Overview


In August 2023, there were around 84,300 people employed in the Ballarat Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Accommodation and Food Services, Education and Training, and Manufacturing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 57% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 17.5% to stand at 16,000
- Retail Trade fell by 19.5% to stand at 8,500
- Accommodation and Food Services rose by 35.9% to stand at 8,400.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Ballarat Employment Region, 64% of workers were employed full-time; 71% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 44.




Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?





Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?




