Overview

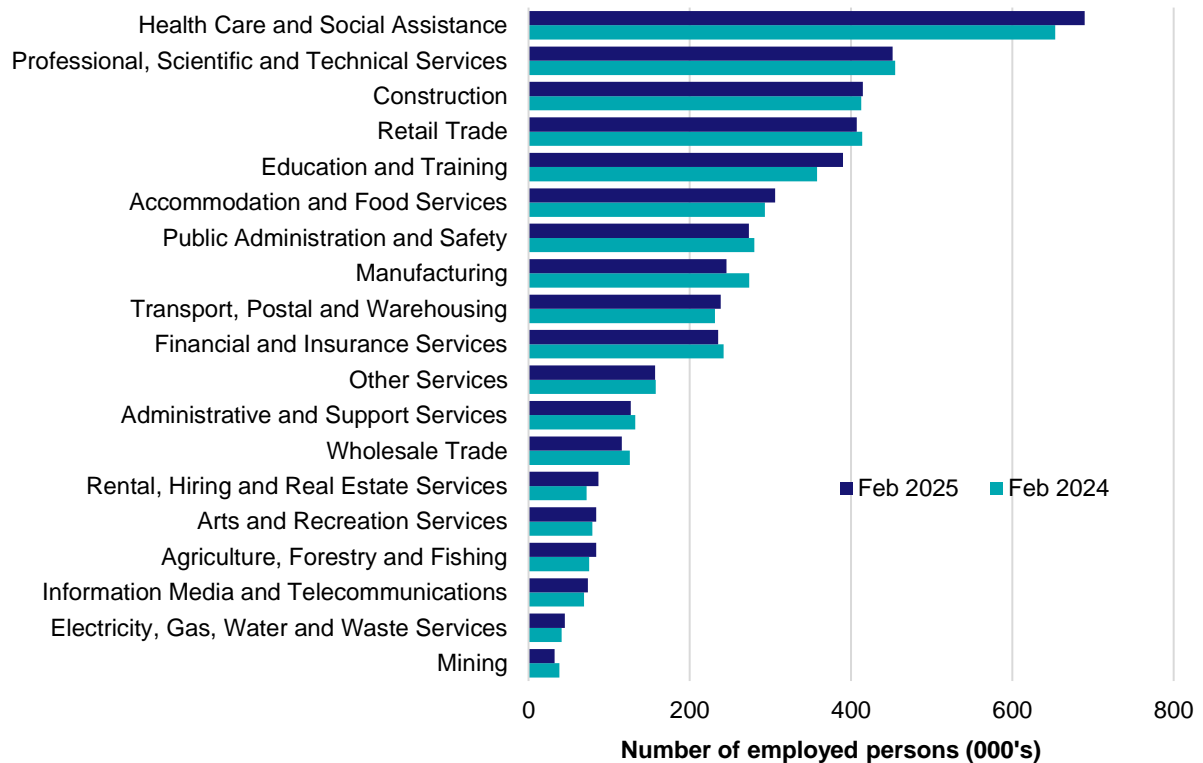
In February 2025, there were around 4,455,800 people employed in New South Wales. The 5 largest employing industries in New South Wales were Health Care and Social Assistance, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Construction, Retail Trade and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 53% of all employment.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 5.6% to stand at 689,800
- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services fell by 0.6% to stand at 451,600
- Construction rose by 0.5% to stand at 414,600.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in New South Wales, 59% of workers were employed full-time; 76% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 42. Around 63% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Sydney.

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024

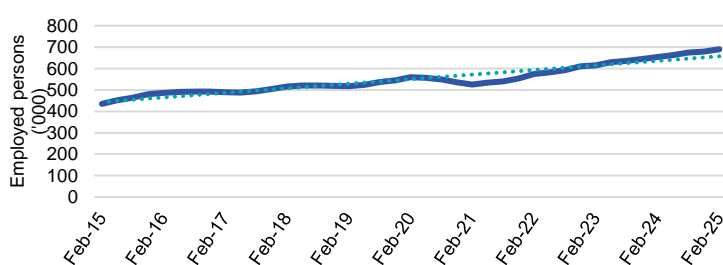

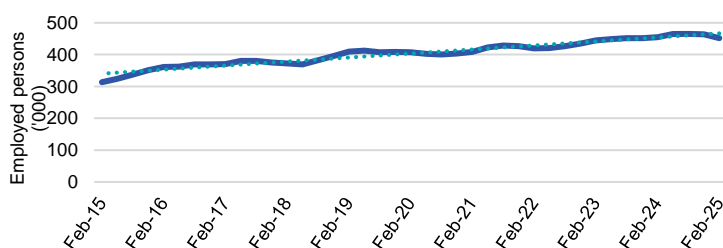

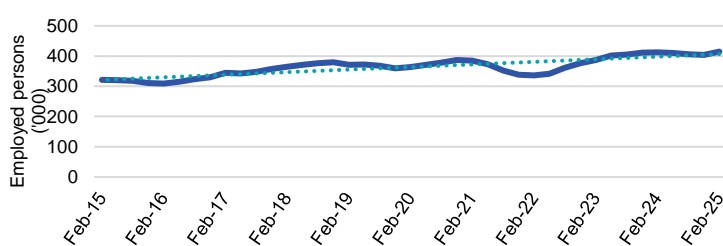

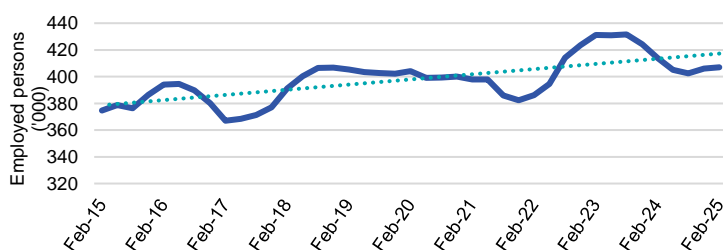

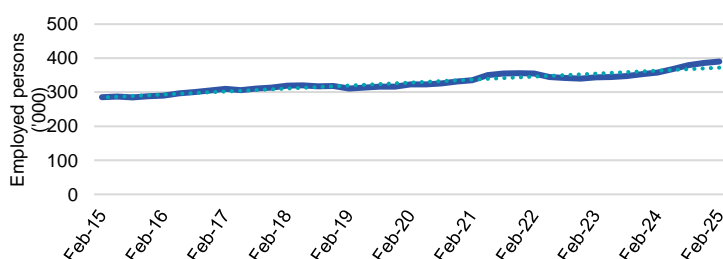

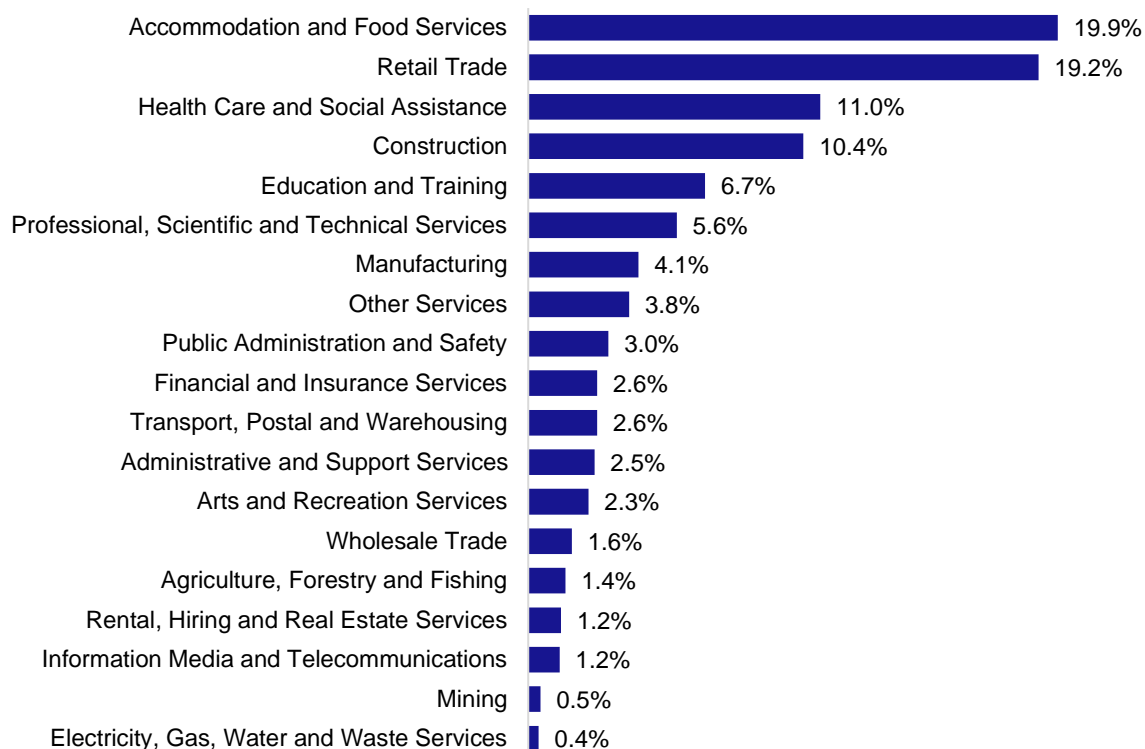

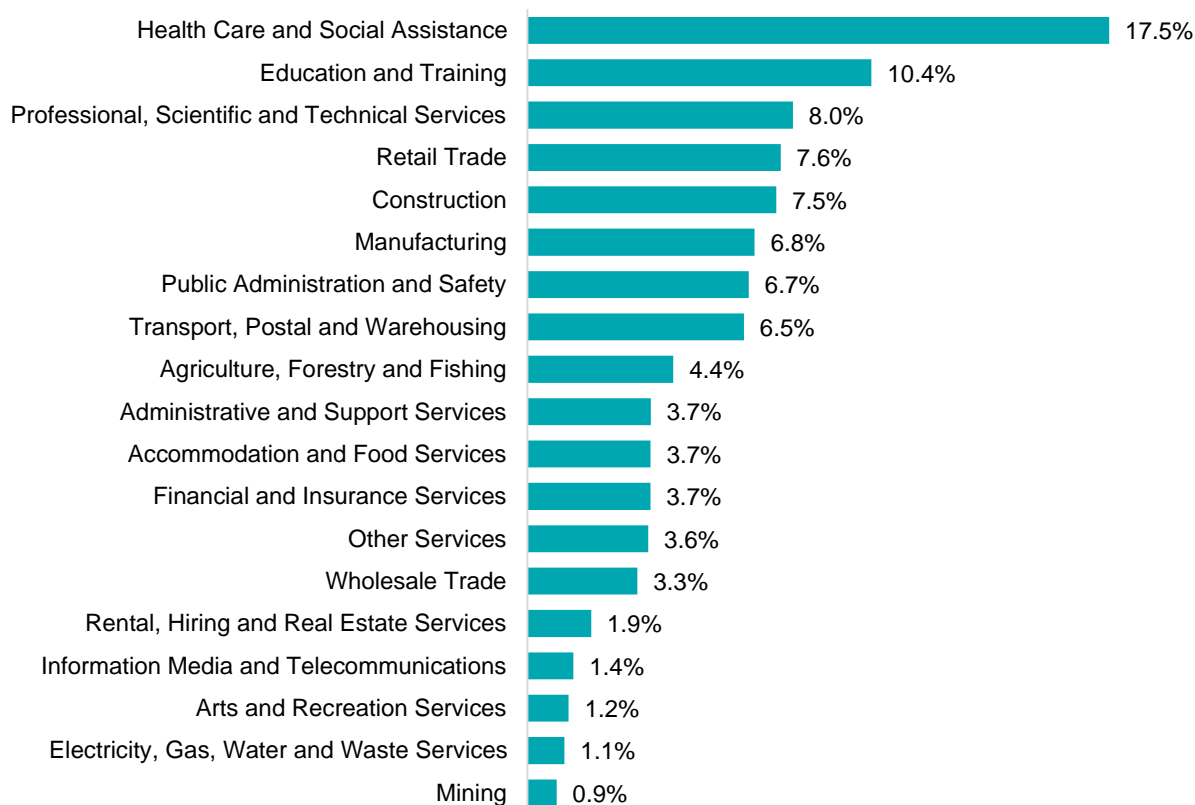

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



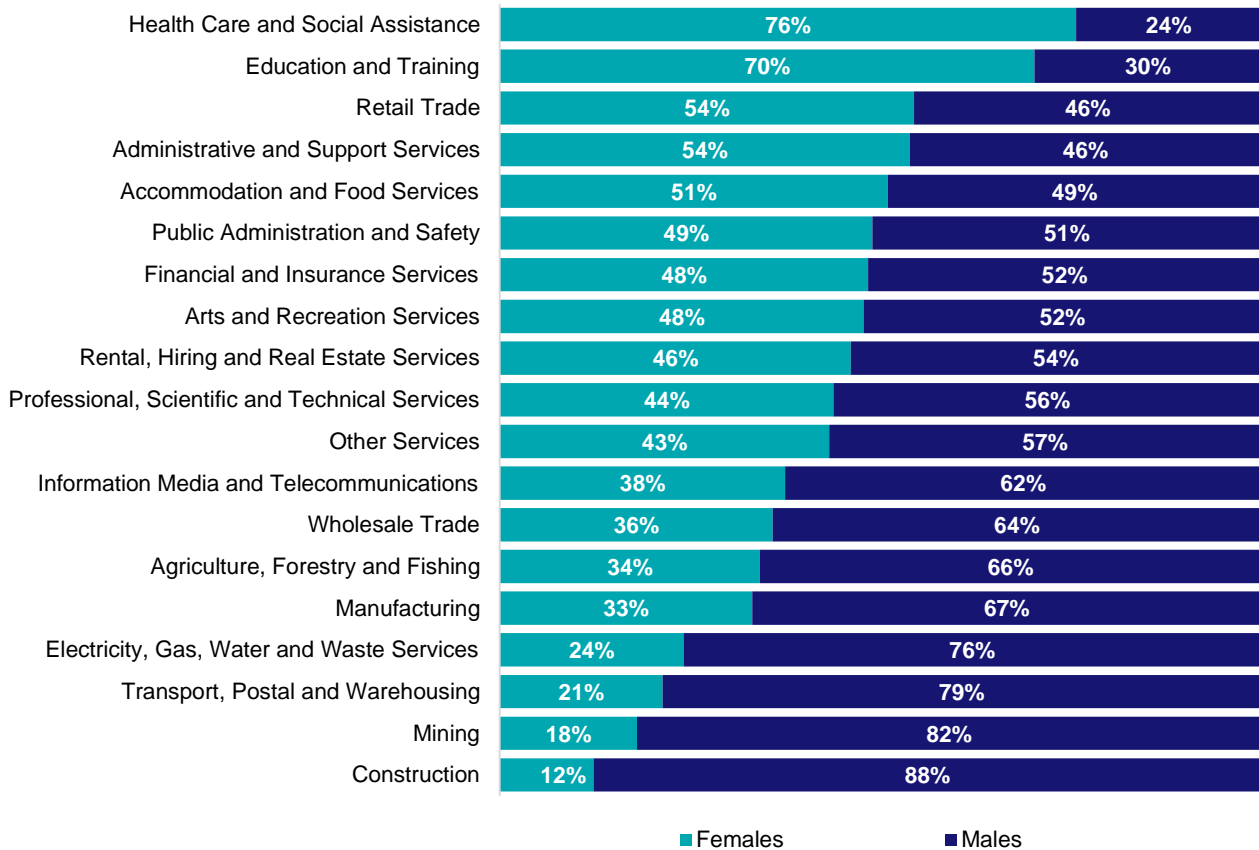

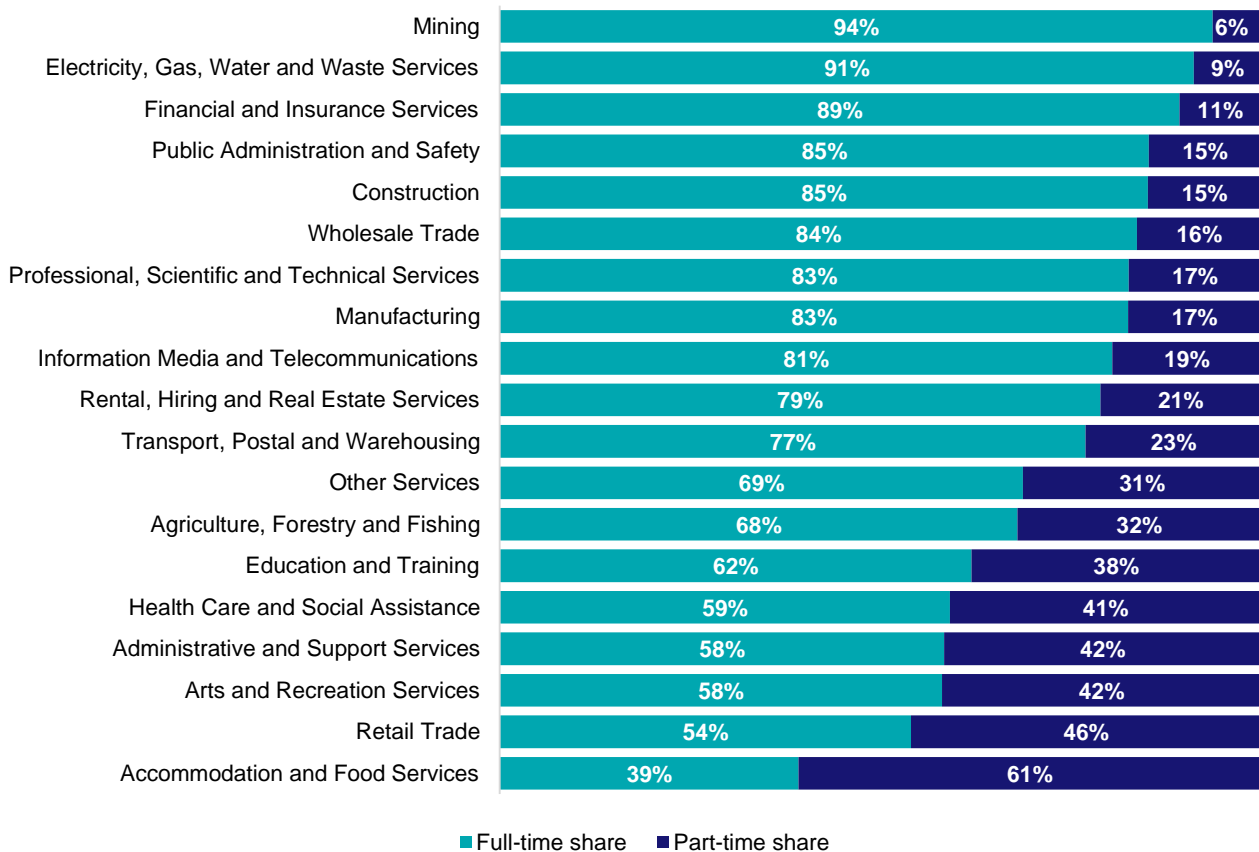

Overview

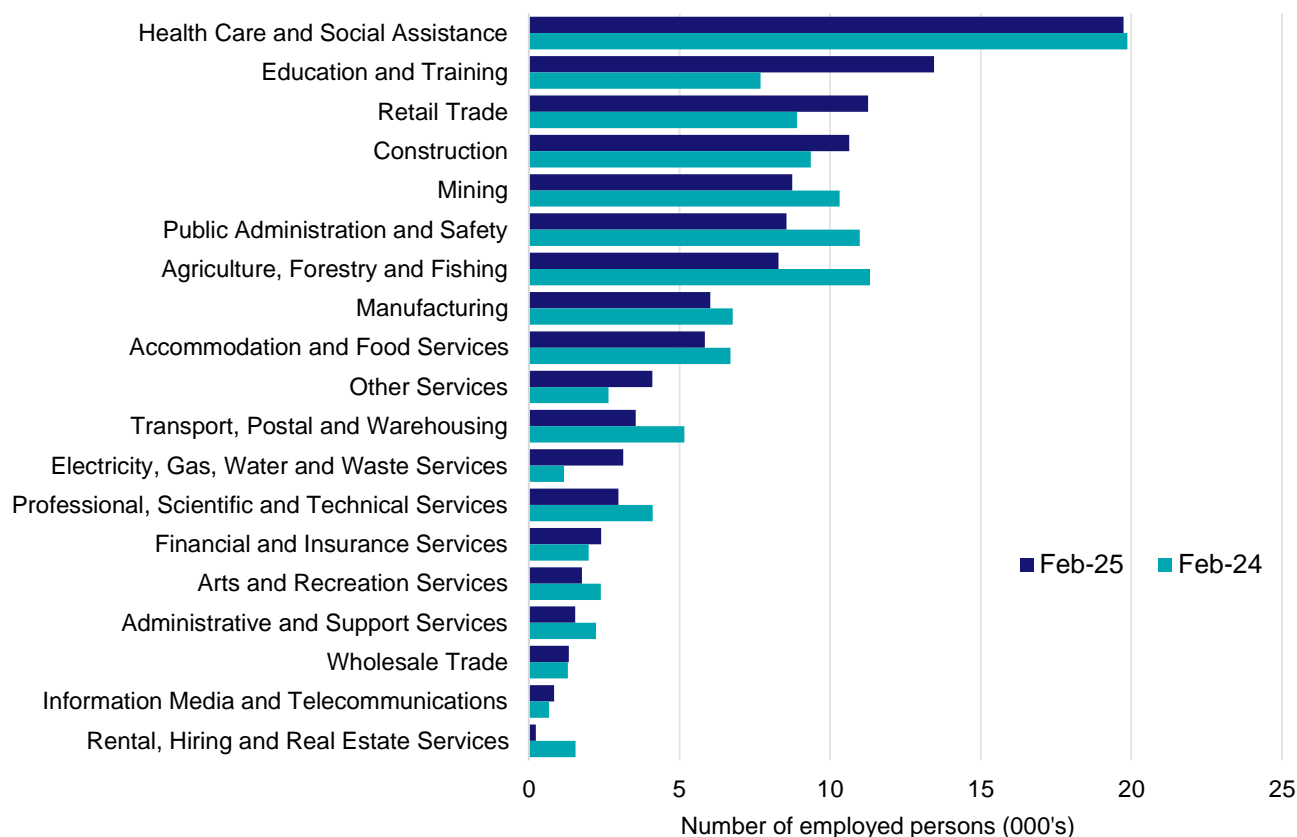
In February 2025, there were around 114,400 people employed in the Central West Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Retail Trade, Construction, and Mining. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 0.7% to stand at 19,700
- Education and Training rose by 75.0% to stand at 13,400
- Retail Trade rose by 26.5% to stand at 11,300.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Central West Employment Region, 64% of workers were employed full-time; 81% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 43.

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



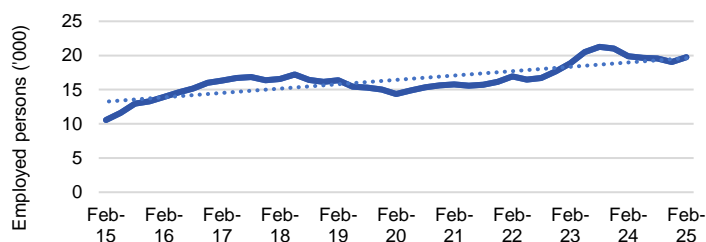

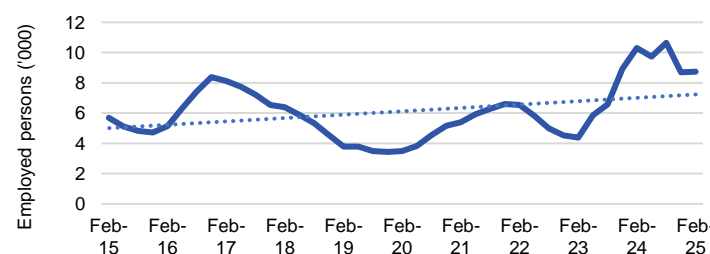

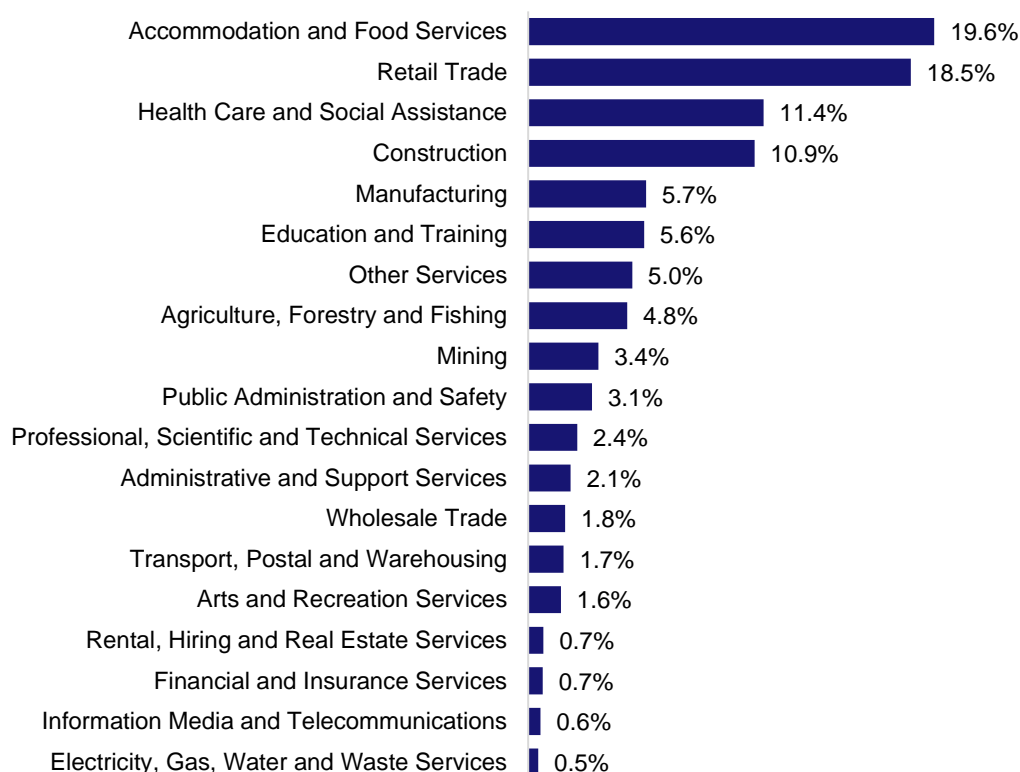

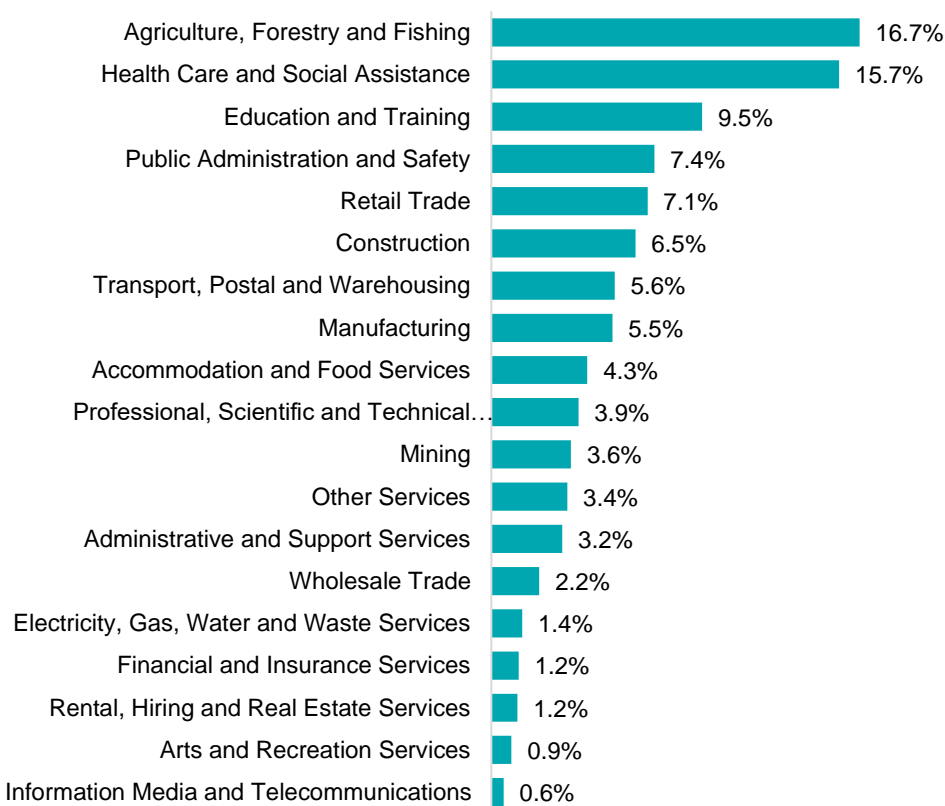

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



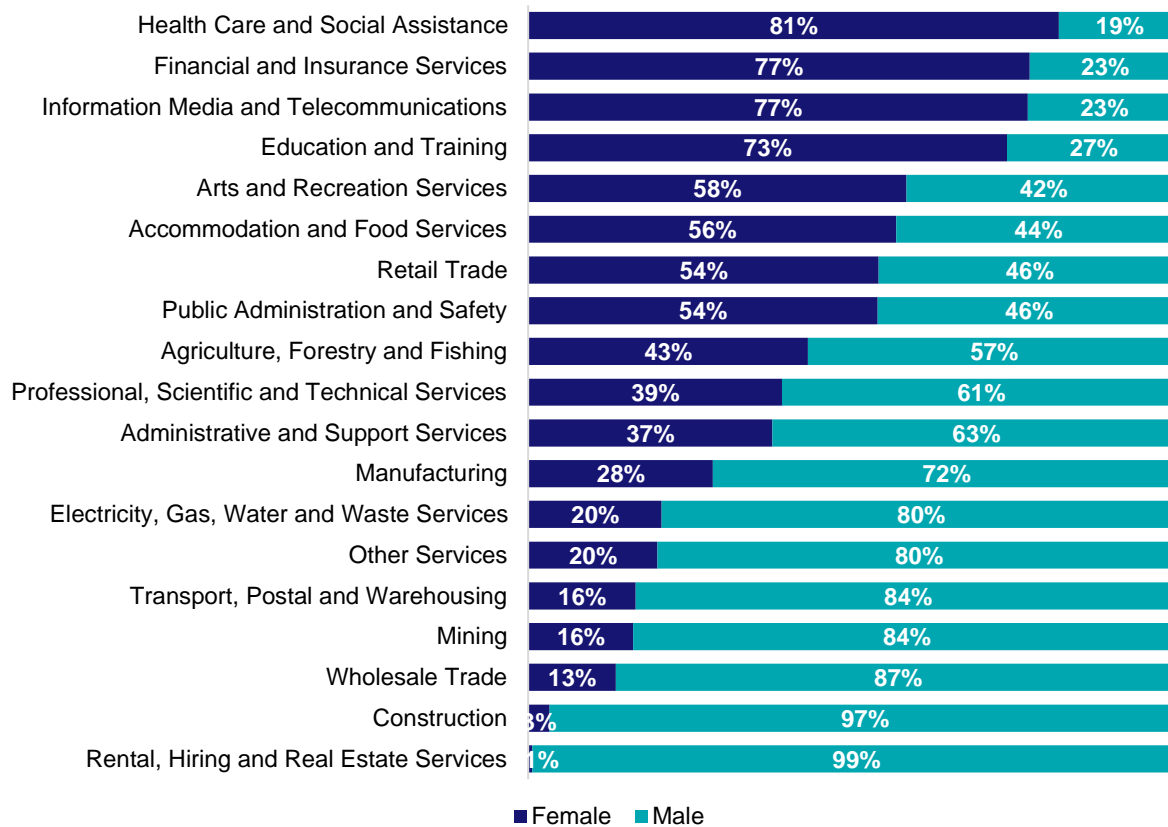

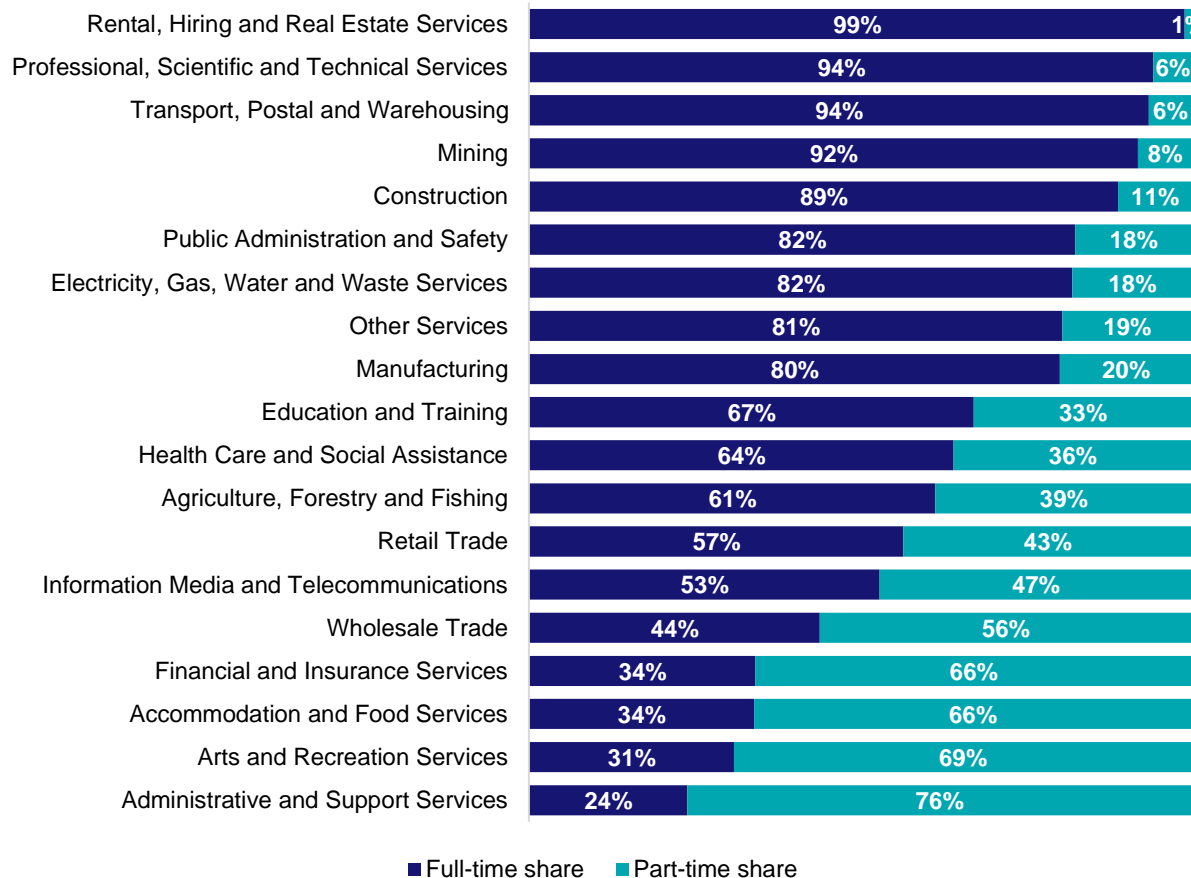

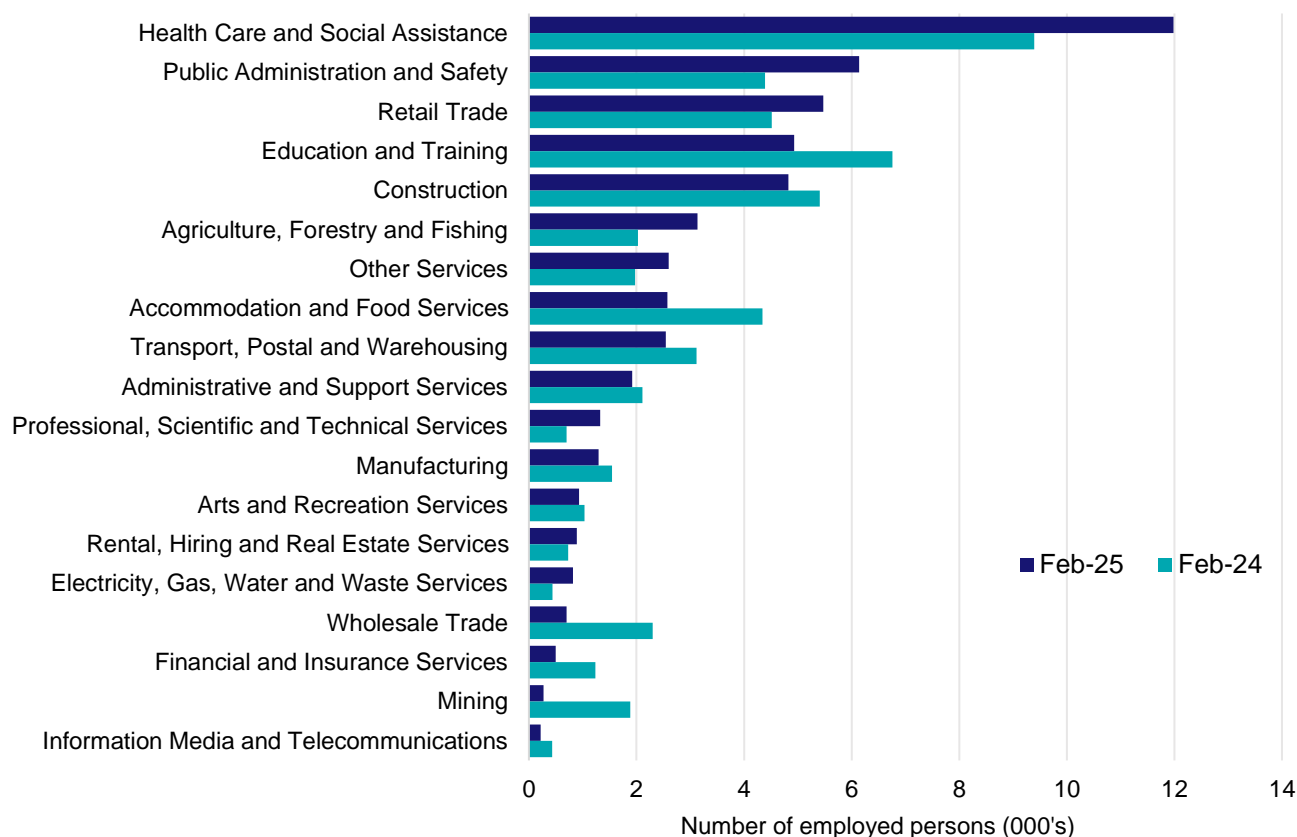

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



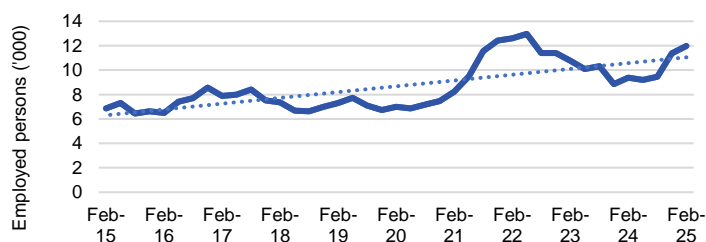

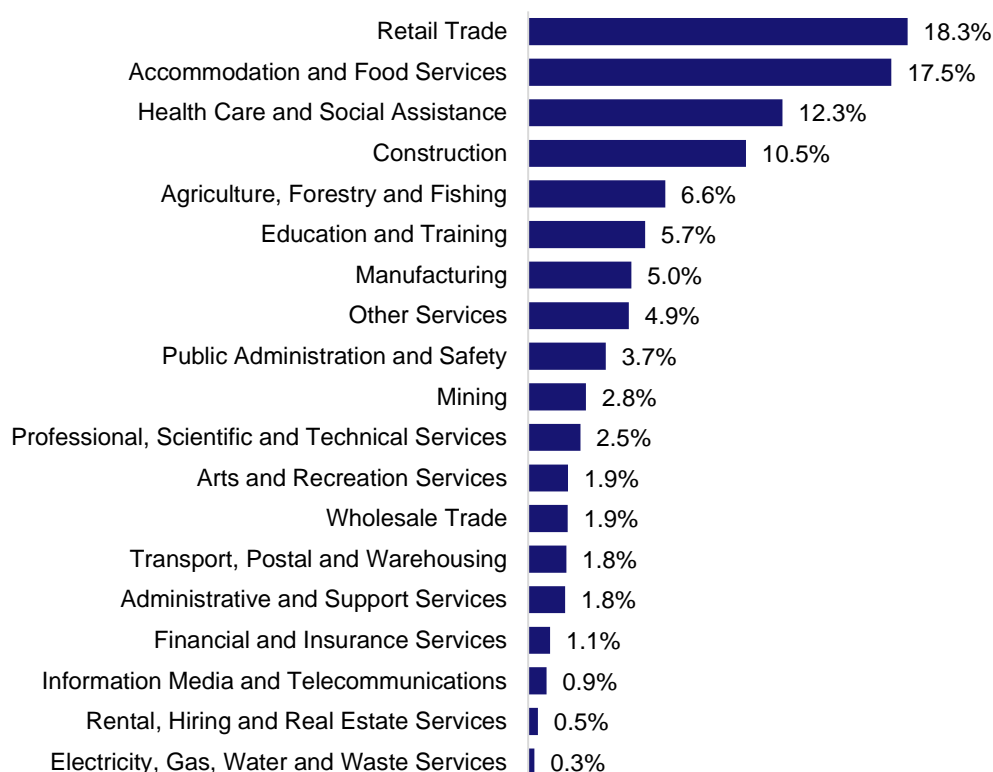

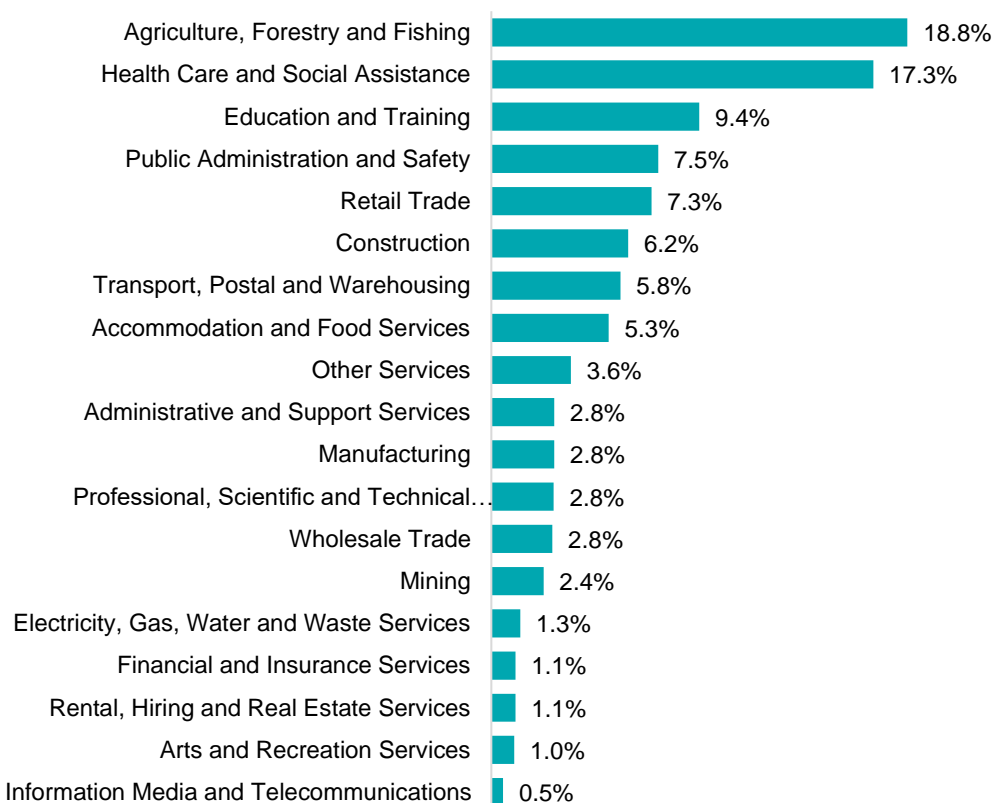

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



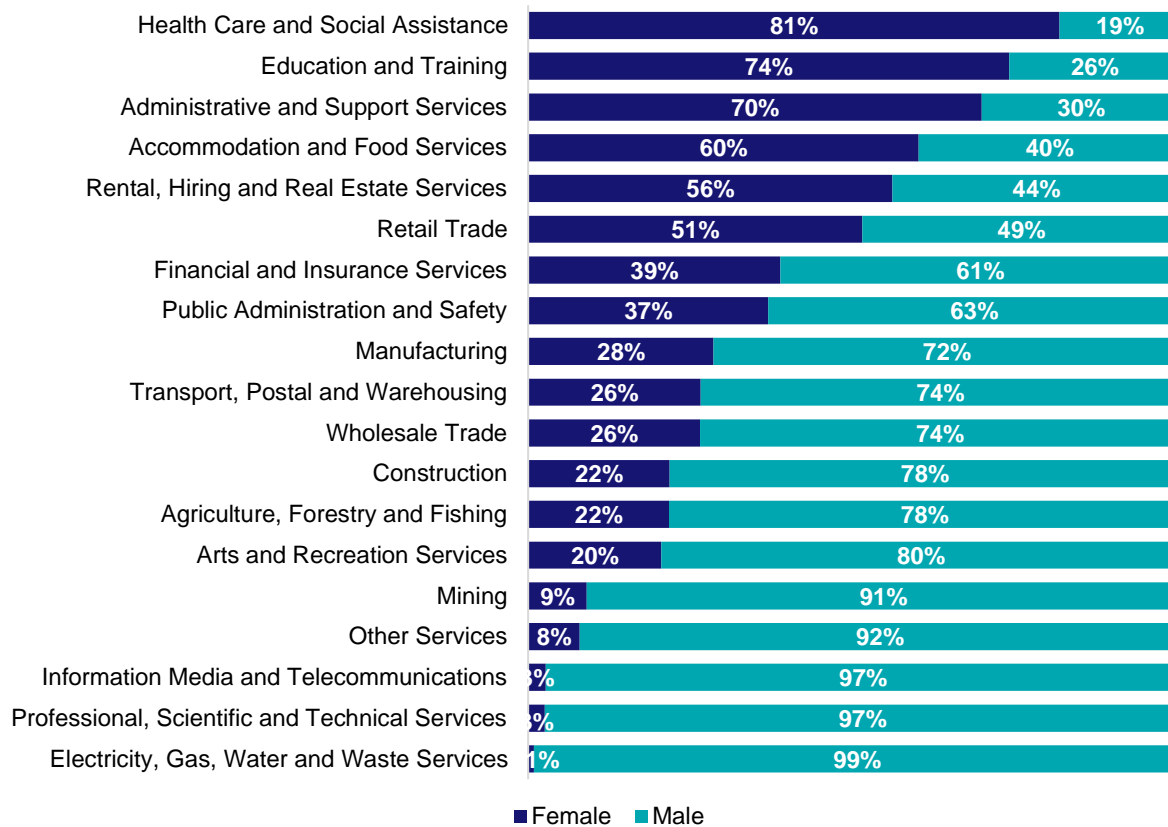

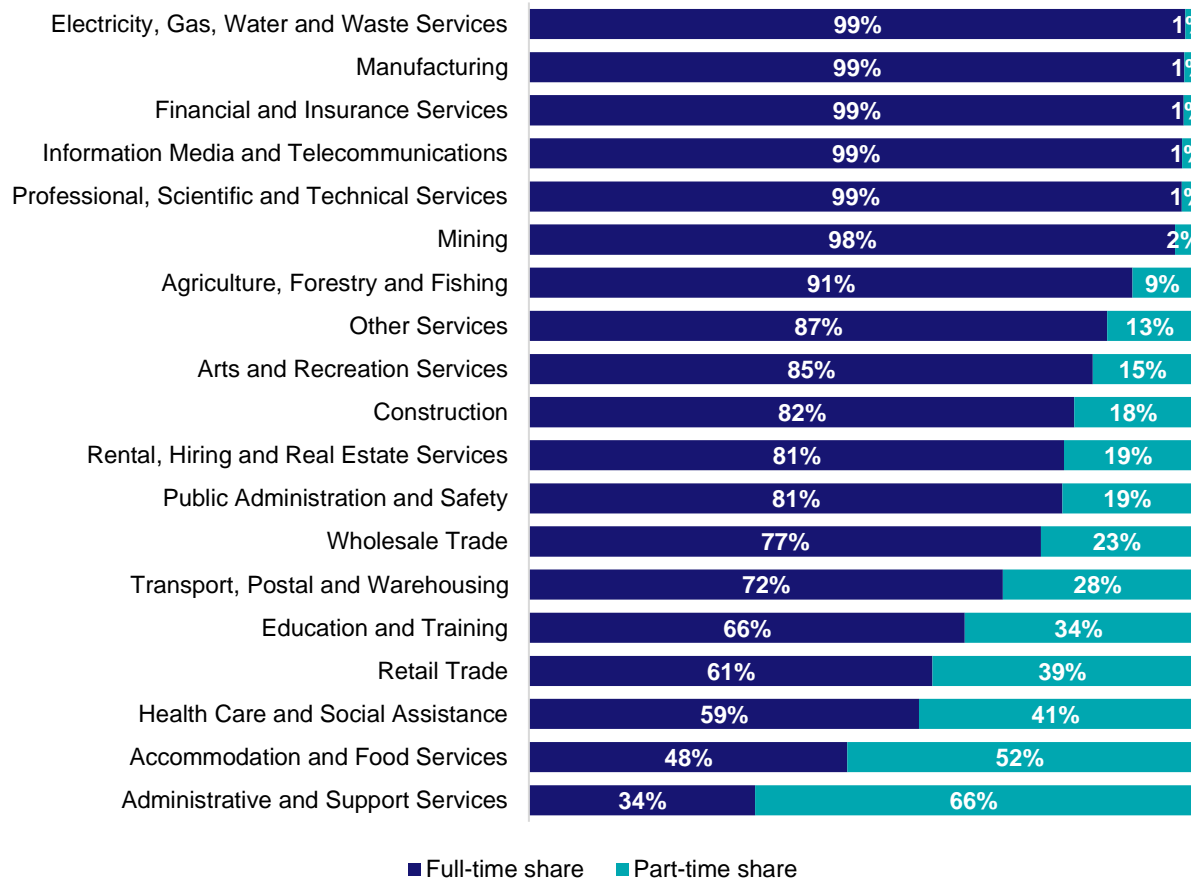

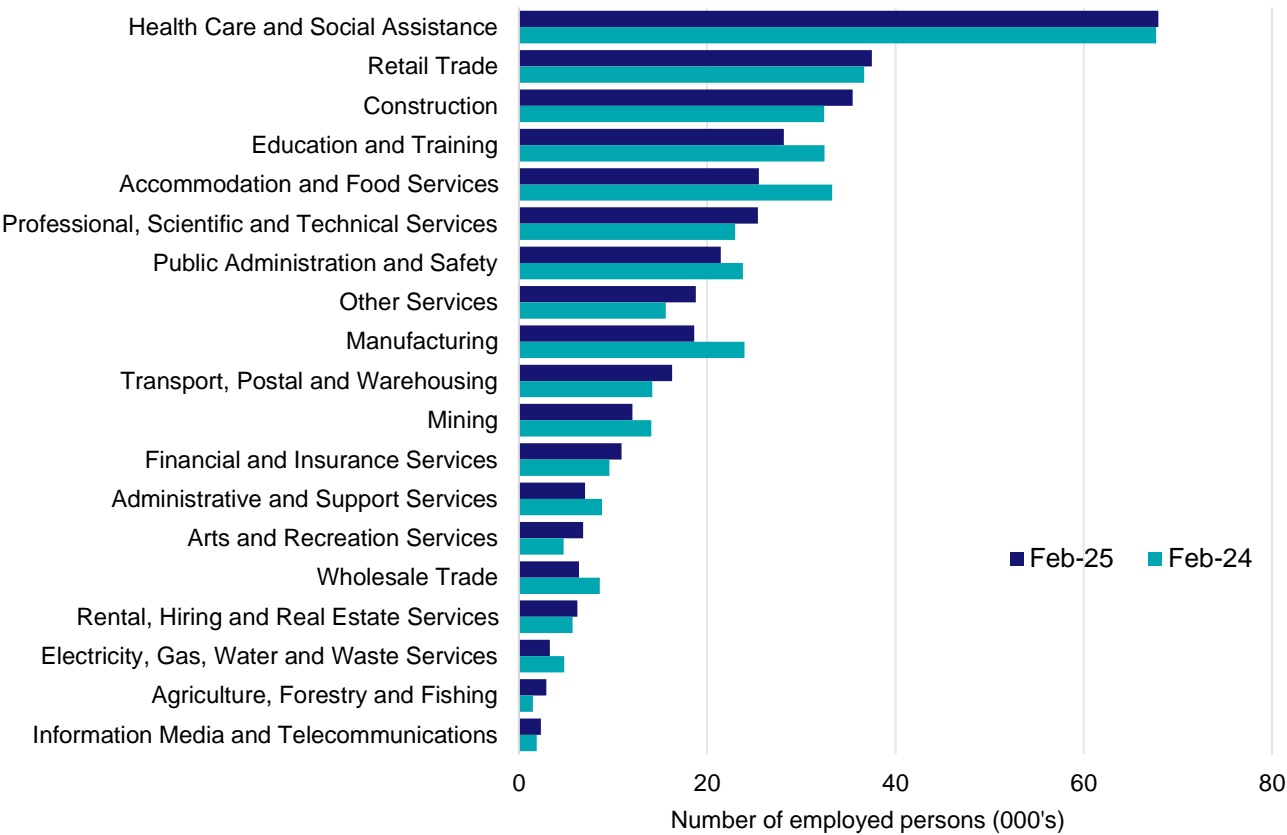

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



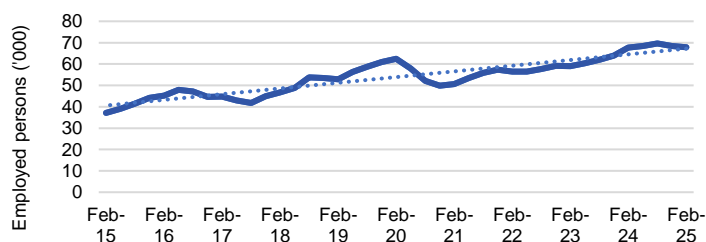

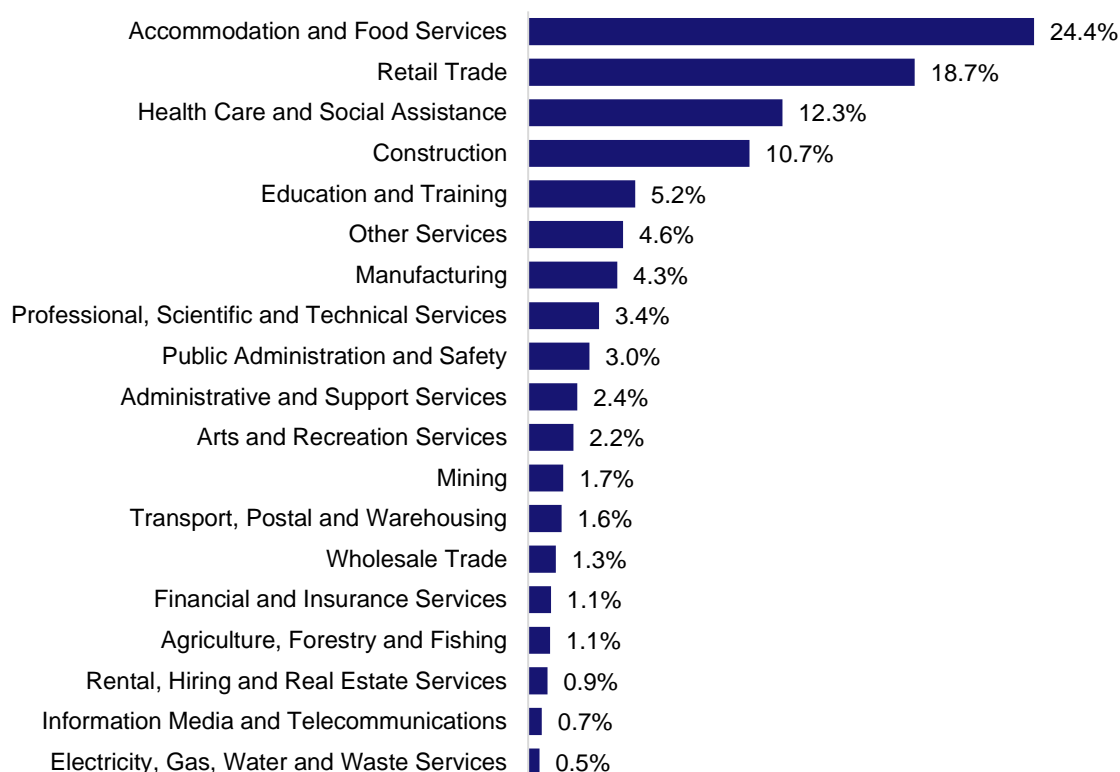

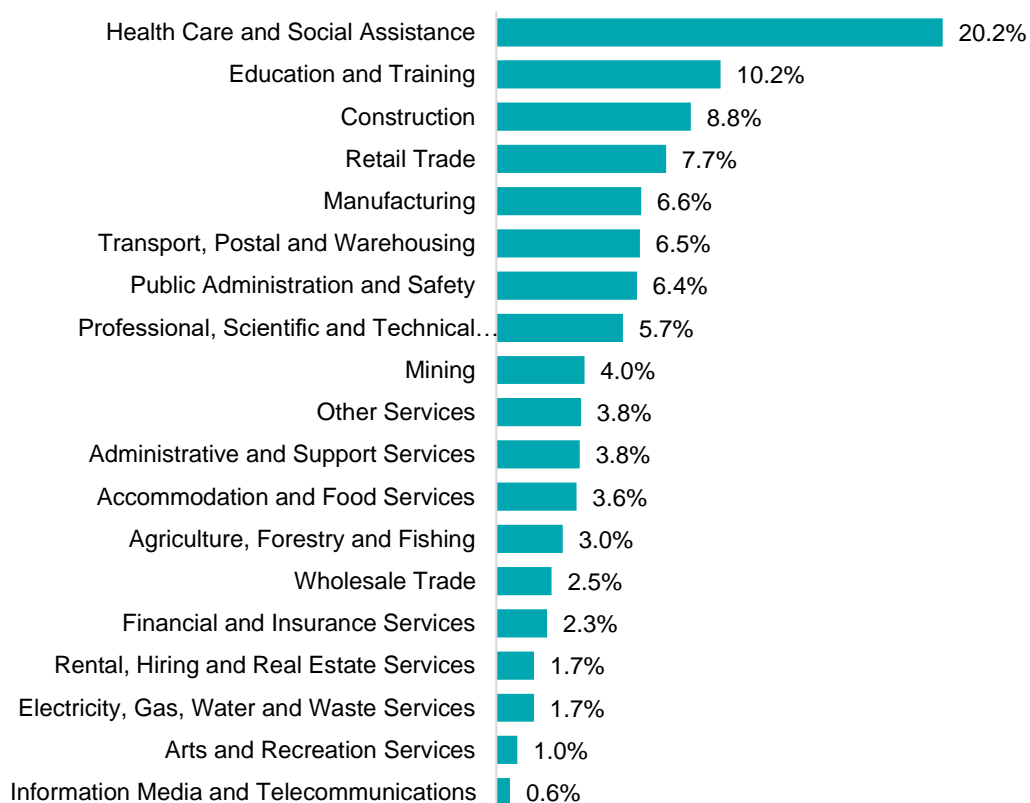

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



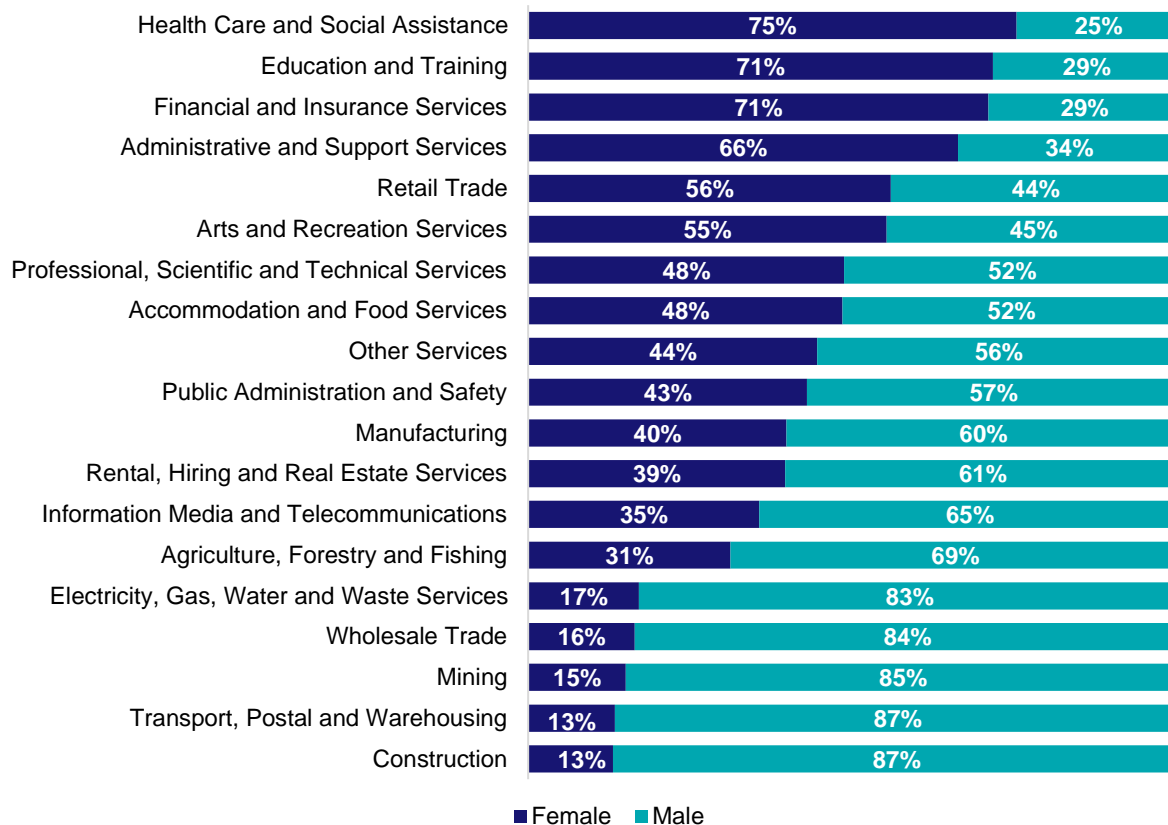

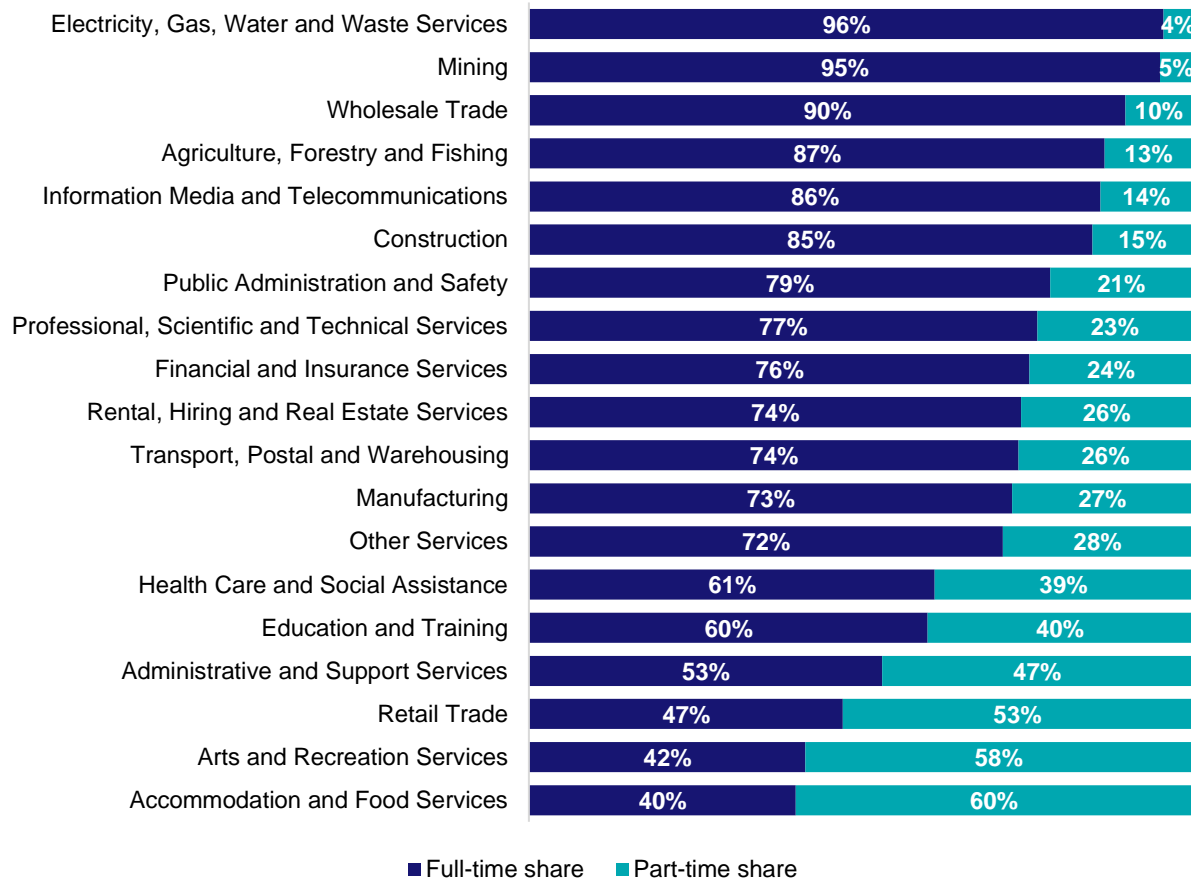

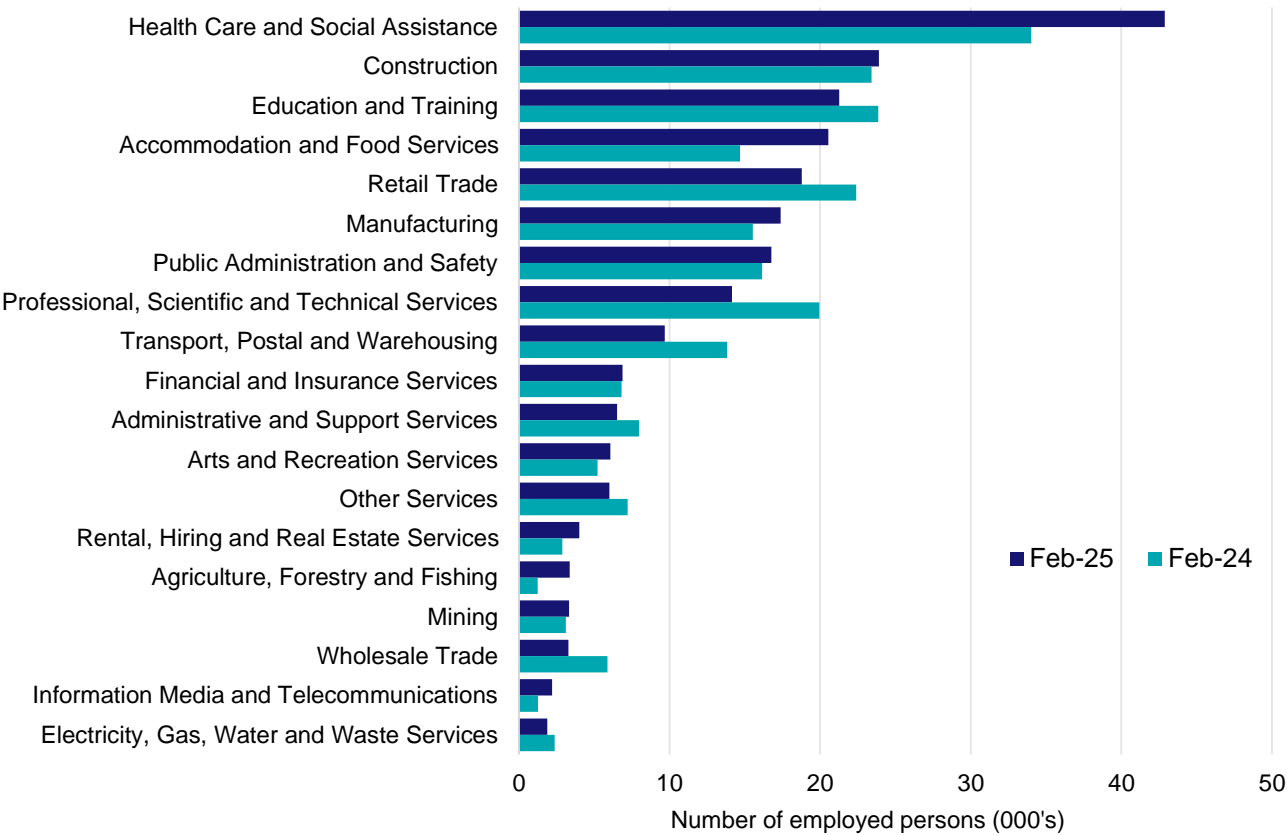

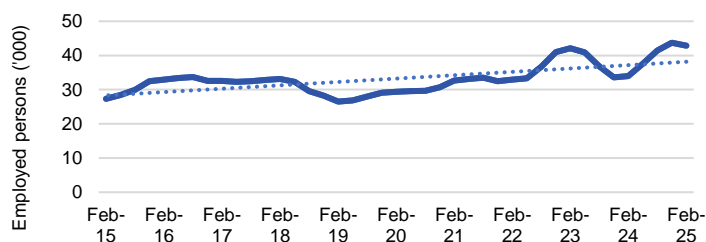

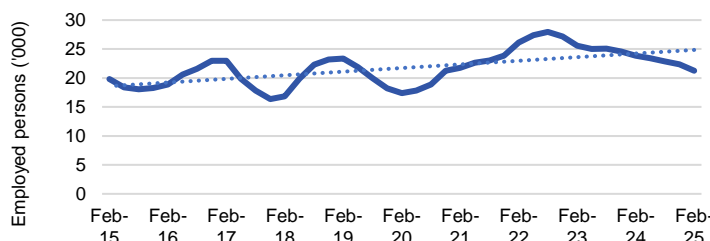

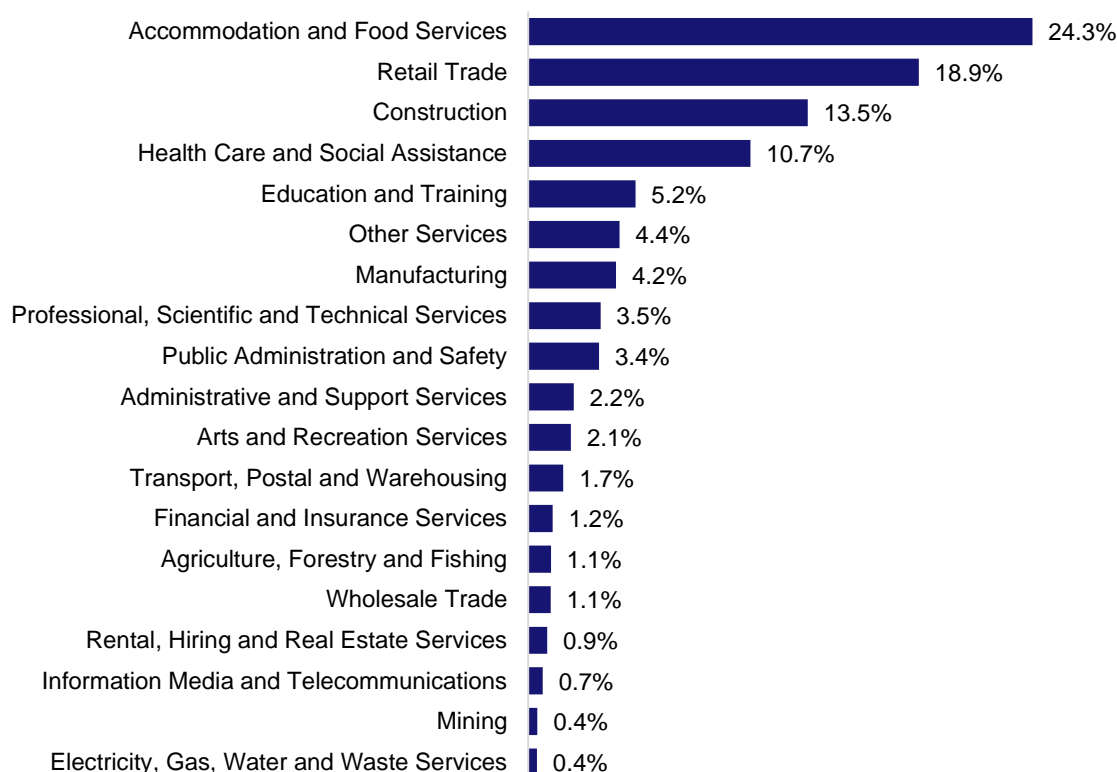

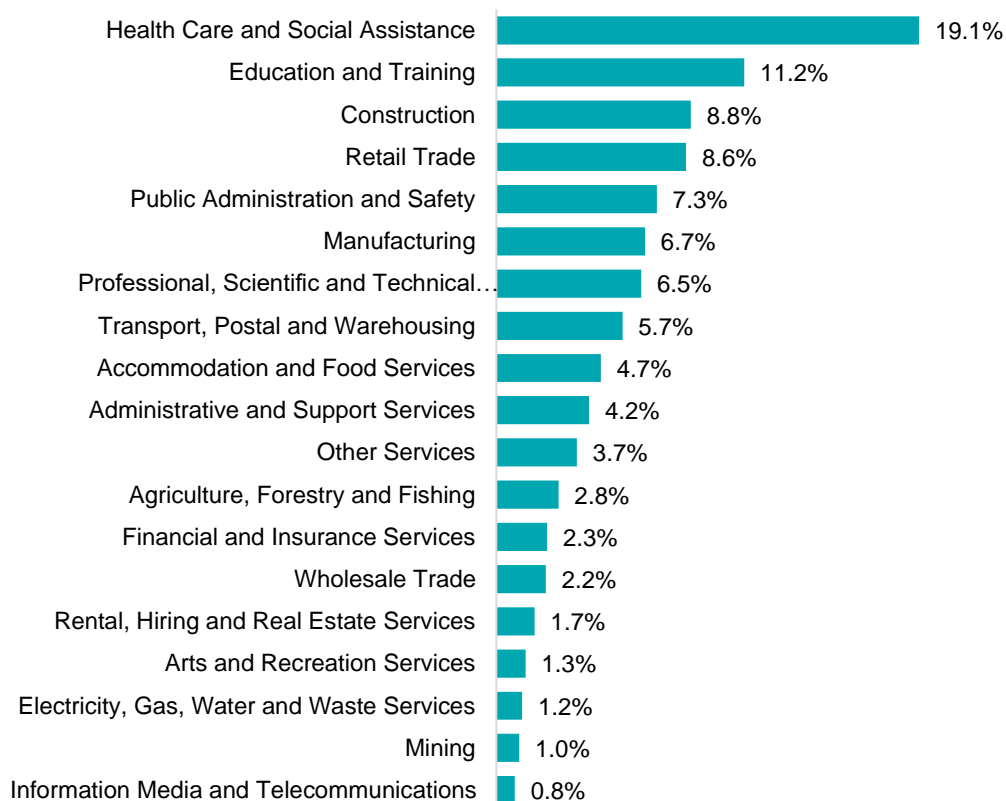

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



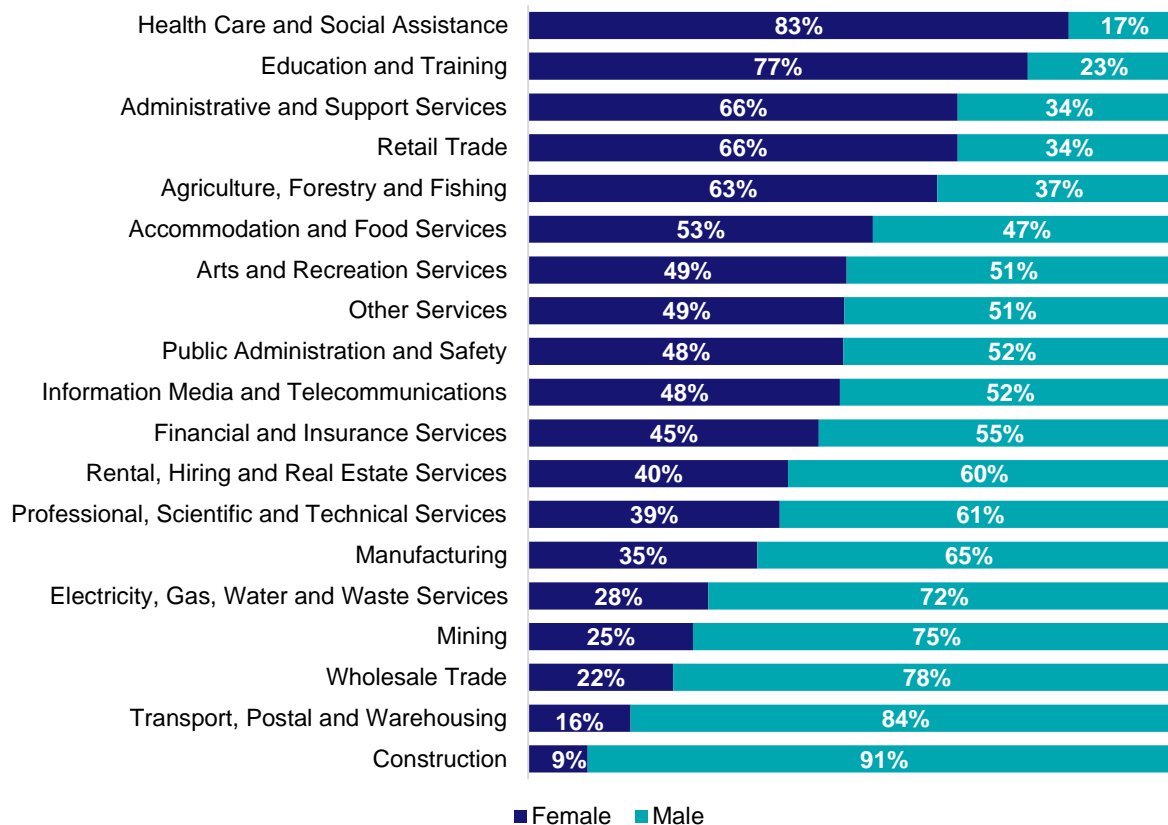

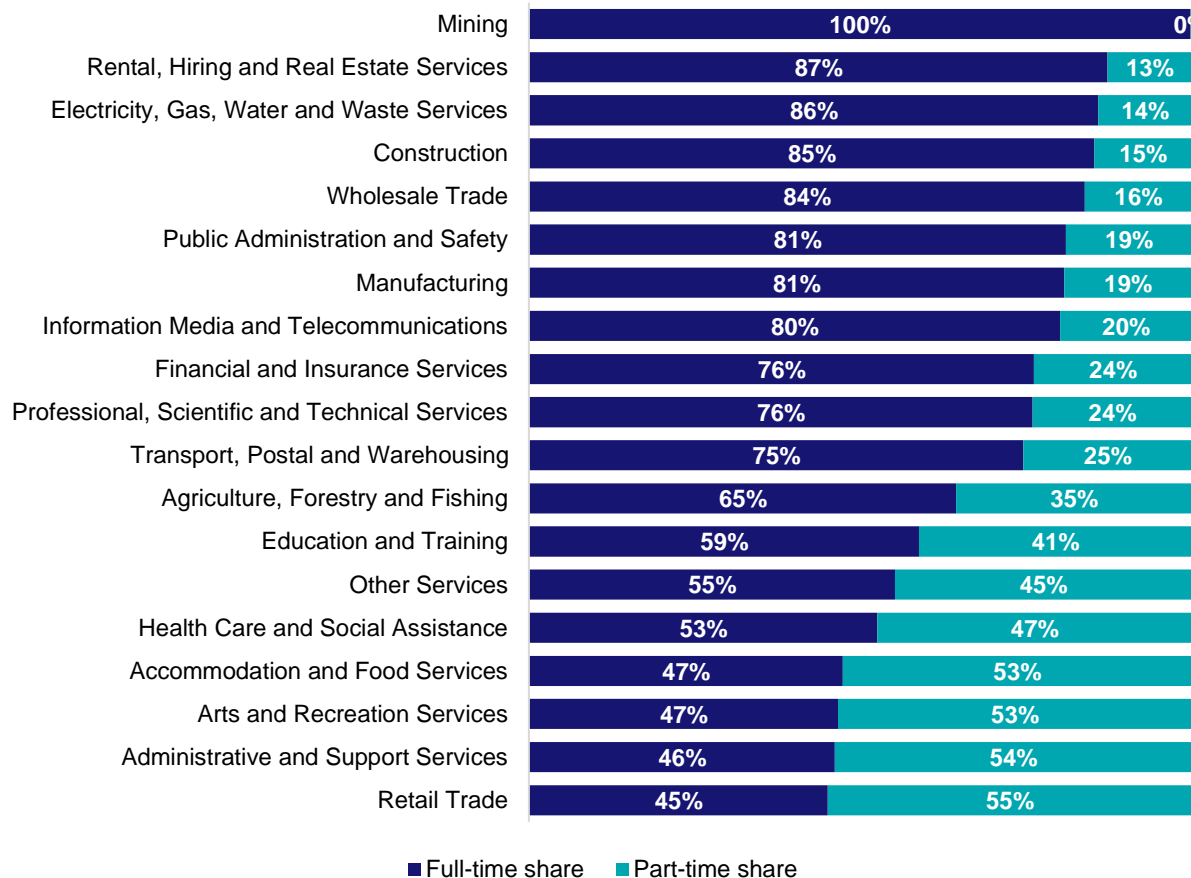

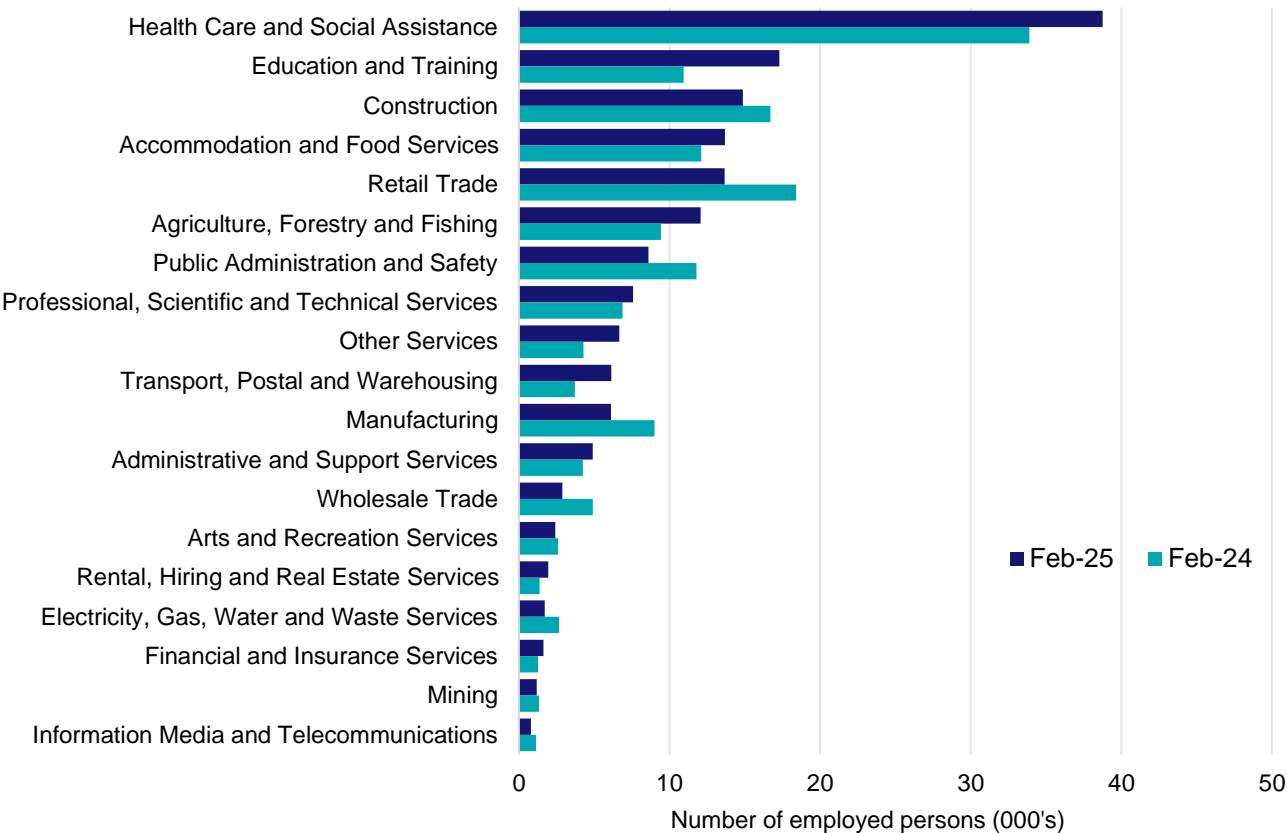

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



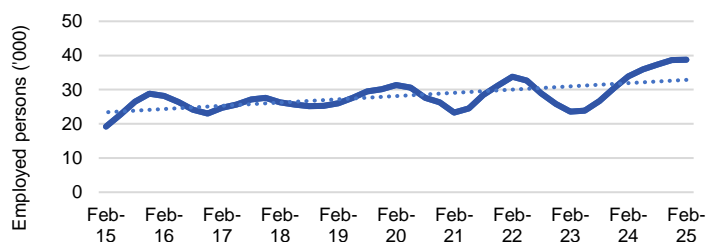

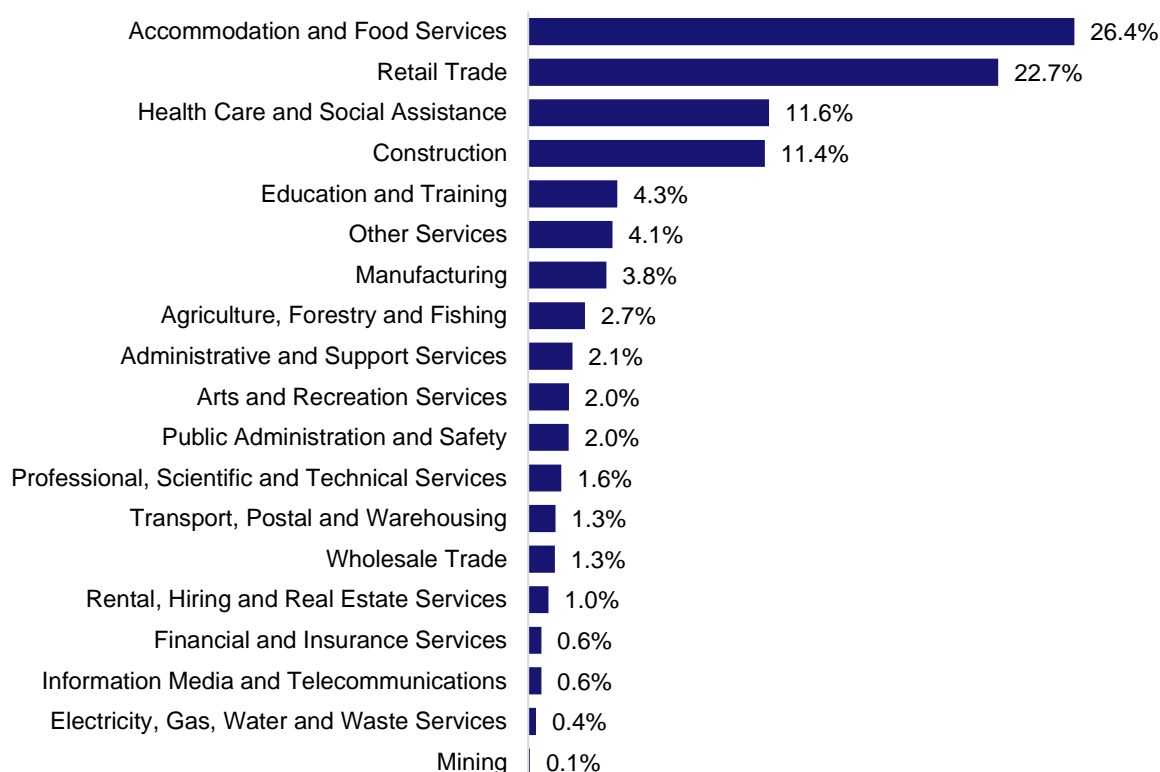

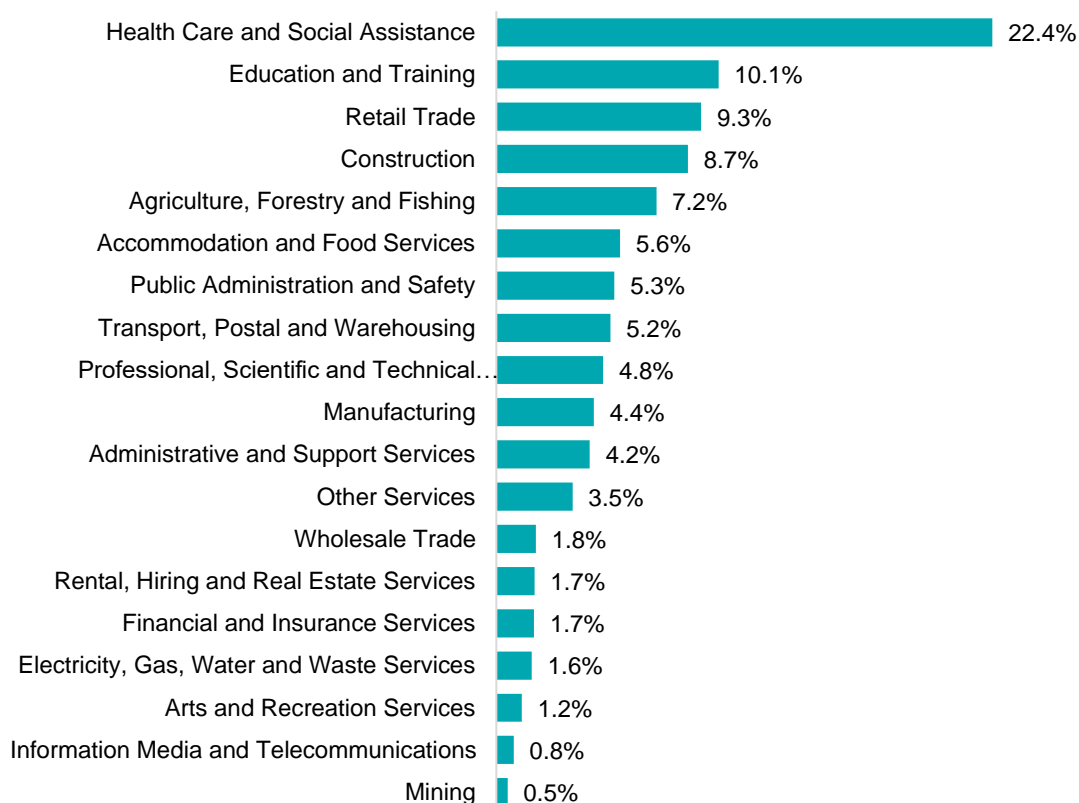

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



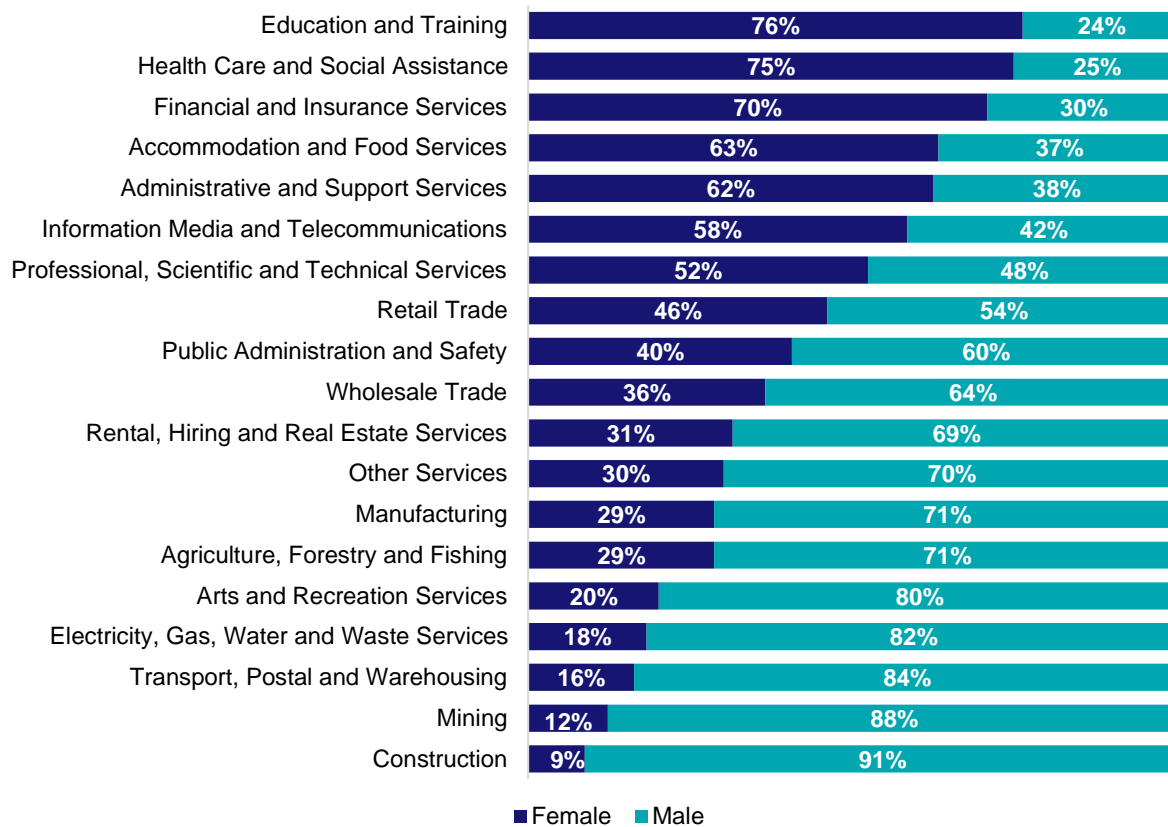

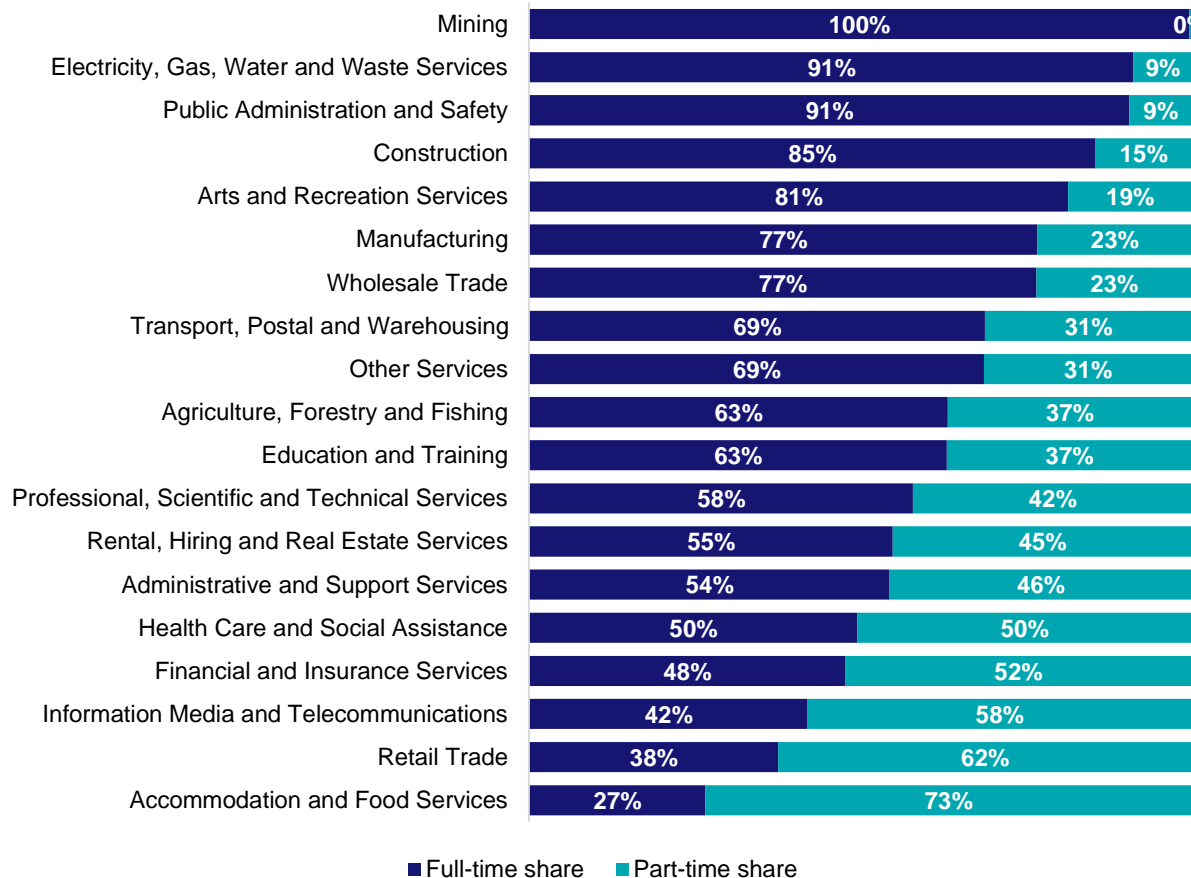

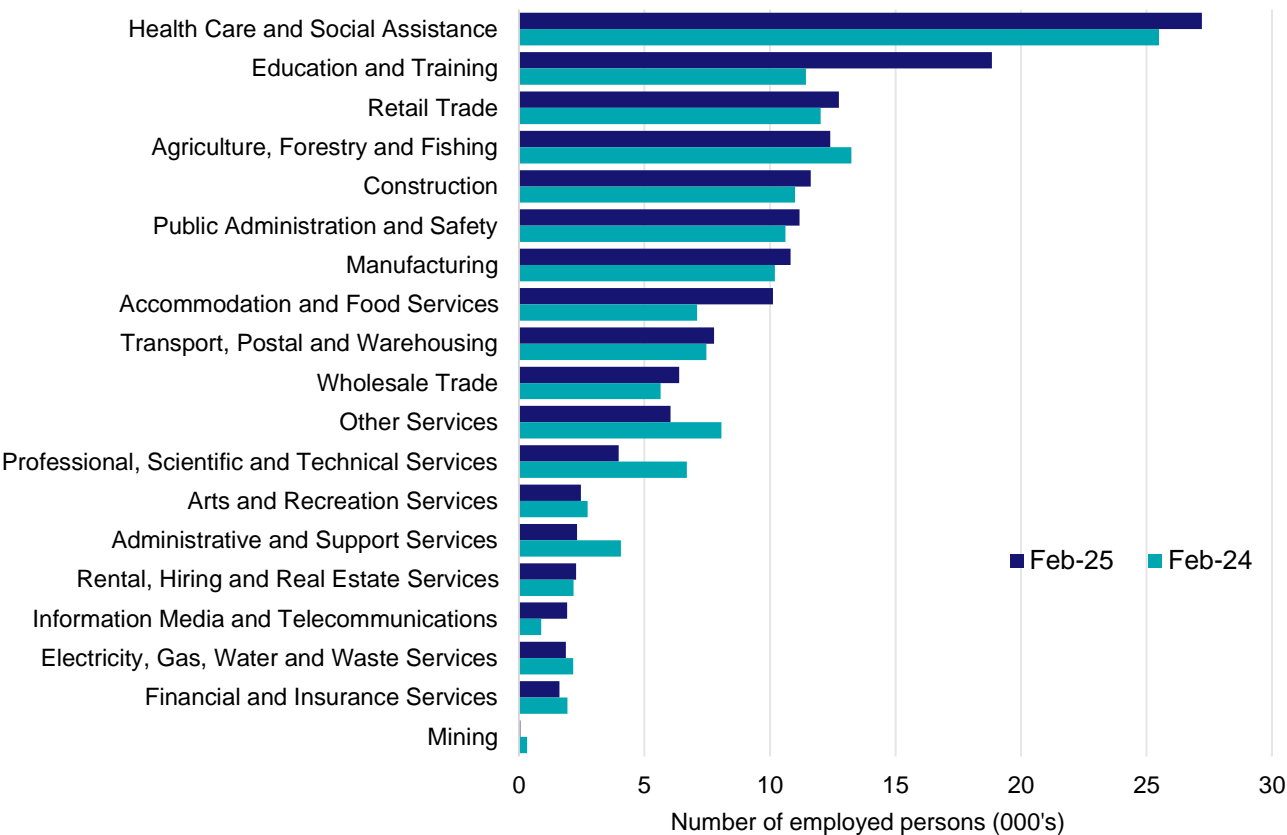

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



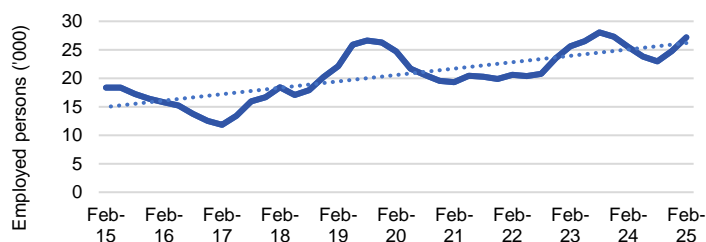

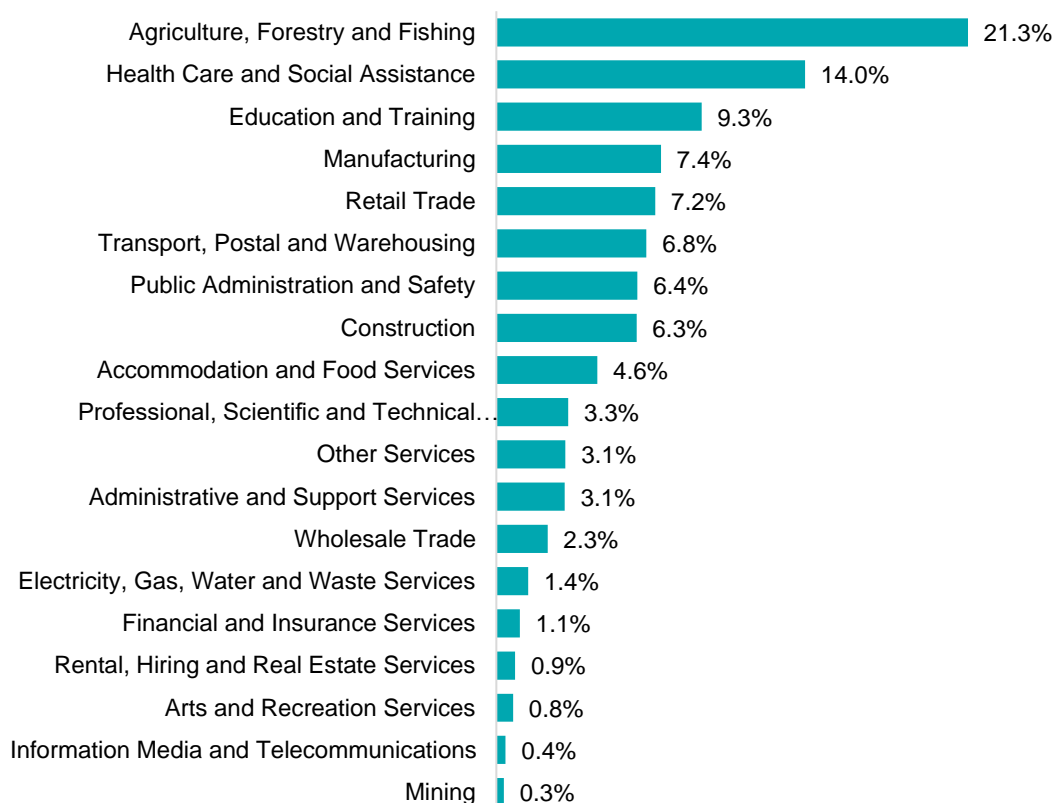

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



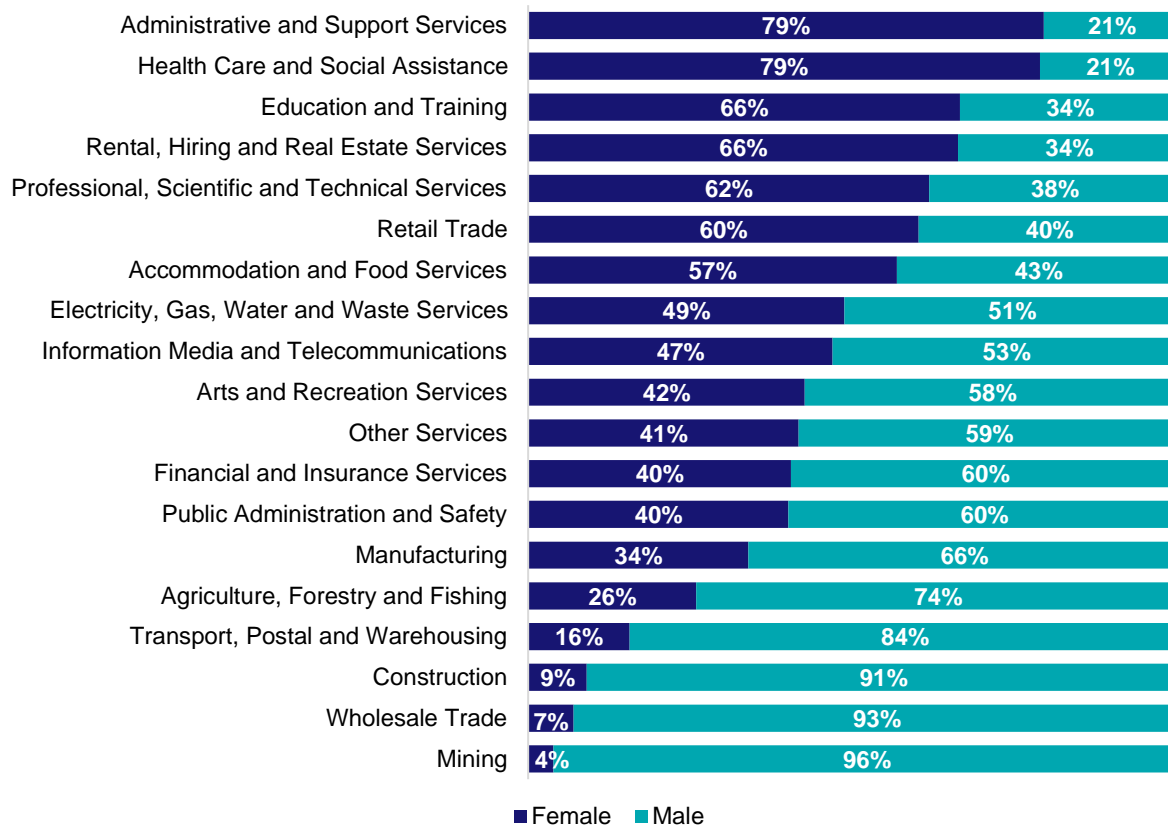

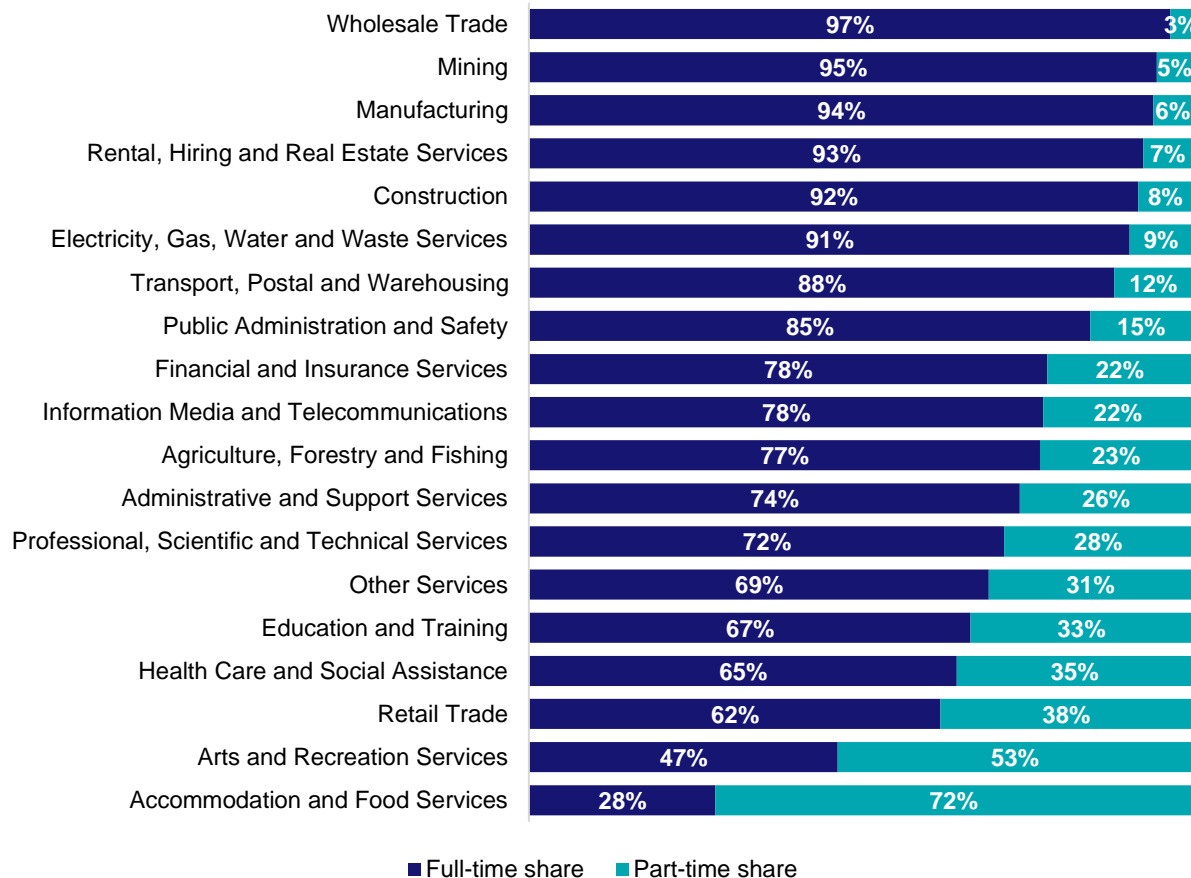

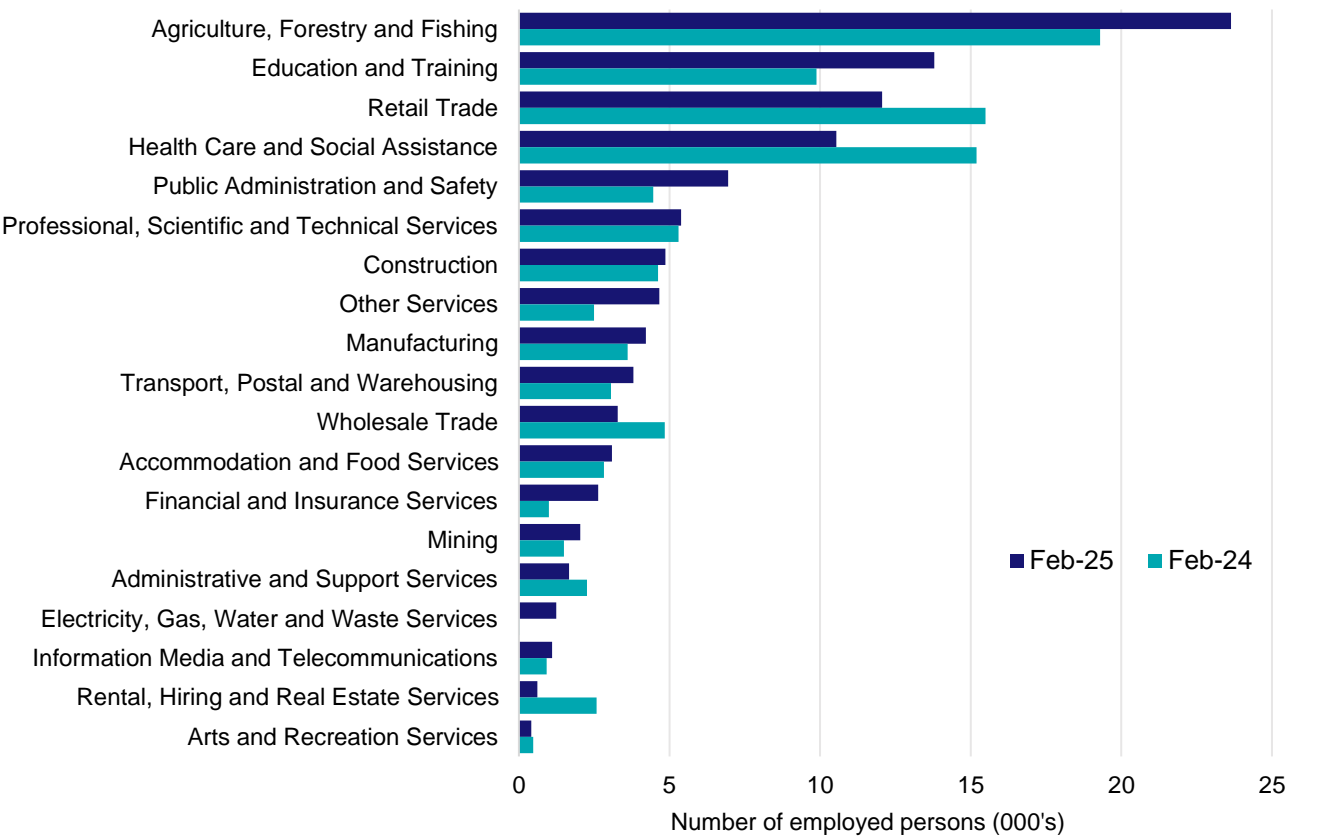

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



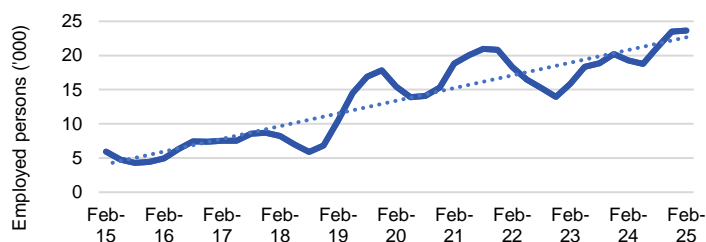

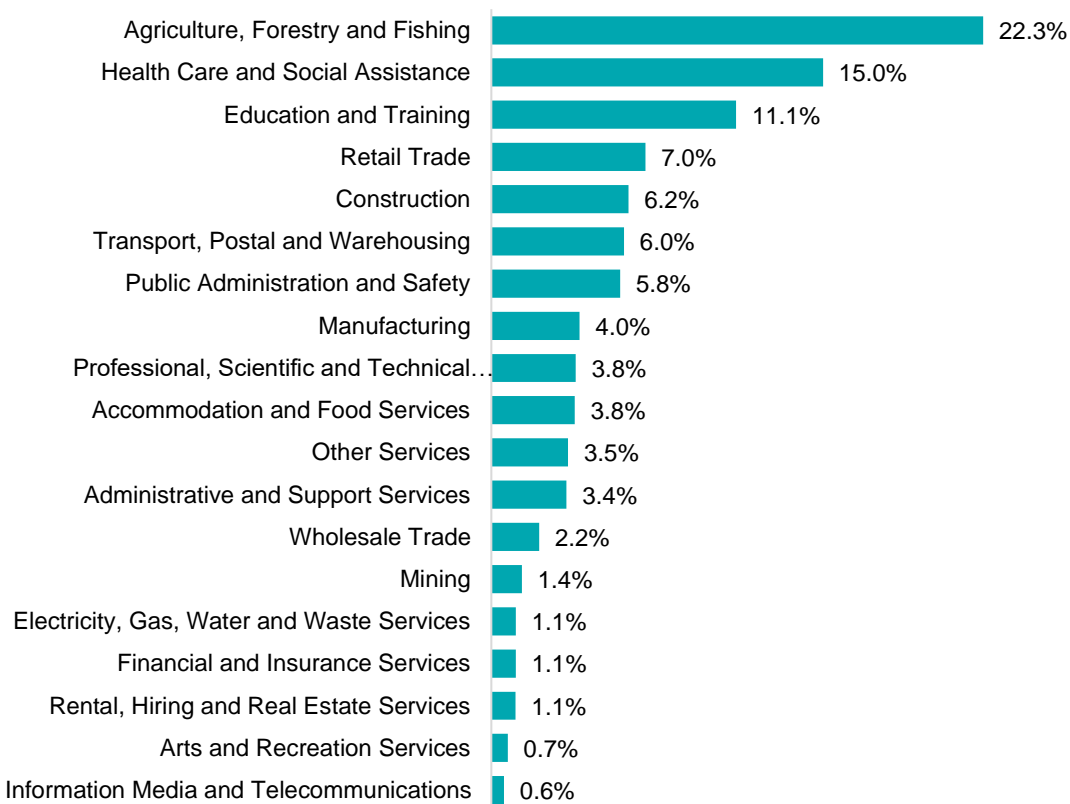

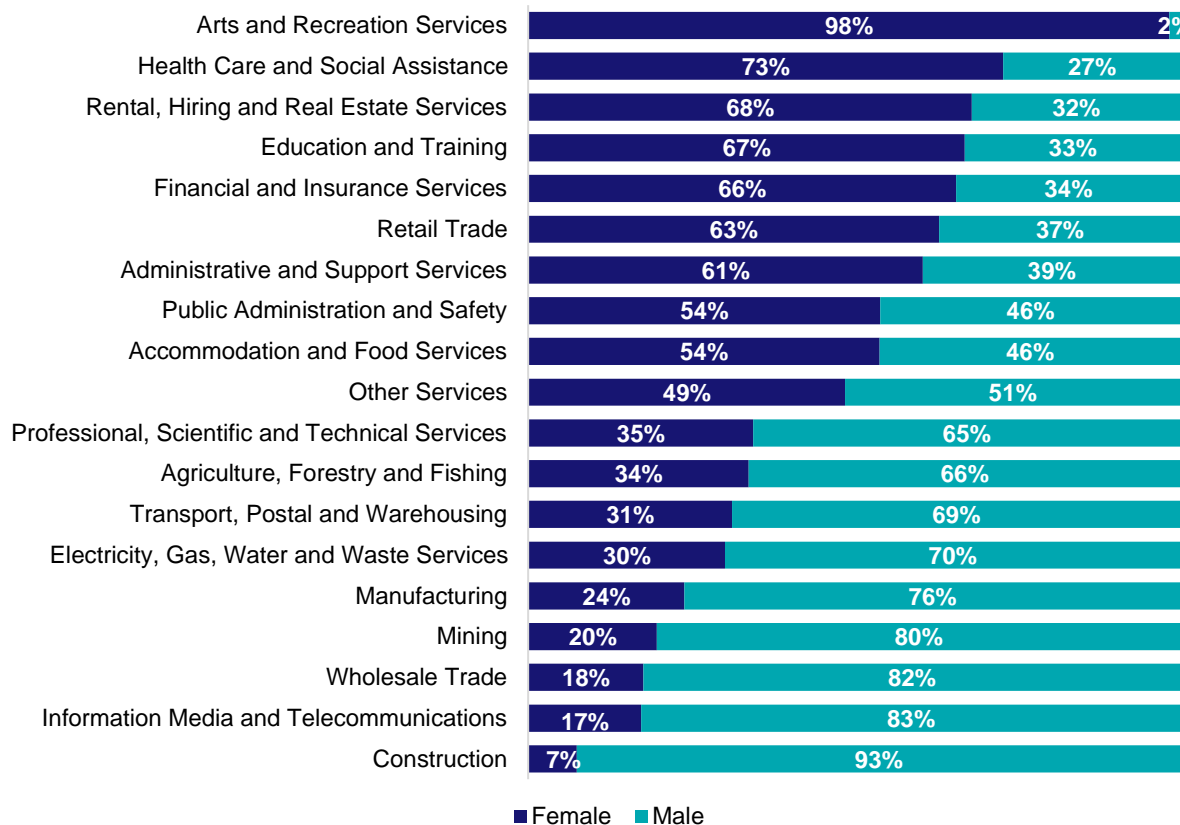

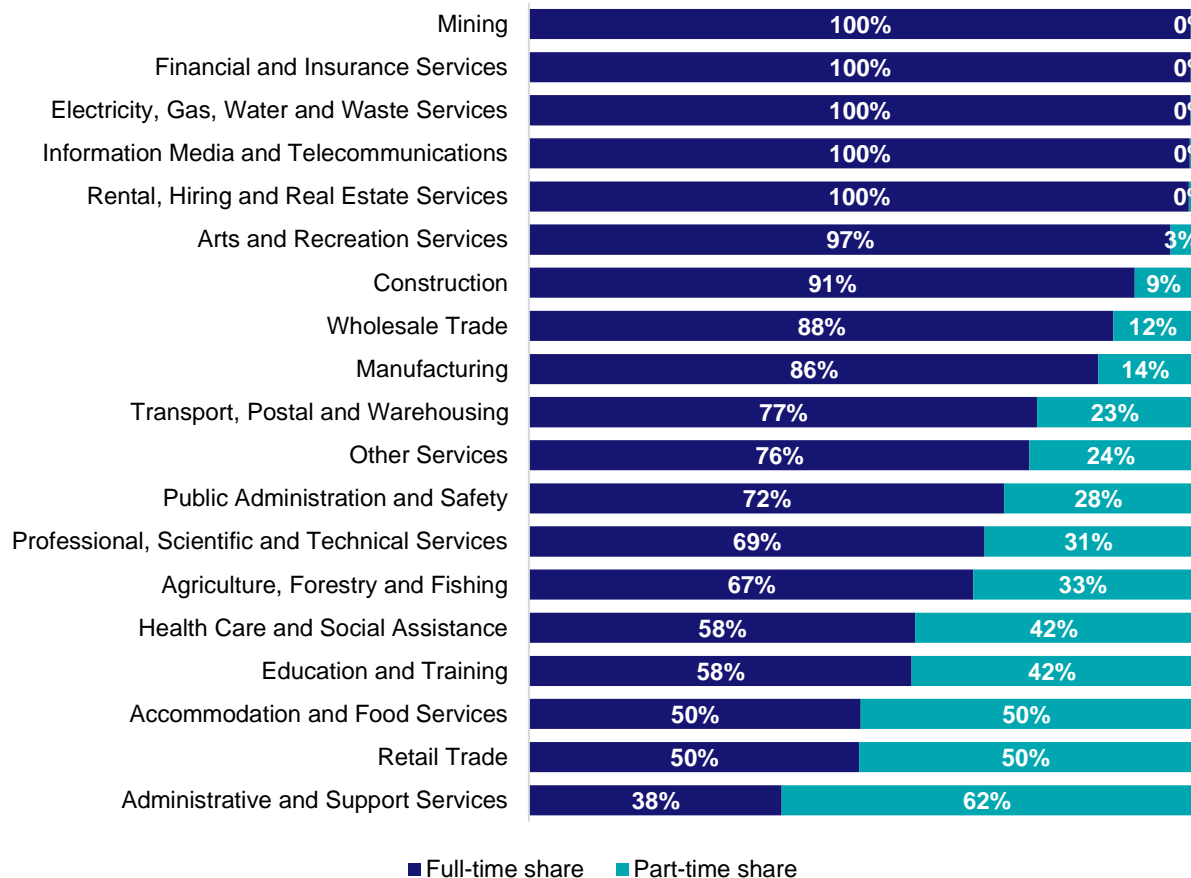

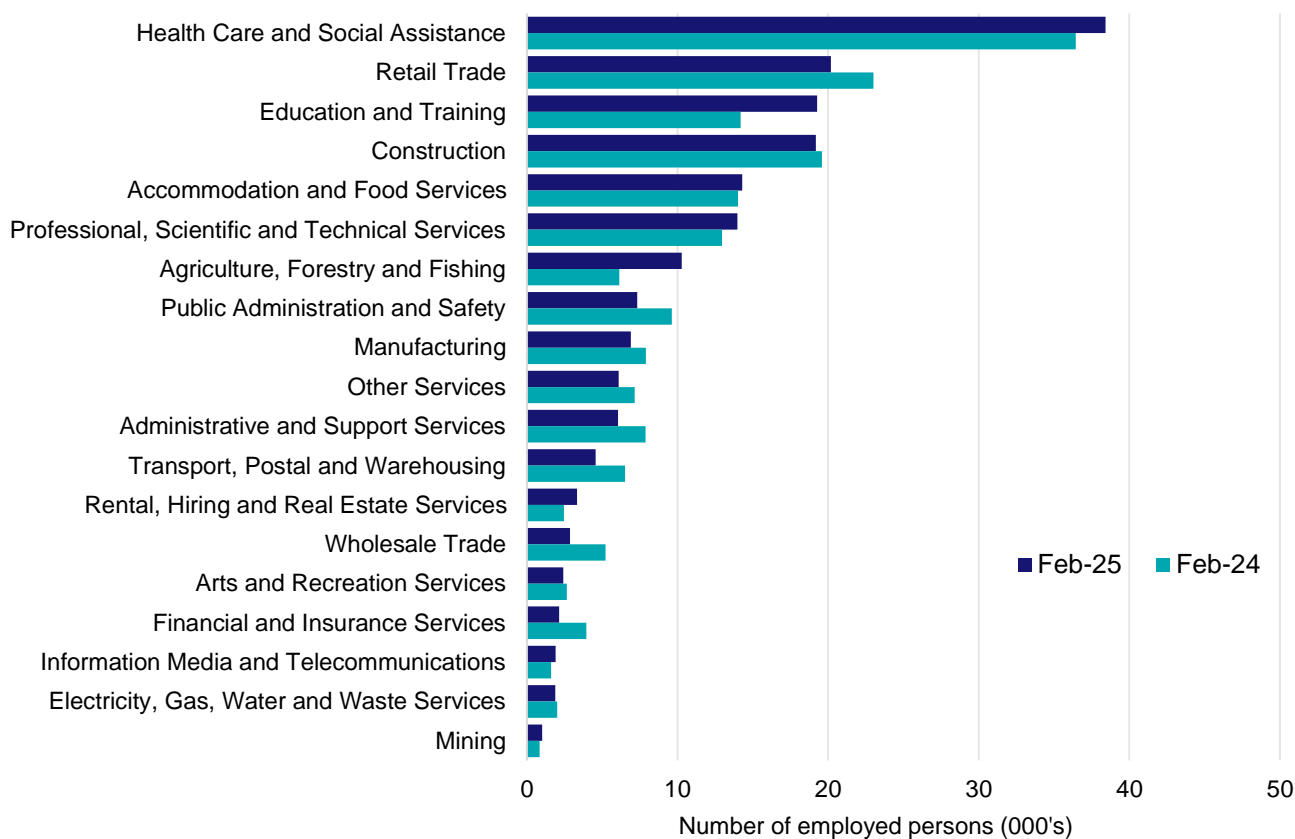

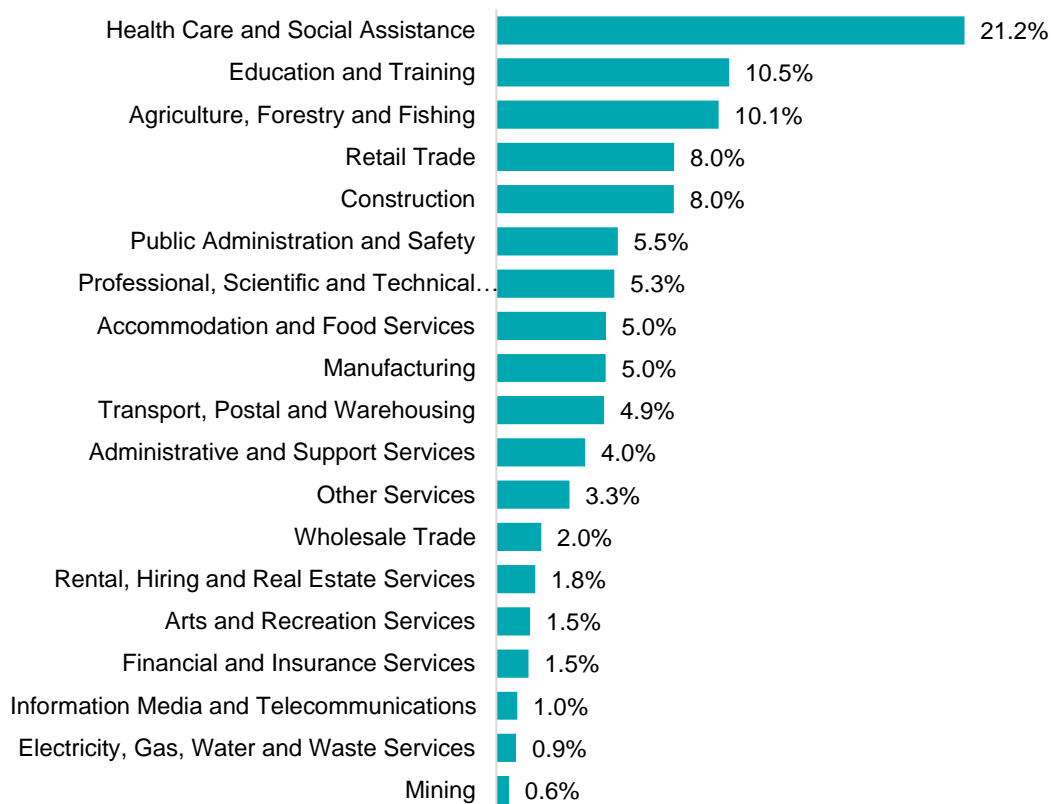

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



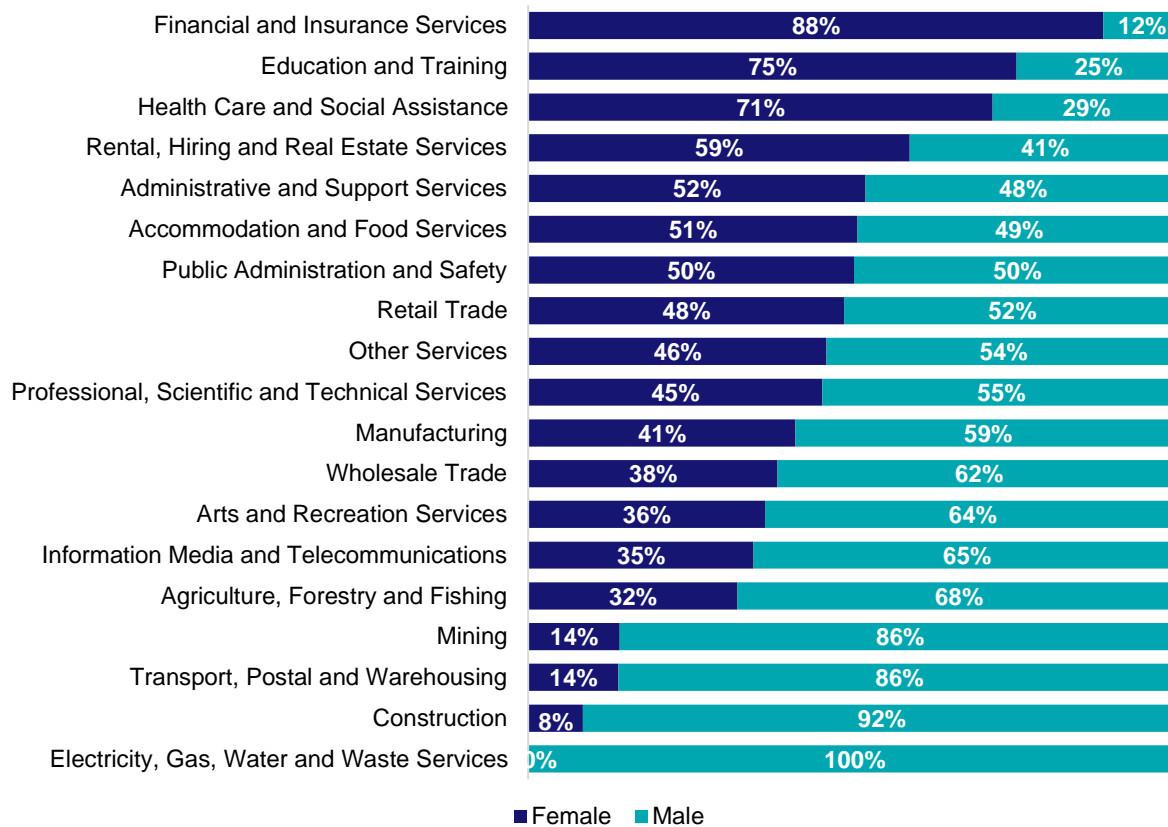

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



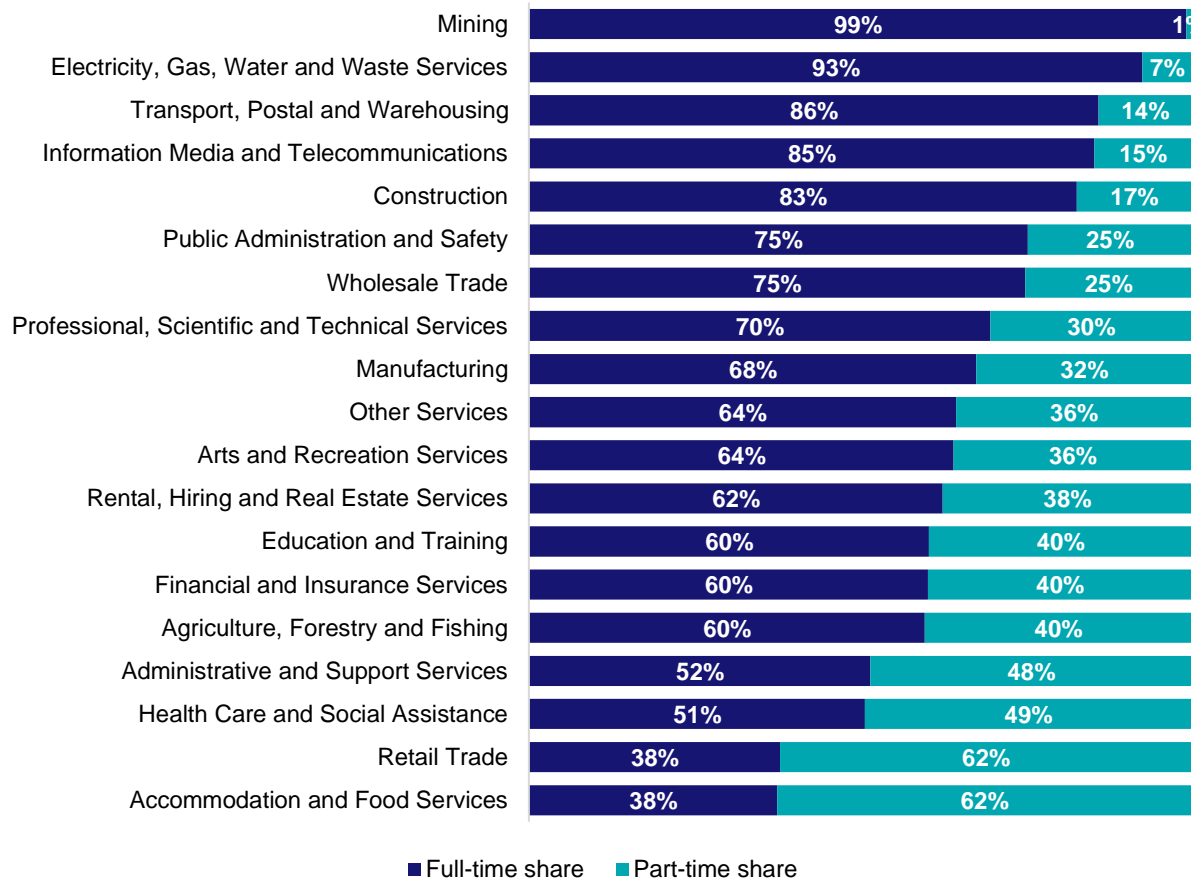

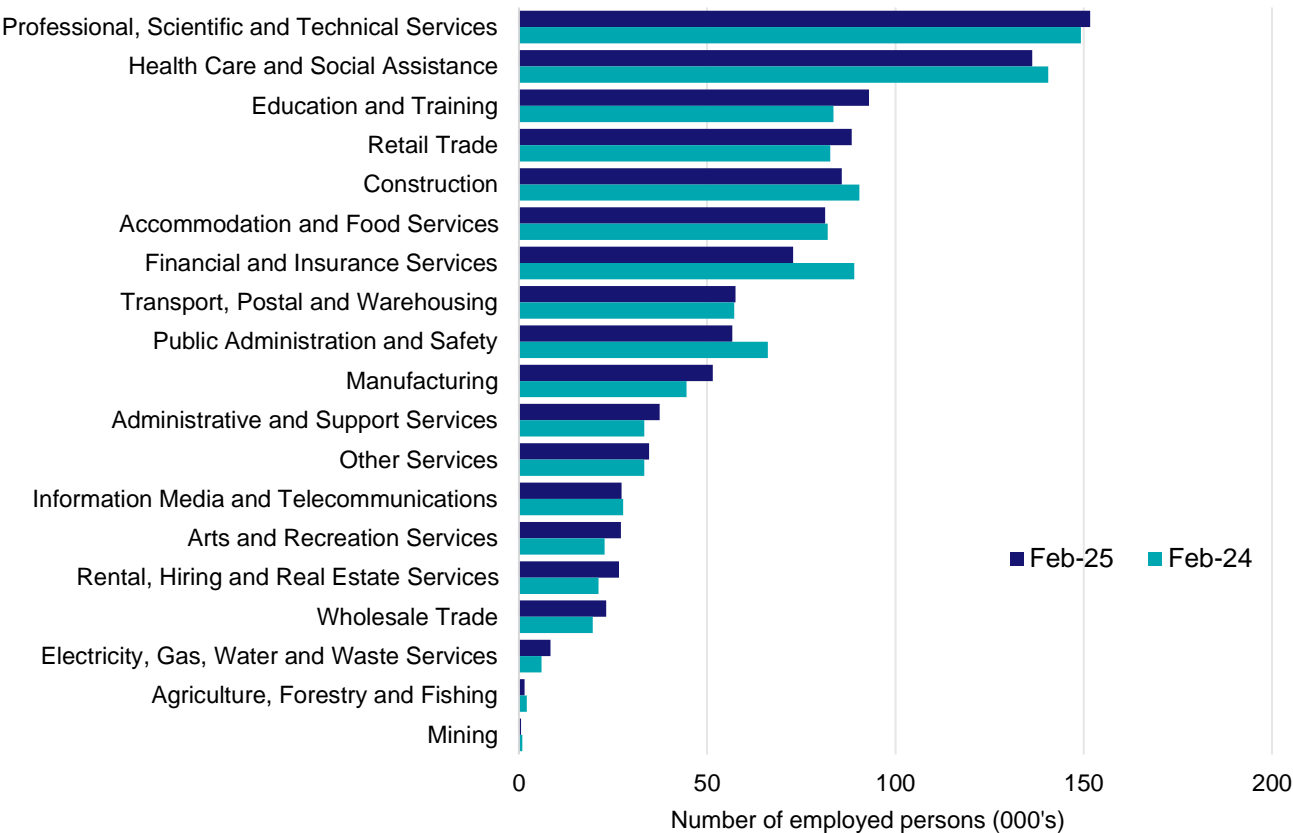

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



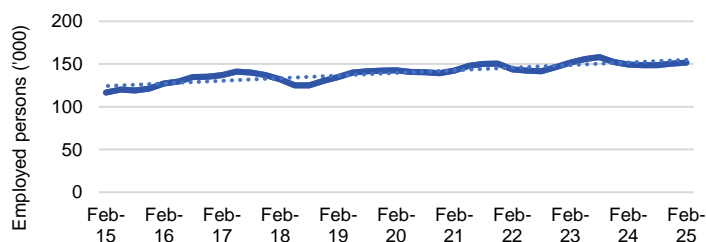

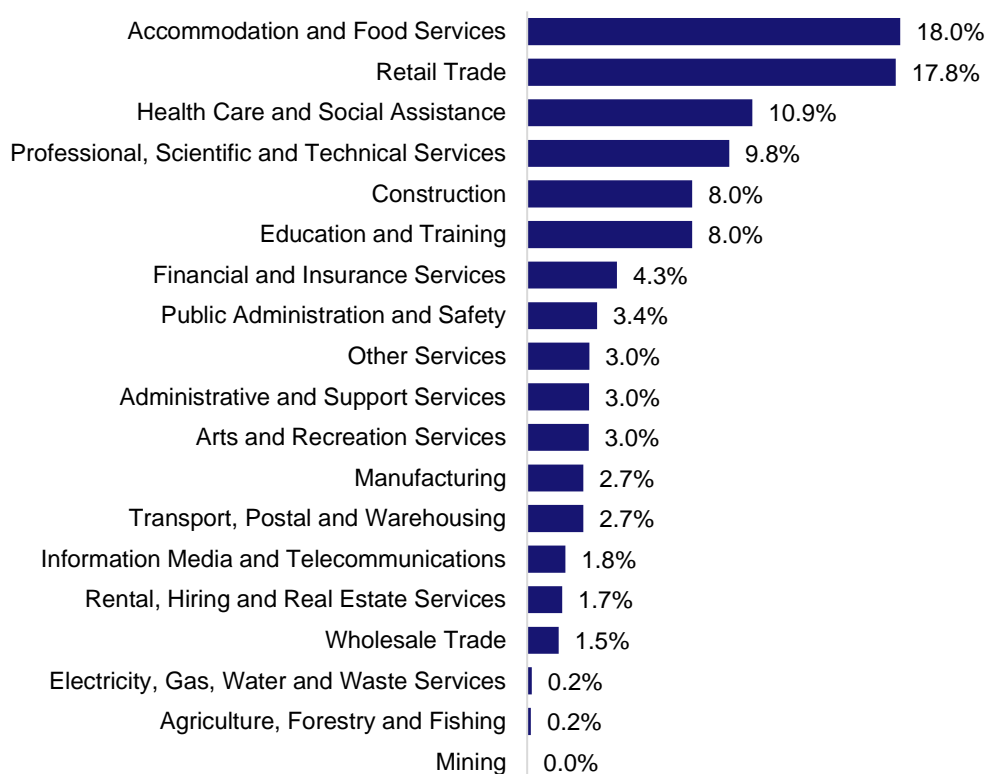

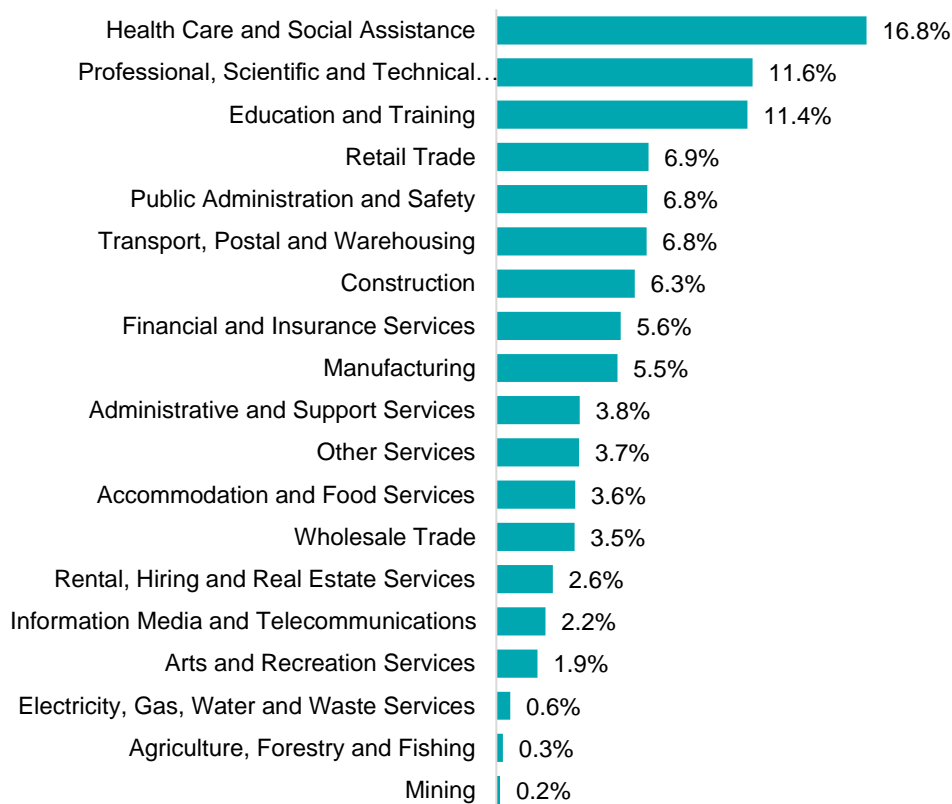

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



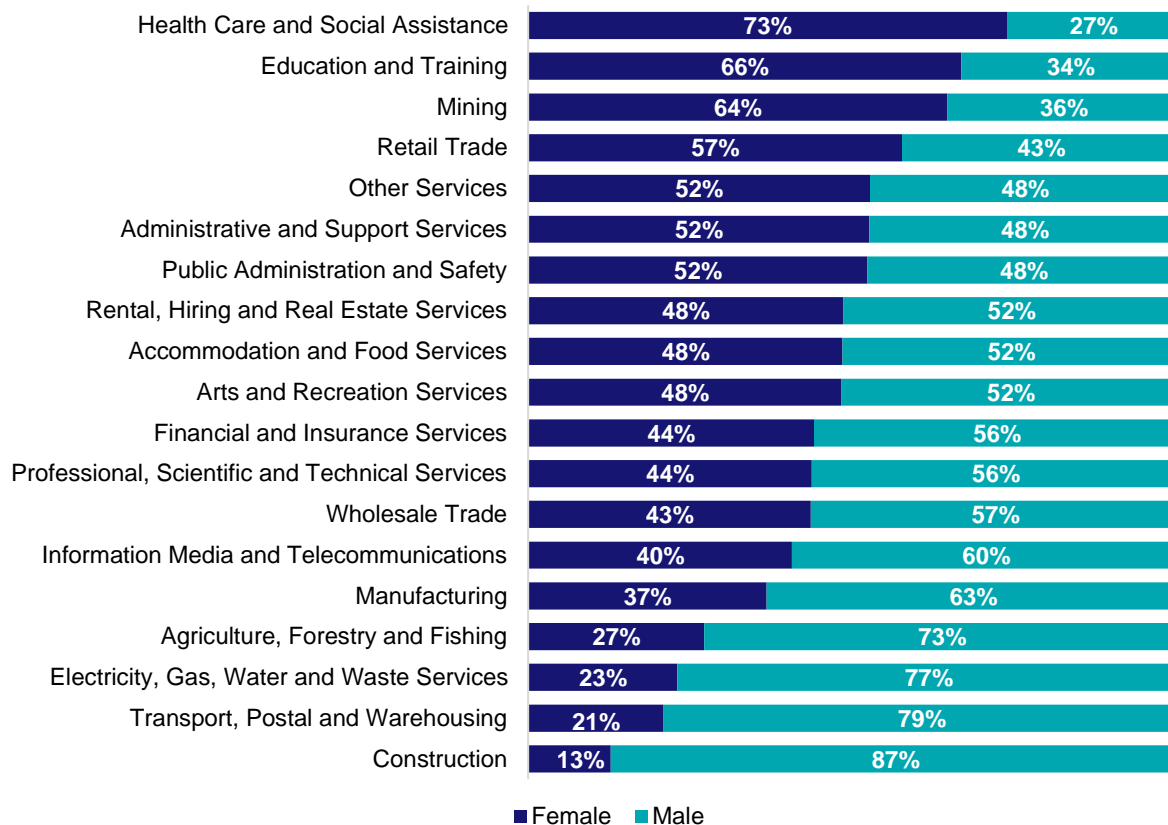

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



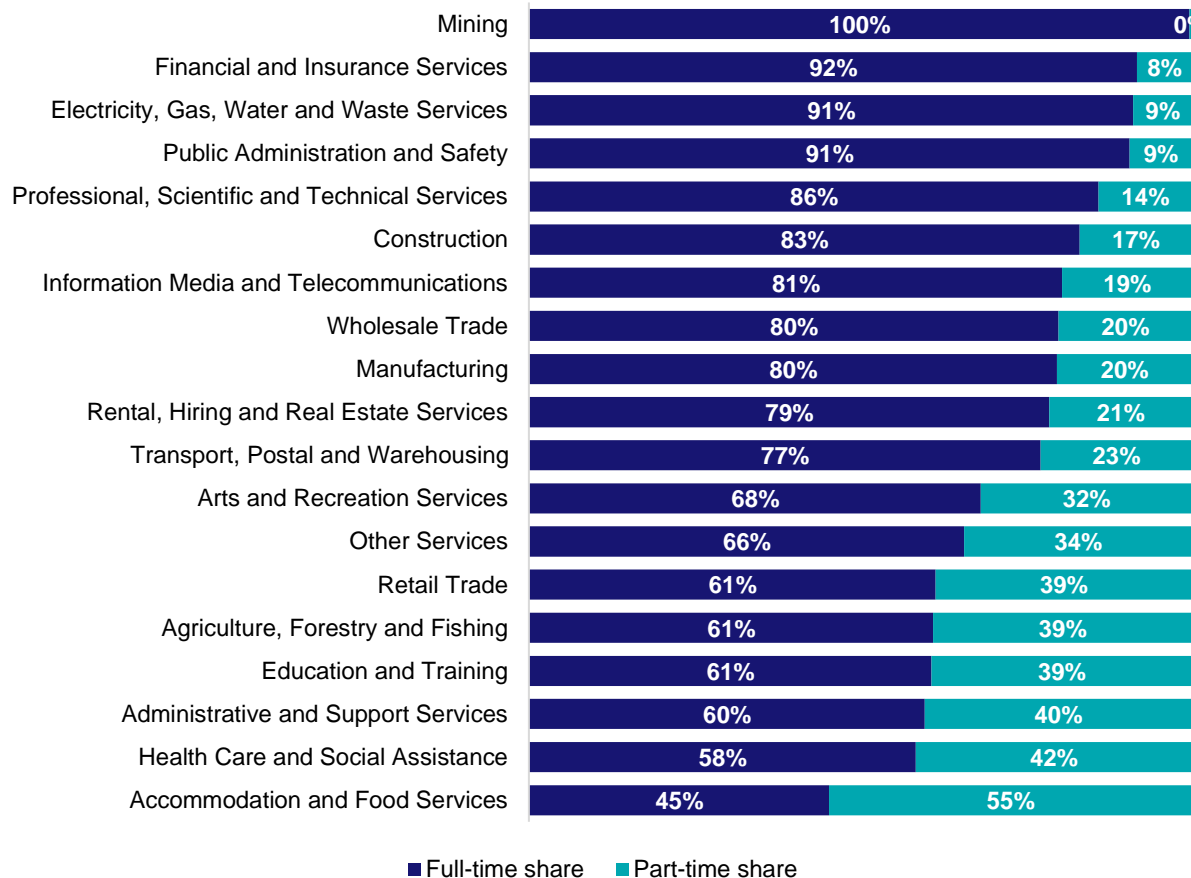

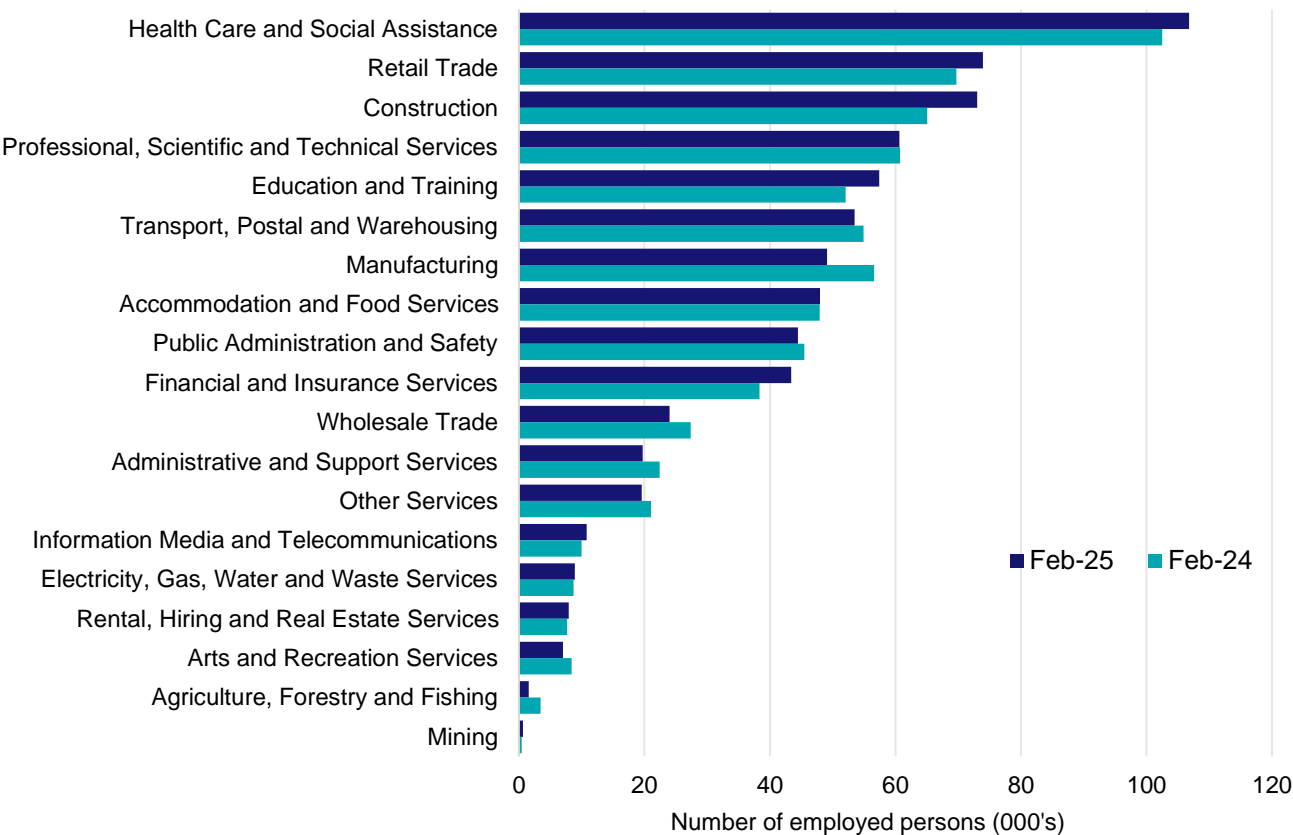

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024

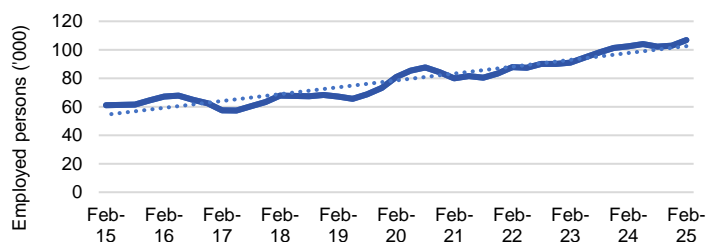

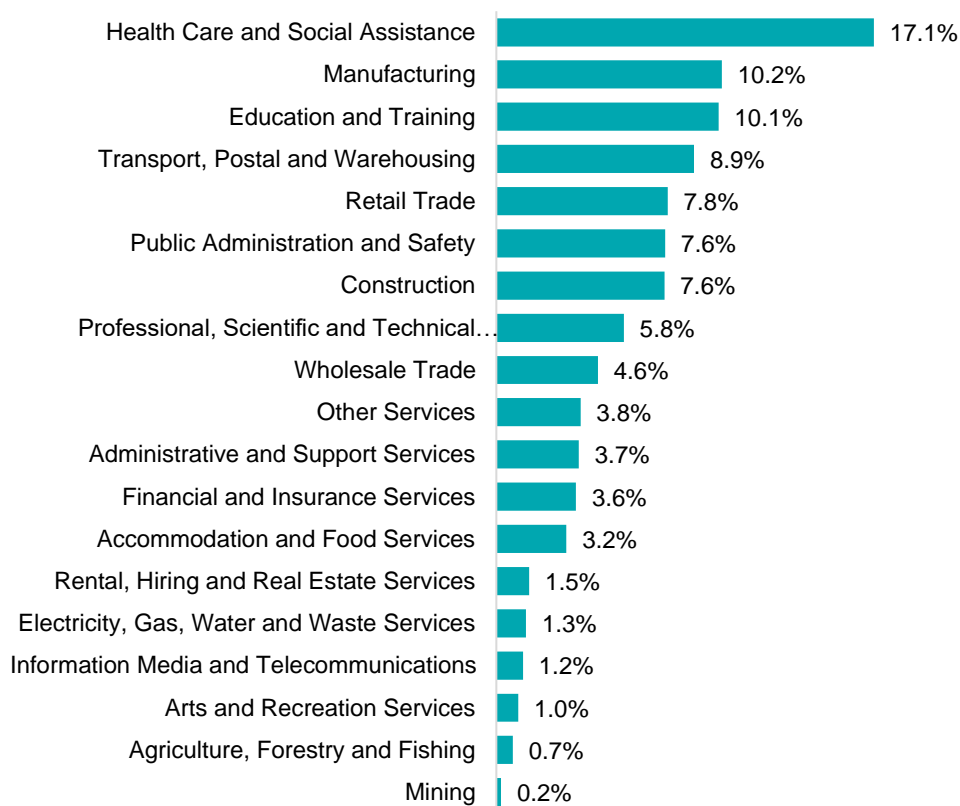

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



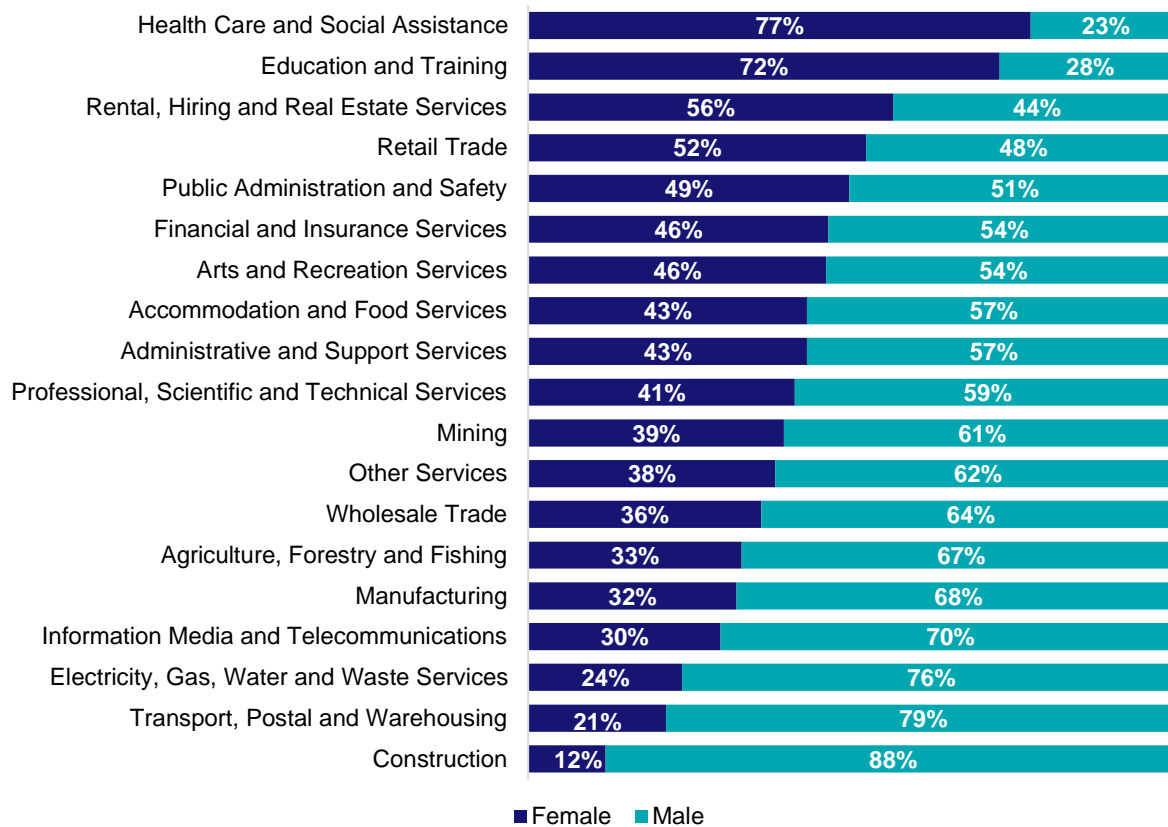

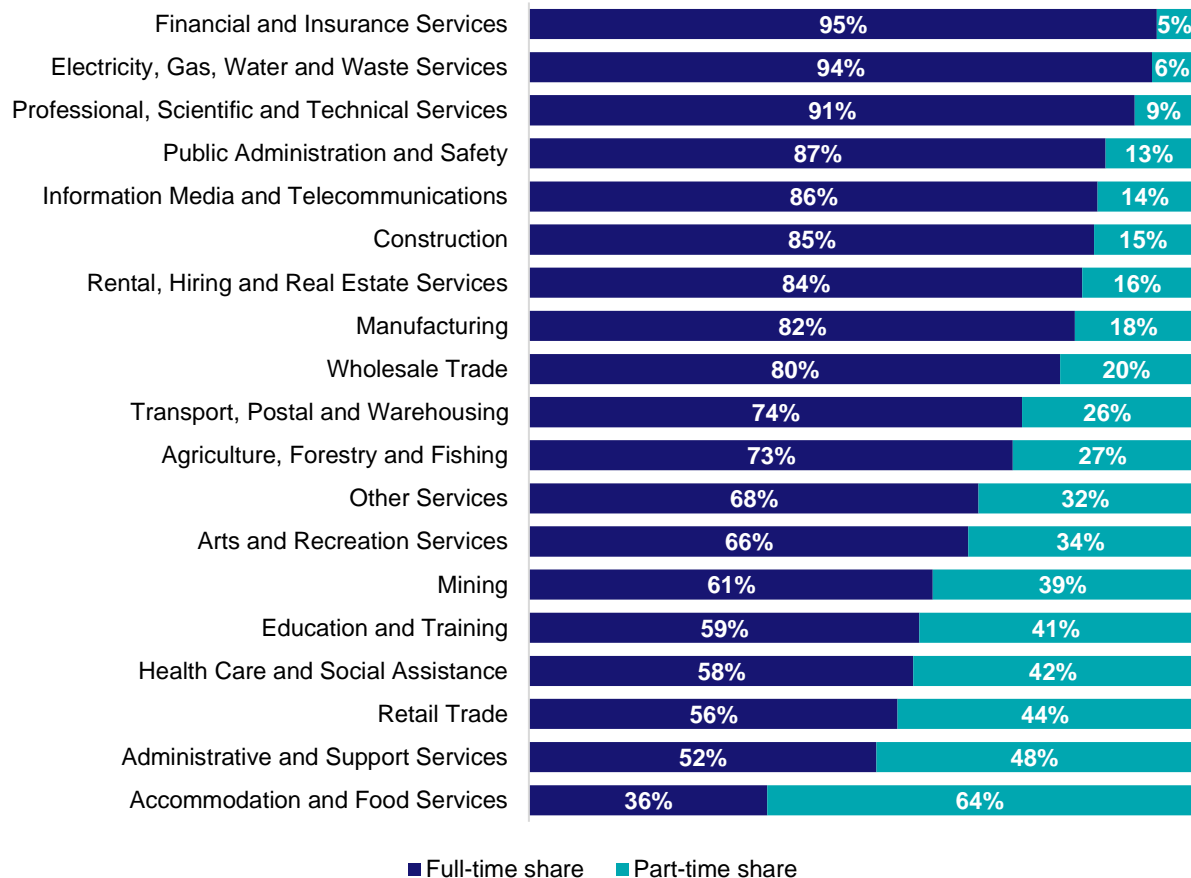

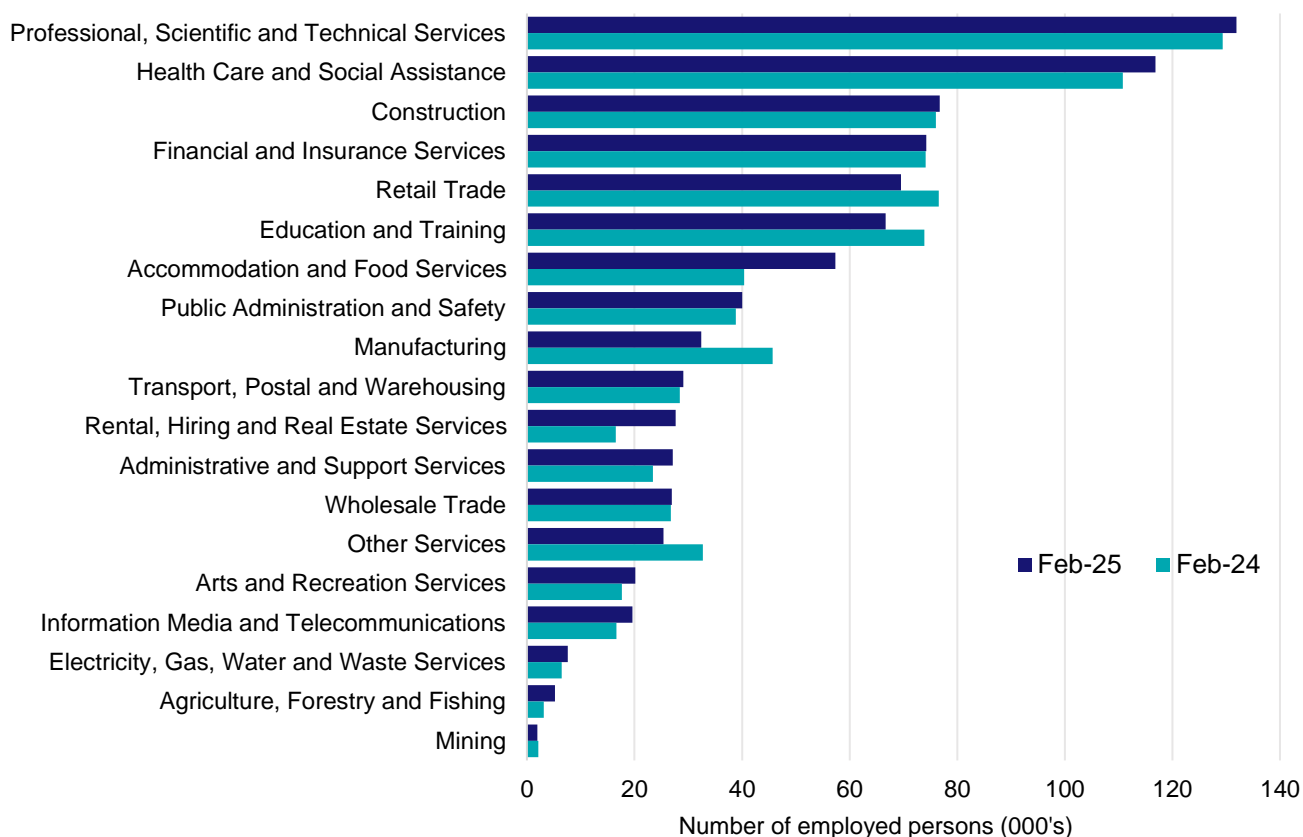

Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024



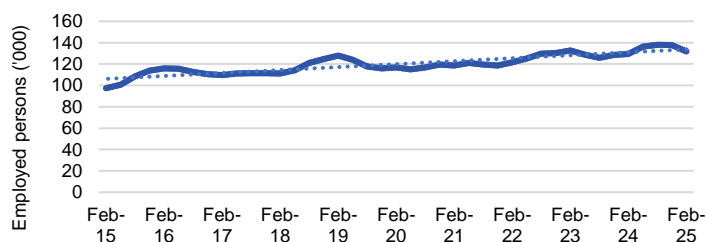

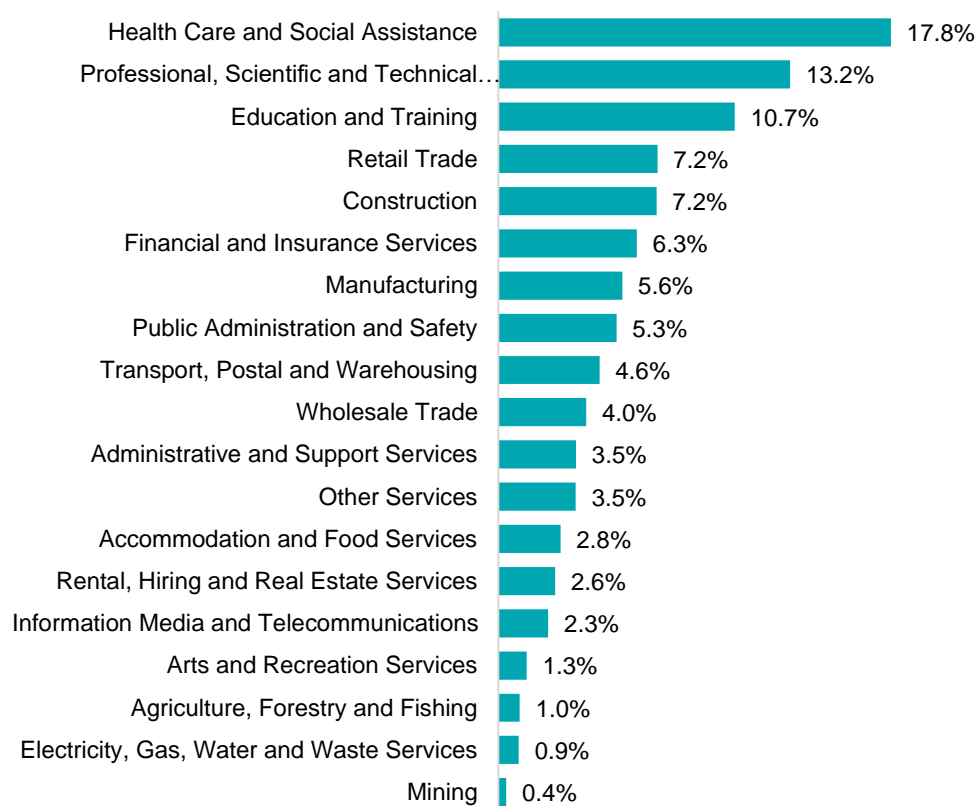

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



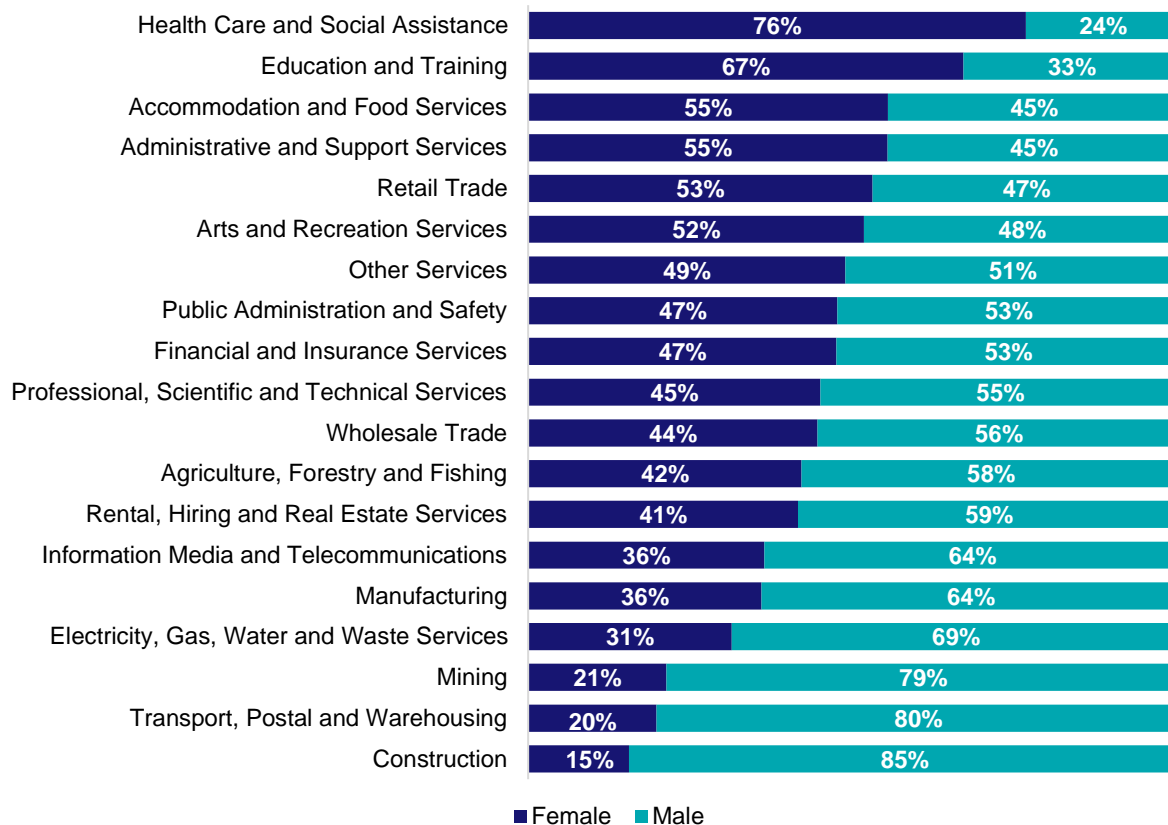

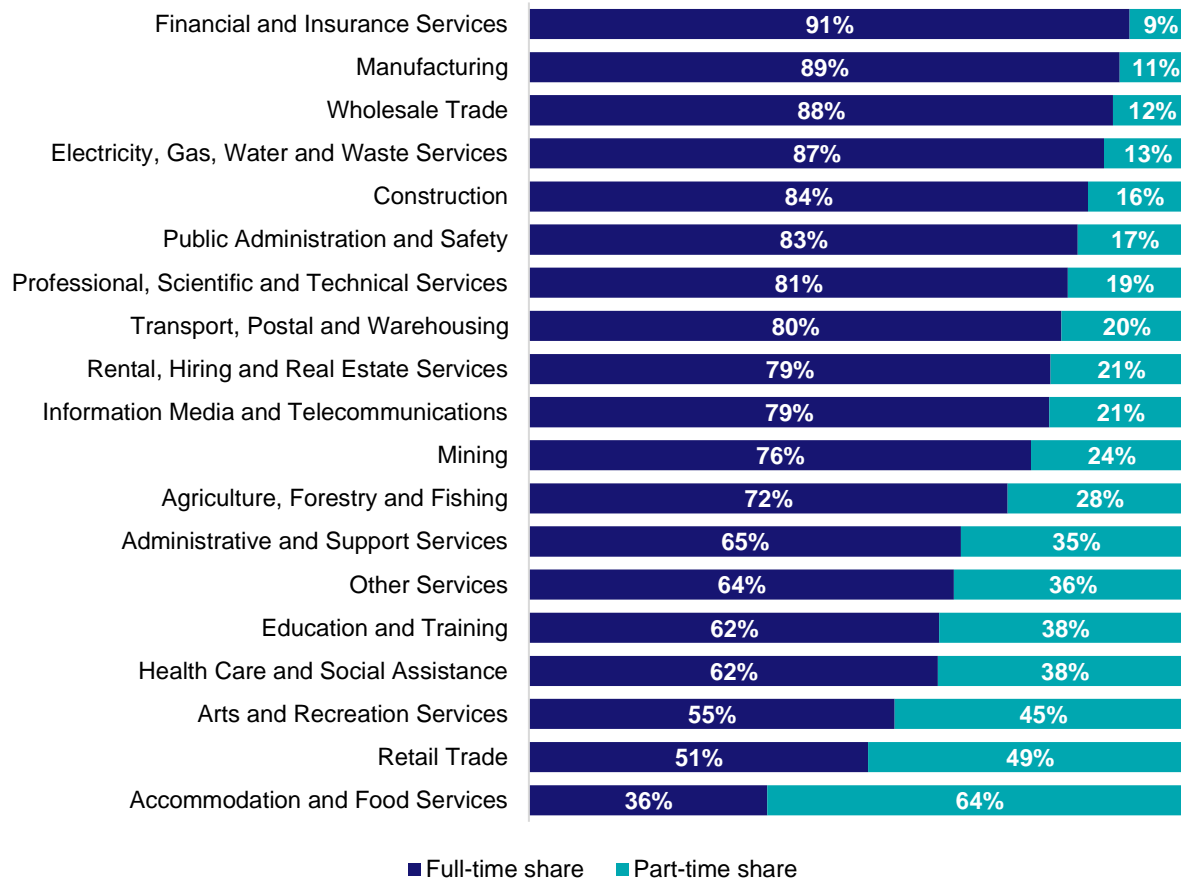

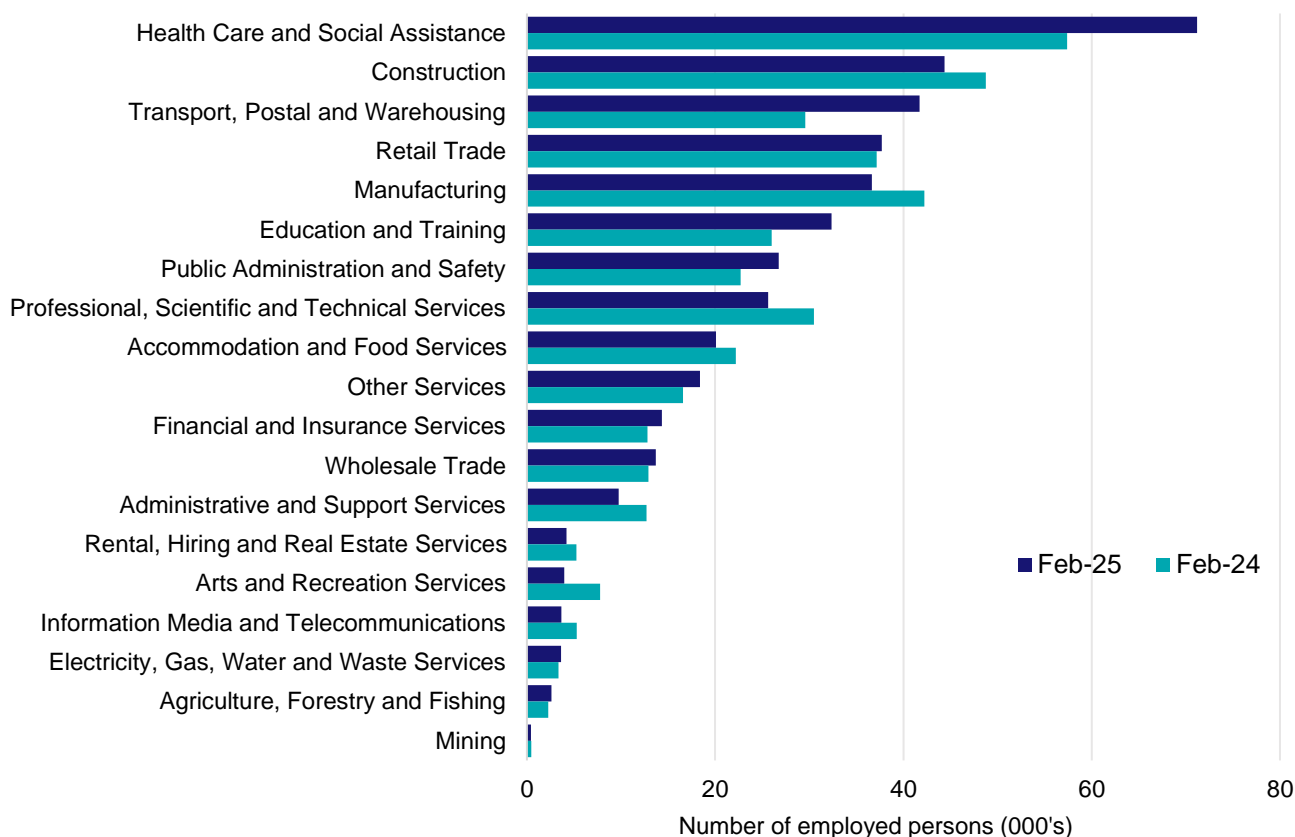

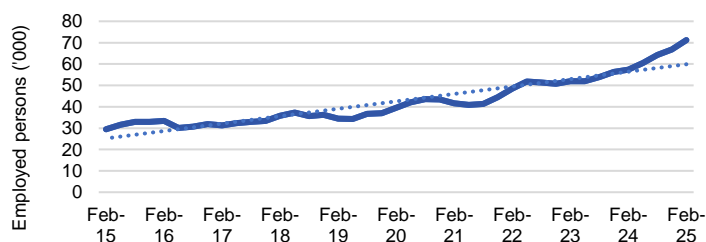

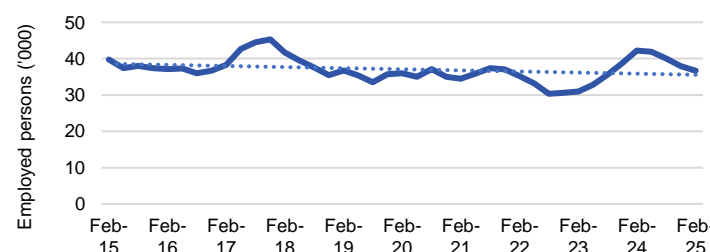

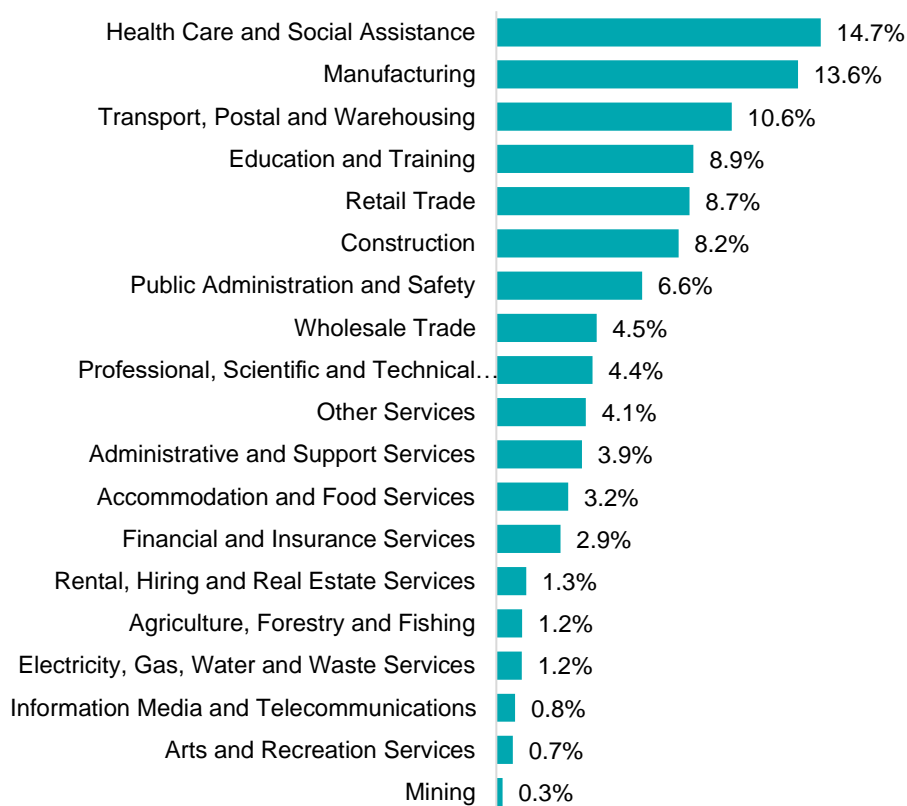

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



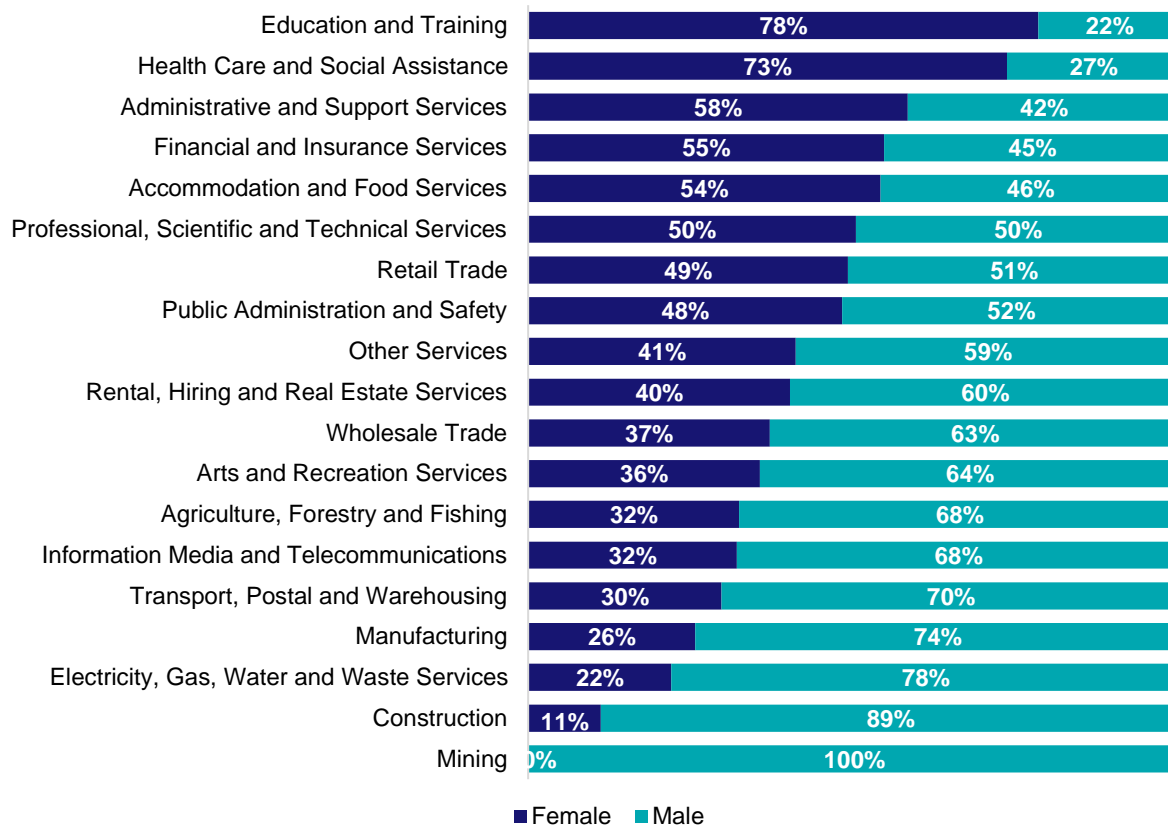

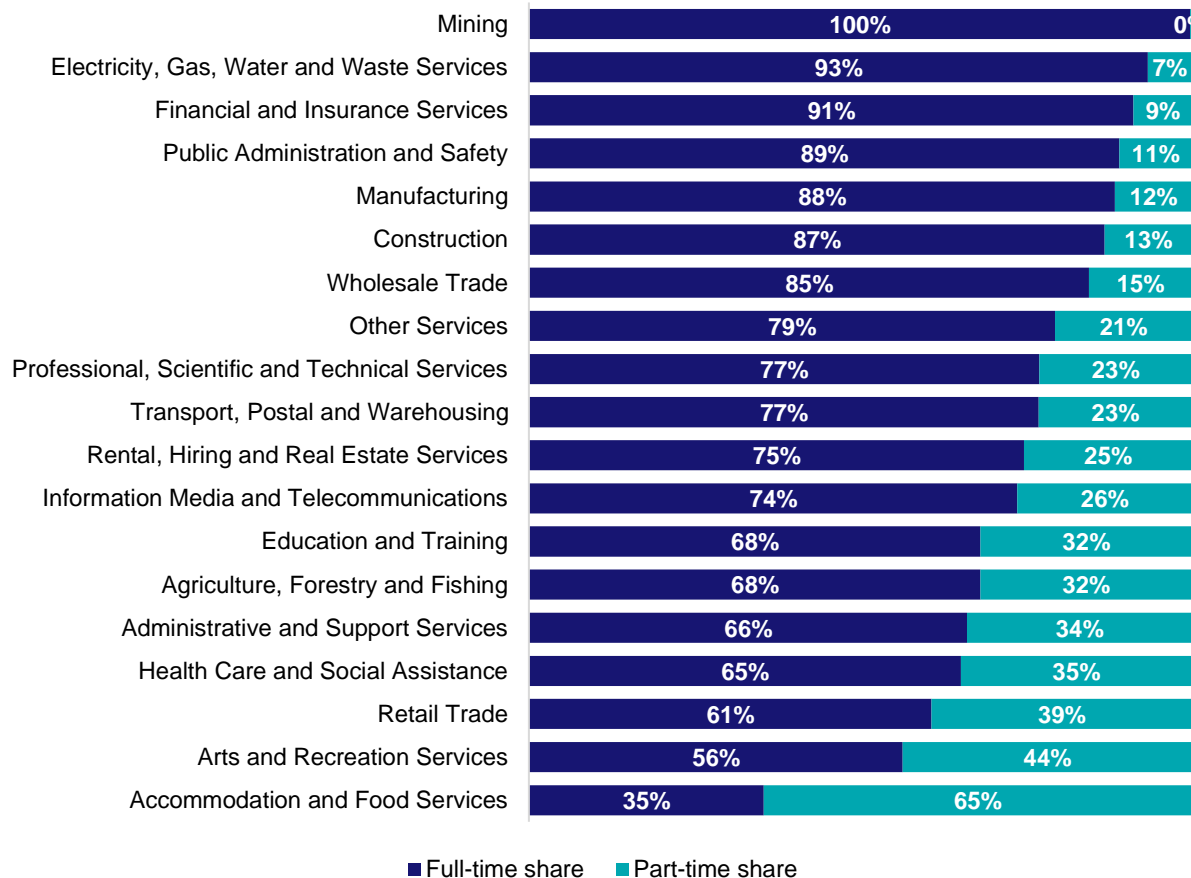
