North Western Melbourne Employment Region

Overview


In August 2023, there were around 225,800 people employed in the North Western Melbourne Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Retail Trade, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 55% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 23.0% to stand at 32,500
- Construction rose by 28.0% to stand at 30,700
- Retail Trade rose by 24.3% to stand at 22,400.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the North Western Melbourne Employment Region, 56% of workers were employed full-time; 72% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 39.


Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?





Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?




