Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region

Overview

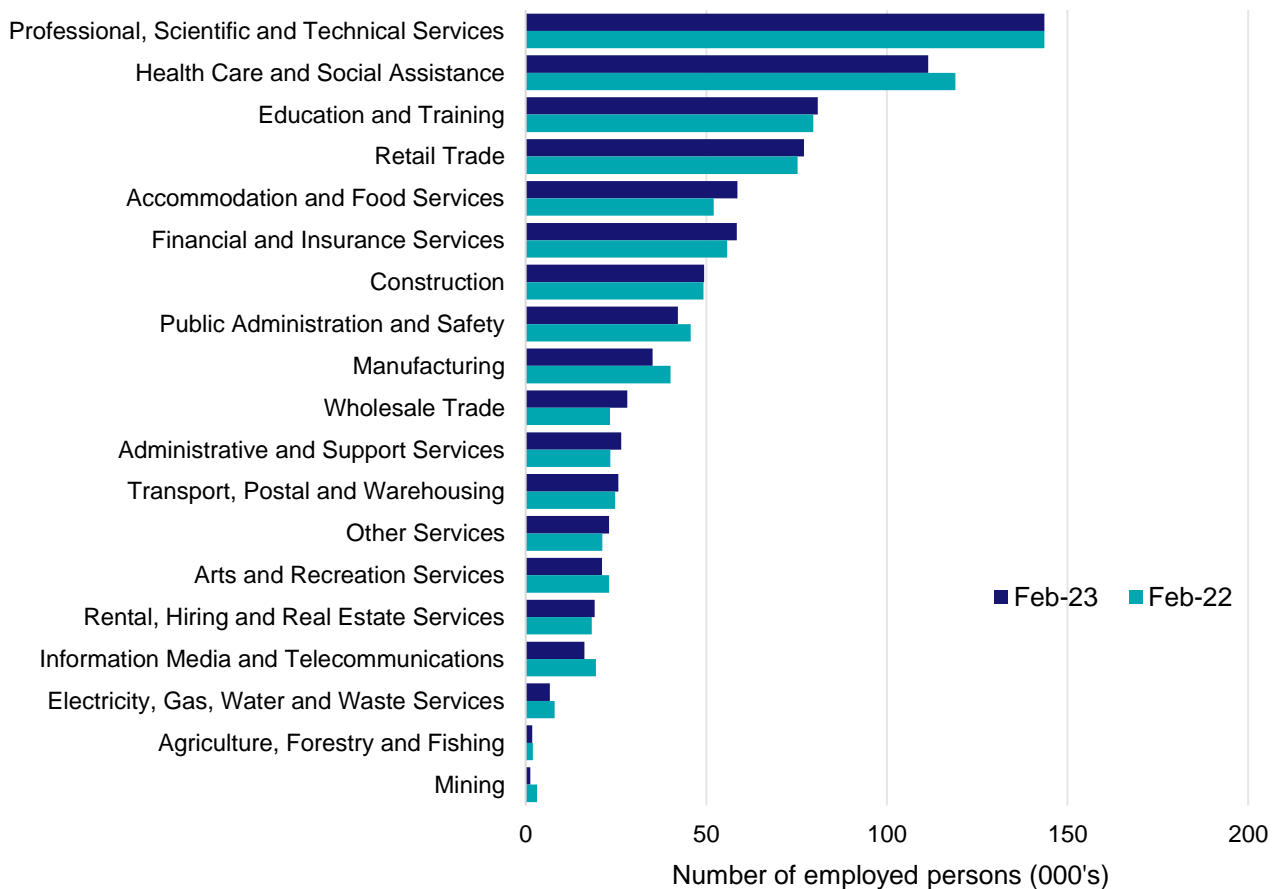
In February 2023, there were around 826,100 people employed in the Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Retail Trade, and Accommodation and Food Services. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services remained stable at 143,600
- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 6.3% to stand at 111,400
- Education and Training rose by 1.6% to stand at 80,900.

In Professional, Scientific and Technical Services in the Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region, 81% of workers were employed full-time; 59% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 38.

Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



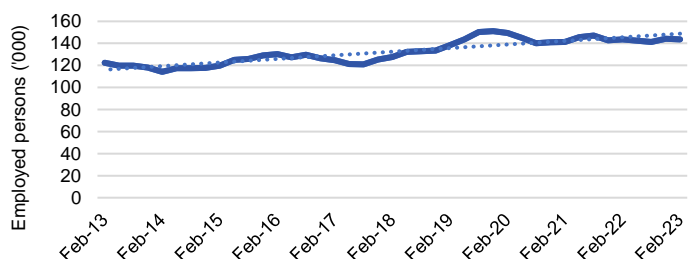

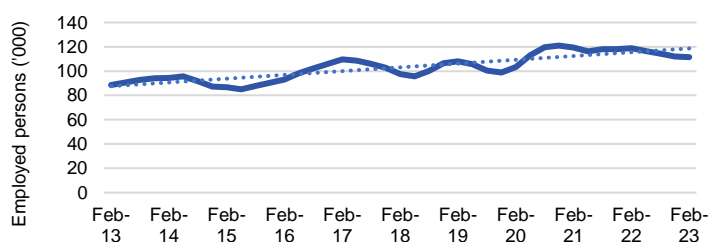

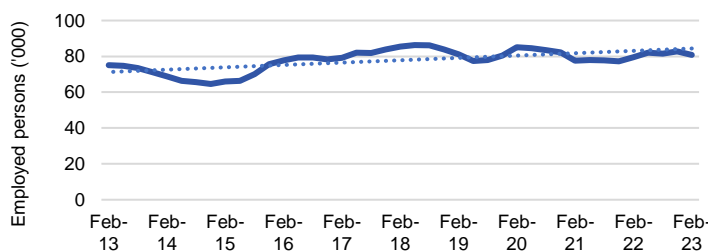

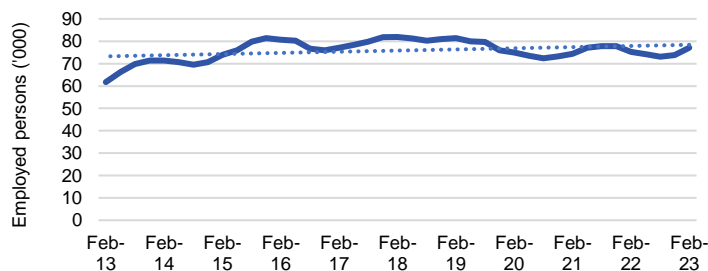

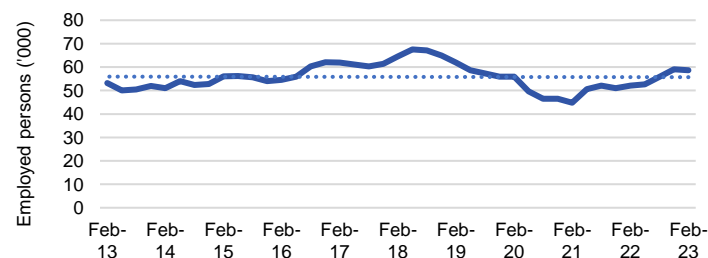

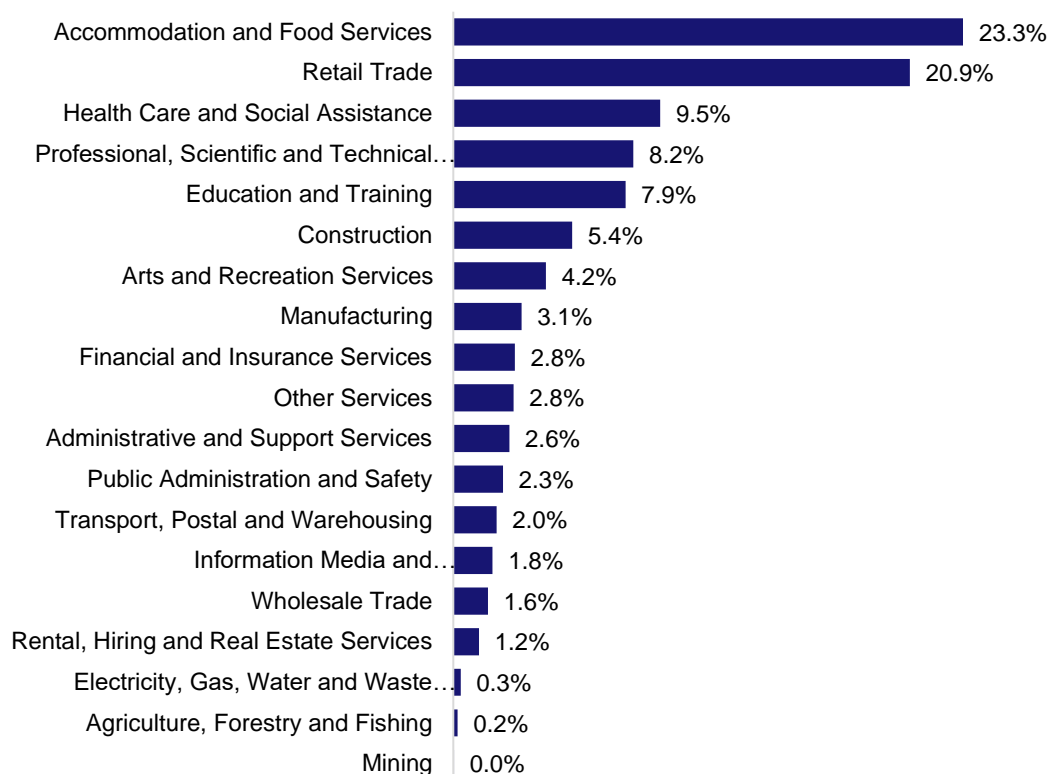

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



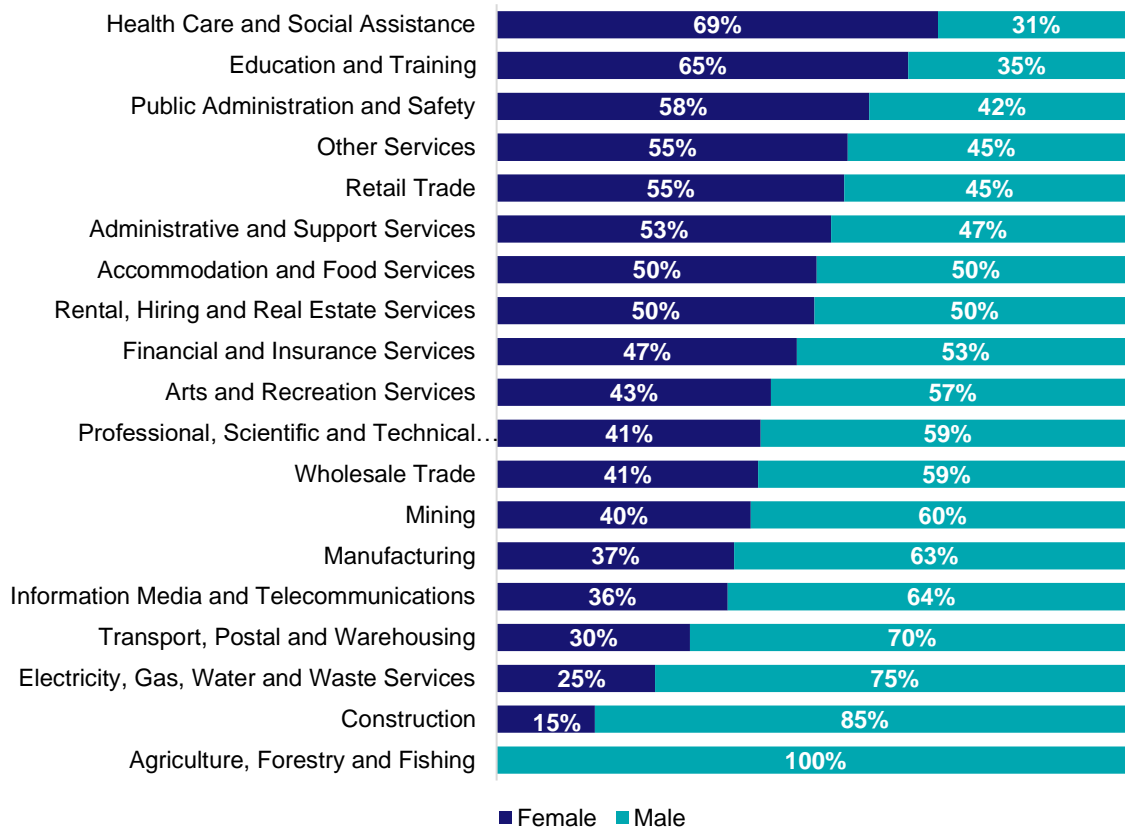

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



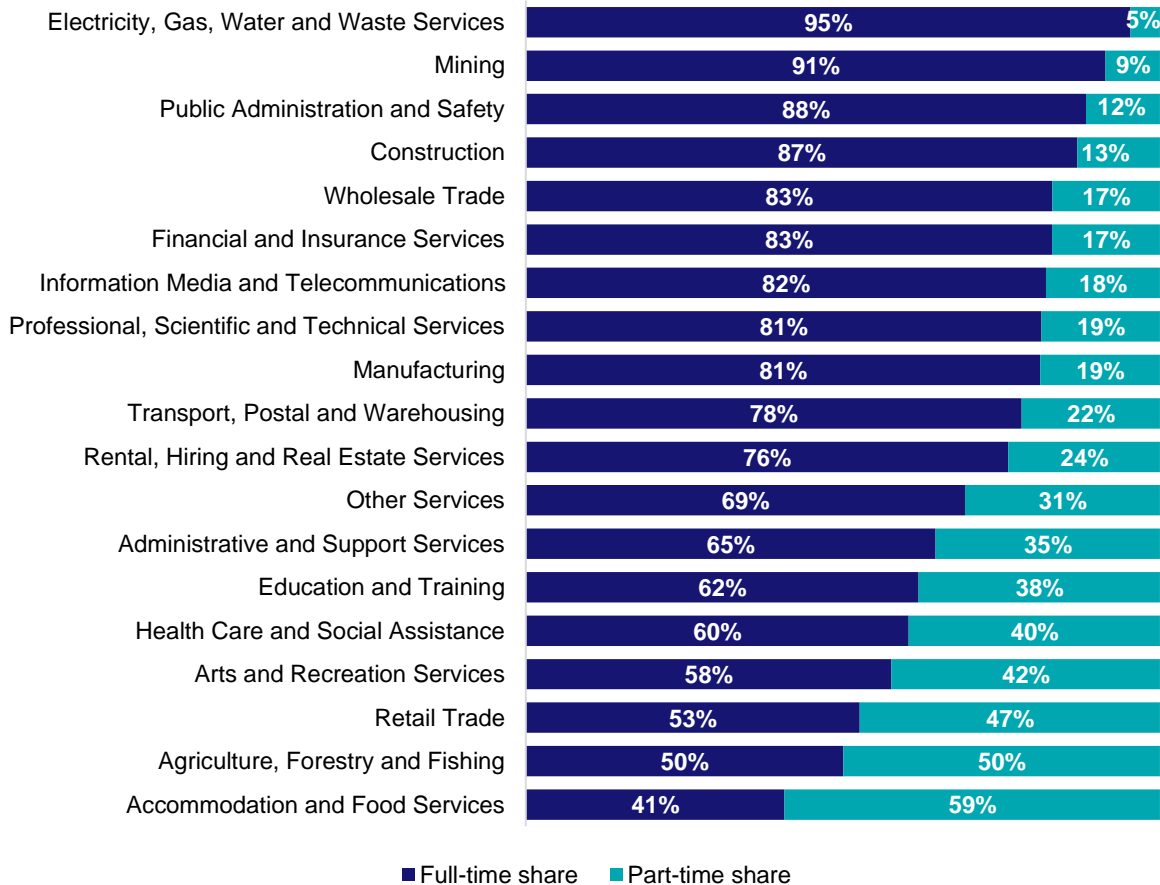
