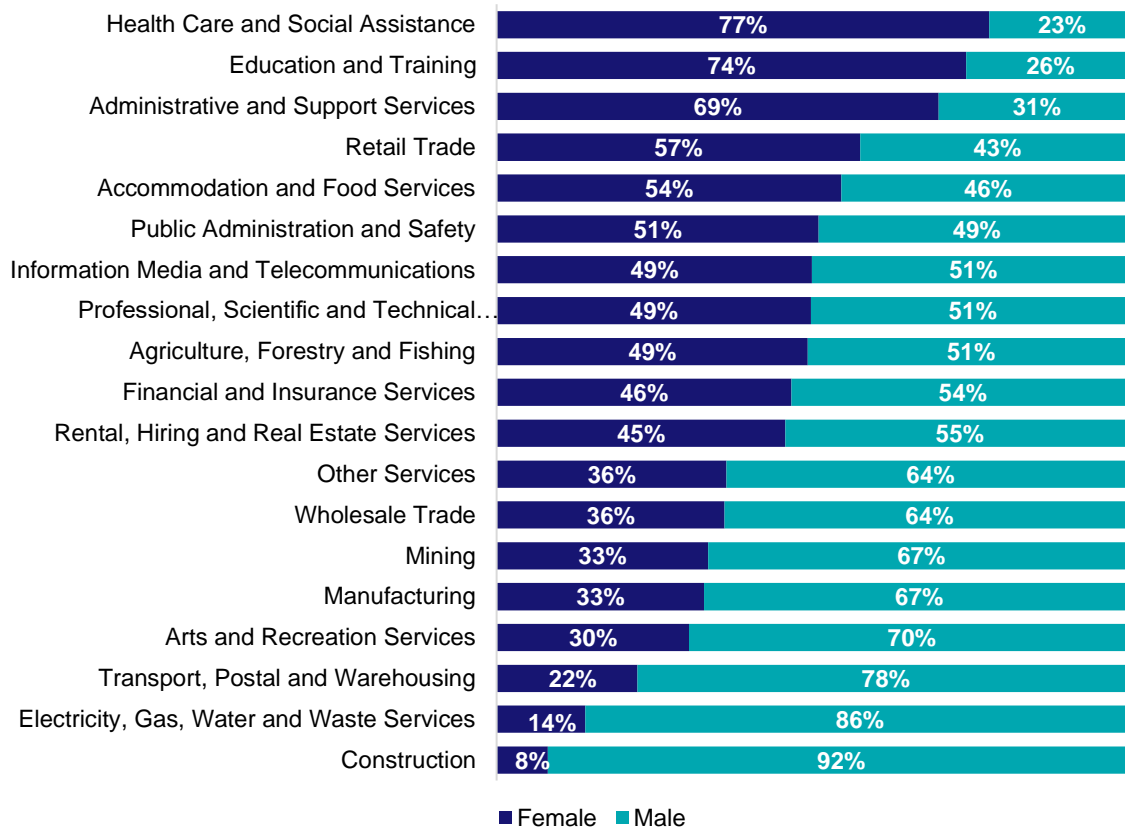

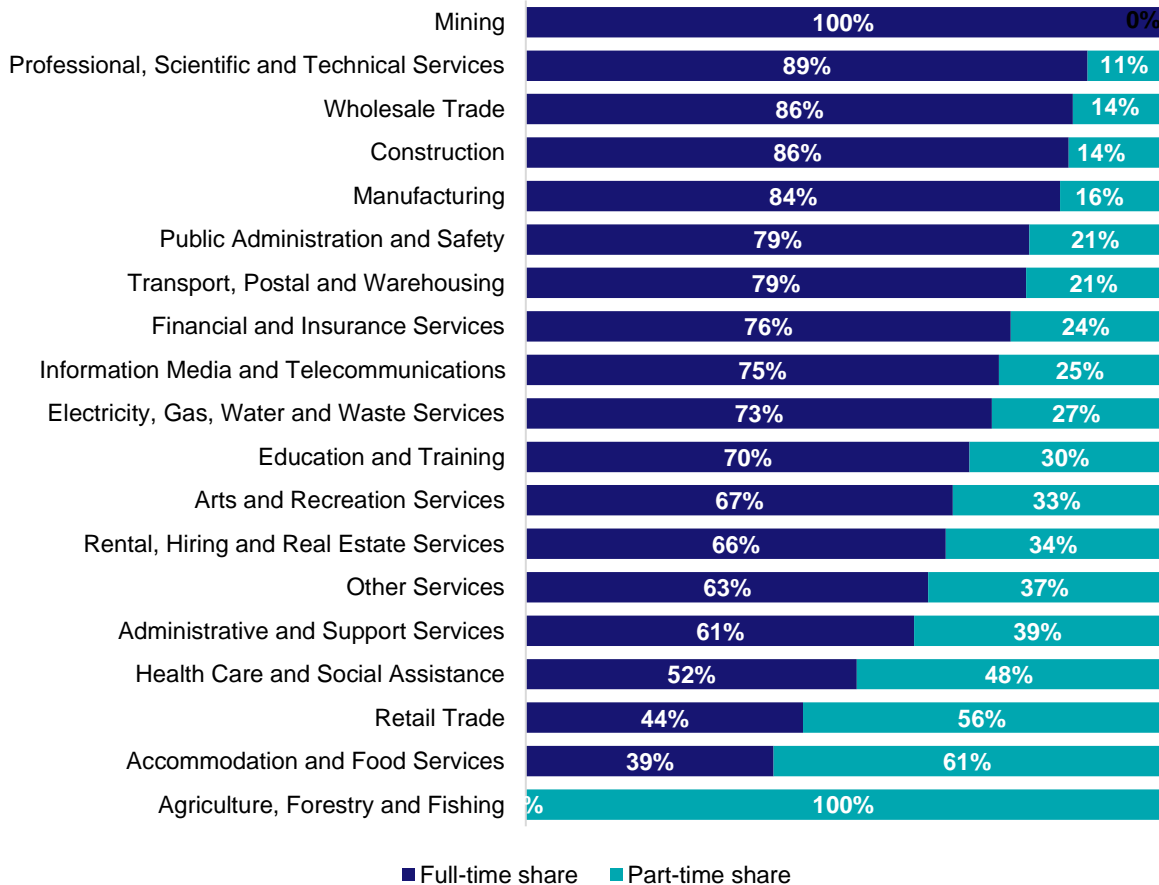

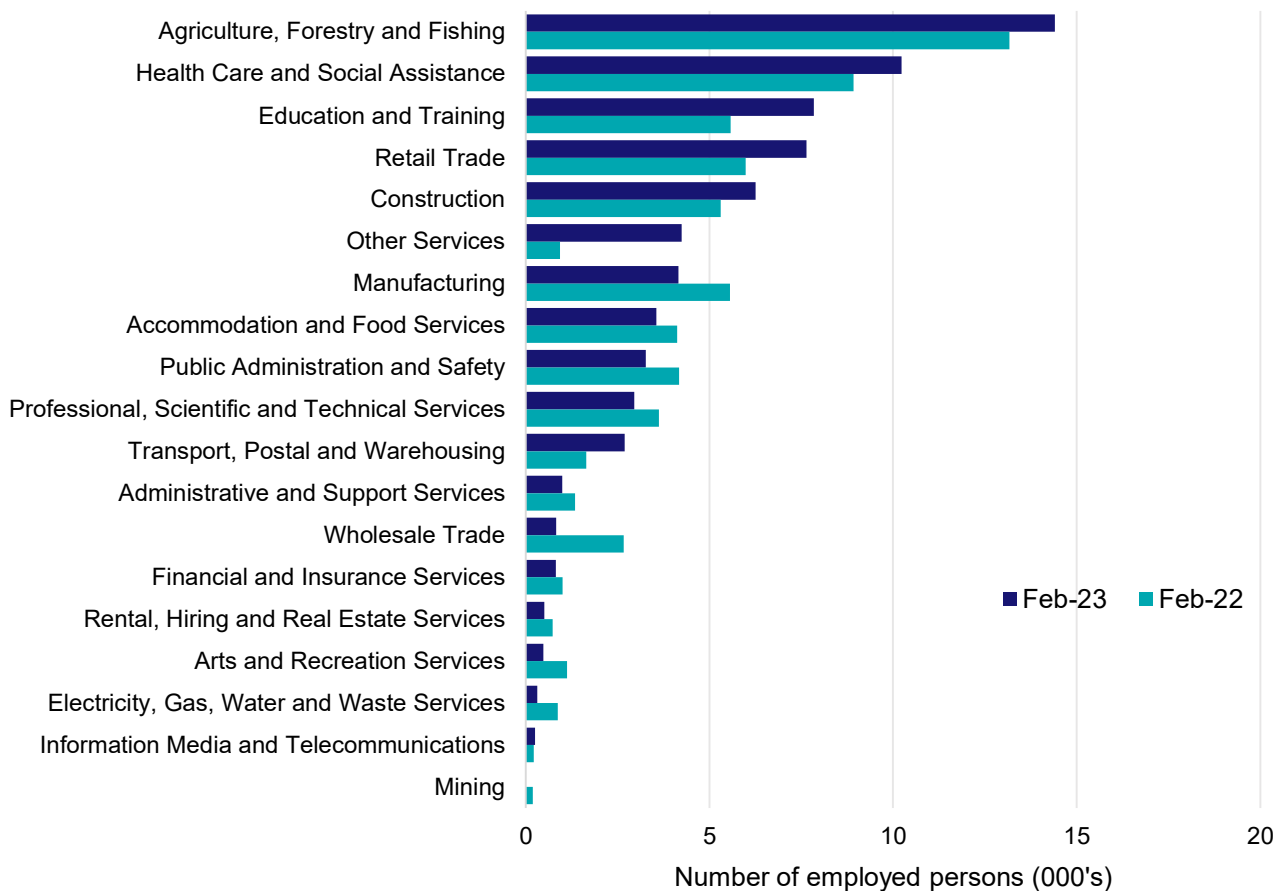

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



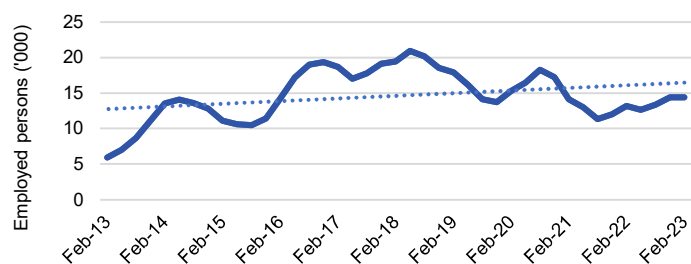

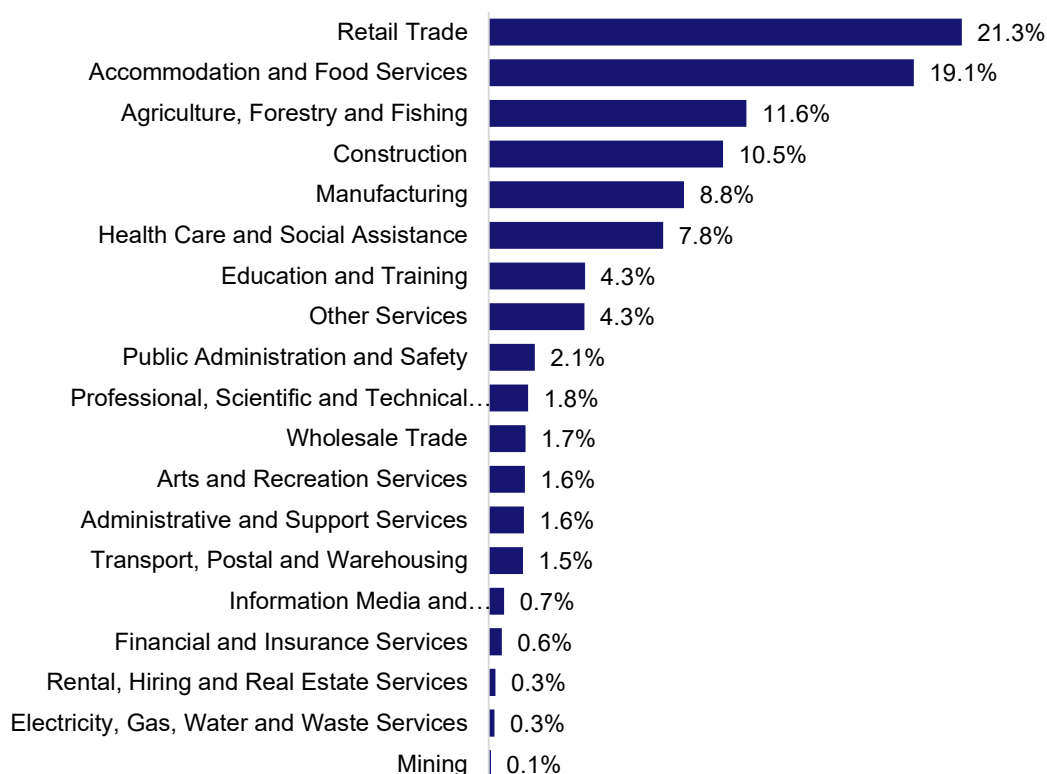

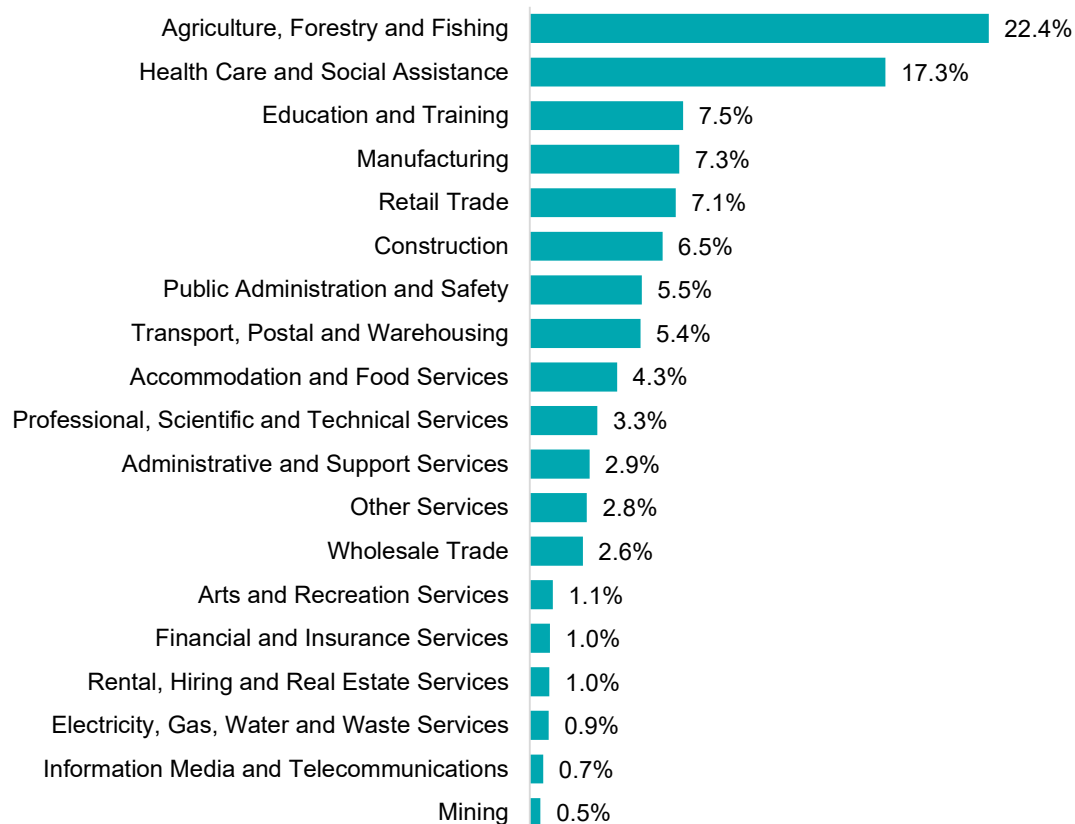

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



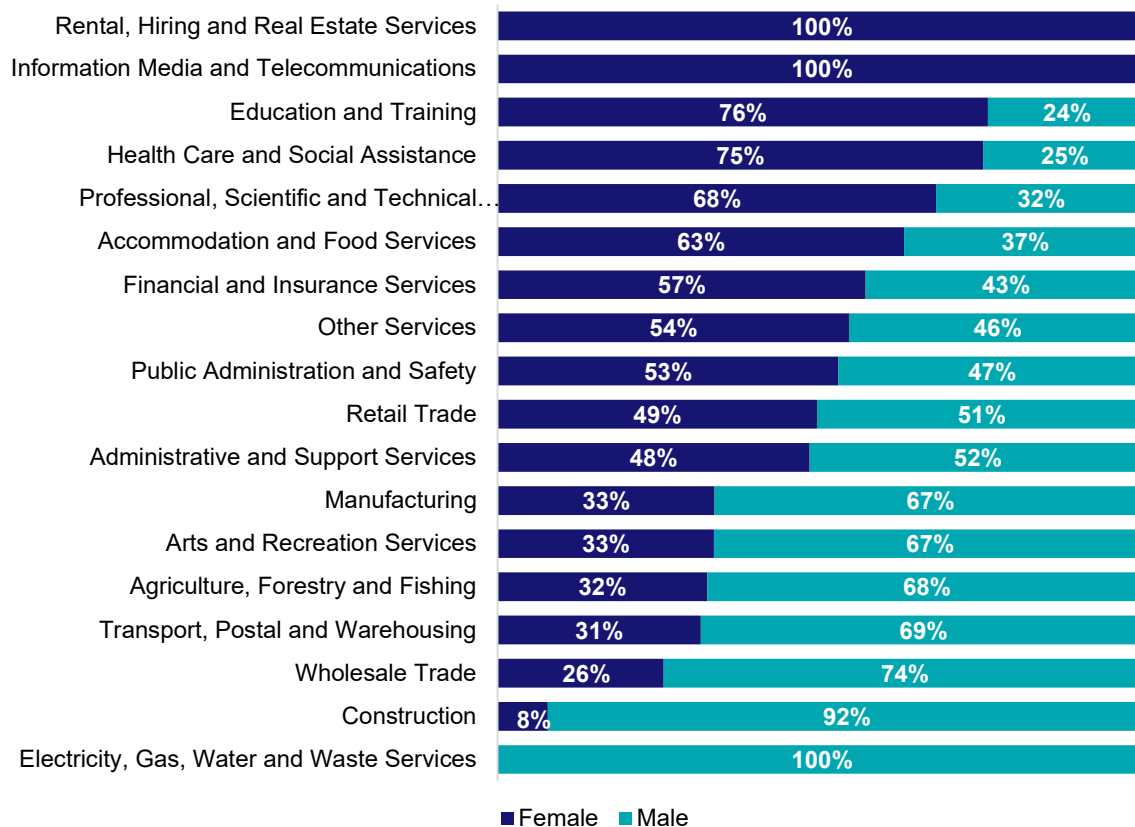

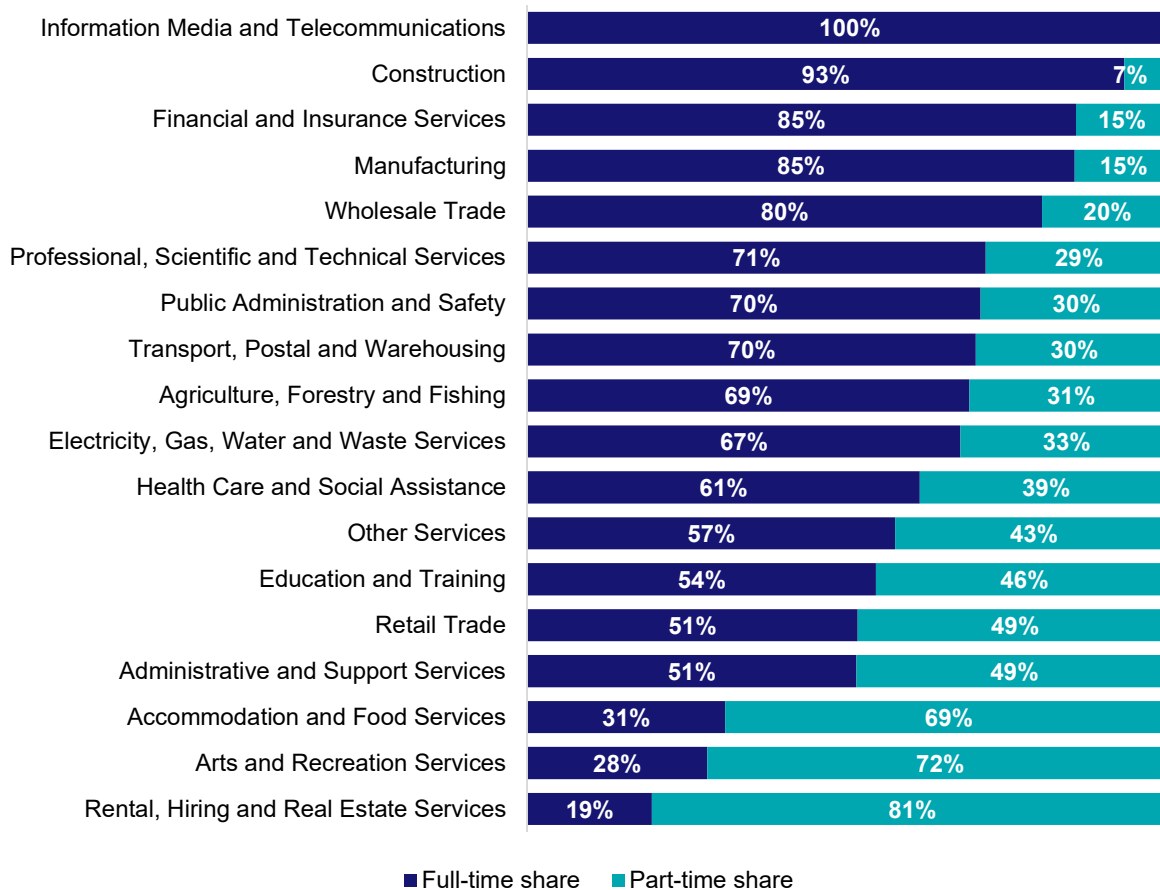

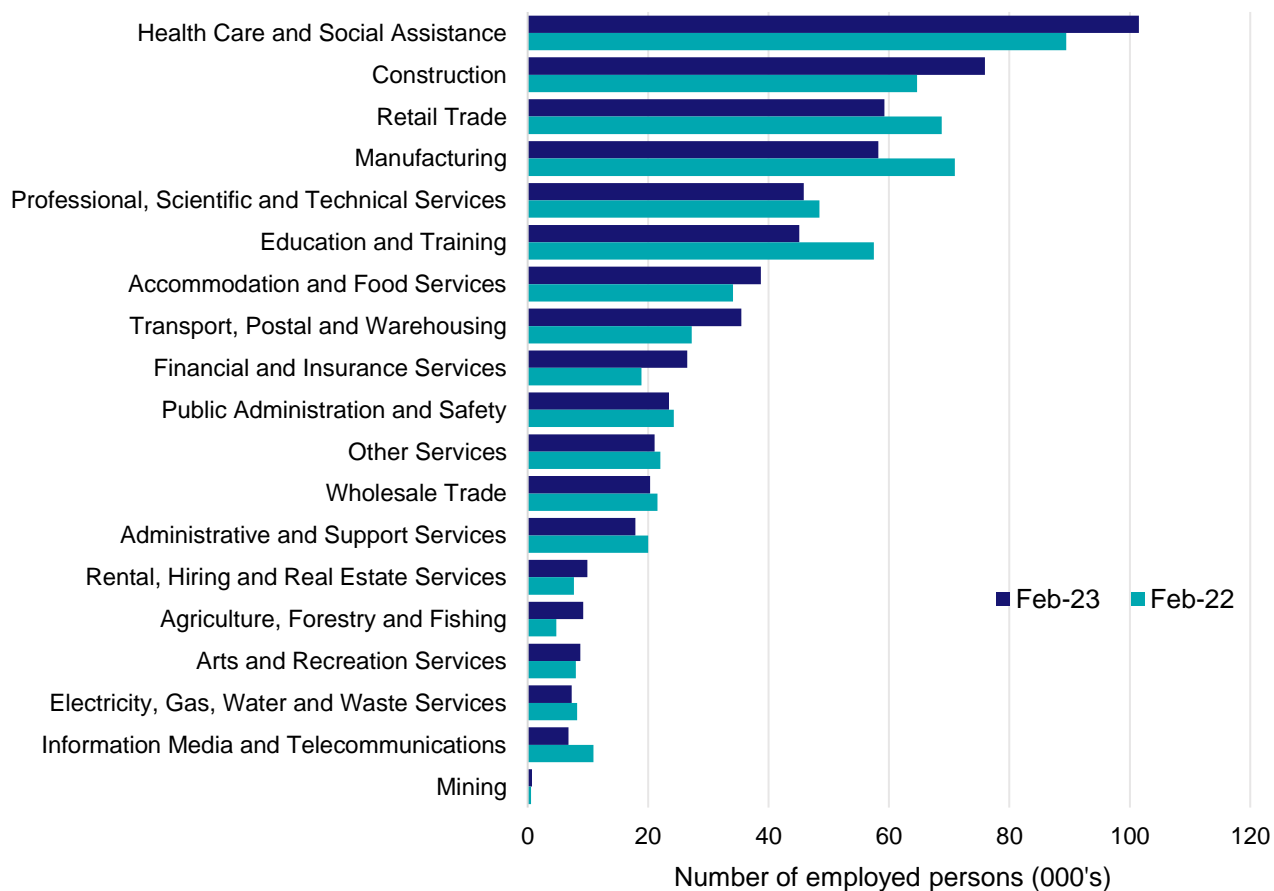

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



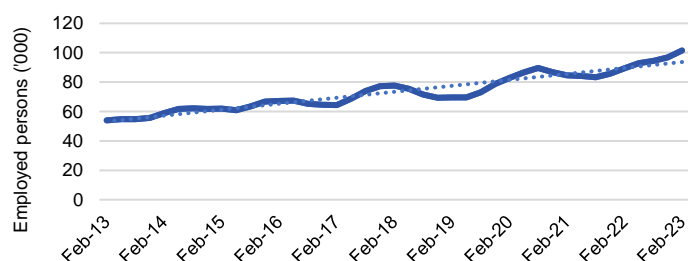

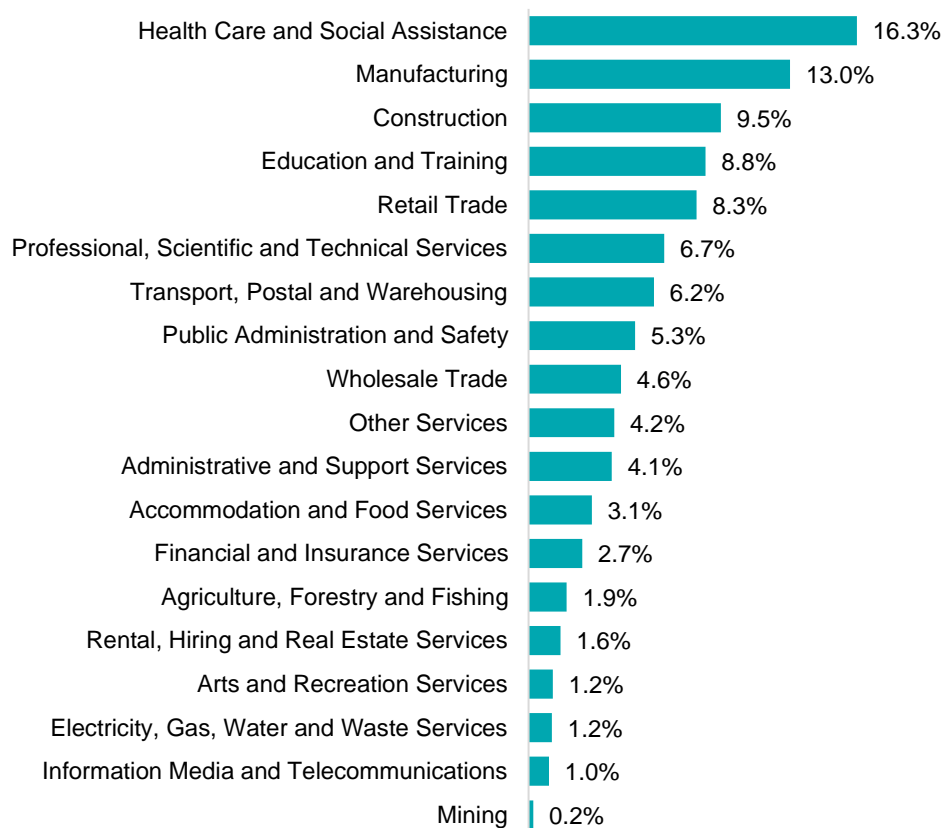

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



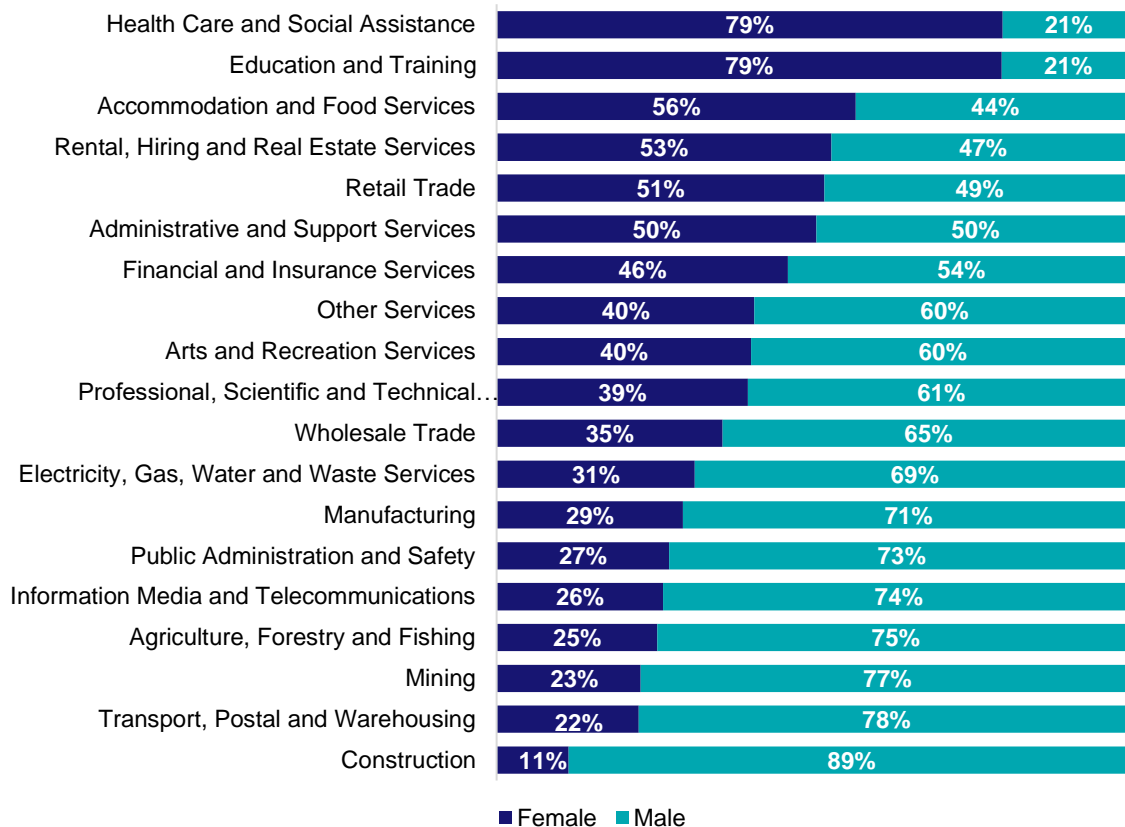

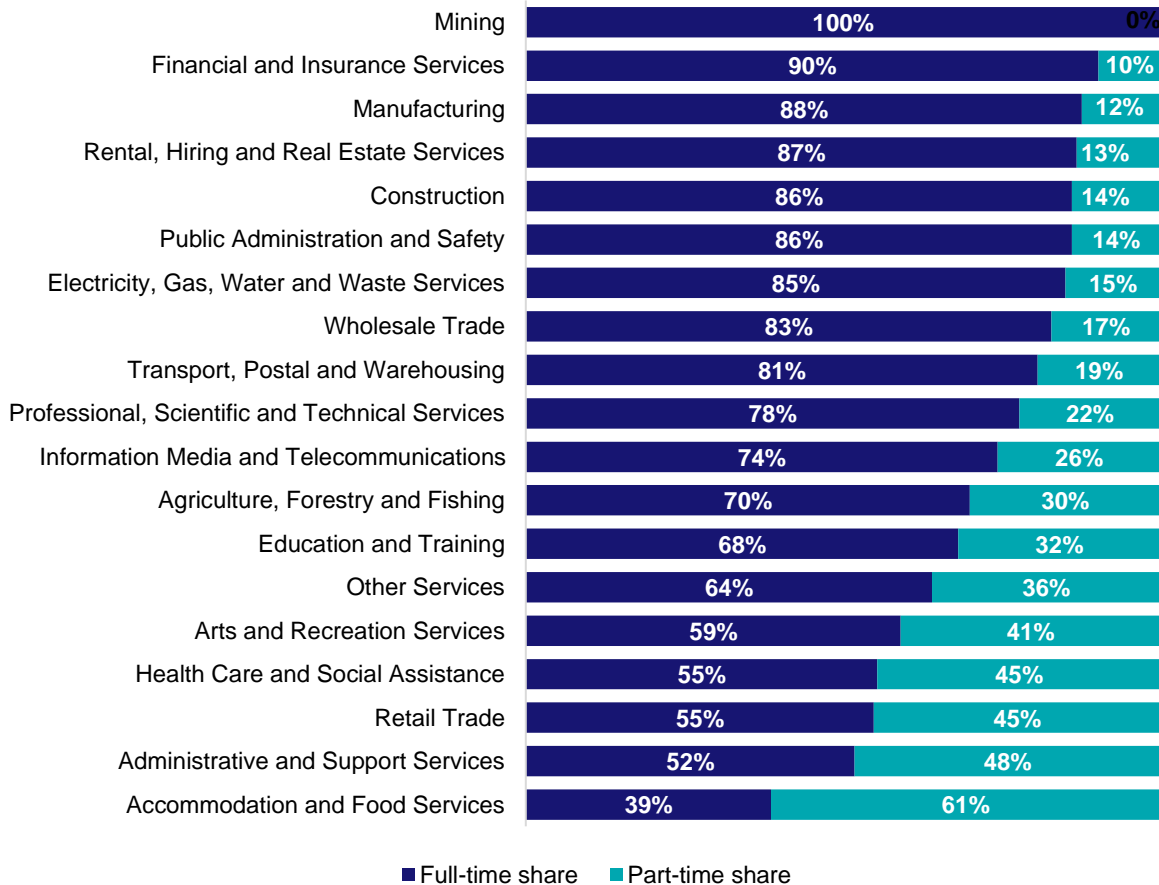

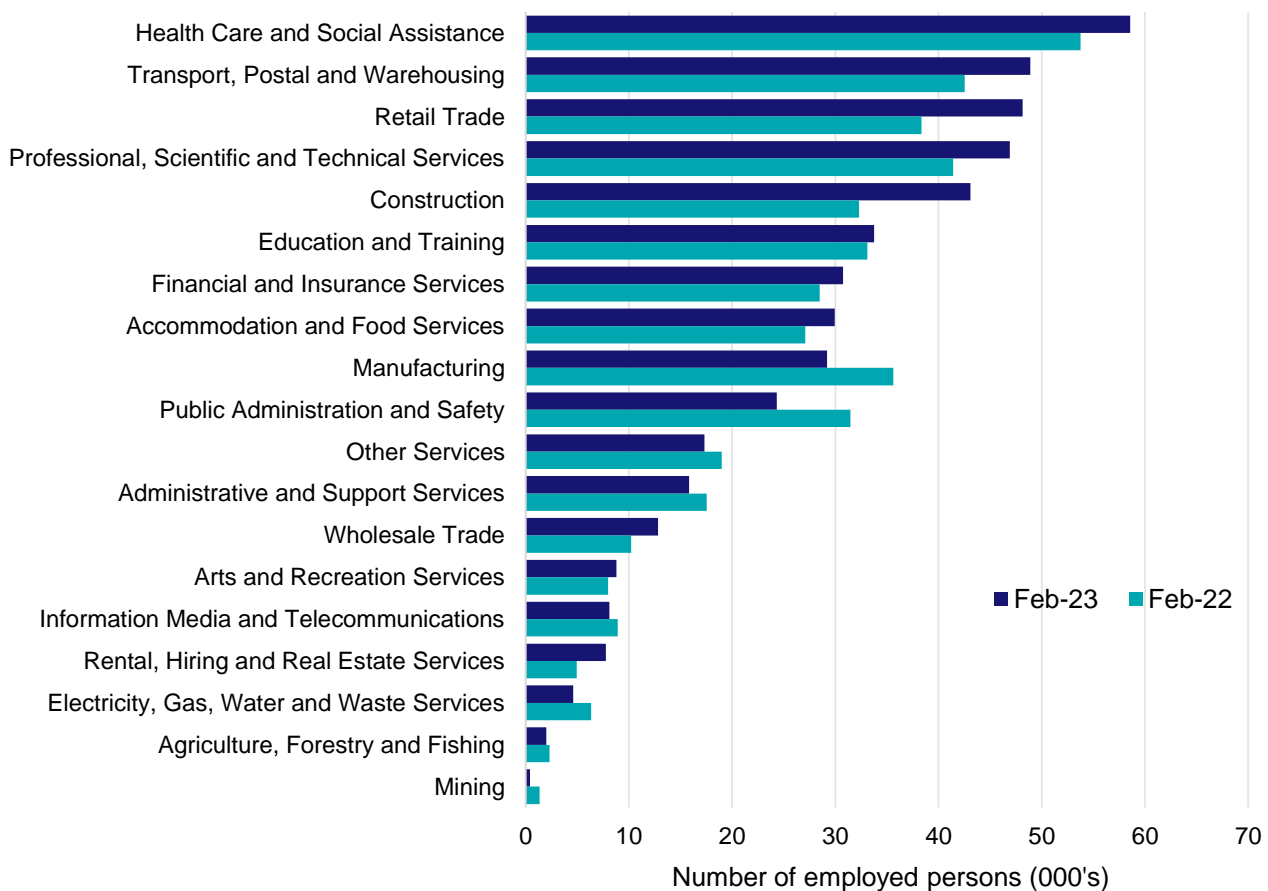

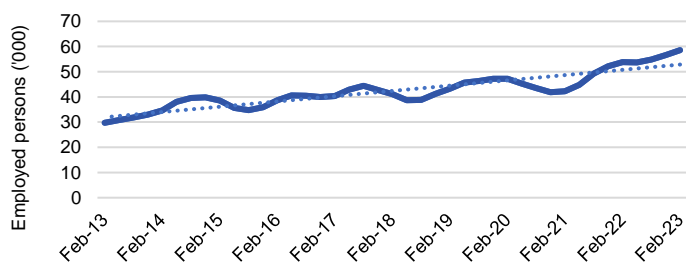

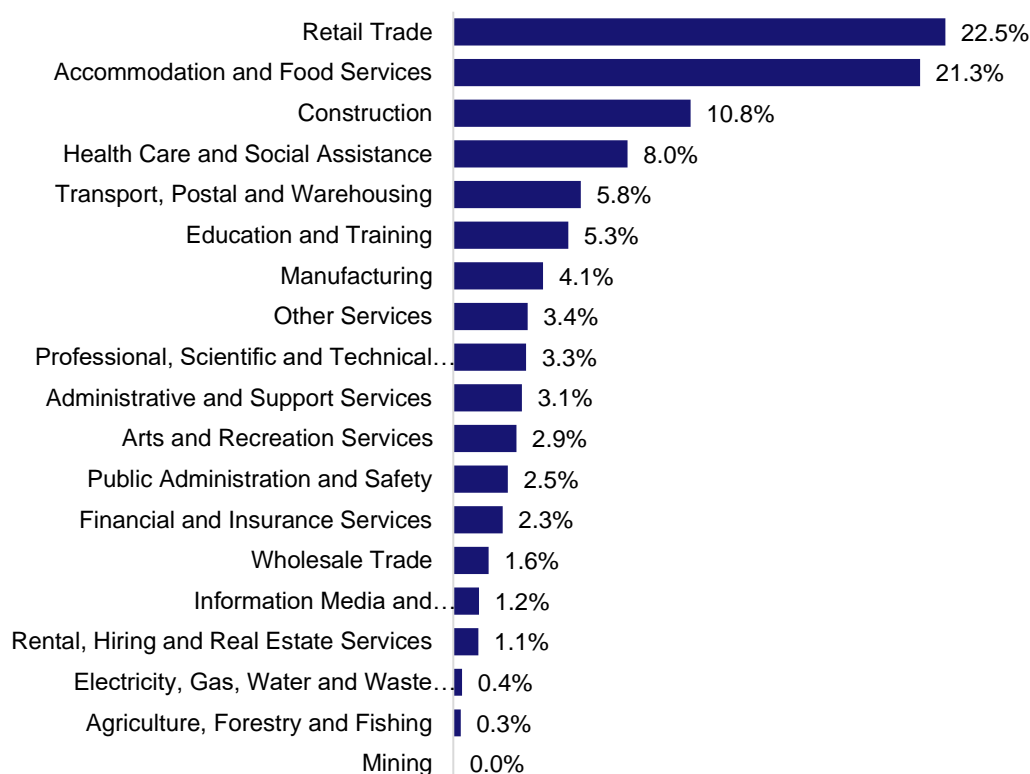

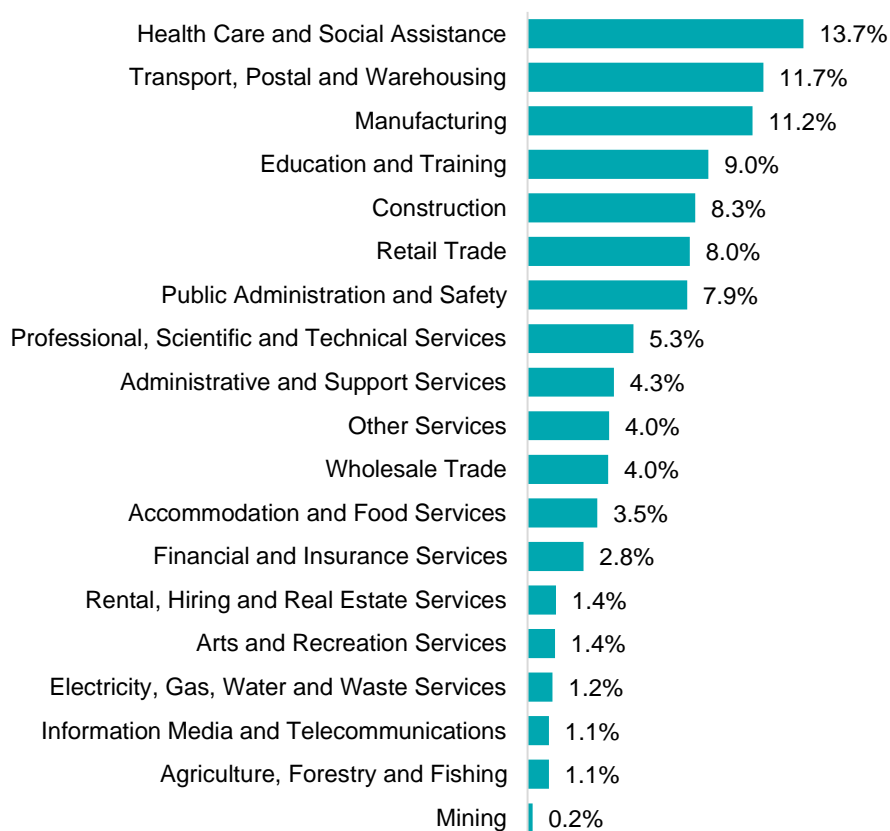

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



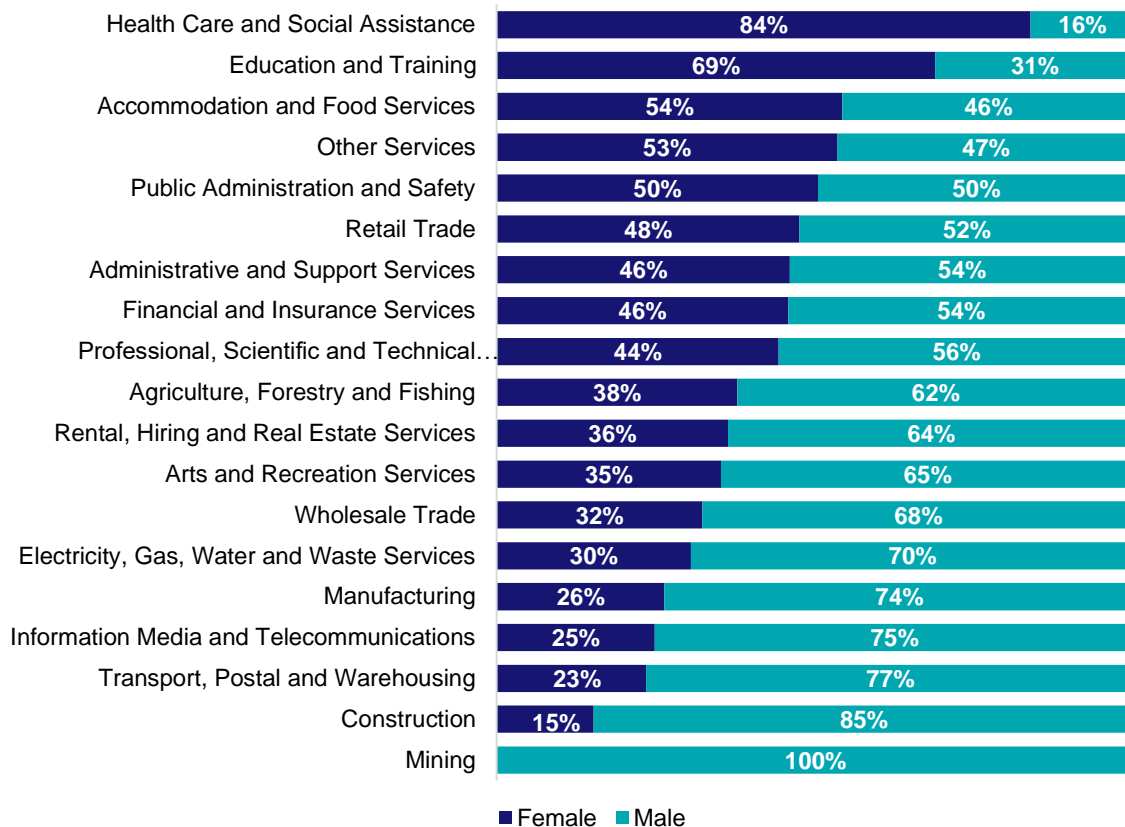

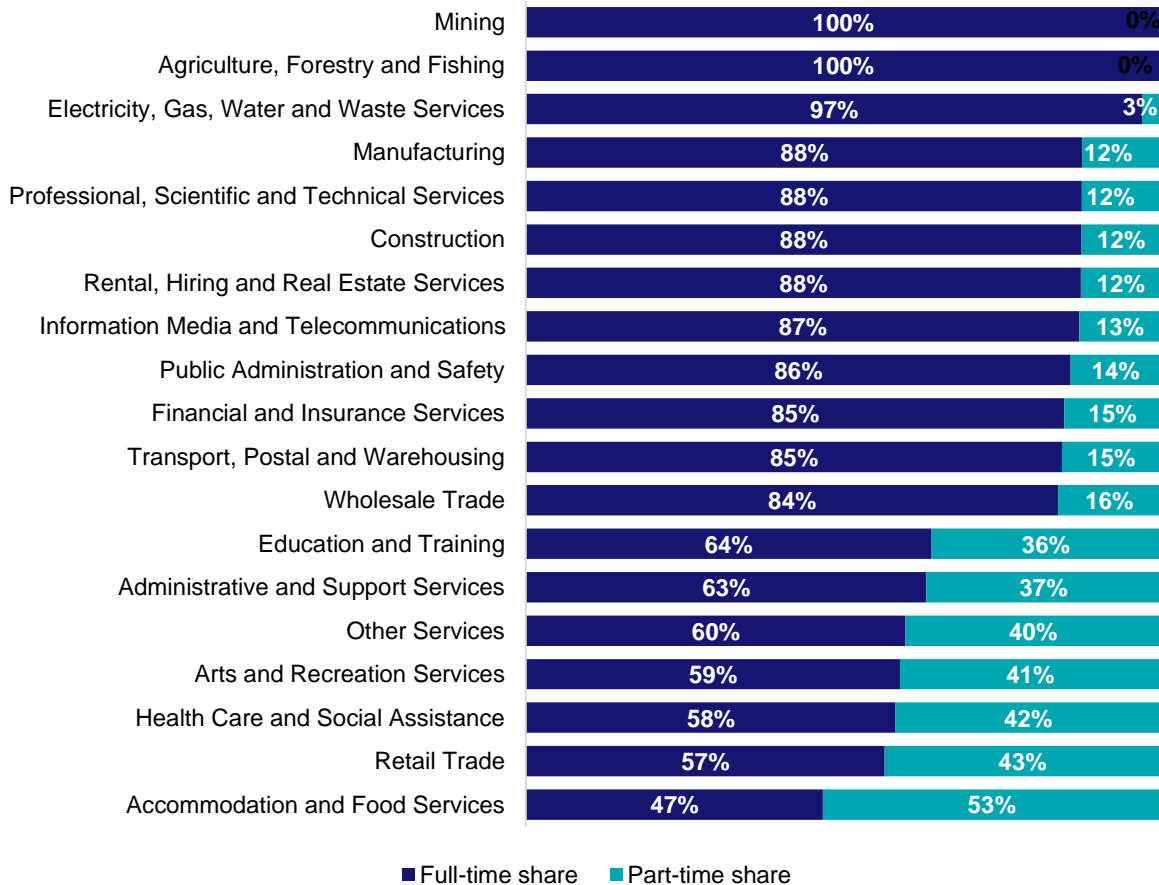

Overview

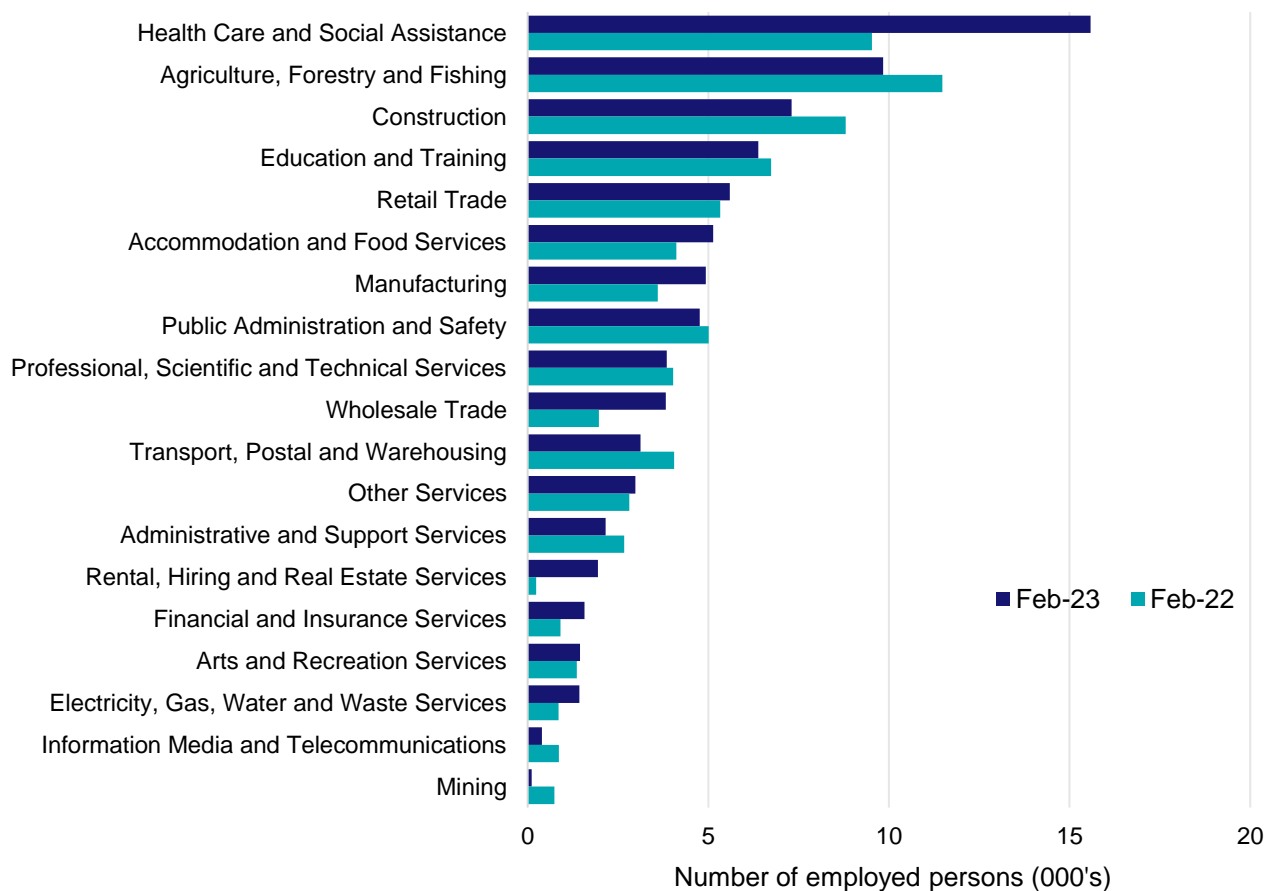
In February 2023, there were around 82,400 people employed in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing, Construction, Education and Training, and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 54% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 63.5% to stand at 15,600
- Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing fell by 14.2% to stand at 9,800
- Construction fell by 16.9% to stand at 7,300.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region, 52% of workers were employed full-time; 78% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 45.

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



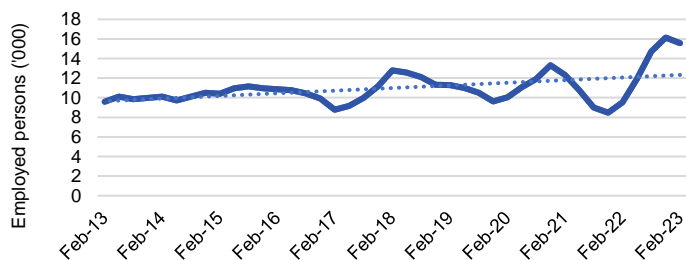

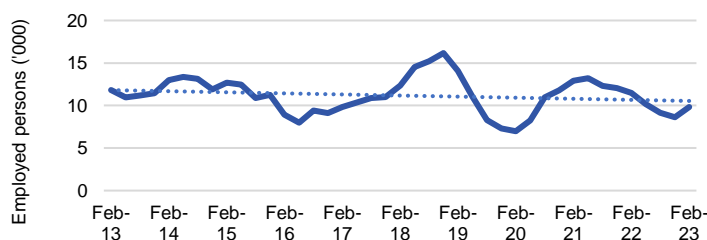

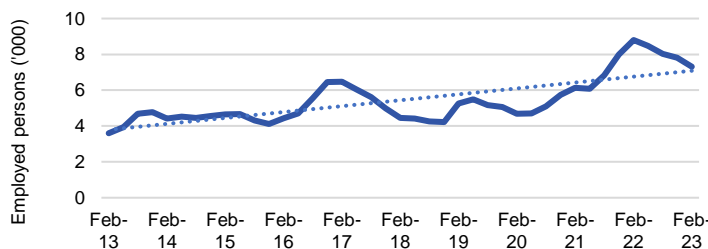

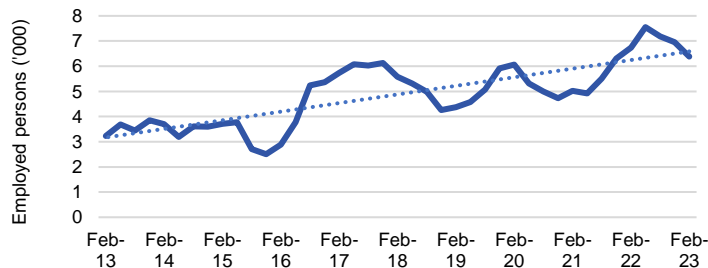

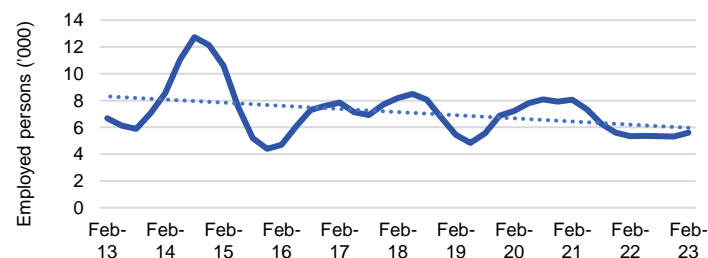

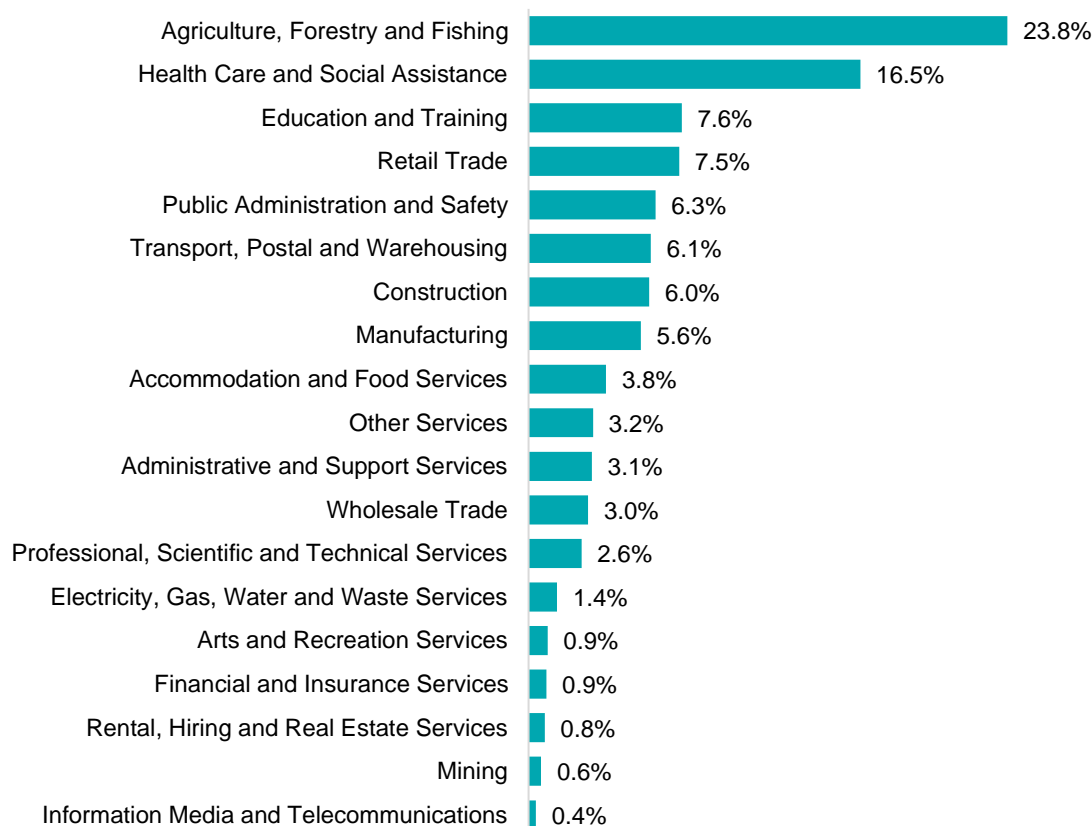
Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



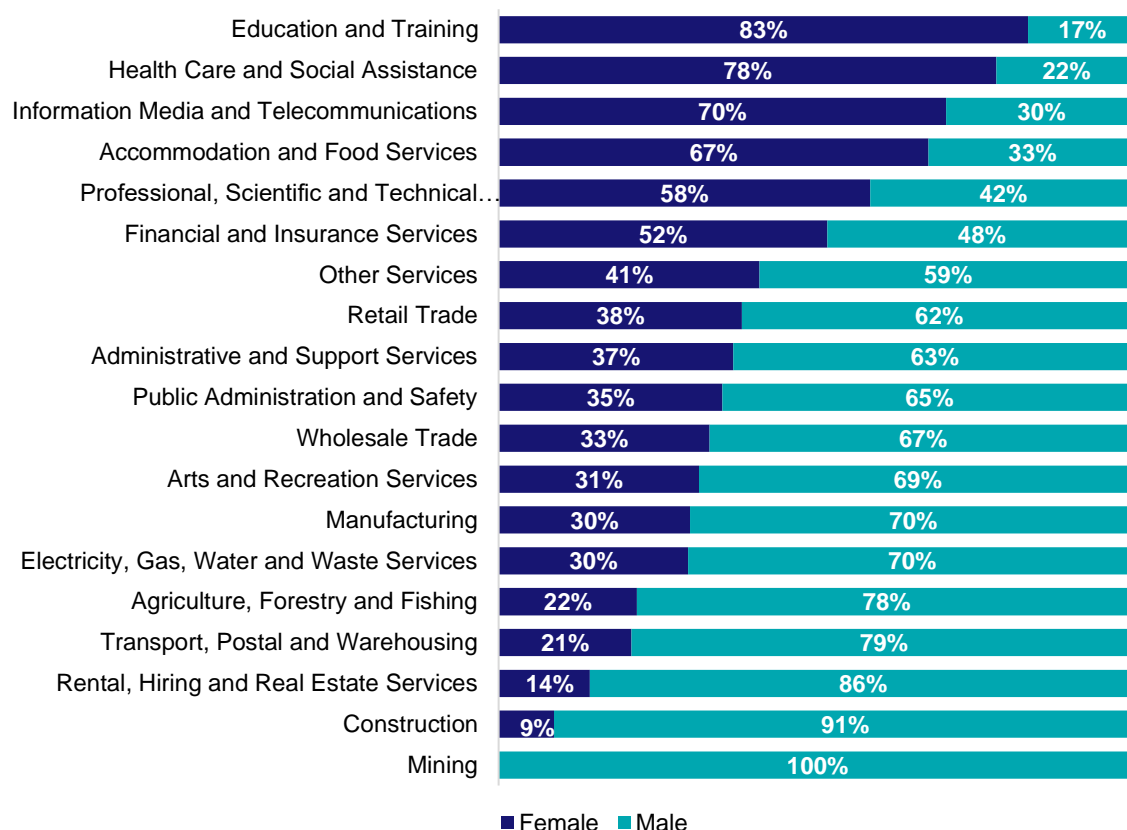

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



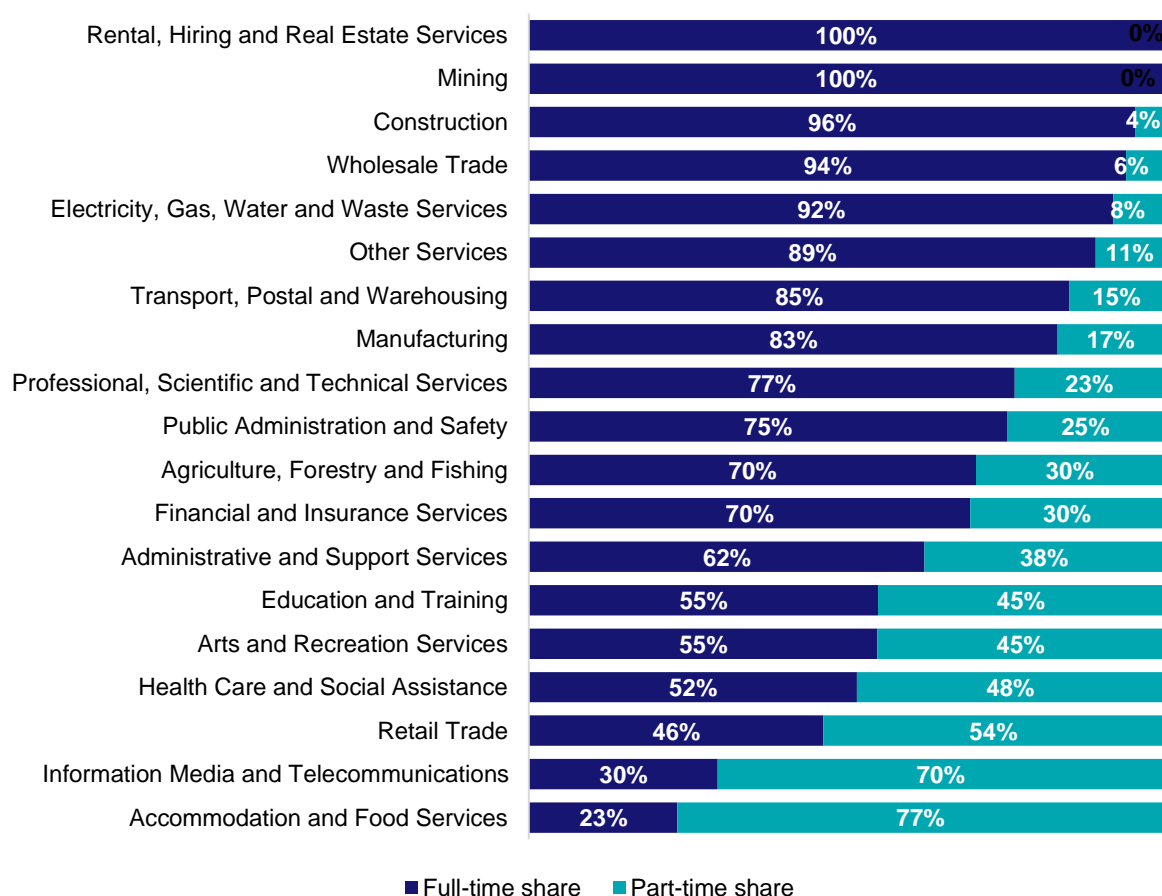
