Overview

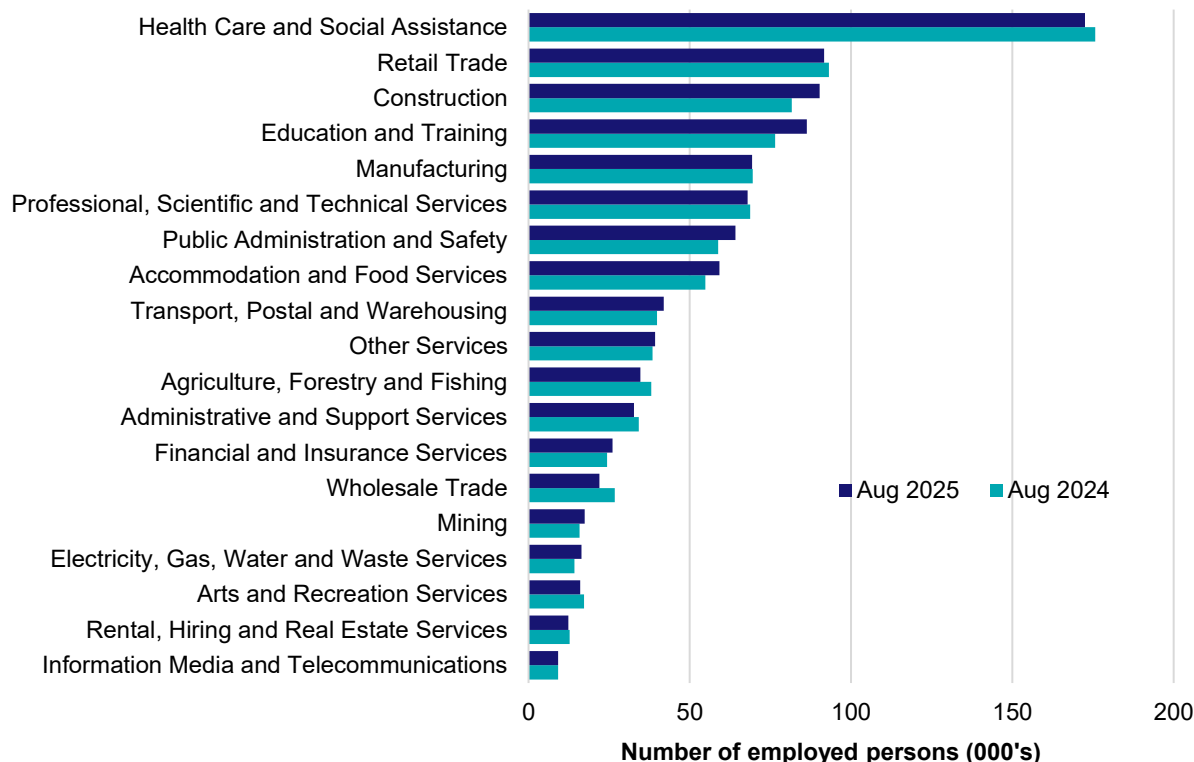
In August 2025, there were around 969,200 people employed in South Australia. The 5 largest employing industries in South Australia were Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Construction, Education and Training and Manufacturing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 53% of all employment.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 1.8% to stand at 172,500
- Retail Trade fell by 1.7% to stand at 91,600
- Construction rose by 10.7% to stand at 90,300.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in South Australia, 54% of workers were employed full-time; 75% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 42. Around 84% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Adelaide.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024

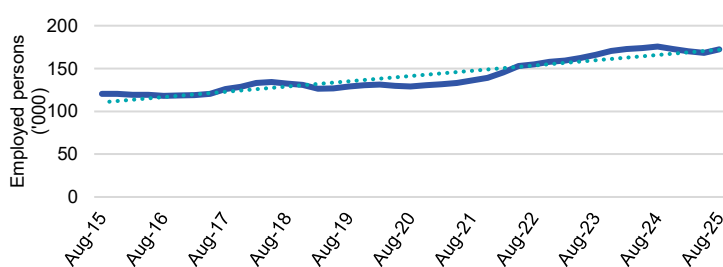

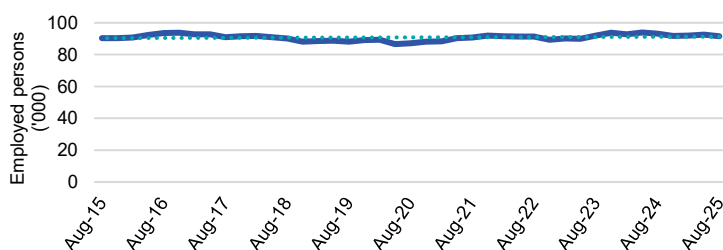

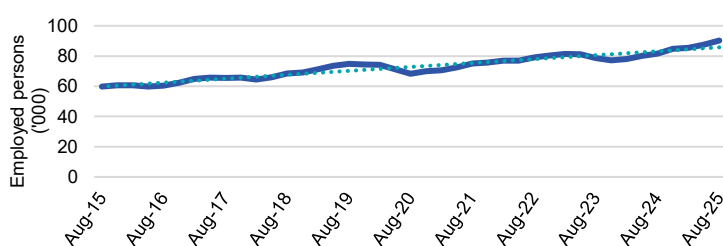

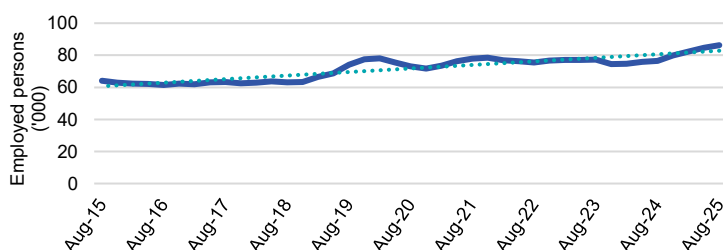

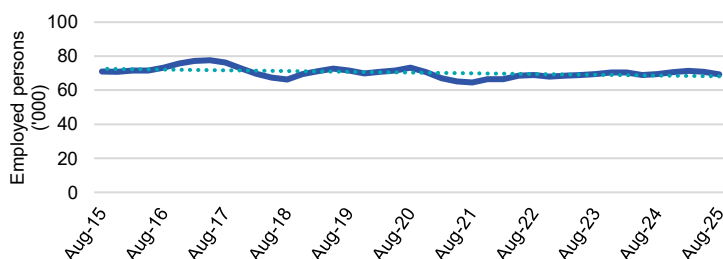

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



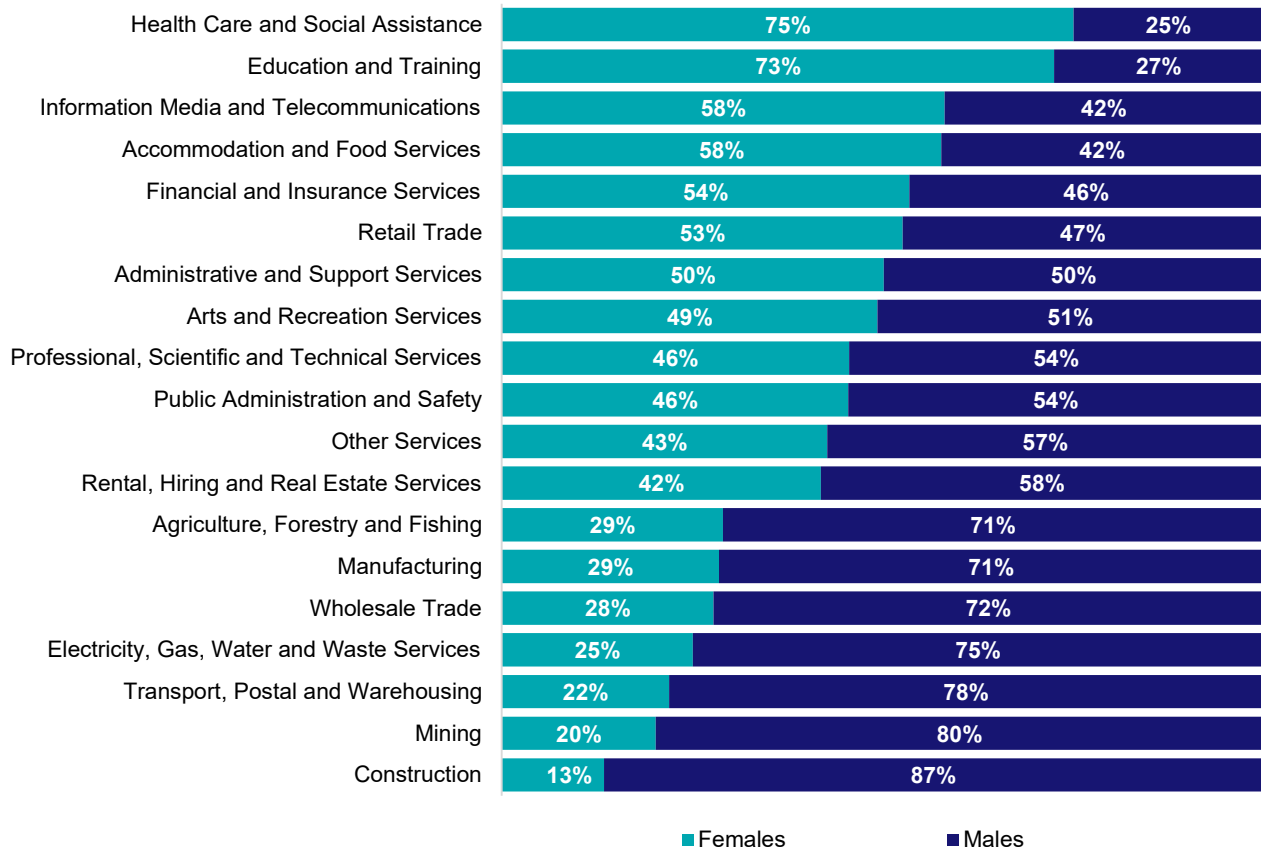

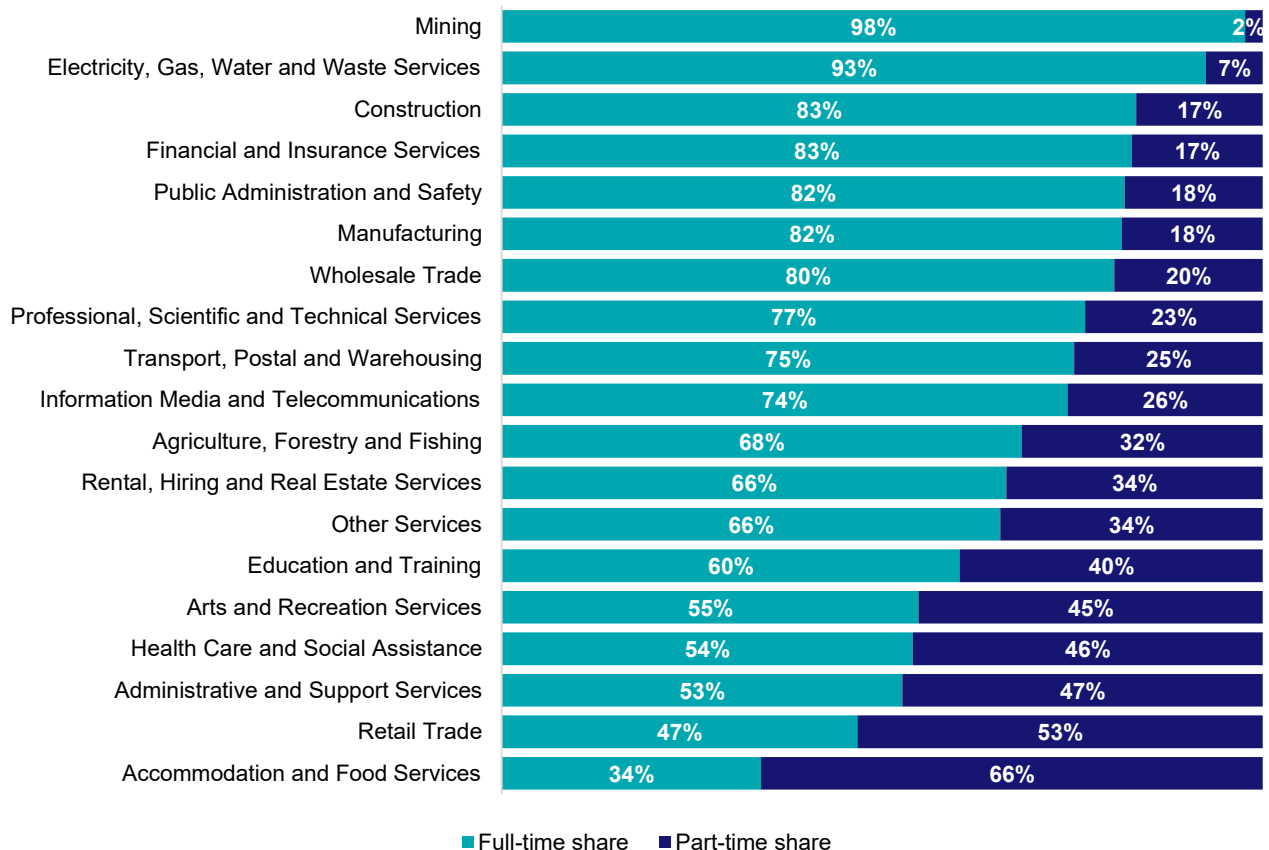

Overview

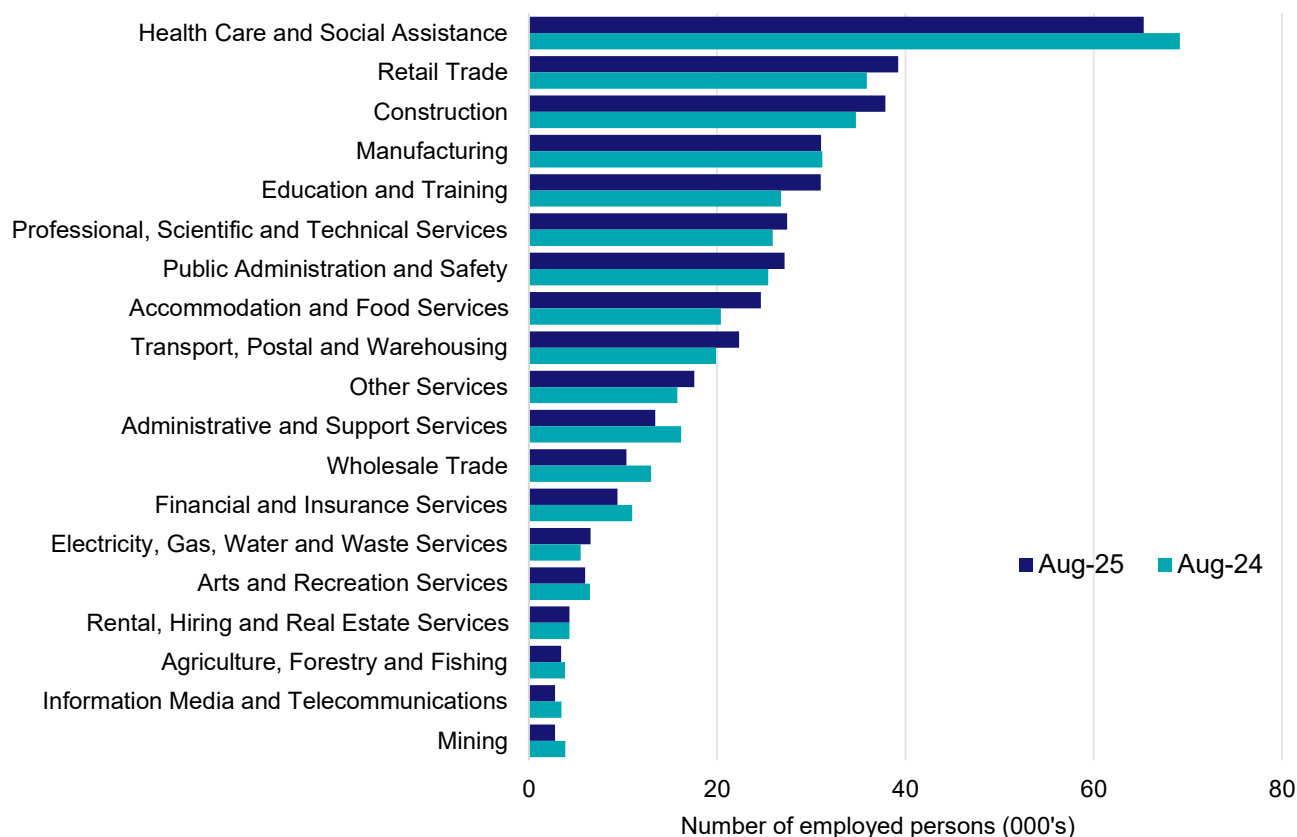
In August 2025, there were around 382,600 people employed in the Adelaide North Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Construction, Manufacturing, and Education and Training. Together these 5 industries accounted for 53% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 5.5% to stand at 65,300
- Retail Trade rose by 9.2% to stand at 39,200
- Construction rose by 9.0% to stand at 37,900.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Adelaide North Employment Region, 56% of workers were employed full-time; 78% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 40.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



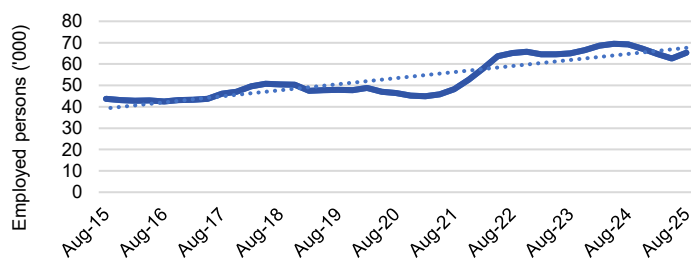

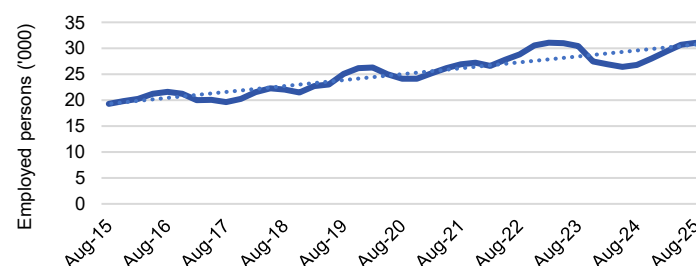

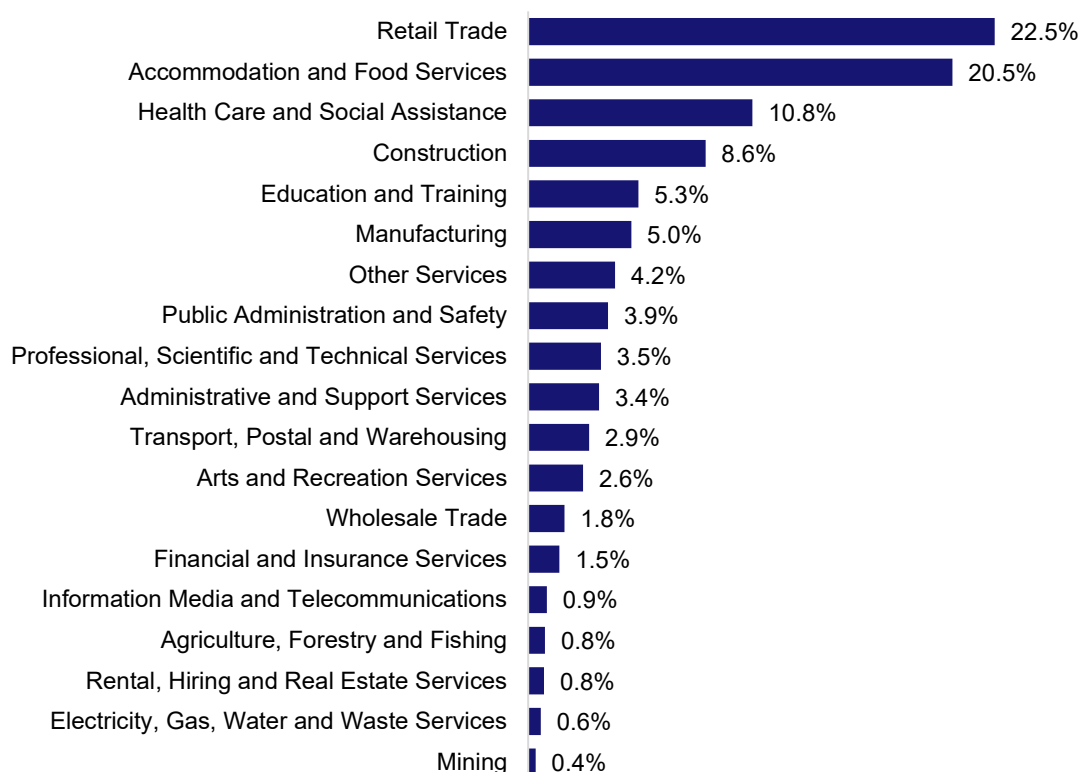

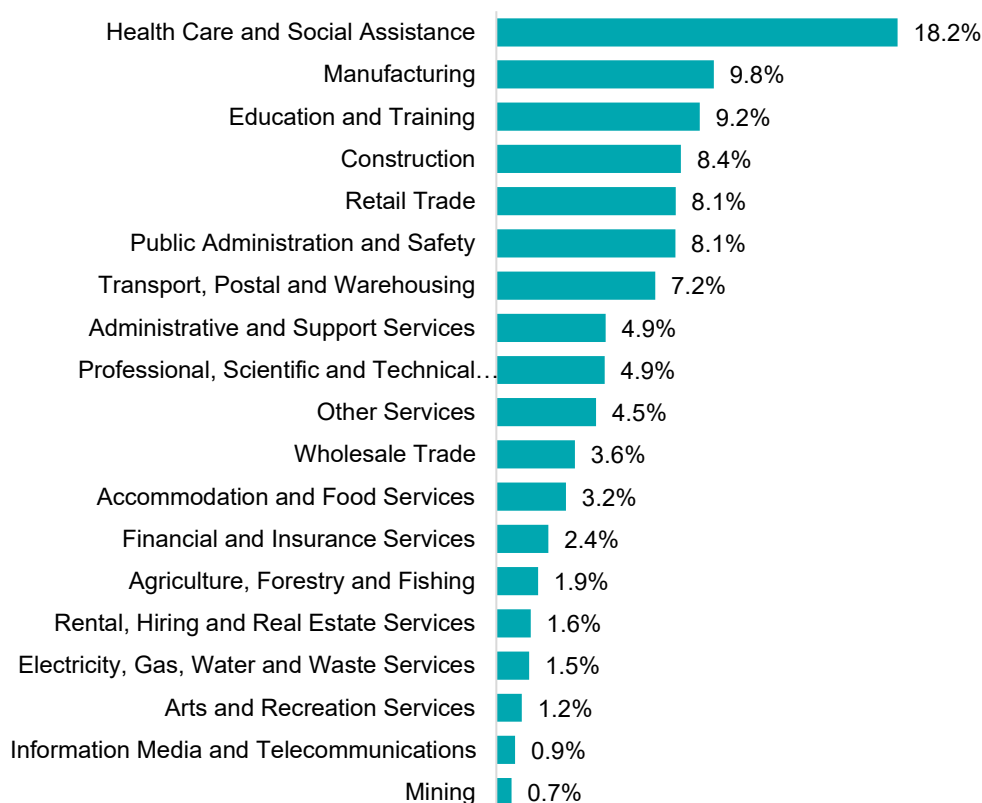

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



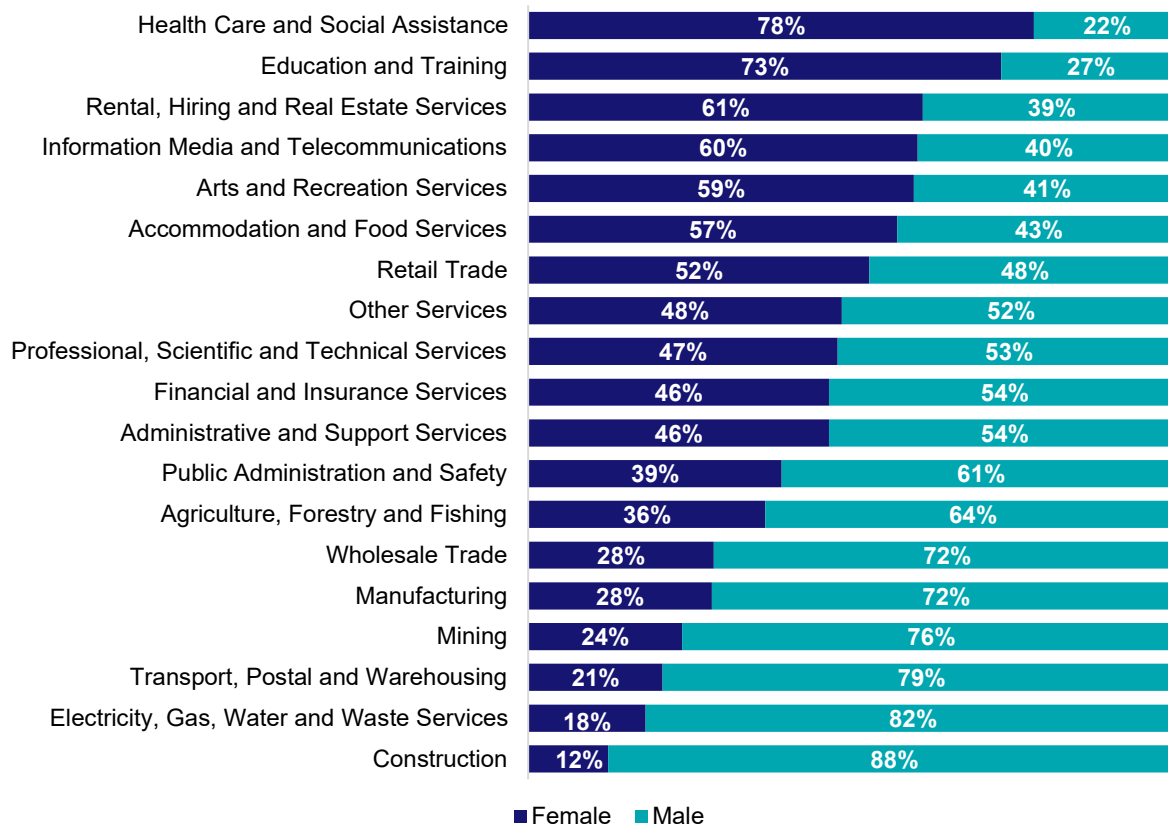

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



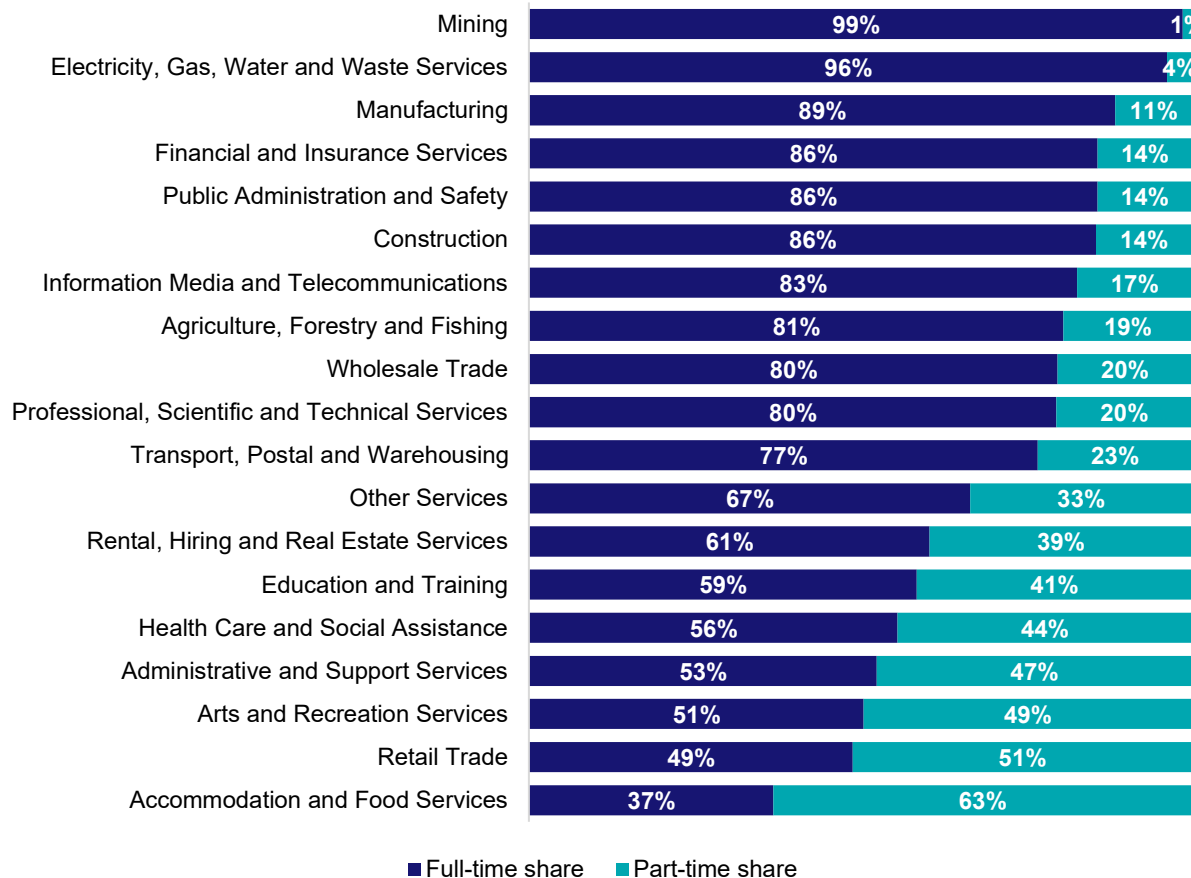

Overview

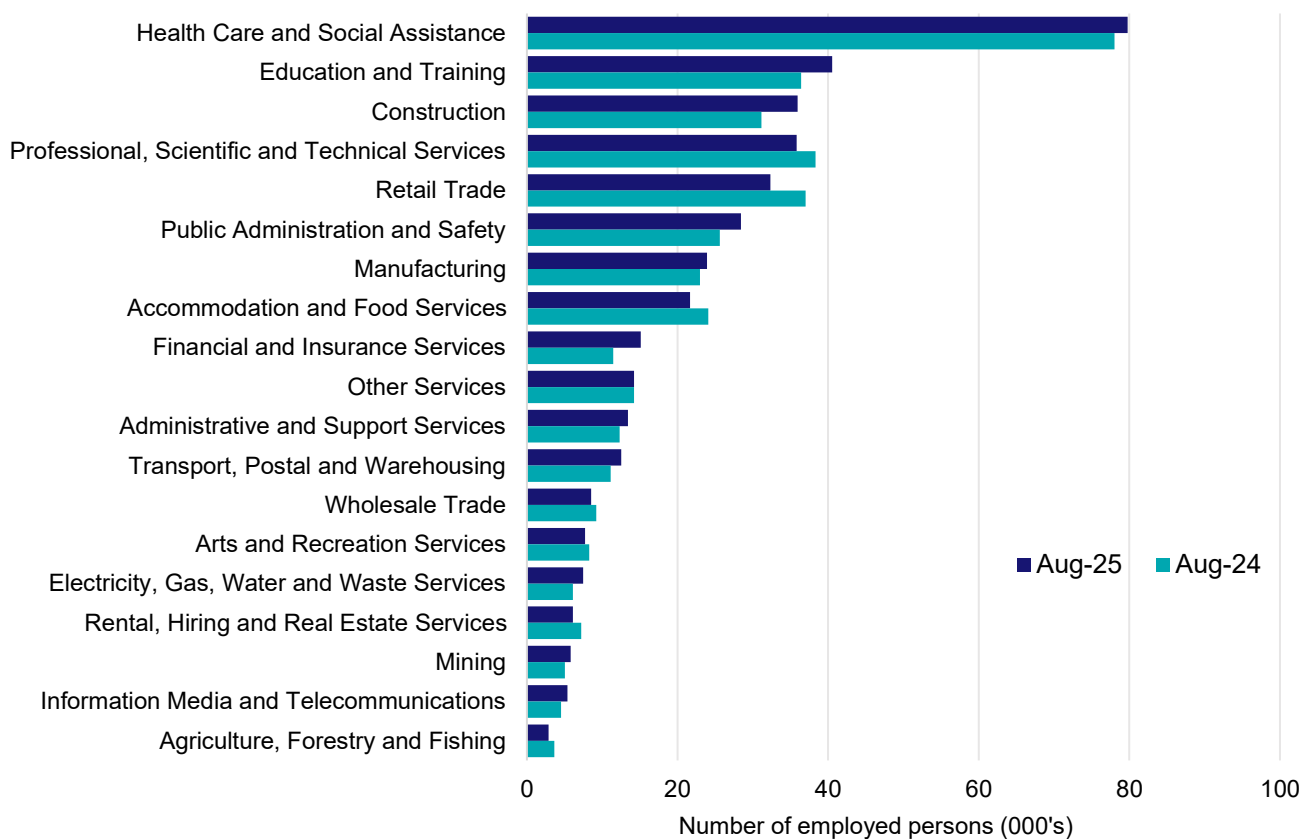
In August 2025, there were around 397,700 people employed in the Adelaide South Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Construction, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 2.3% to stand at 79,800
- Education and Training rose by 11.3% to stand at 40,500
- Construction rose by 15.4% to stand at 35,900.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



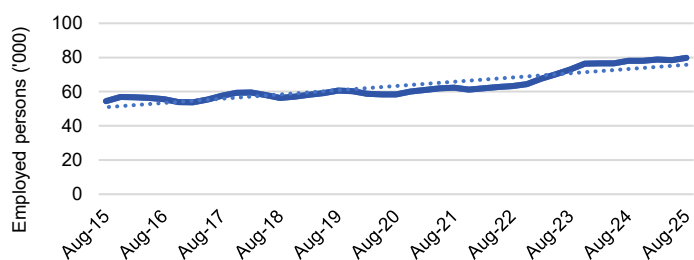

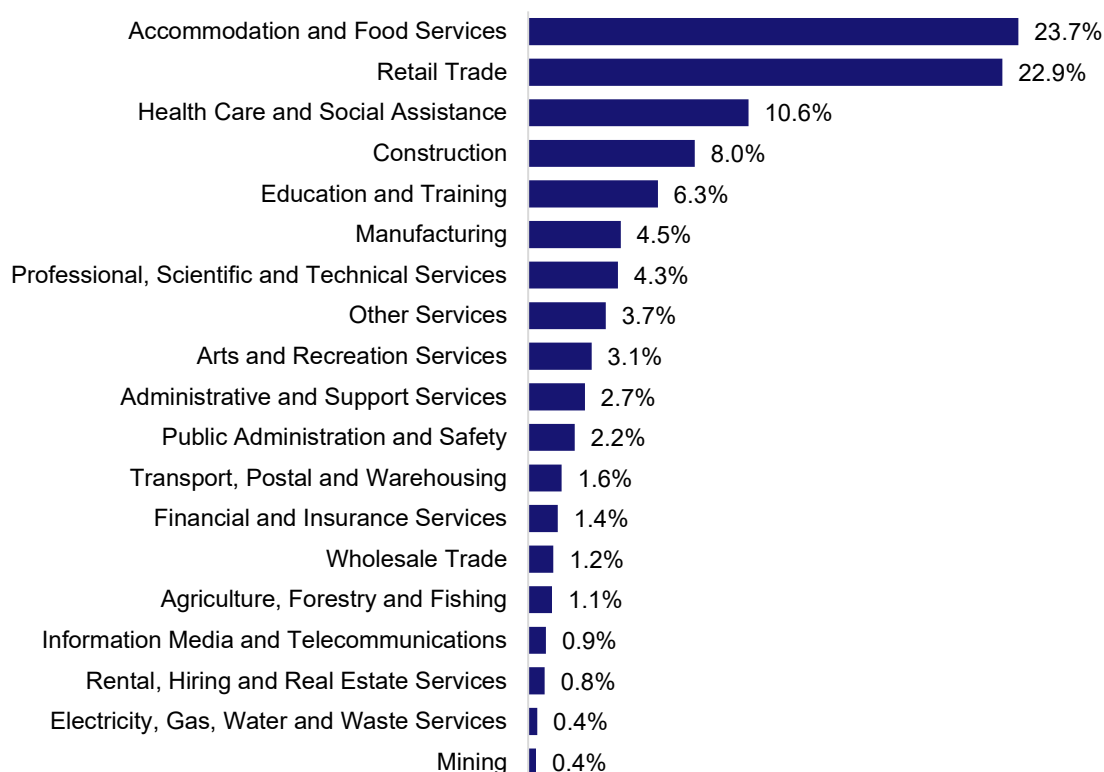

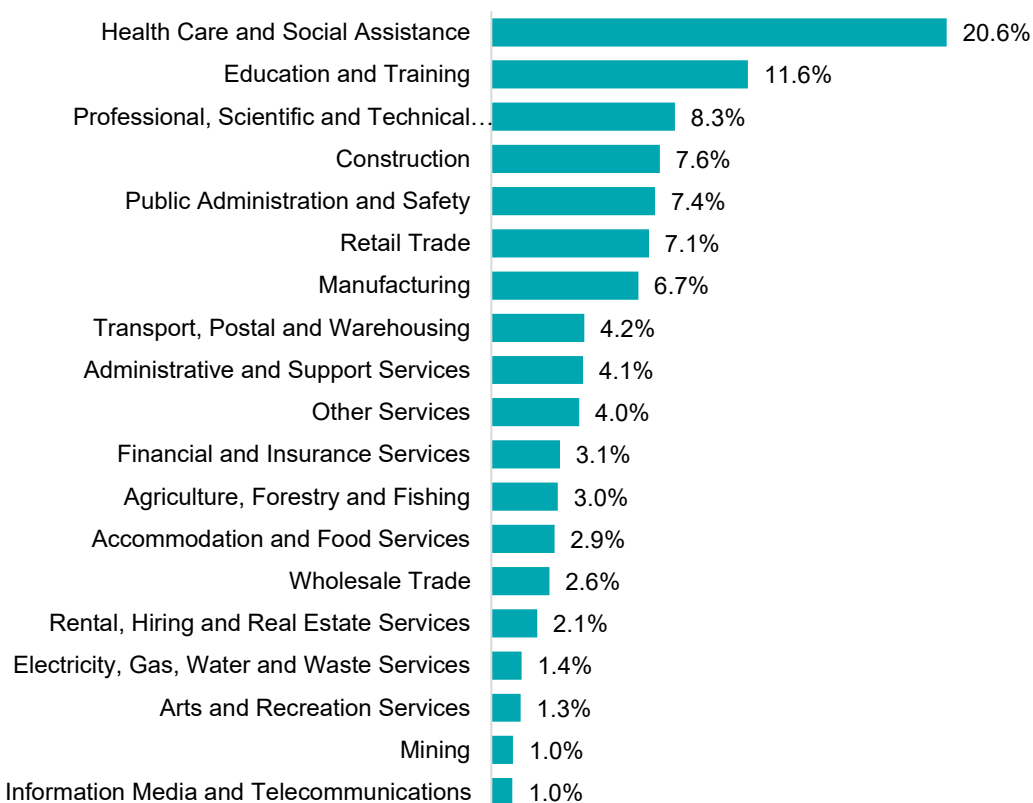

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



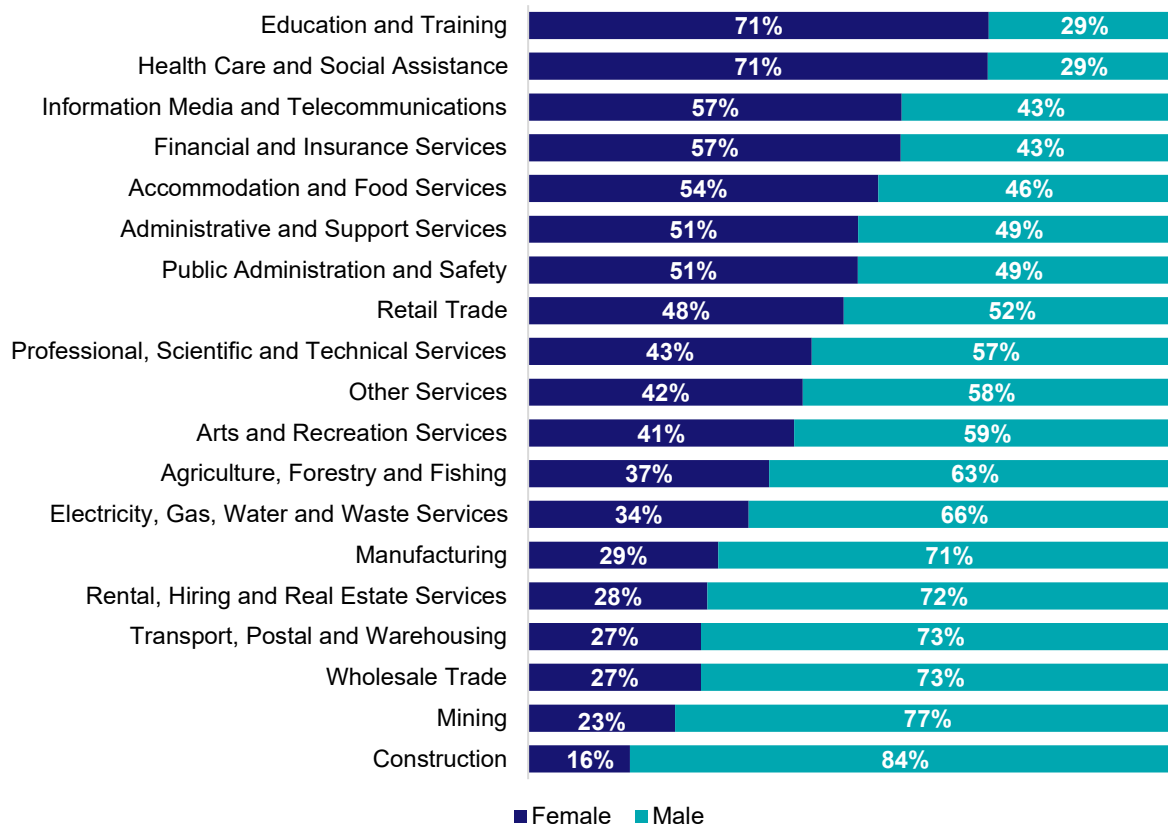

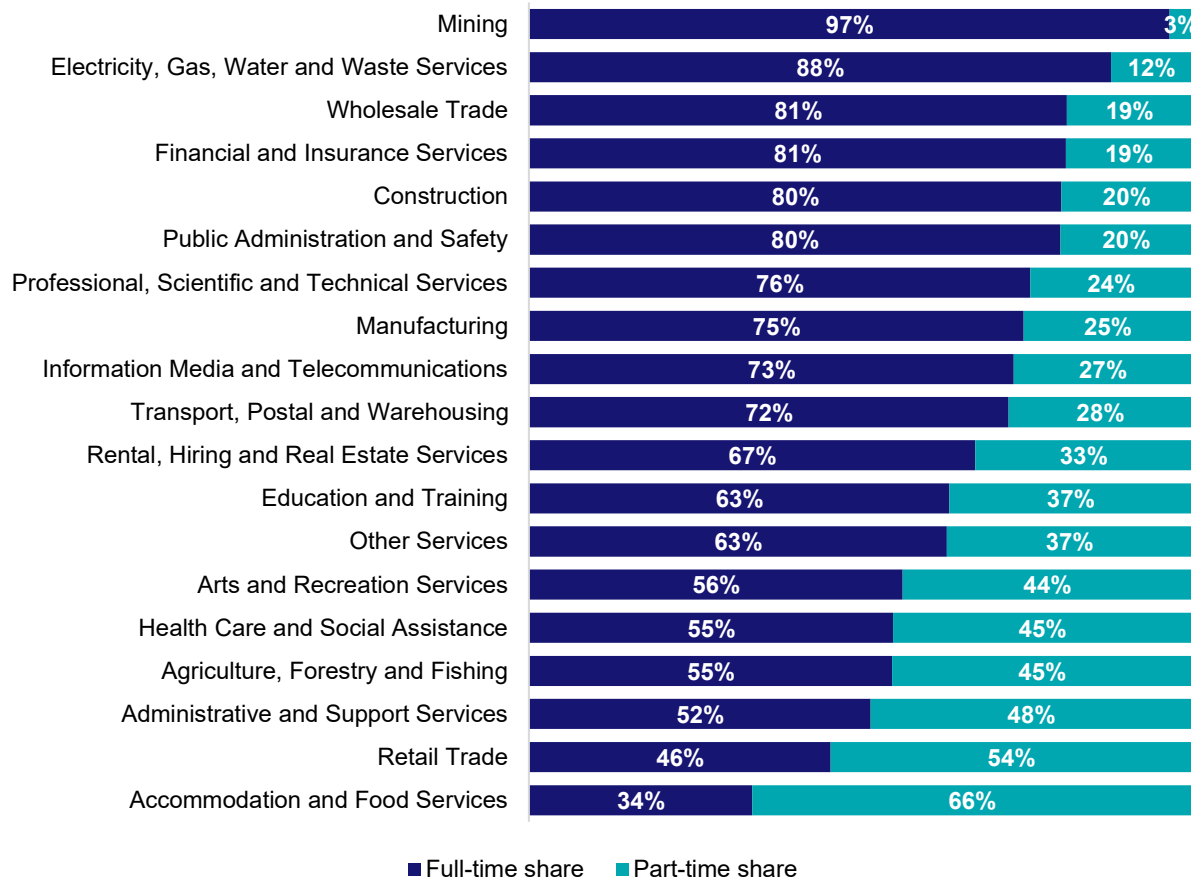

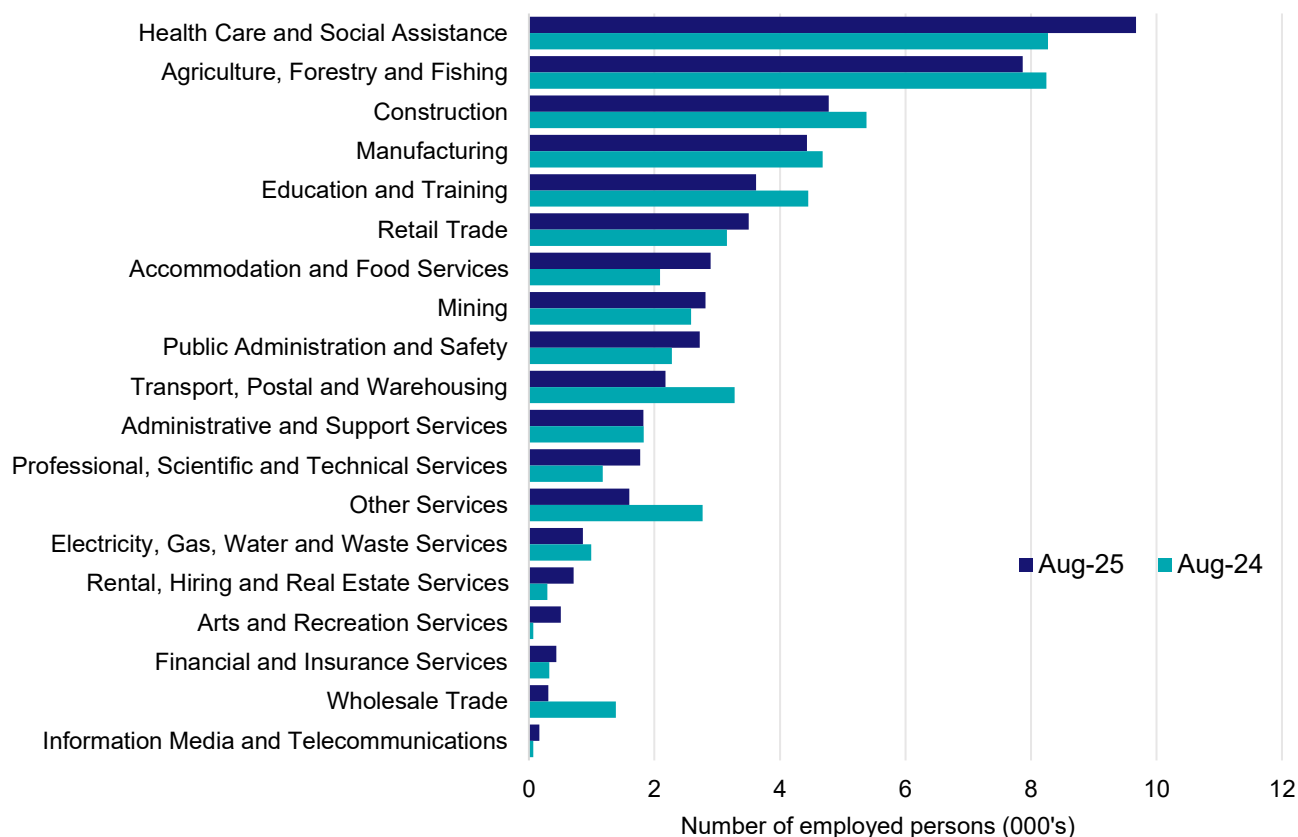

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



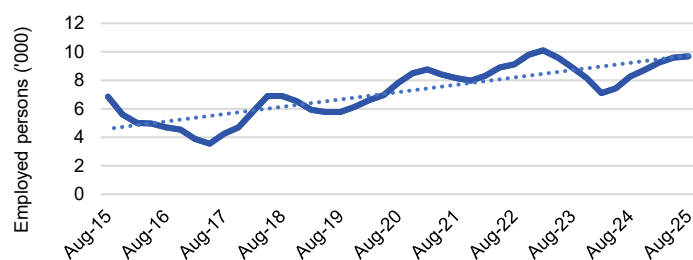

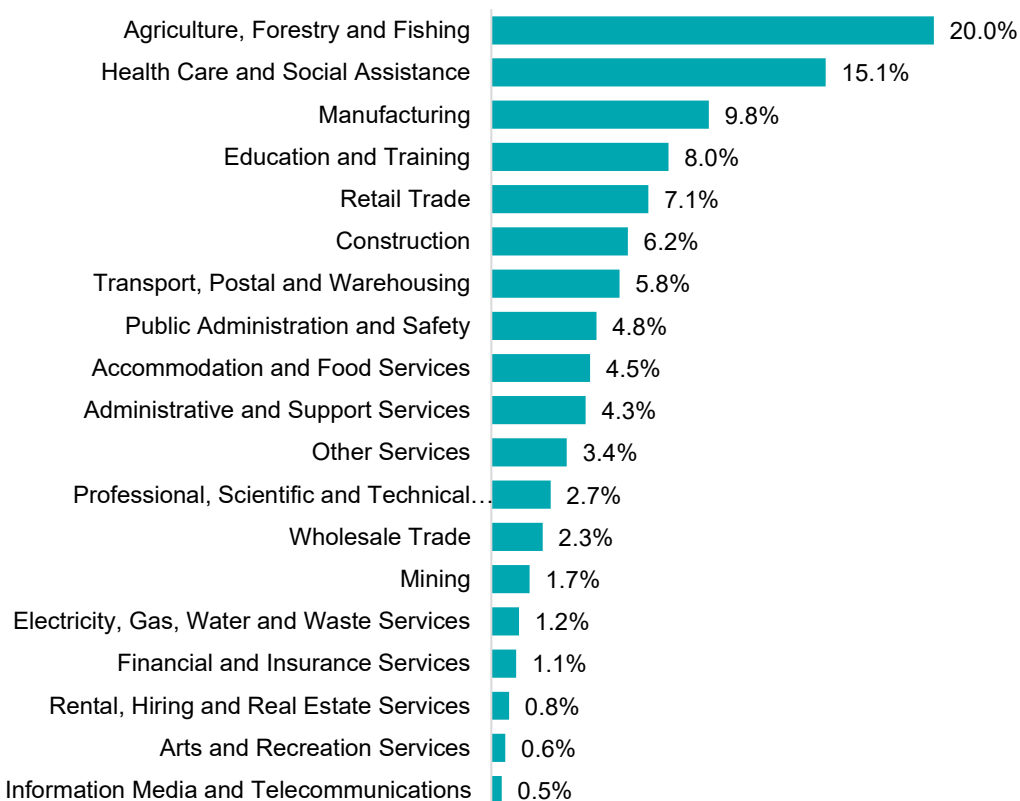

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



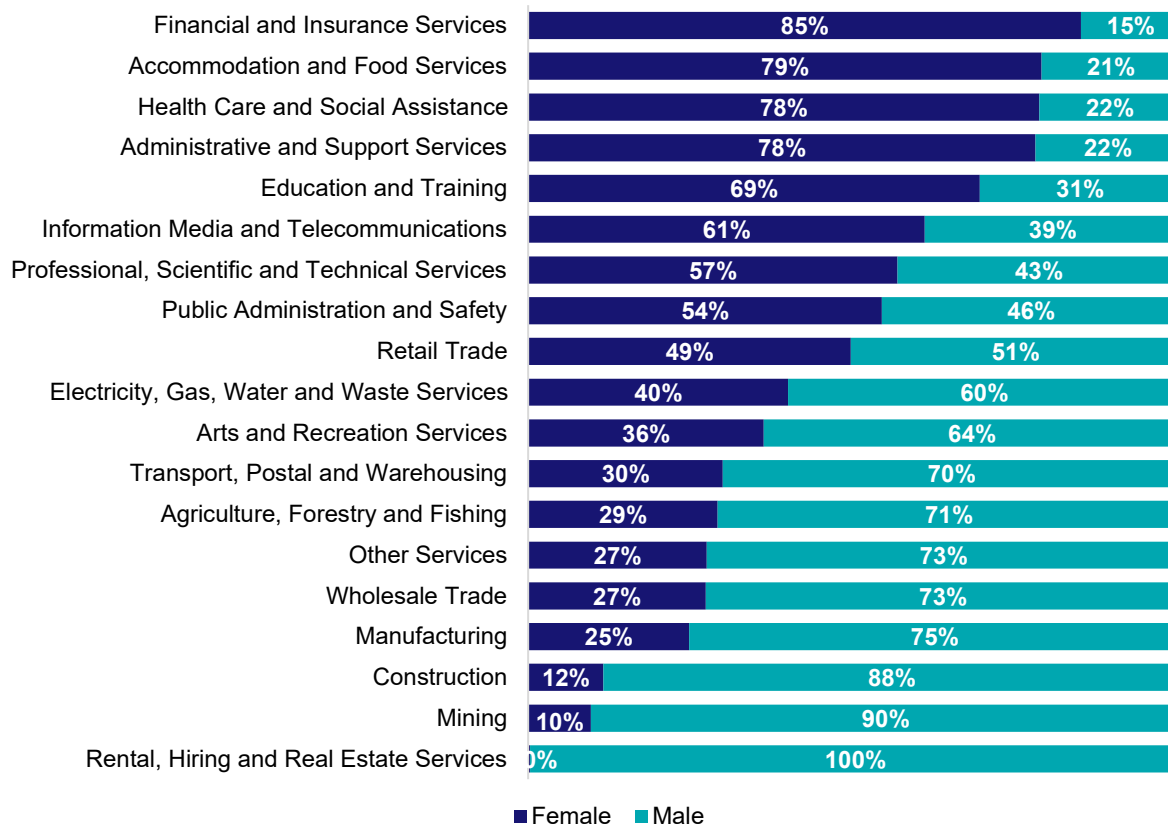

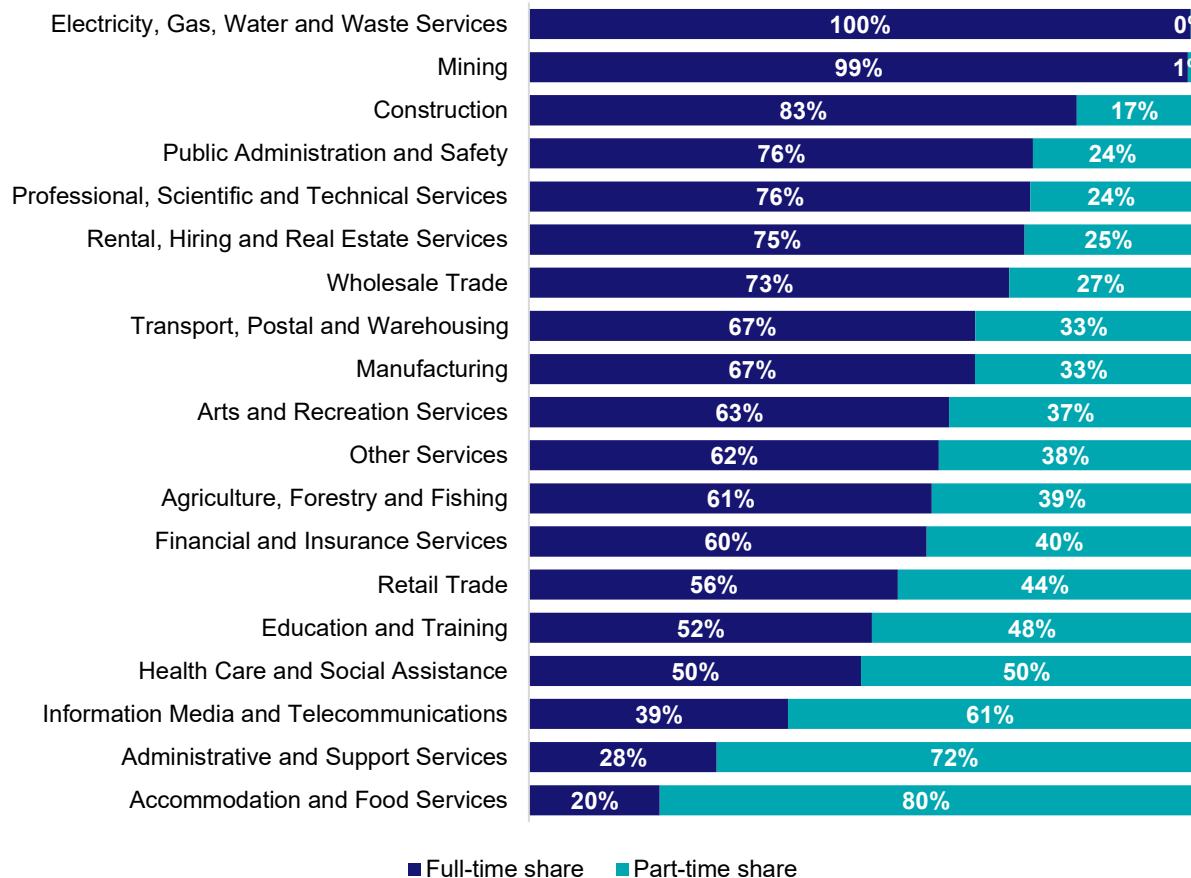

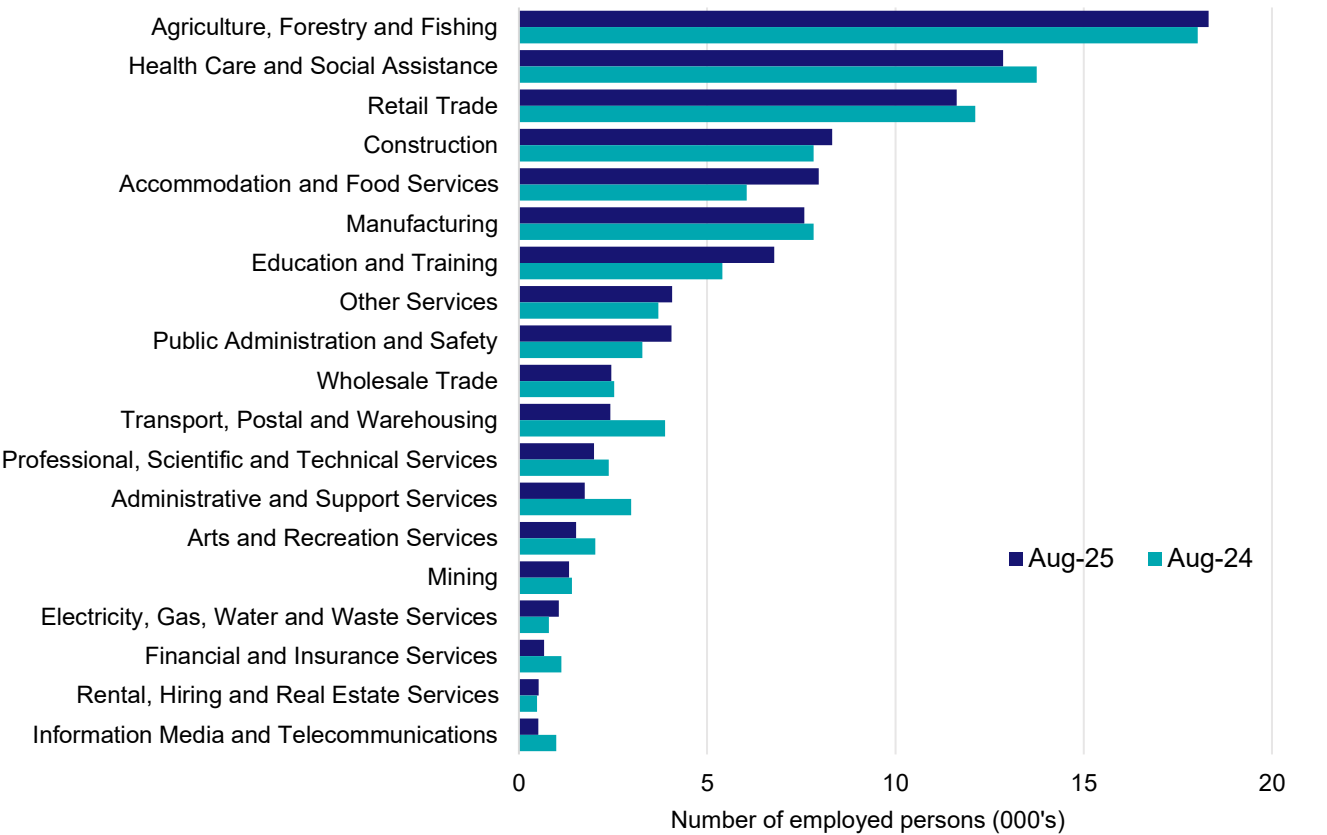
In August 2025, there were around 95,800 people employed in the Murray and South East Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing, Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Construction, and Accommodation and Food Services. Together these 5 industries accounted for 62% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing rose by 1.6% to stand at 18,300
- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 6.5% to stand at 12,900
- Retail Trade fell by 4.0% to stand at 11,600.

In Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing in the Murray and South East Employment Region, 71% of workers were employed full-time; 72% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 48.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



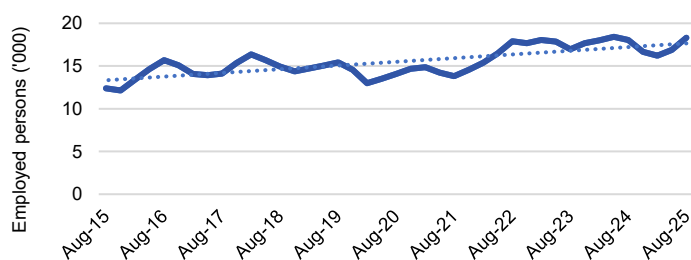

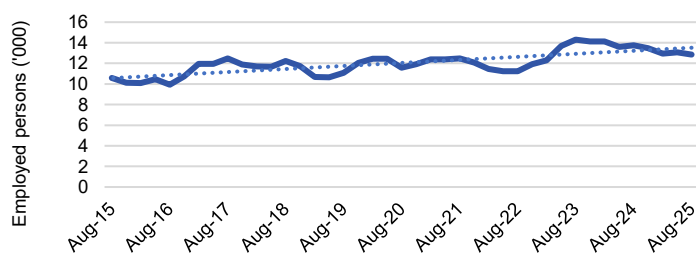

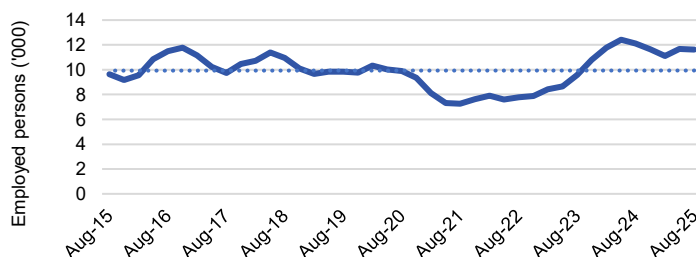

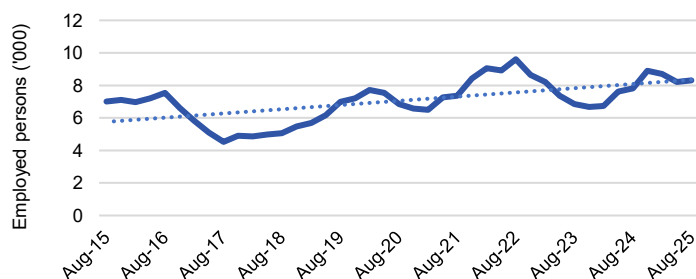

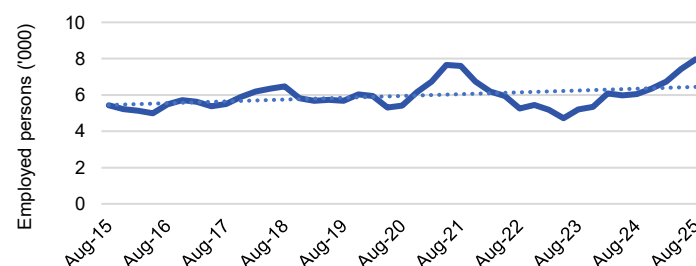

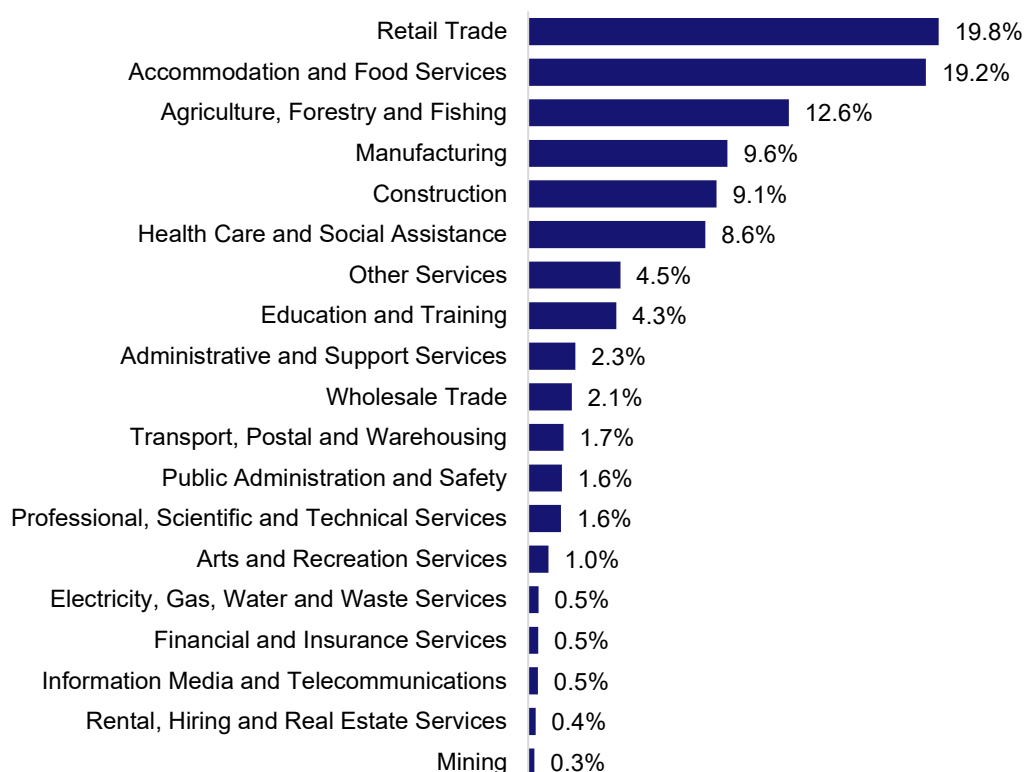

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



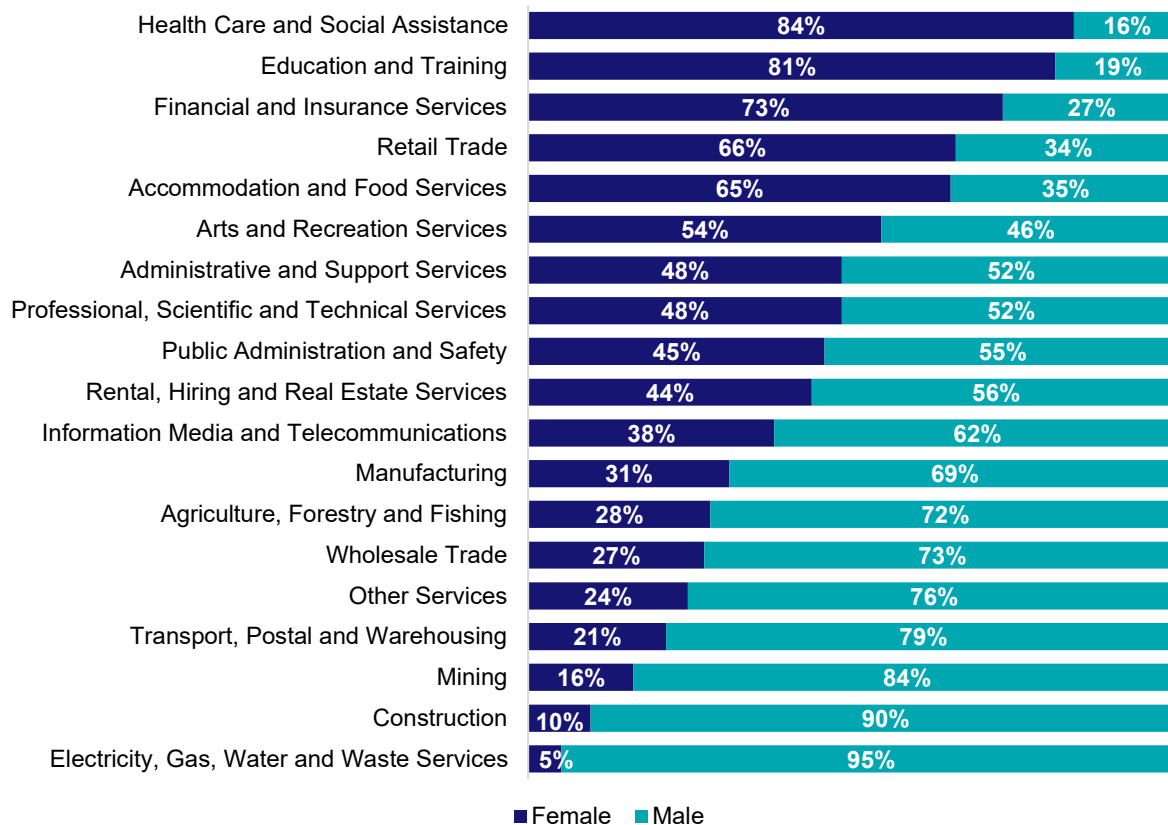

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



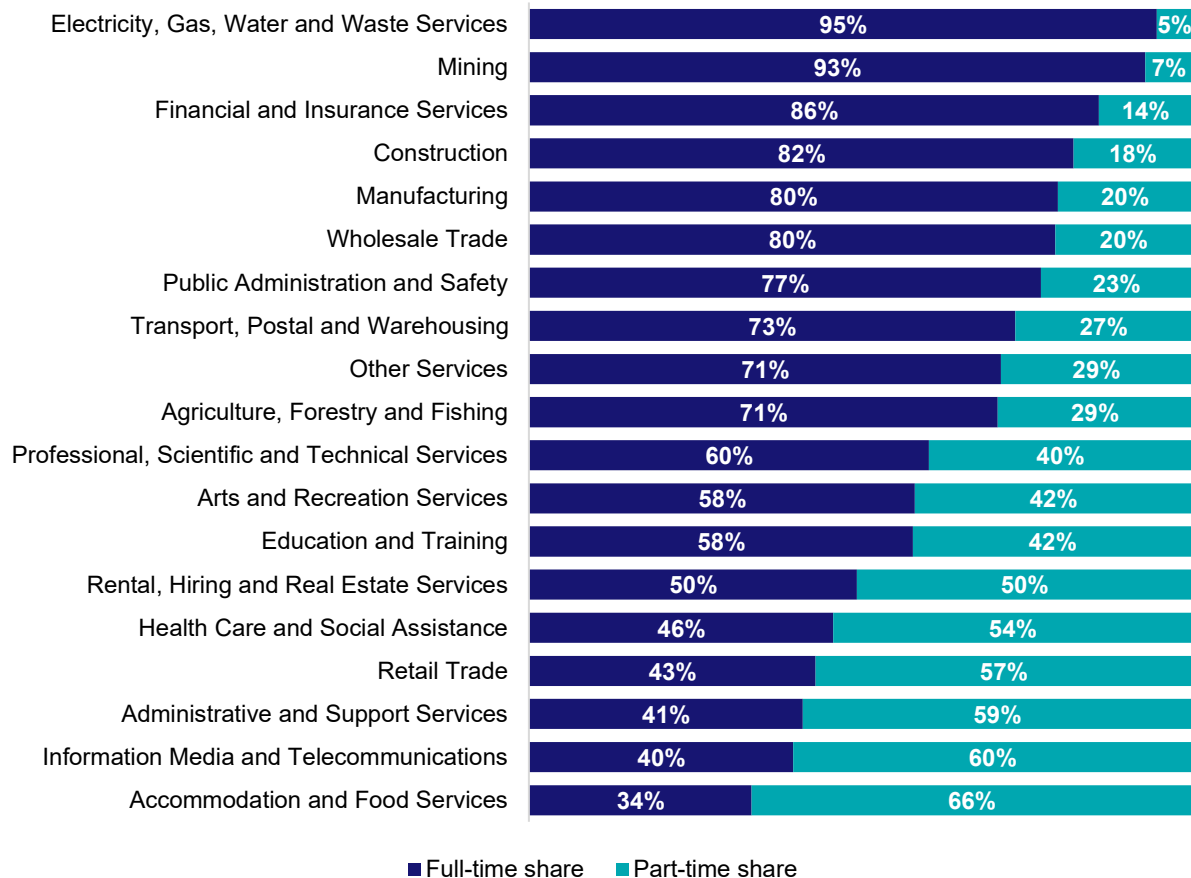

Overview

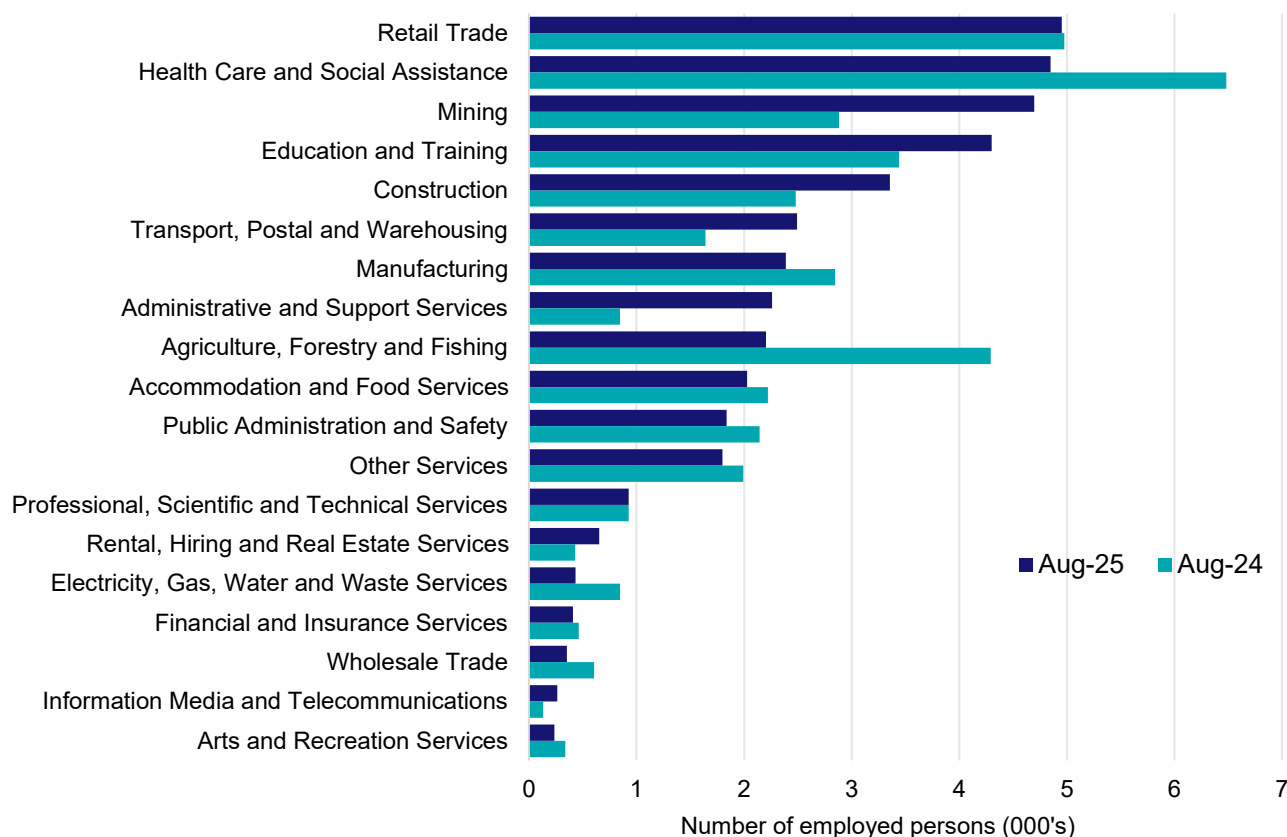
In August 2025, there were around 40,400 people employed in the North West Country SA Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Retail Trade, Health Care and Social Assistance, Mining, Education and Training, and Construction. Together these 5 industries accounted for 55% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Retail Trade fell by 0.4% to stand at 5,000
- Health Care and Social Assistance fell by 25.2% to stand at 4,800
- Mining rose by 62.9% to stand at 4,700.

In Retail Trade in the North West Country SA Employment Region, 61% of workers were employed part-time; 55% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 35.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



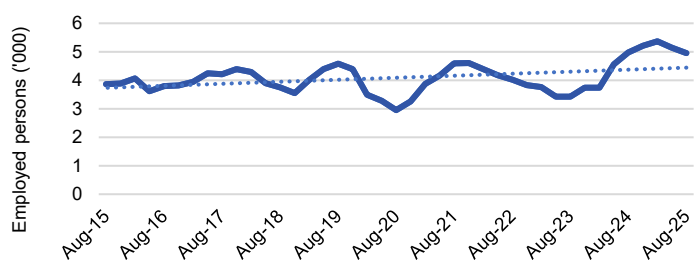

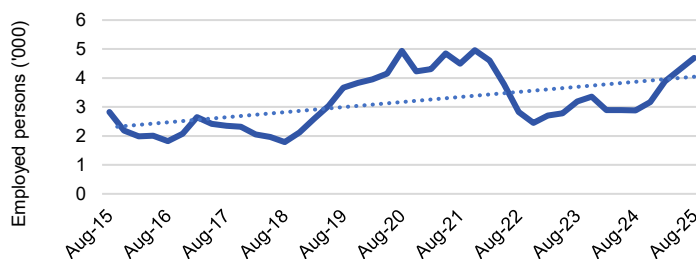

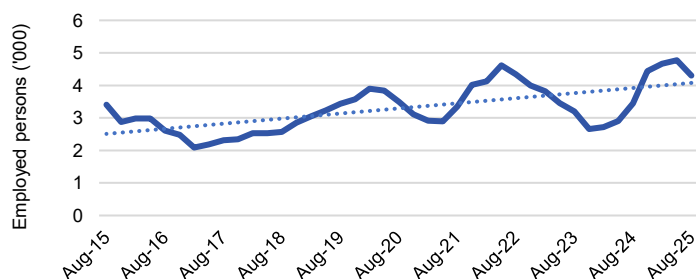

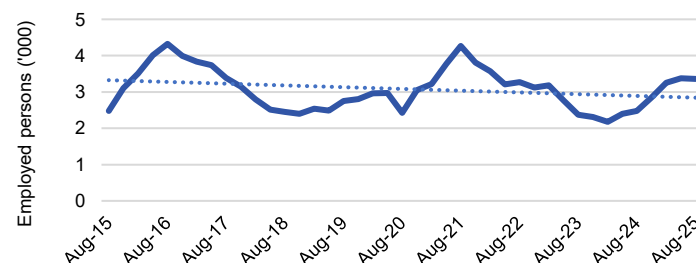

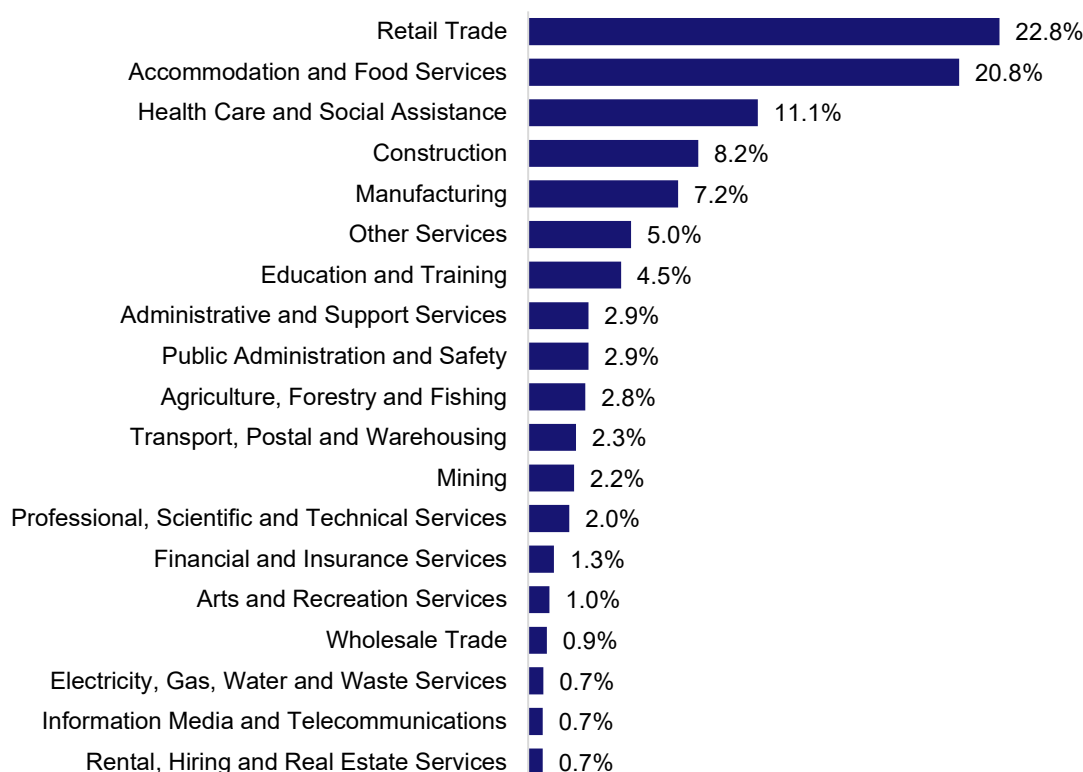

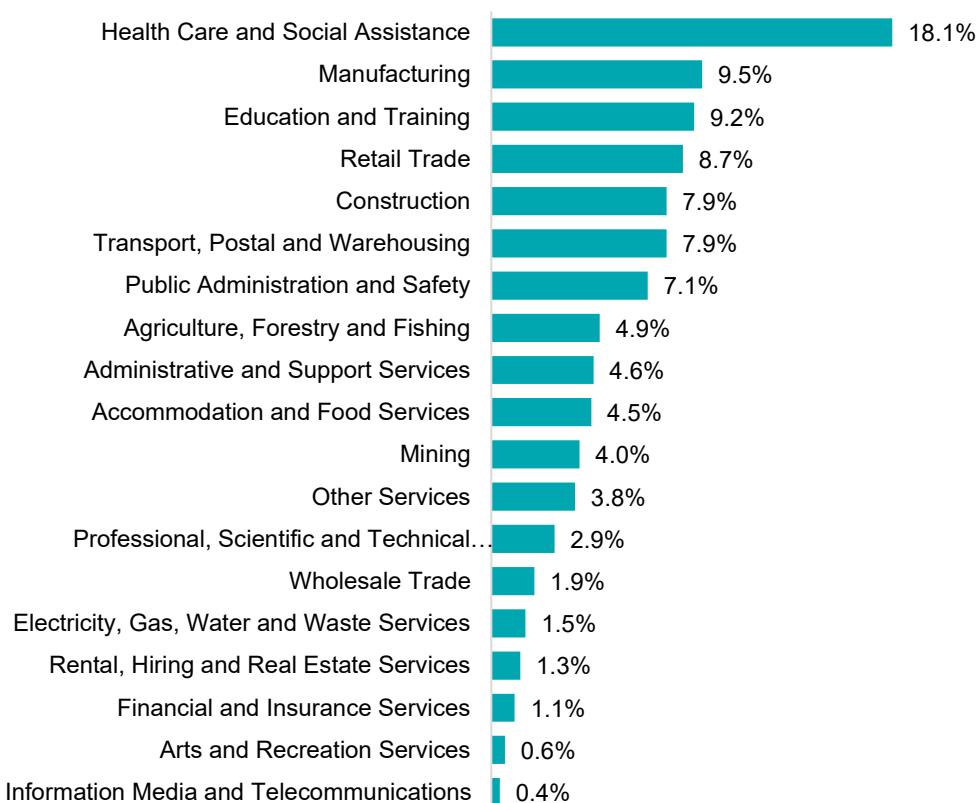
Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



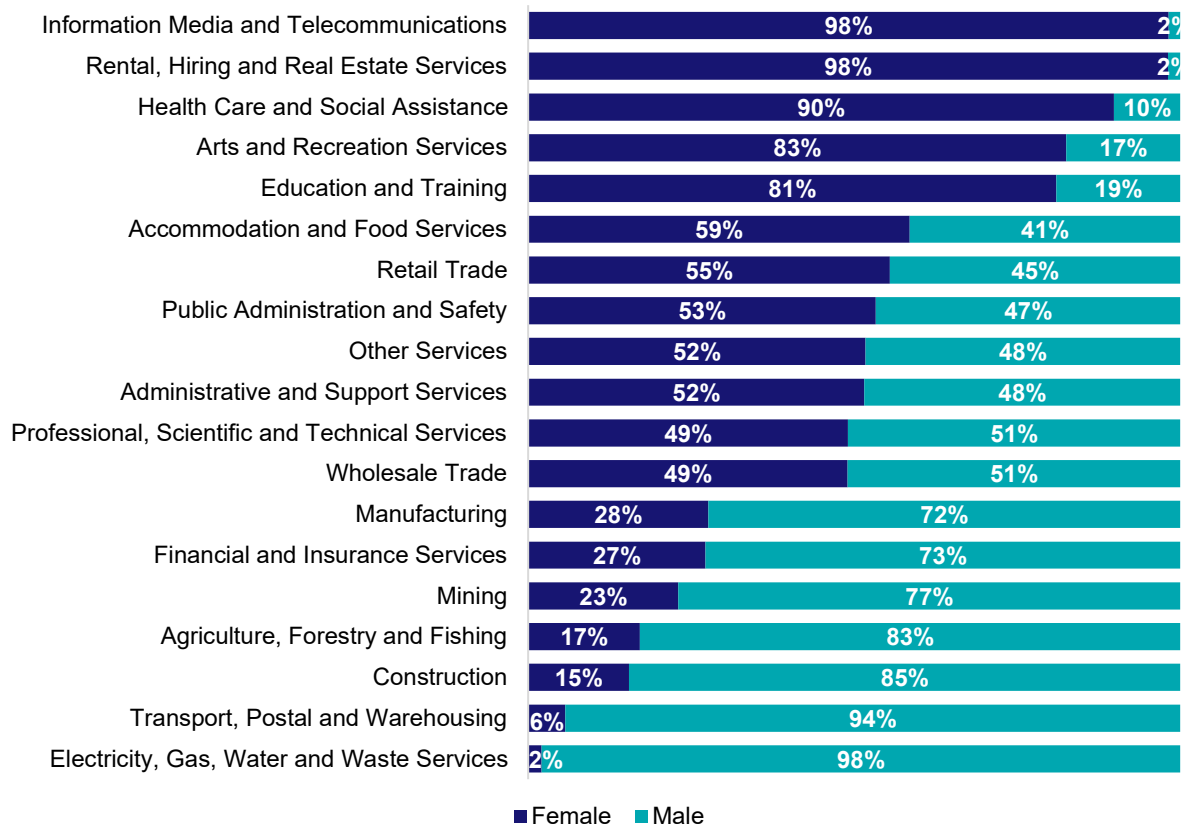

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



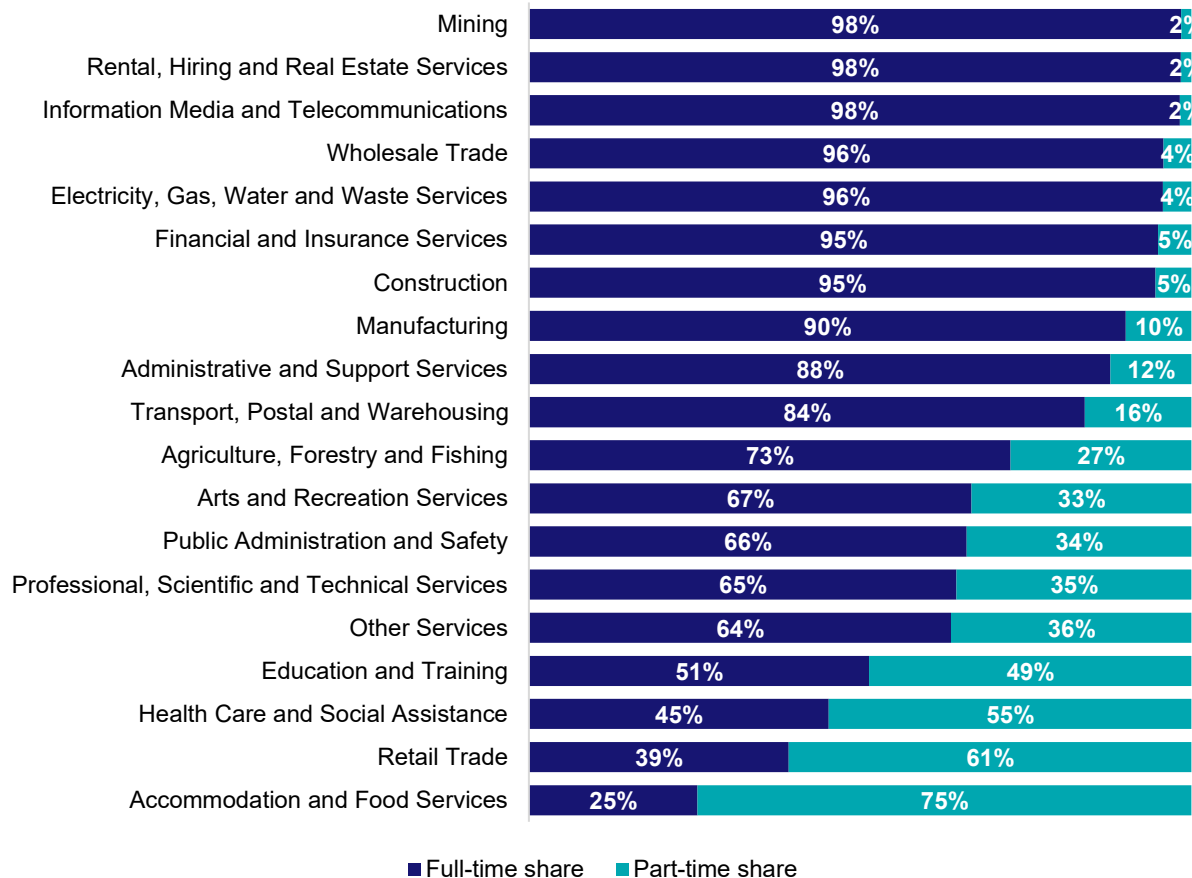
