



# Employment Region Industry profile

## Wide Bay and Sunshine Coast Employment Region

### Overview

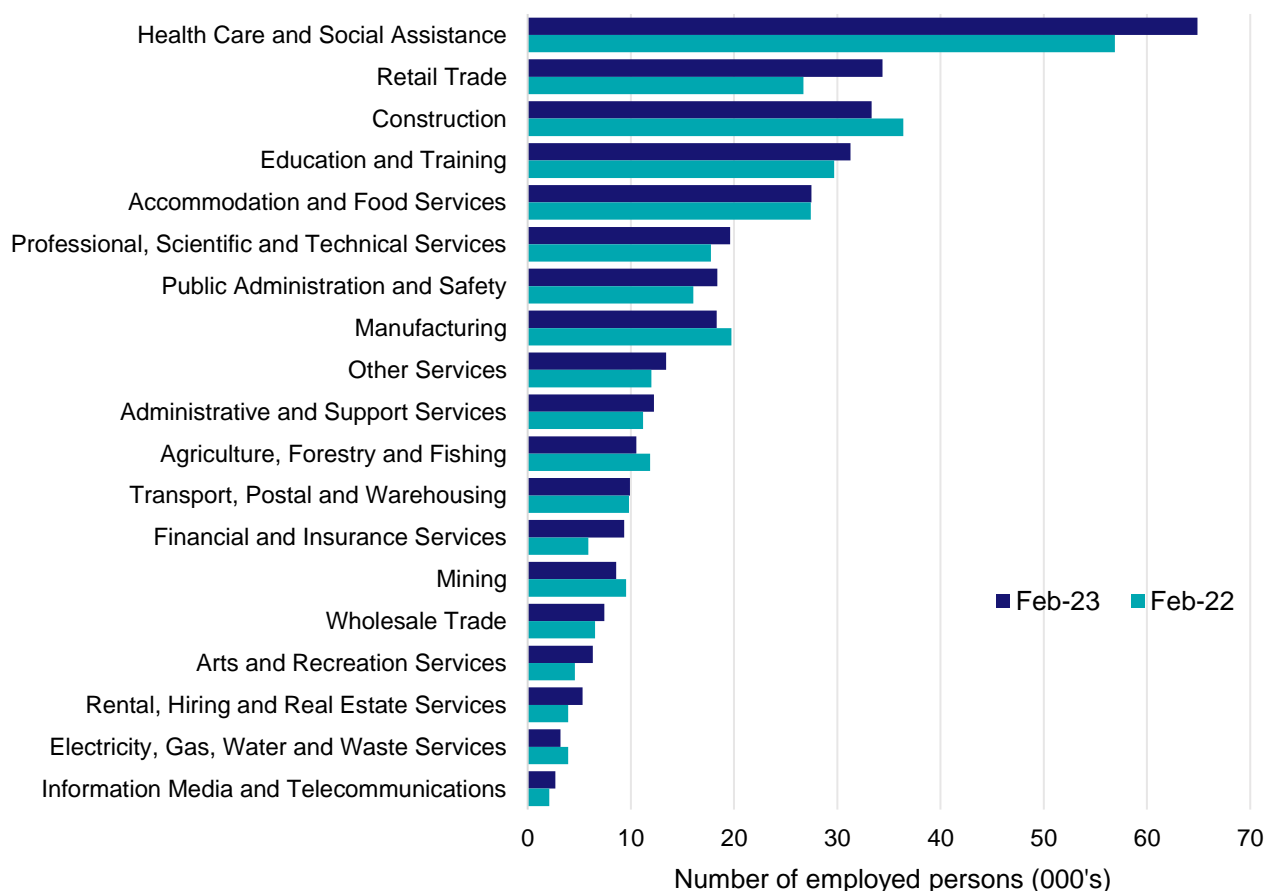
In February 2023, there were around 336,600 people employed in the Wide Bay and Sunshine Coast Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Construction, Education and Training, and Accommodation and Food Services. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 14.1% to stand at 64,900
- Retail Trade rose by 28.7% to stand at 34,400
- Construction fell by 8.5% to stand at 33,300.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Wide Bay and Sunshine Coast Employment Region, 55% of workers were employed full-time; 72% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 45.

### Employment by industry, February 2023 and February 2022



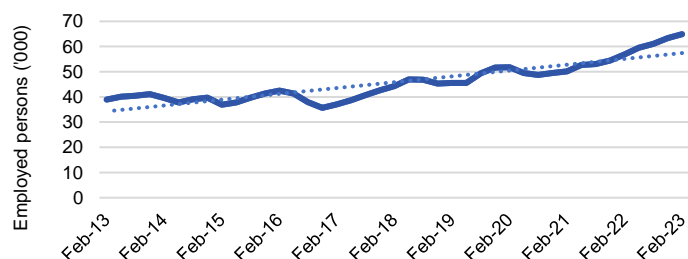

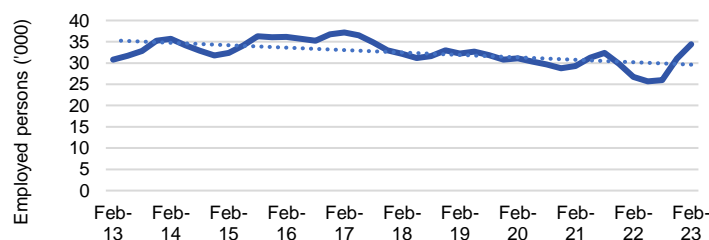

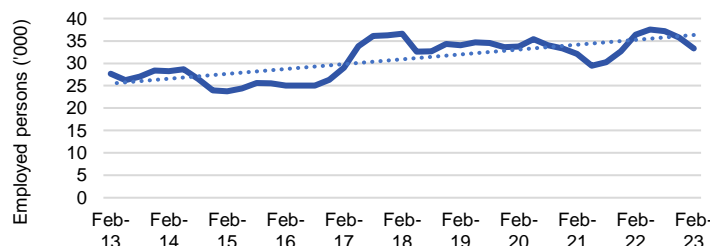

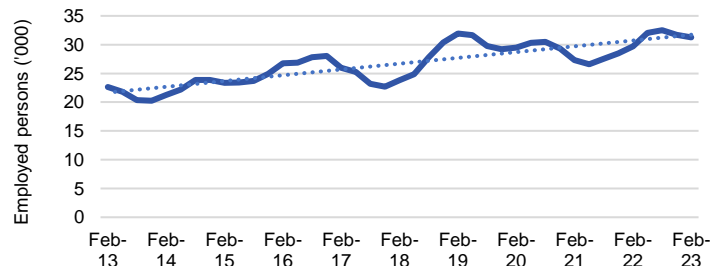

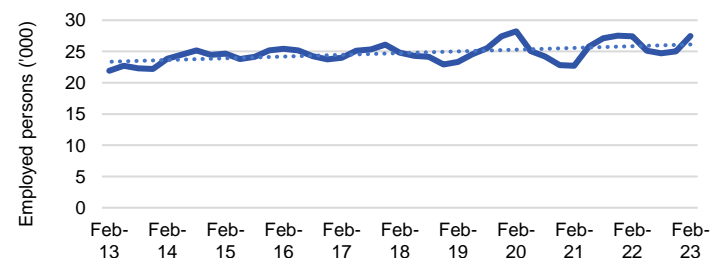

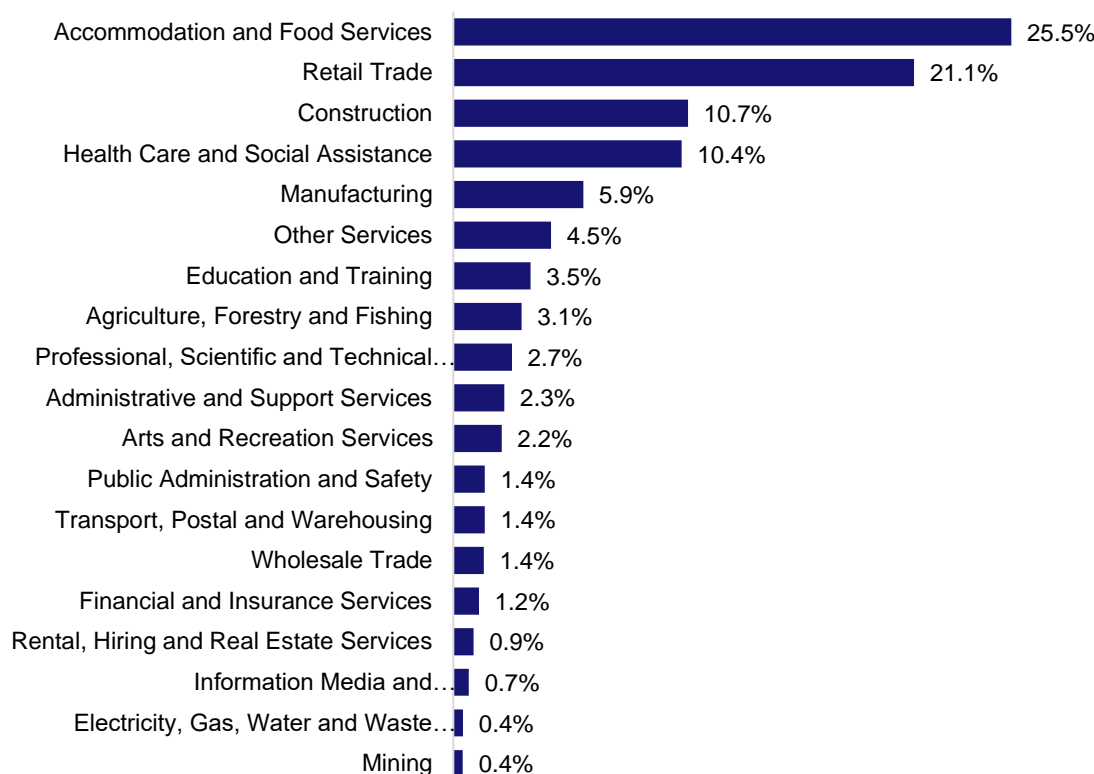

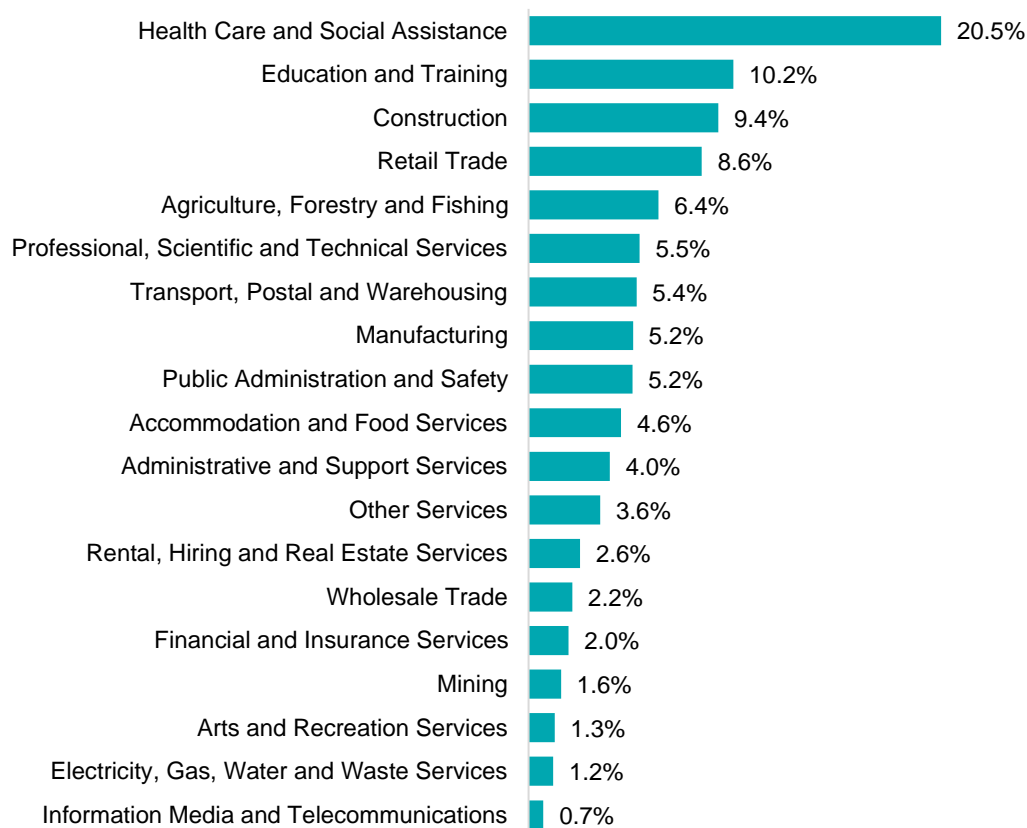

### Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



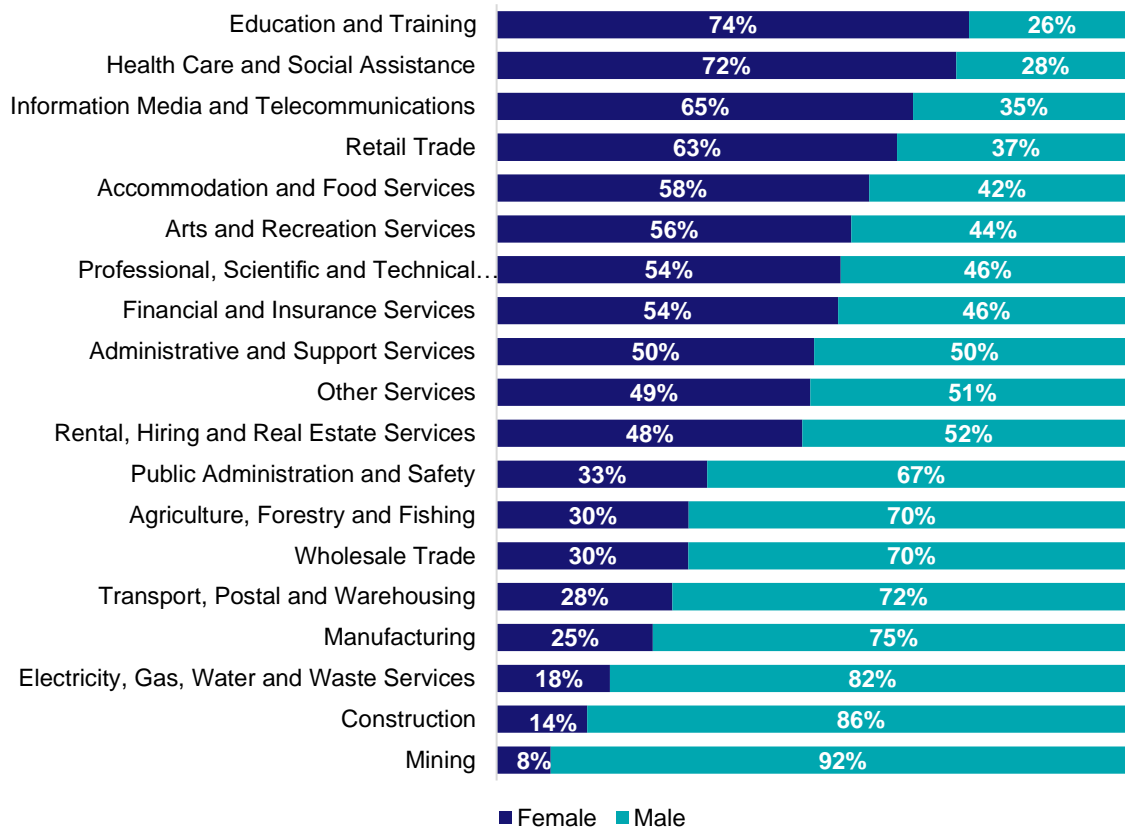

### Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



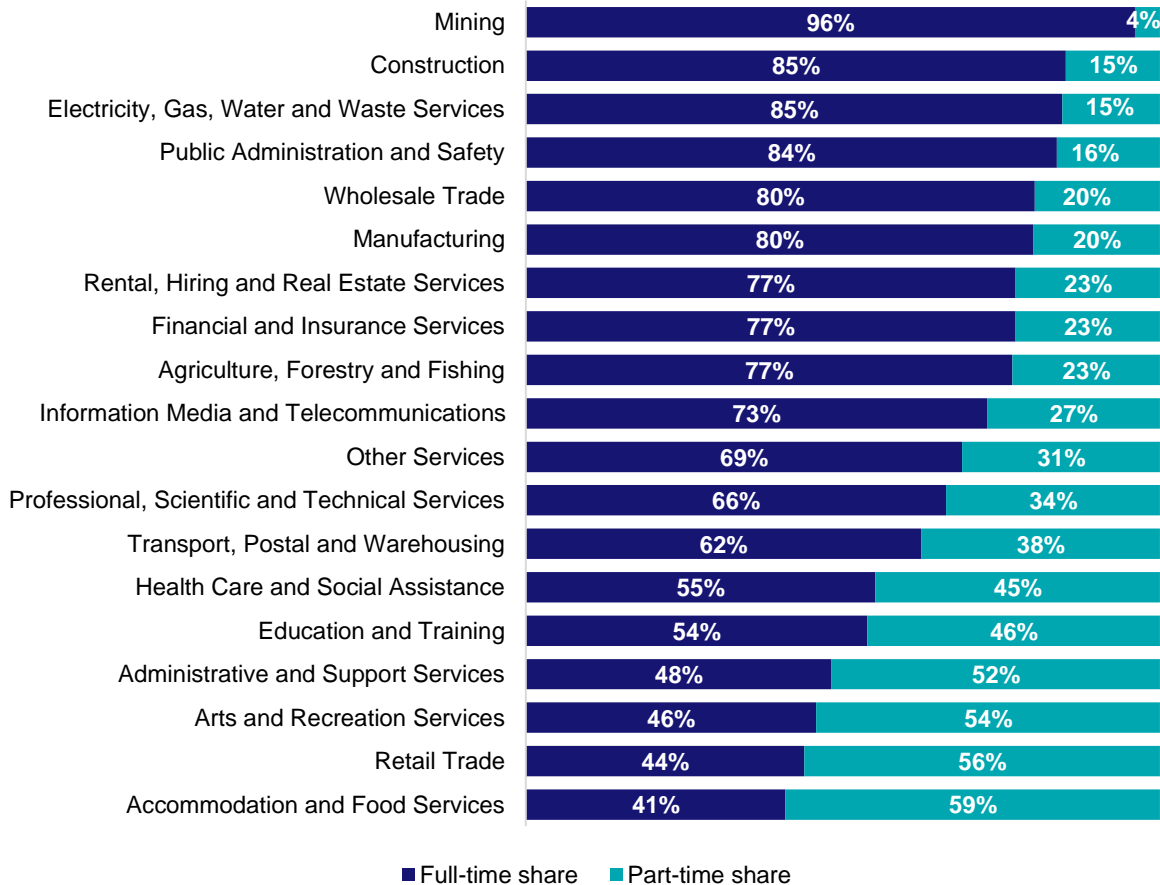
