# Overview


In February 2025, there were around 3,770,800 people employed in Victoria. The 5 largest employing industries in Victoria were Health Care and Social Assistance, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Construction, Retail Trade and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 53% of all employment.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 2.0% to stand at 591,400
- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services fell by 2.9% to stand at 368,400
- Construction rose by 3.0% to stand at 357,900.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Victoria, 53% of workers were employed full-time; 75% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 41. Around 76% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Melbourne.


#### Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024






In February 2025, there were around 91,500 people employed in the Ballarat Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Construction, Retail Trade, and Manufacturing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 6.8% to stand at 17,600
- Education and Training rose by 12.7% to stand at 9,400
- Construction rose by 46.9% to stand at 9,200.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Ballarat Employment Region, 59% of workers were employed full-time; 85% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 44.

# Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024







































# Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024
























## Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024










## Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024















## Overview


In February 2025, there were around 520,800 people employed in the Western Melbourne Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Transport, Postal and Warehousing, Retail Trade, Construction, and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 50% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 7.2% to stand at 65,500
- Transport, Postal and Warehousing rose by 11.8% to stand at 55,400
- Retail Trade rose by 28.8% to stand at 48,500.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Western Melbourne Employment Region, 56% of workers were employed full-time; 76% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 39.


## Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024










In February 2025, there were around 77,800 people employed in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing, Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Retail Trade, and Construction. Together these 5 industries accounted for 63% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing fell by 12.4% to stand at 11,900
- · Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 25.8% to stand at 10,200
- Education and Training rose by 51.7% to stand at 9,400.

In Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region, 82% of workers were employed full-time; 76% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 49.


## Employment by industry, February 2025 and February 2024








