

# Employment Region Industry profile

## Sydney Greater West Employment Region

### Overview

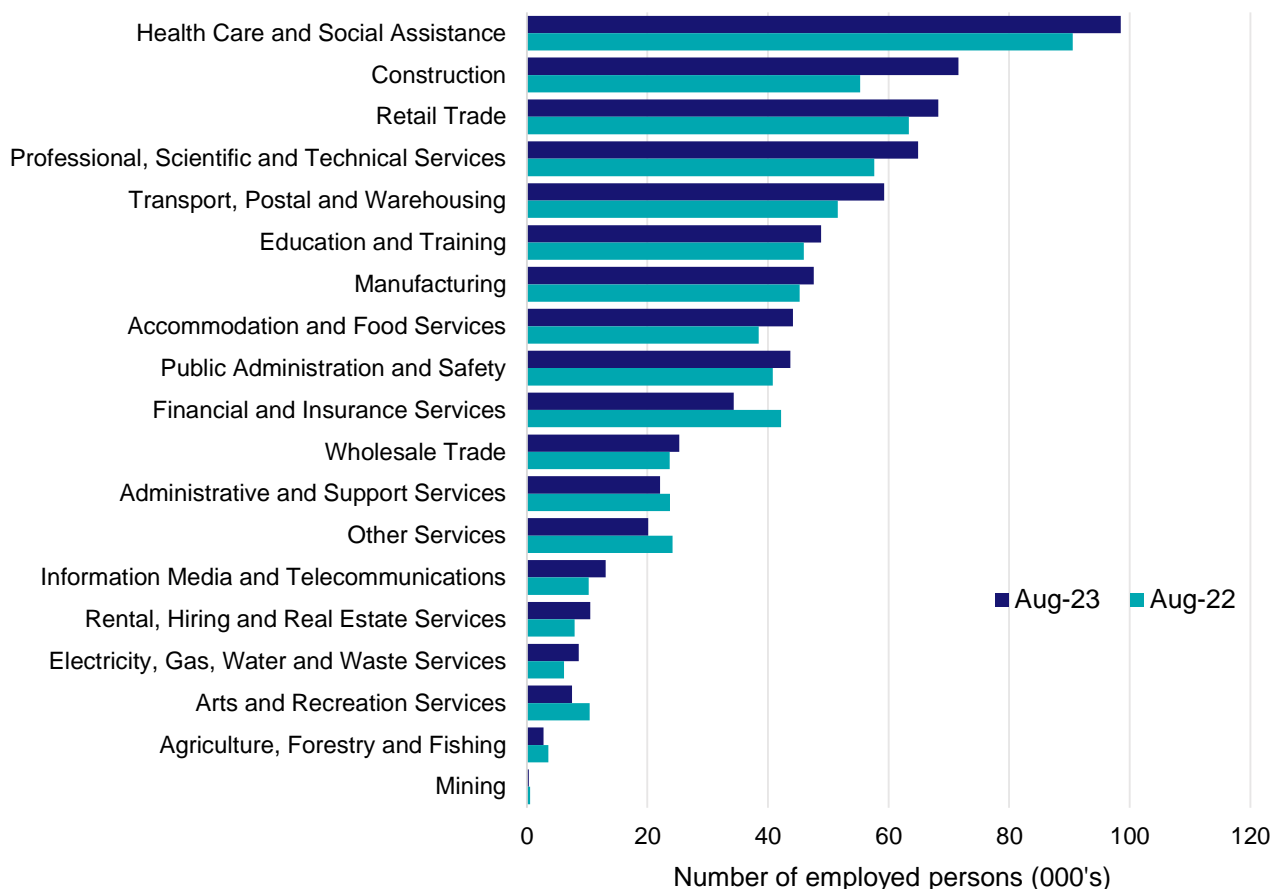
In August 2023, there were around 691,500 people employed in the Sydney Greater West Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Retail Trade, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, and Transport, Postal and Warehousing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 52% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 8.8% to stand at 98,500
- Construction rose by 29.5% to stand at 71,600
- Retail Trade rose by 7.7% to stand at 68,200.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Sydney Greater West Employment Region, 62% of workers were employed full-time; 80% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 39.

### Employment by industry, August 2023 and August 2022



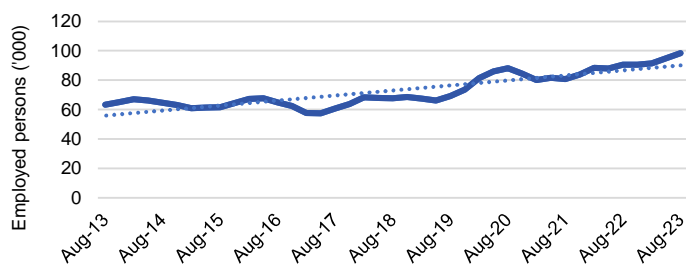

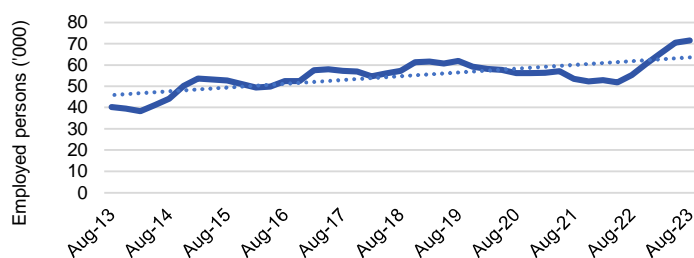

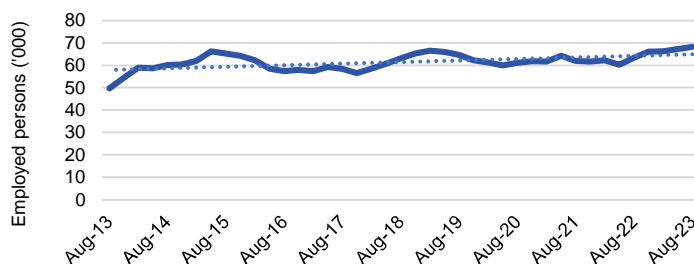

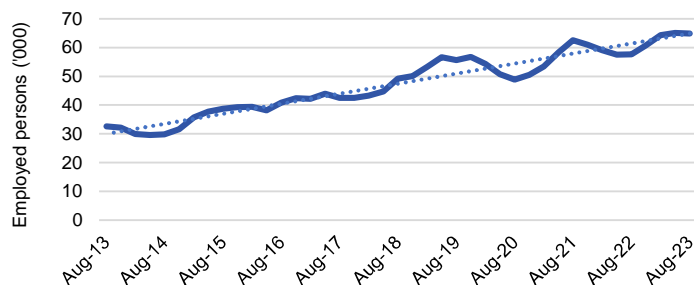

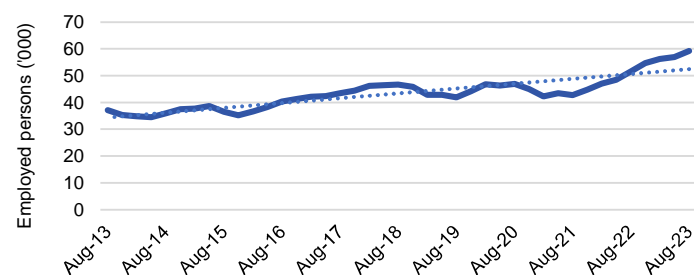

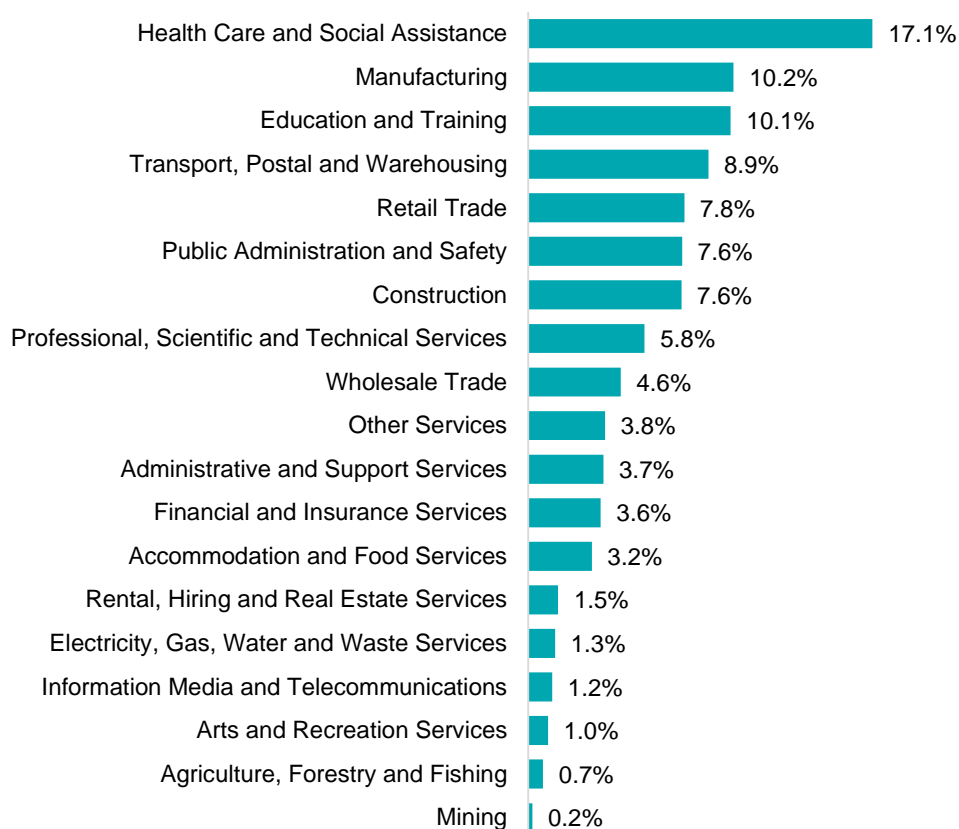

### Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



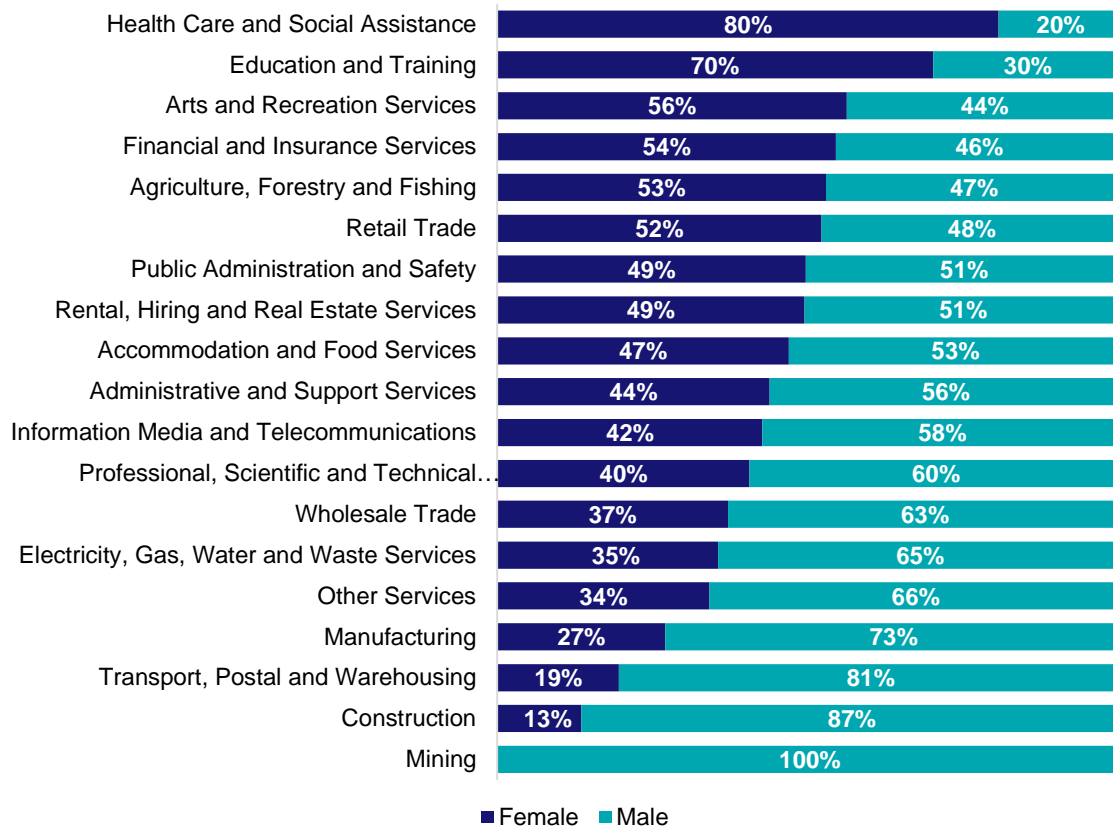

### Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



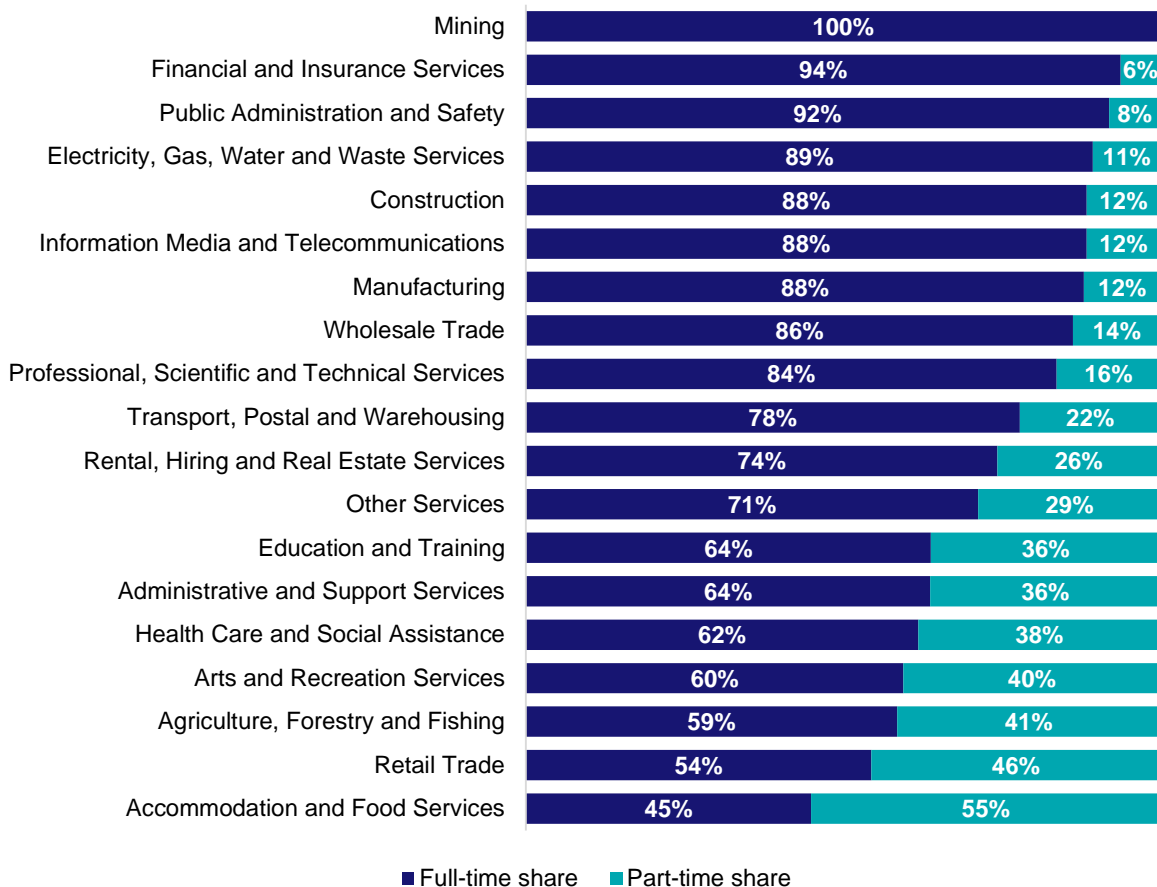
