Employment Region Industry profile

Sydney North & West Employment Region

Overview


In February 2025, there were around 856,500 people employed in the Sydney North & West Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Health Care and Social Assistance, Construction, Financial and Insurance Services, and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 55% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2025, employment in:

- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services rose by 2.0% to stand at 131,900
- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 5.5% to stand at 116,900
- Construction rose by 0.9% to stand at 76,800.

In Professional, Scientific and Technical Services in the Sydney North & West Employment Region, 81% of workers were employed full-time; 55% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 42.










Employment characteristics by Industry
