



# Note regarding labour force data for the Broome, Esperance, Geraldton and Kalgoorlie Employment Regions

These Employment Regions fall within the Western Australia – Outback (North and South) SA4. This SA4 is very large and covers much of regional and remote WA, including Broome, Esperance, Geraldton and Kalgoorlie. The WA Outback SA4 is a poor fit for these Employment Regions but is the only data readily available for the labour force. As a result, the labour force data for the Western Australia – Outback (North and South) SA4 is presented for each of these Employment Regions.







# **Employment Region Industry profile**

### **Kalgoorlie Employment Region**

#### Overview


In August 2023, there were around 121,200 people employed in the Kalgoorlie Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Mining, Accommodation and Food Services, Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, and Transport, Postal and Warehousing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 54% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2023, employment in:

- Mining rose by 22.0% to stand at 25,200
- Accommodation and Food Services rose by 13.0% to stand at 11,100
- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 4.4% to stand at 10,200.

In Mining in the Kalgoorlie Employment Region, 95% of workers were employed full-time; 75% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 39.





#### Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?





#### Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?




