Overview

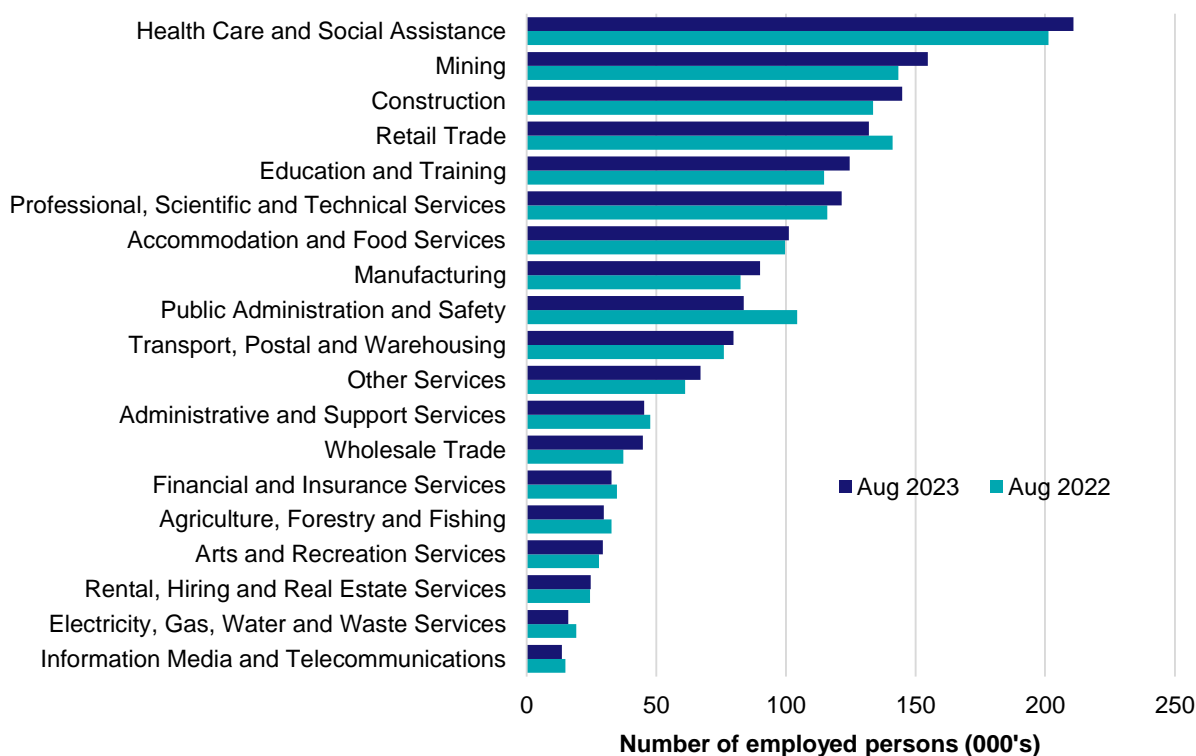
In August 2023, there were around 1,547,100 people employed in Western Australia. The 5 largest employing industries in Western Australia were Health Care and Social Assistance, Mining, Construction, Retail Trade and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 50% of all employment.

Over the year to August 2023, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 4.8% to stand at 211,000
- Mining rose by 7.9% to stand at 154,700
- Construction rose by 8.4% to stand at 144,900.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Western Australia, 56% of workers were employed full-time; 78% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 42. Around 85% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Perth.

Employment by industry, August 2023 and August 2022

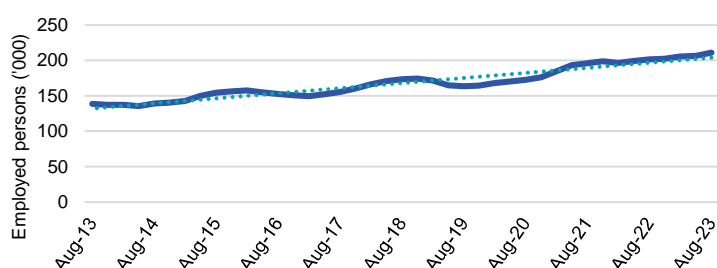

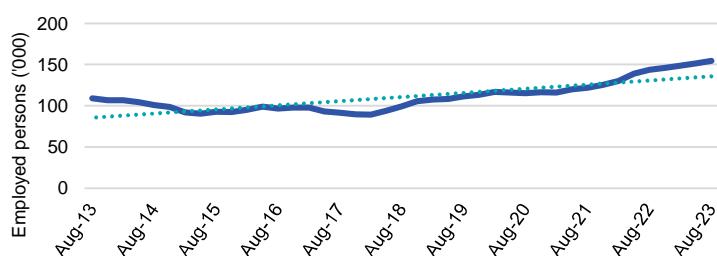

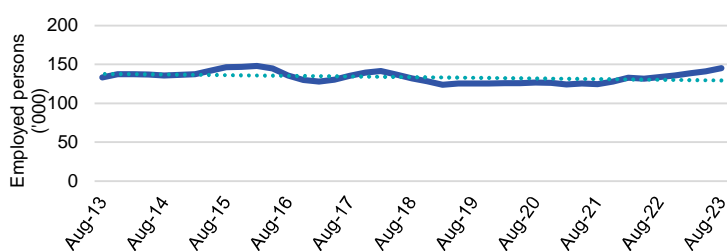

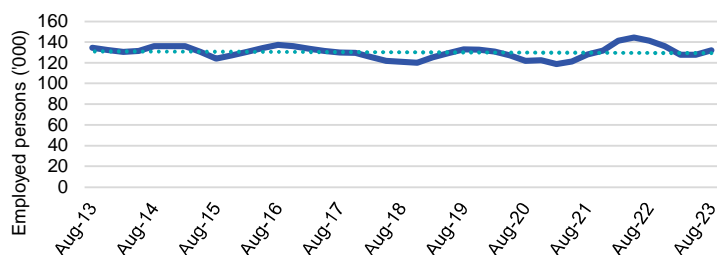

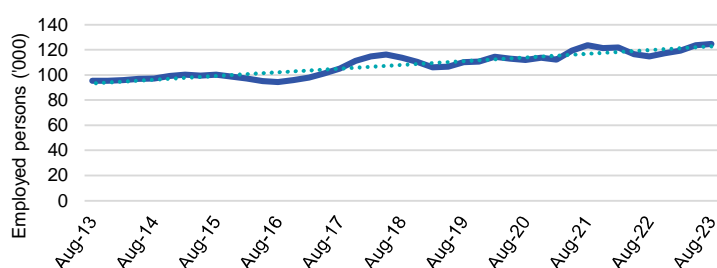

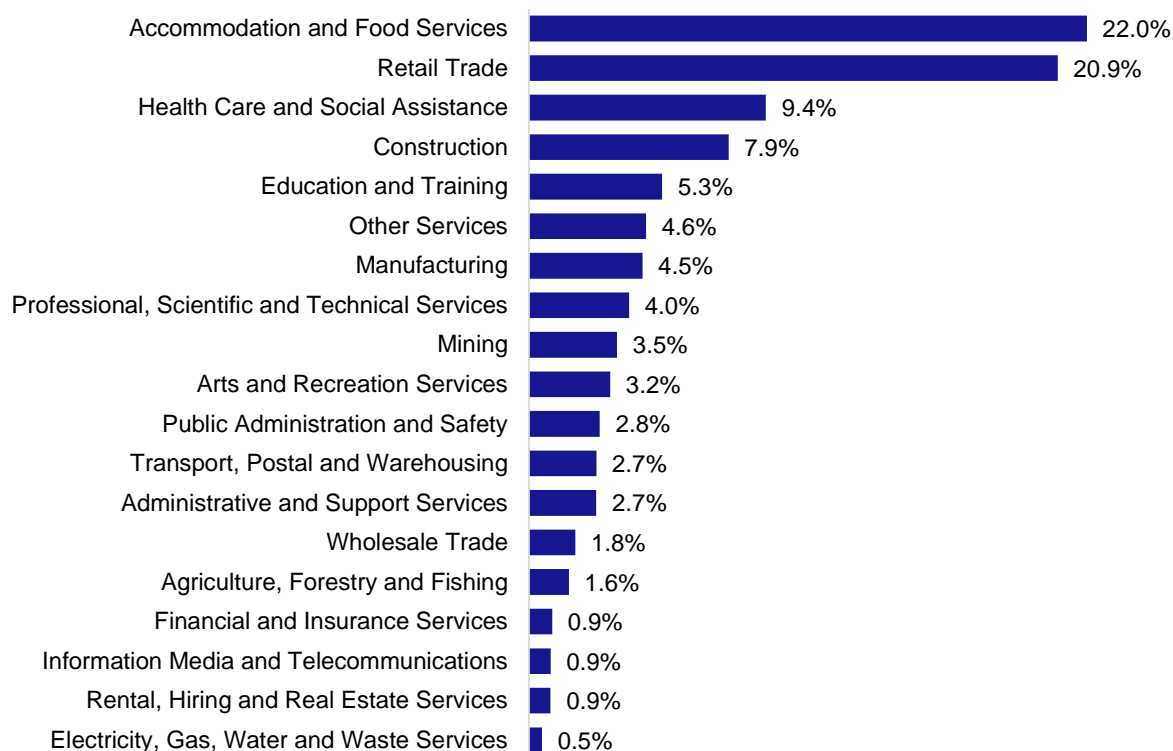

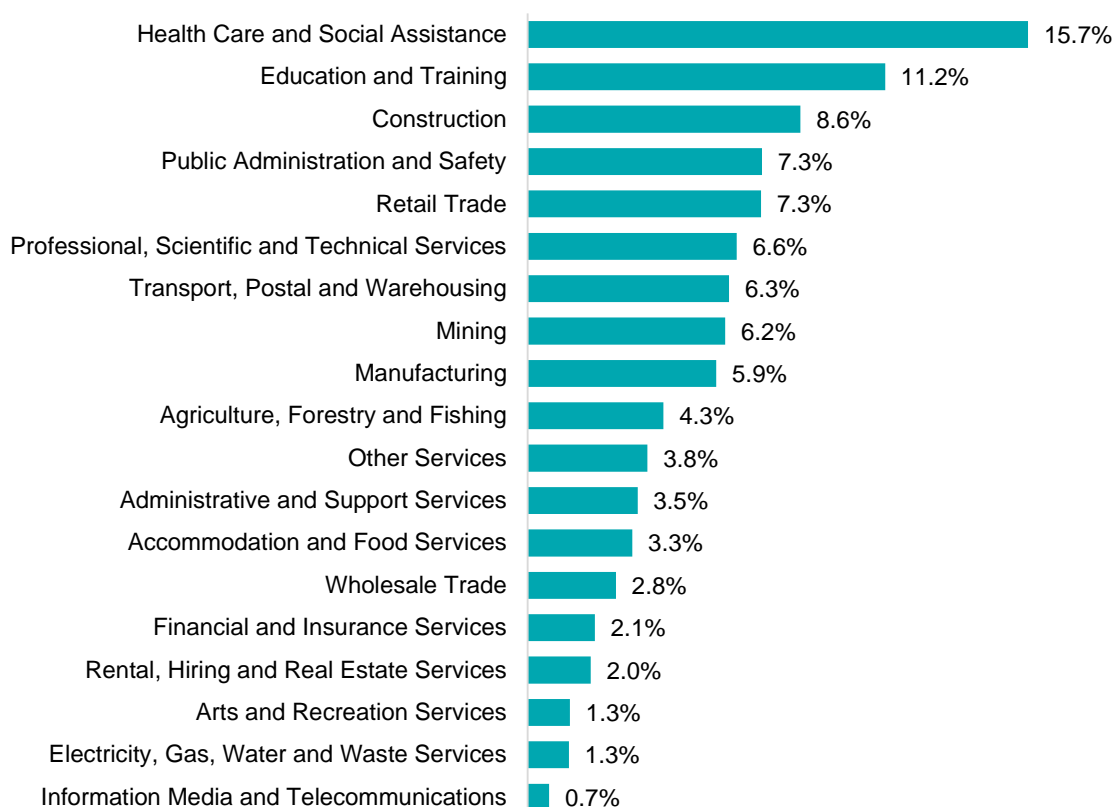
Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



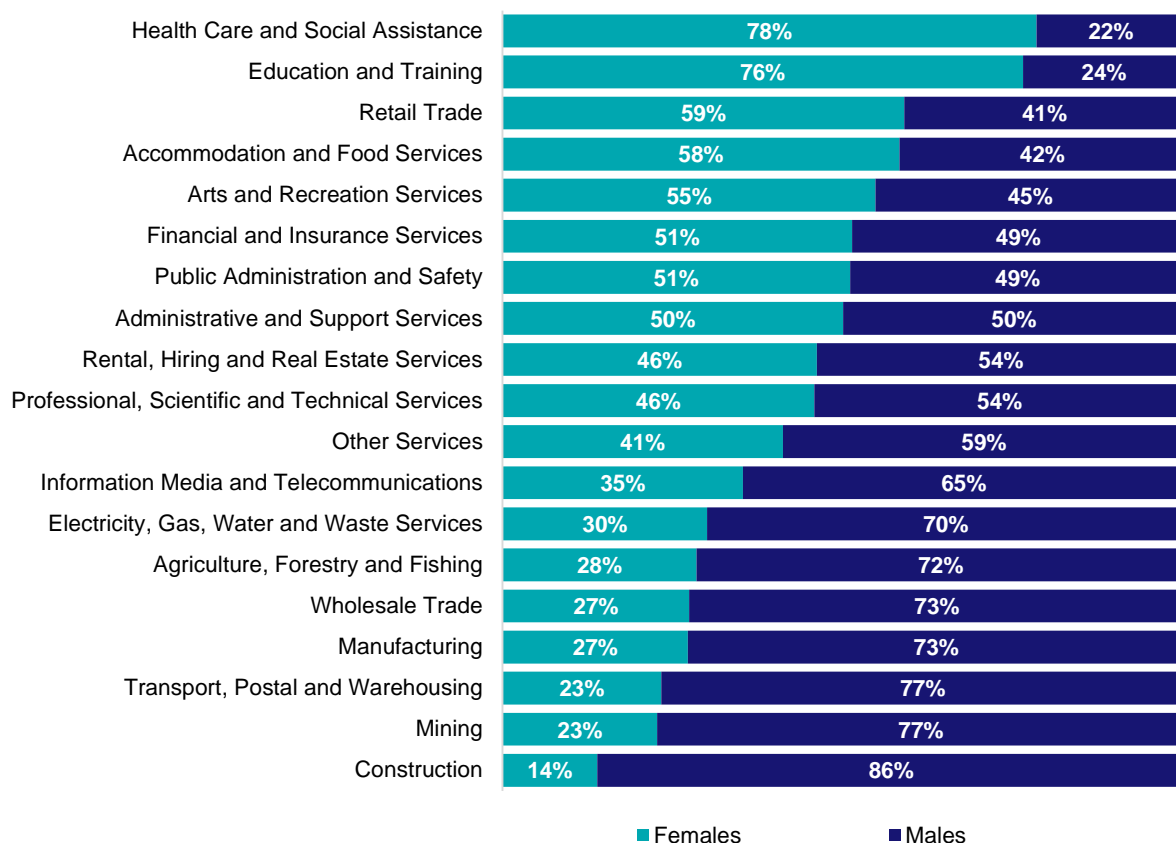

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



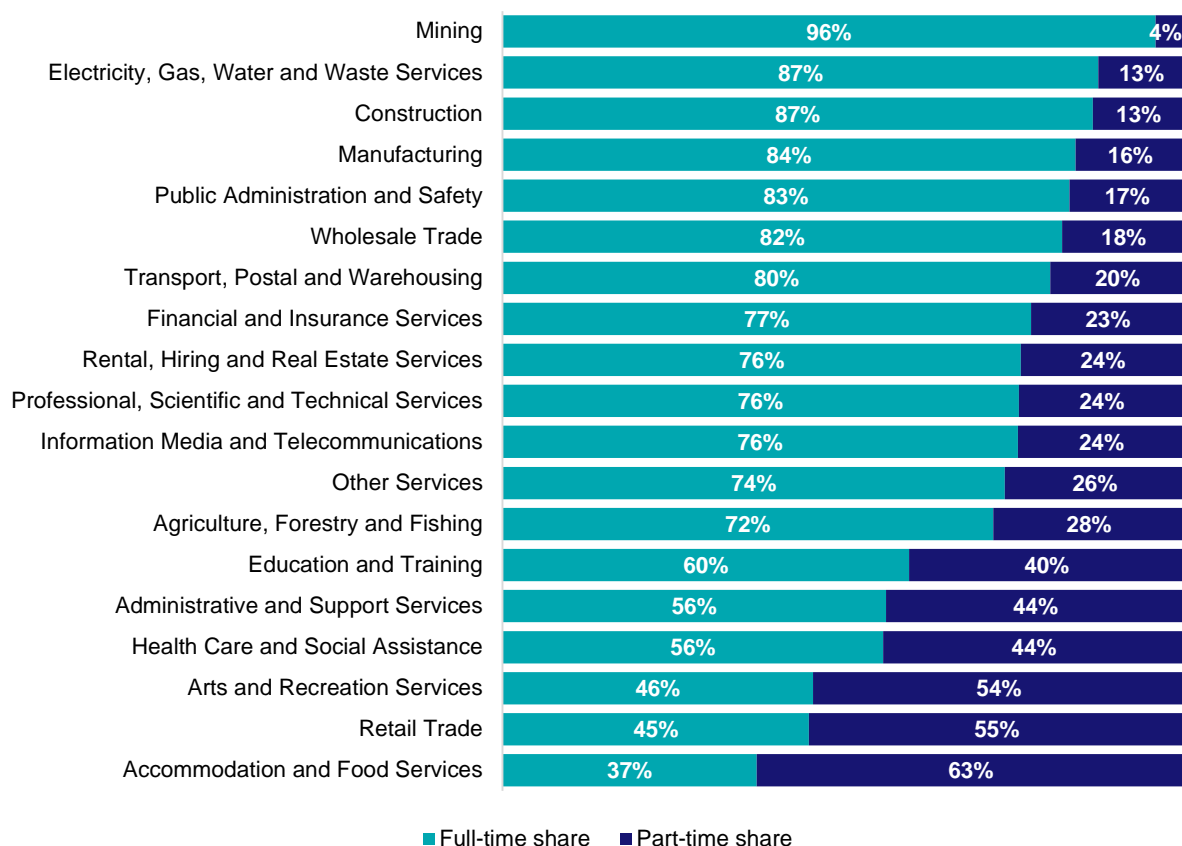
