Overview

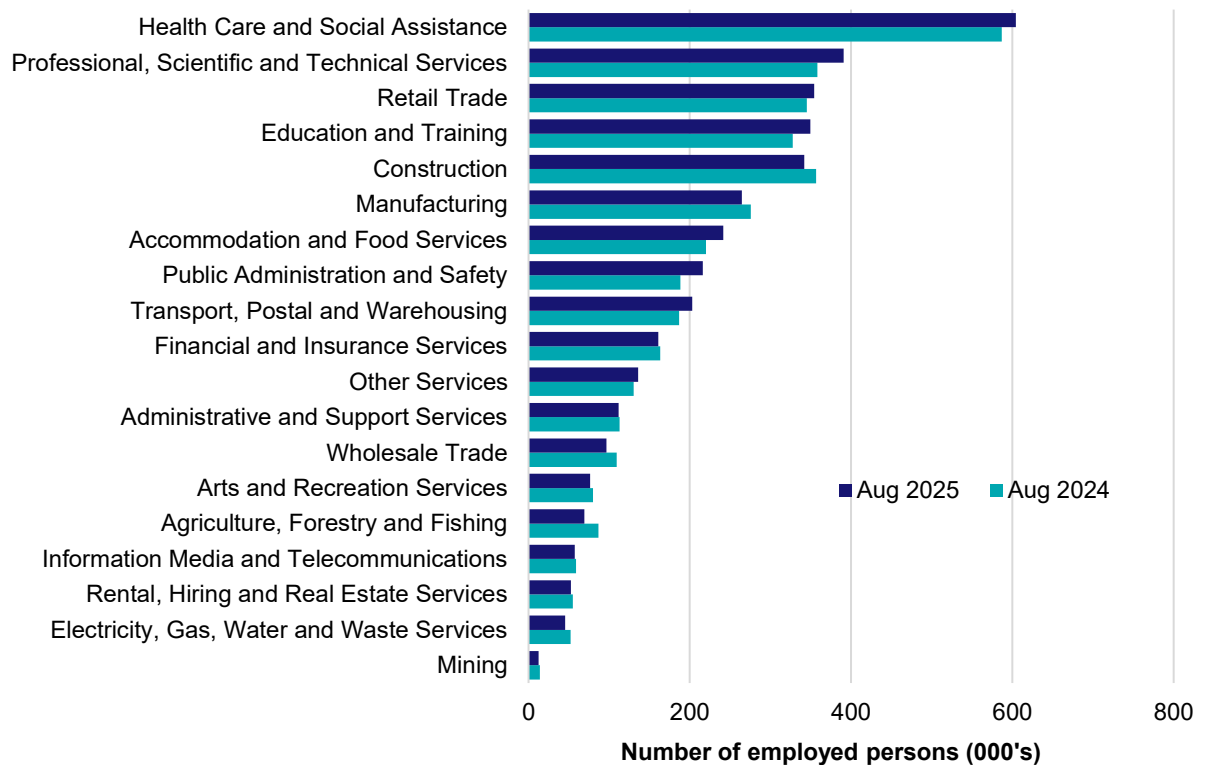
In August 2025, there were around 3,783,500 people employed in Victoria. The 5 largest employing industries in Victoria were Health Care and Social Assistance, Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Retail Trade, Education and Training and Construction. Together these 5 industries accounted for 54% of all employment.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 3.0% to stand at 604,200
- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services rose by 9.1% to stand at 390,700
- Retail Trade rose by 2.6% to stand at 354,000.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in Victoria, 53% of workers were employed full-time; 76% were Female; and the median age of the workforce was 41. Around 76% of employed persons in this industry were located in Greater Melbourne.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024

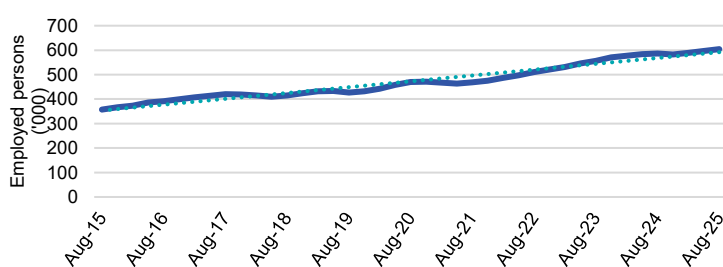

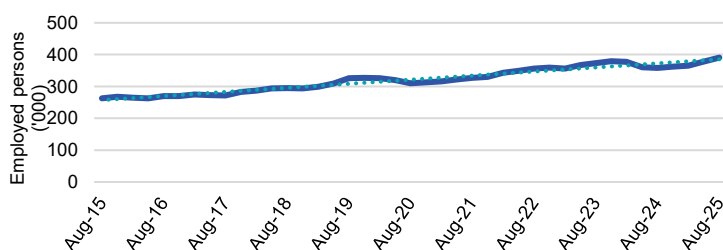

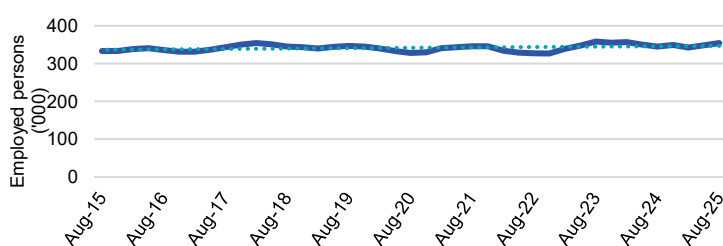

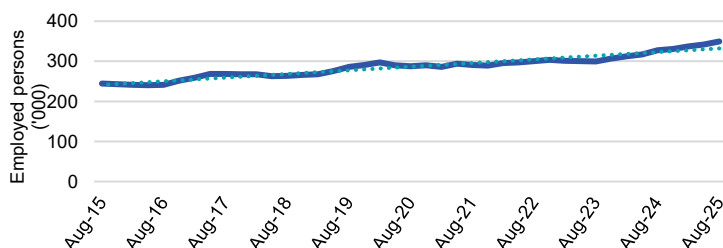

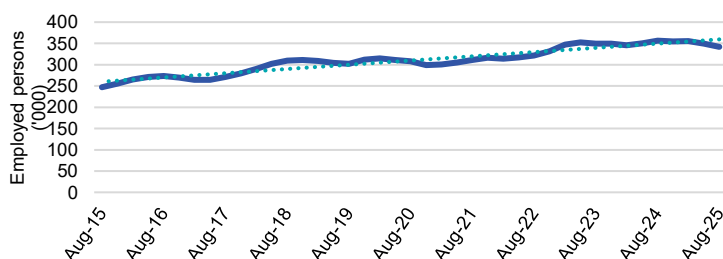

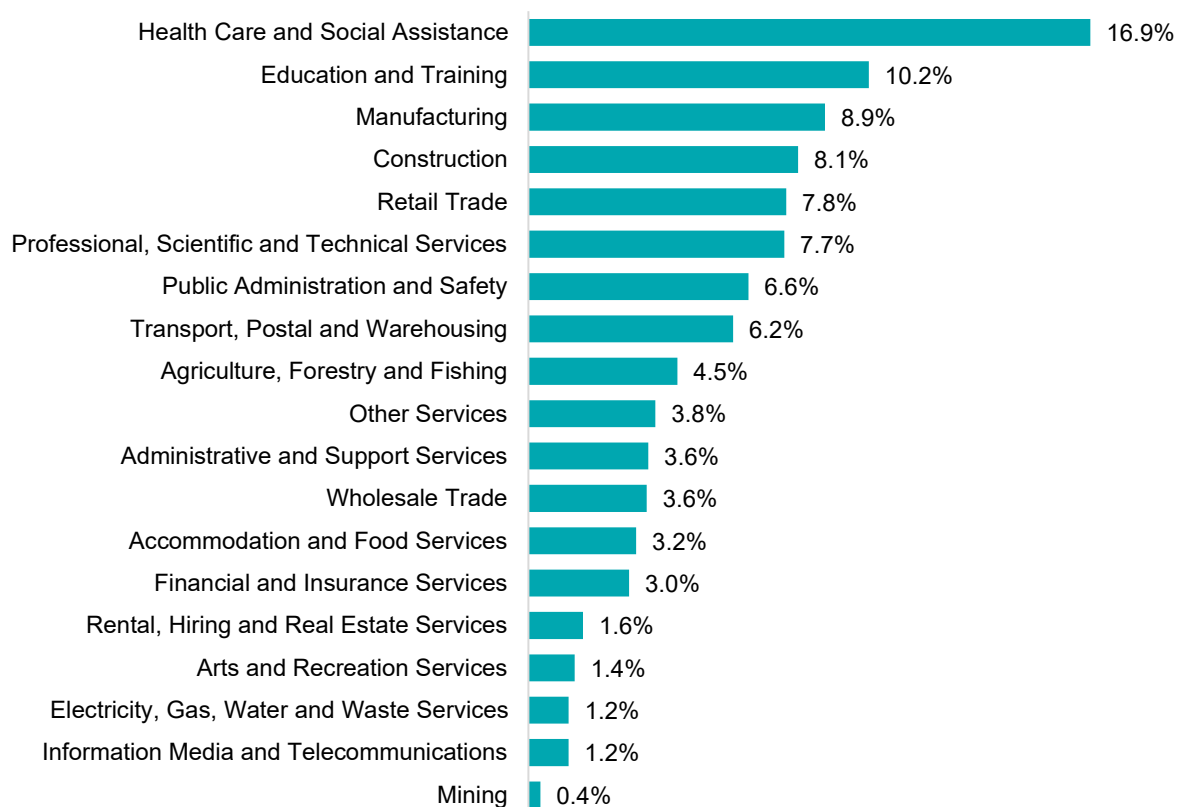

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



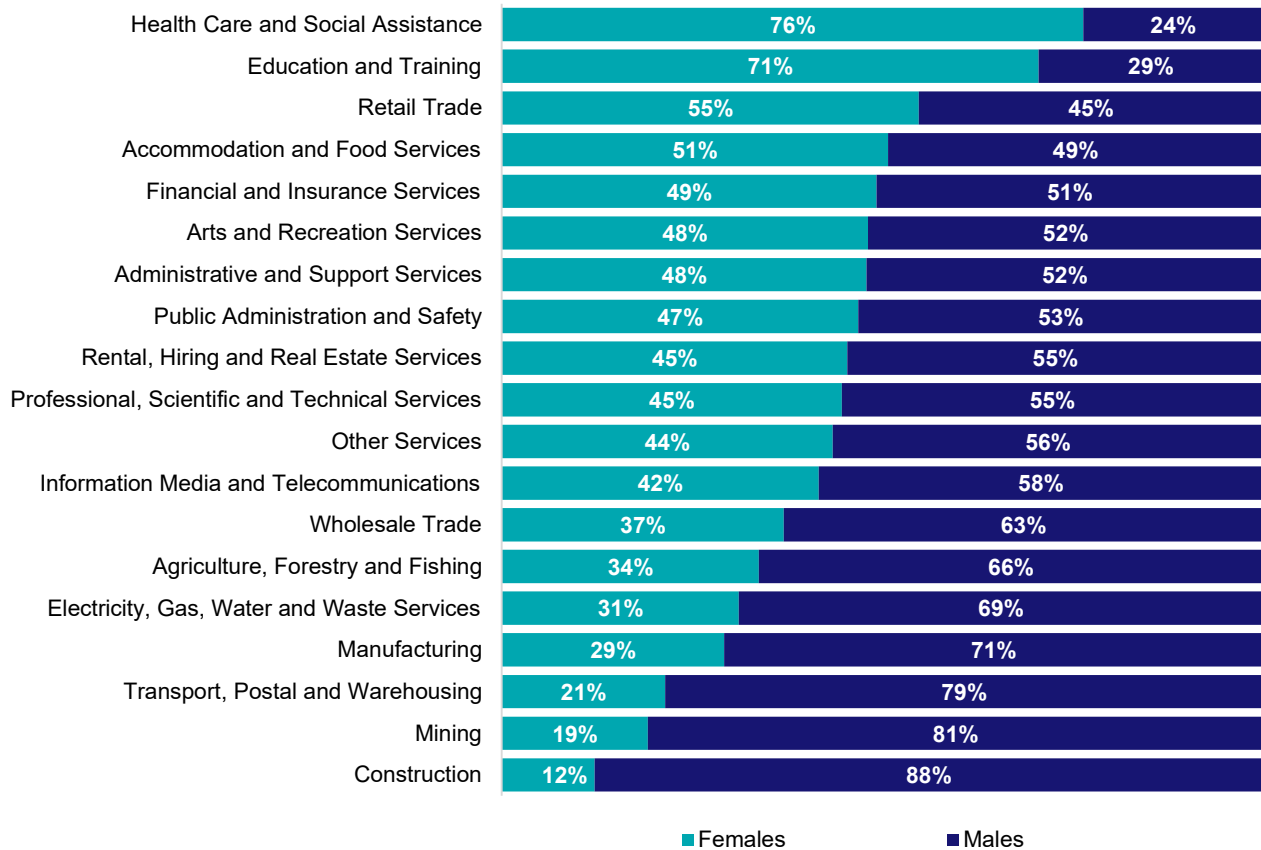

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



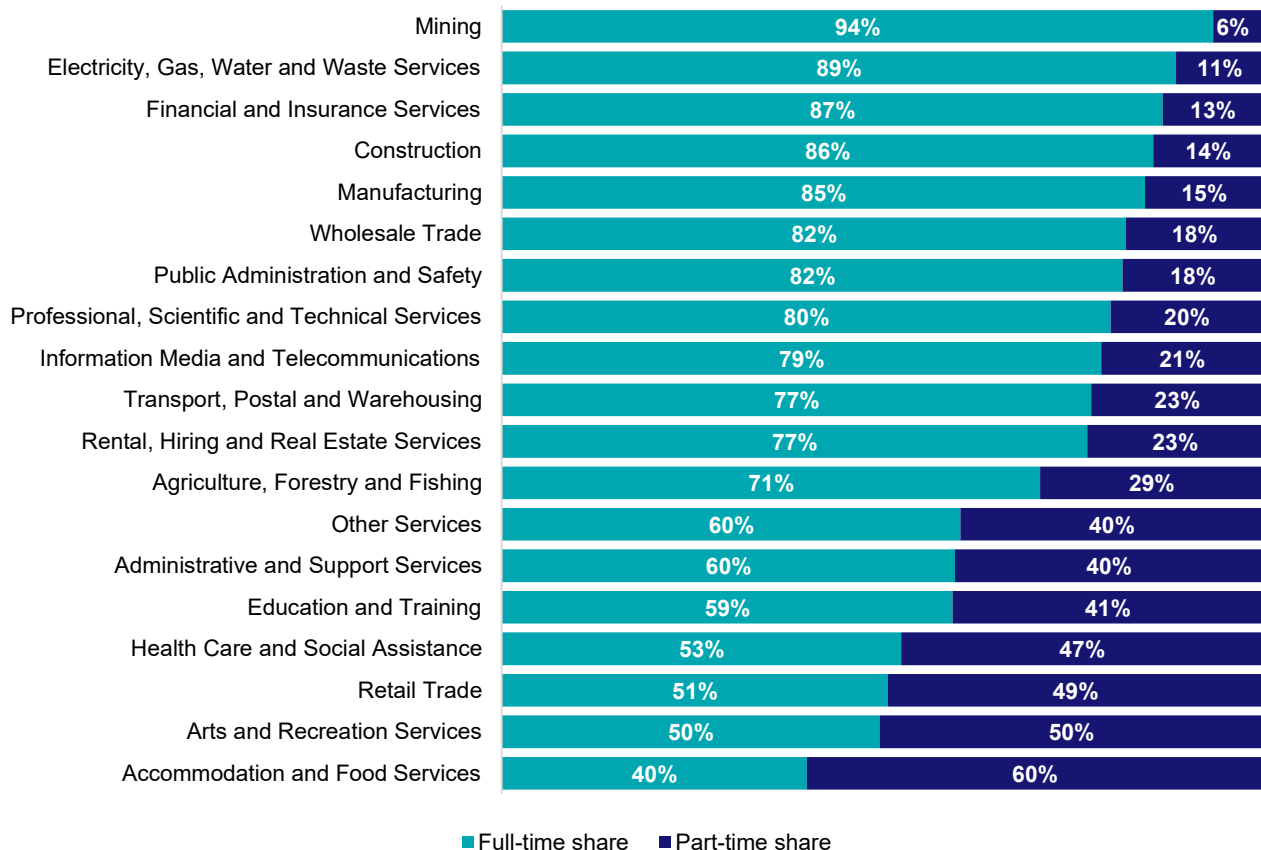

Overview

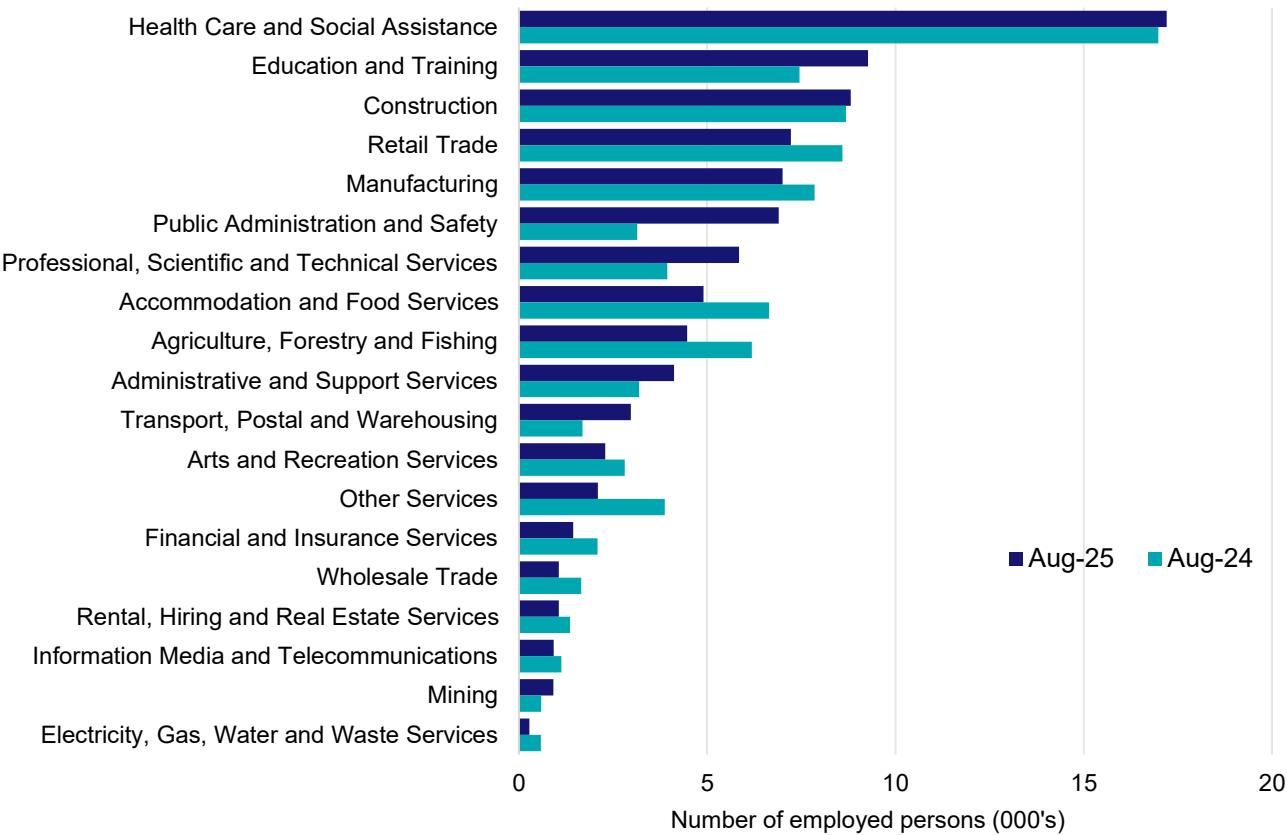
In August 2025, there were around 88,800 people employed in the Ballarat Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Construction, Retail Trade, and Manufacturing. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 1.3% to stand at 17,200
- Education and Training rose by 24.3% to stand at 9,300
- Construction rose by 1.5% to stand at 8,800.

In Health Care and Social Assistance in the Ballarat Employment Region, 59% of workers were employed full-time; 81% were female; and the median age of the workforce was 44.

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



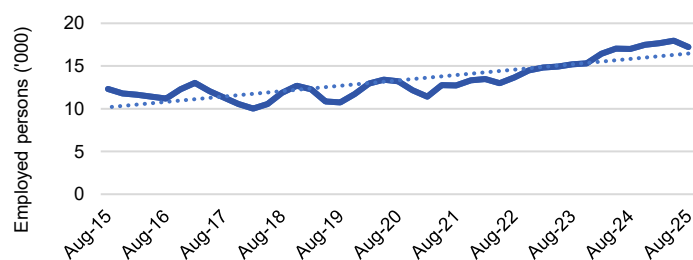

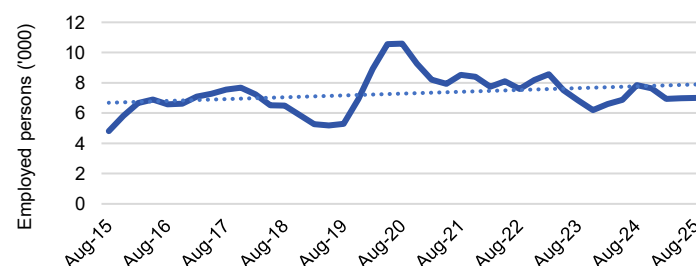

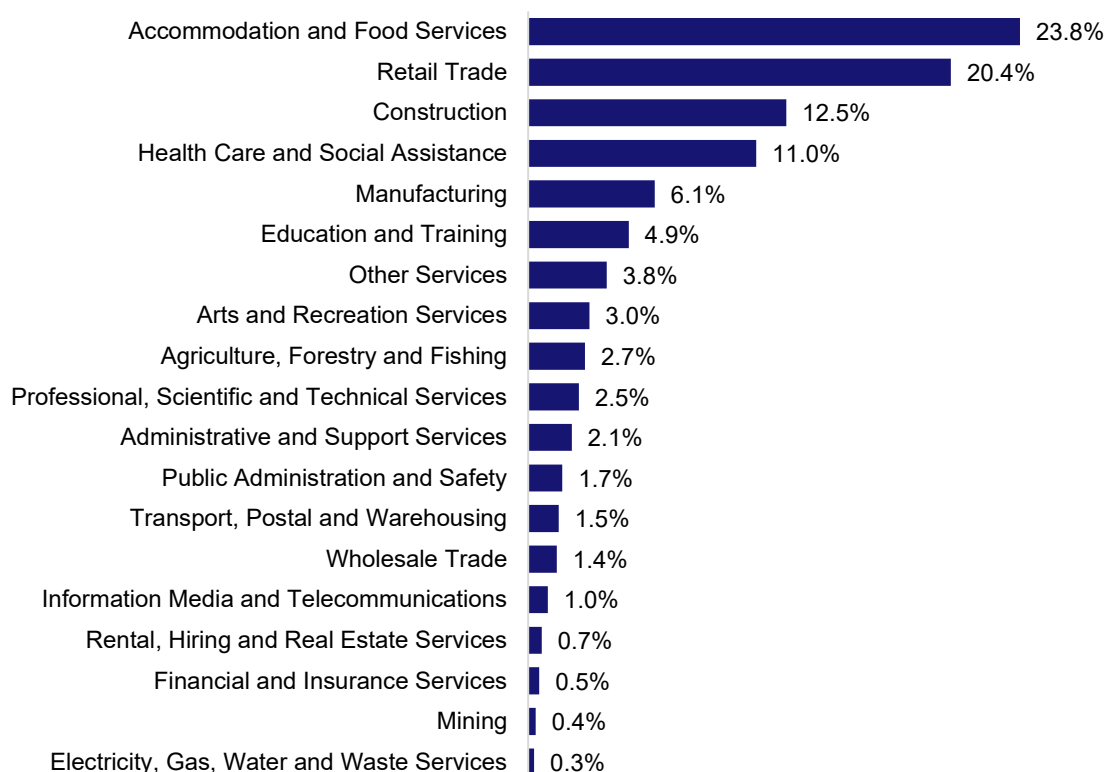

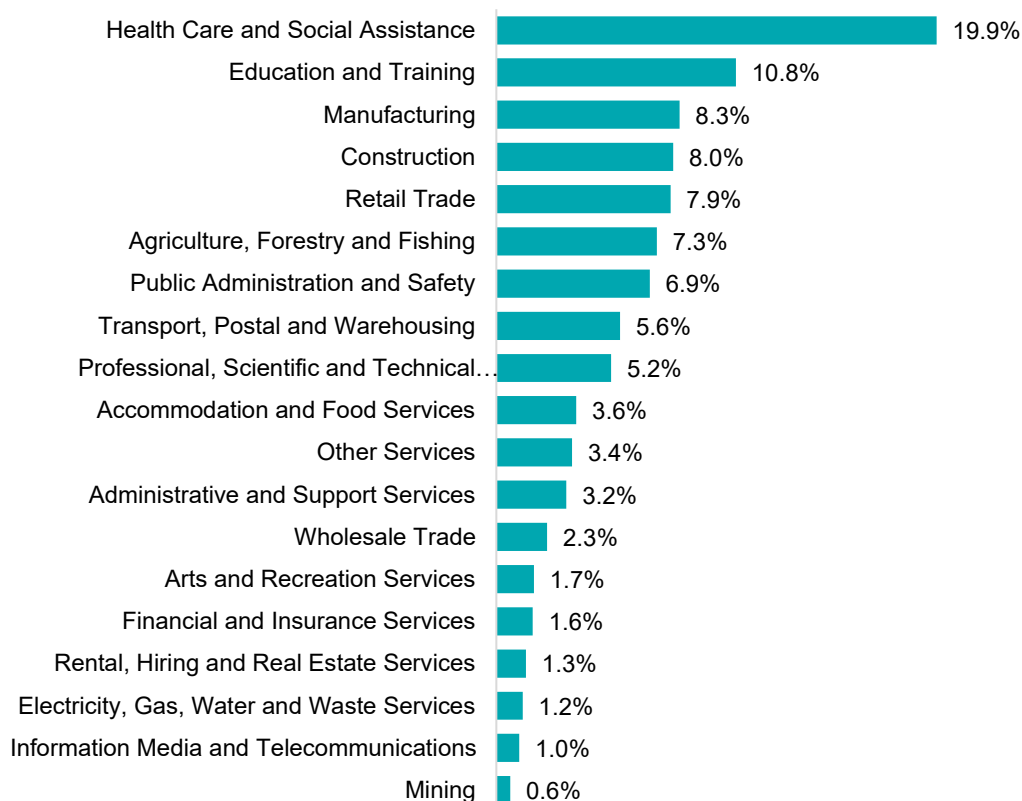

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



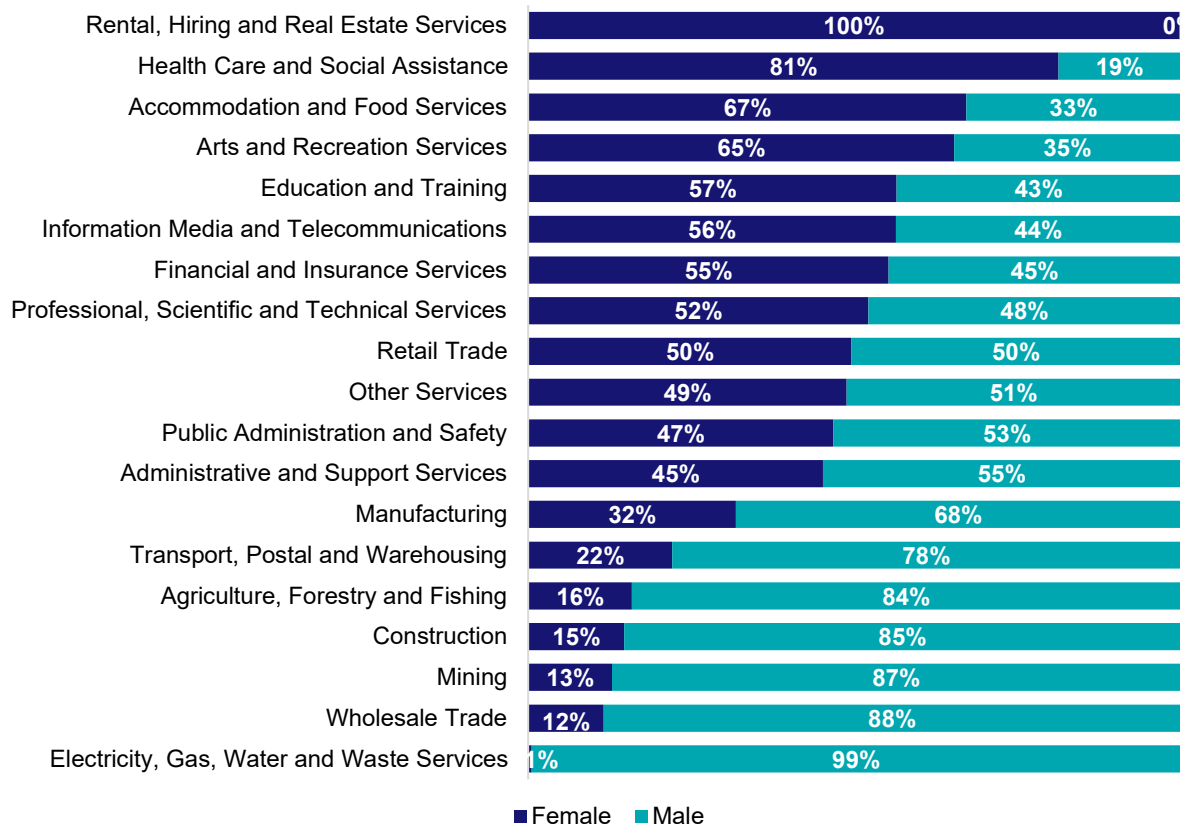

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



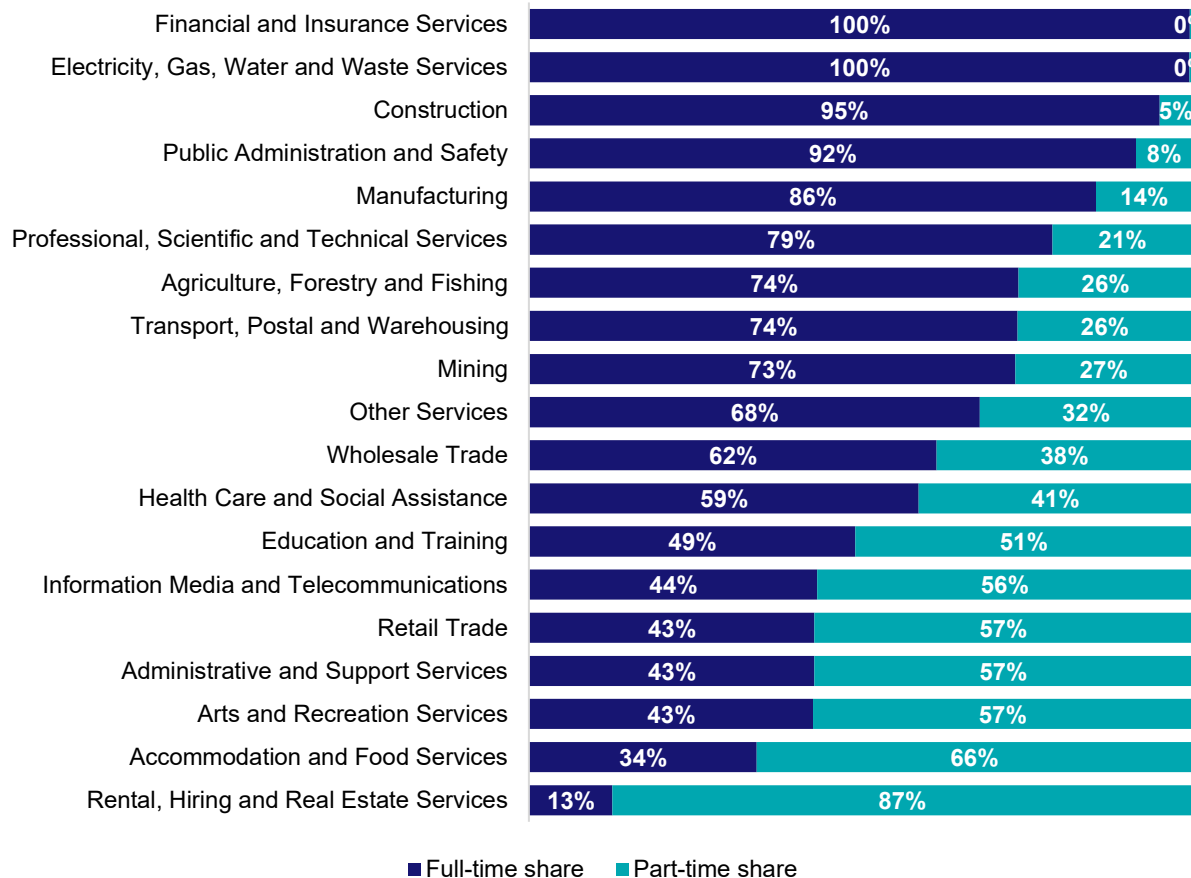

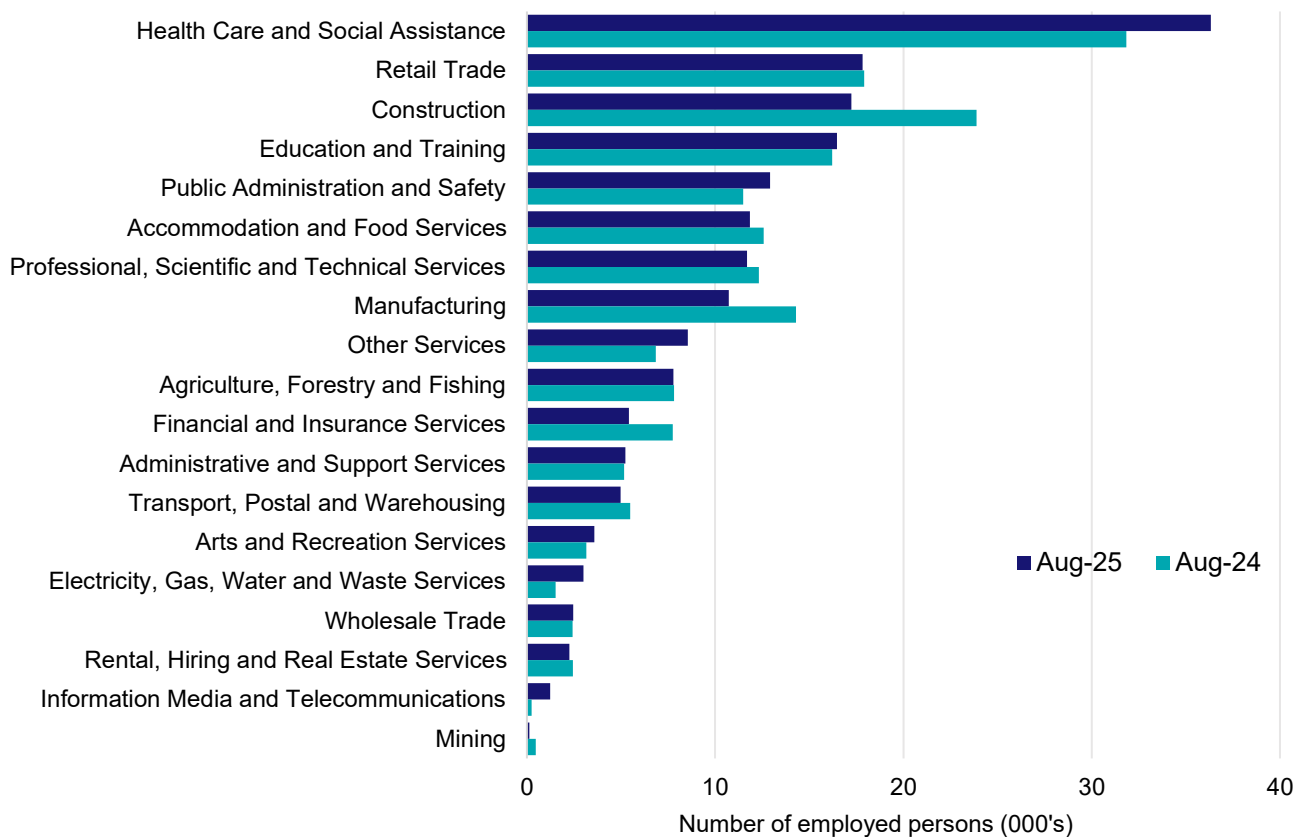

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



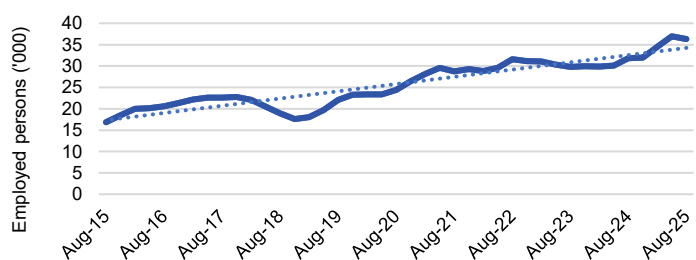

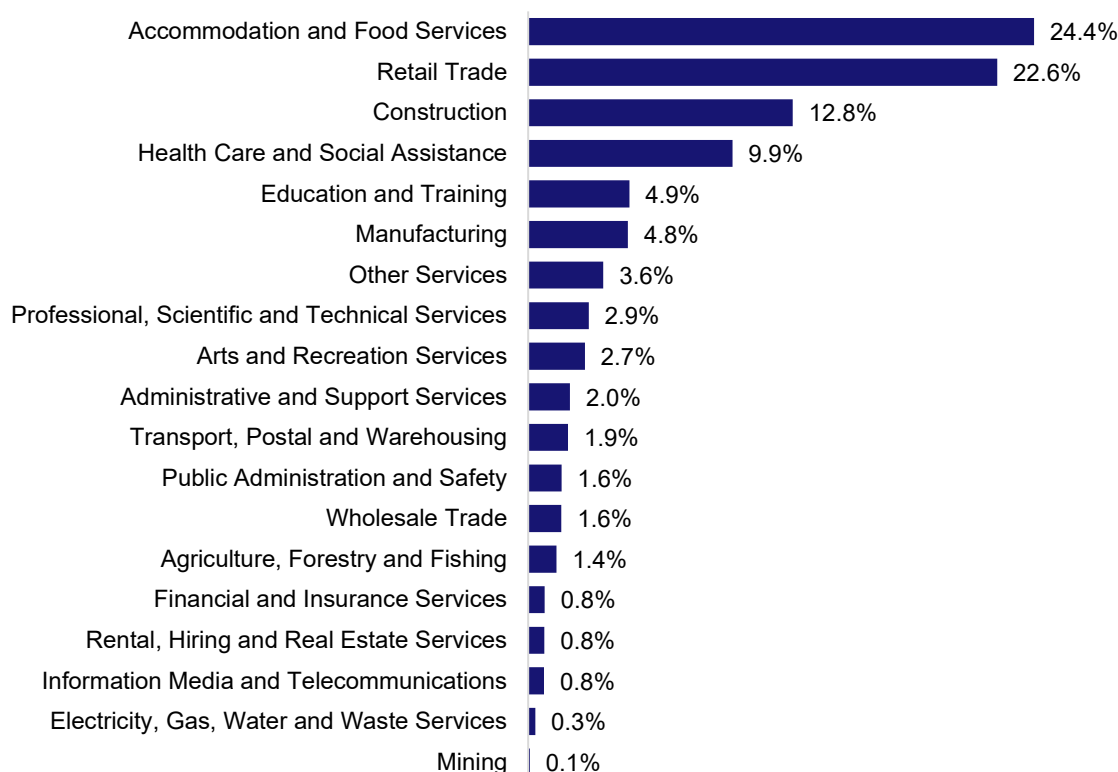

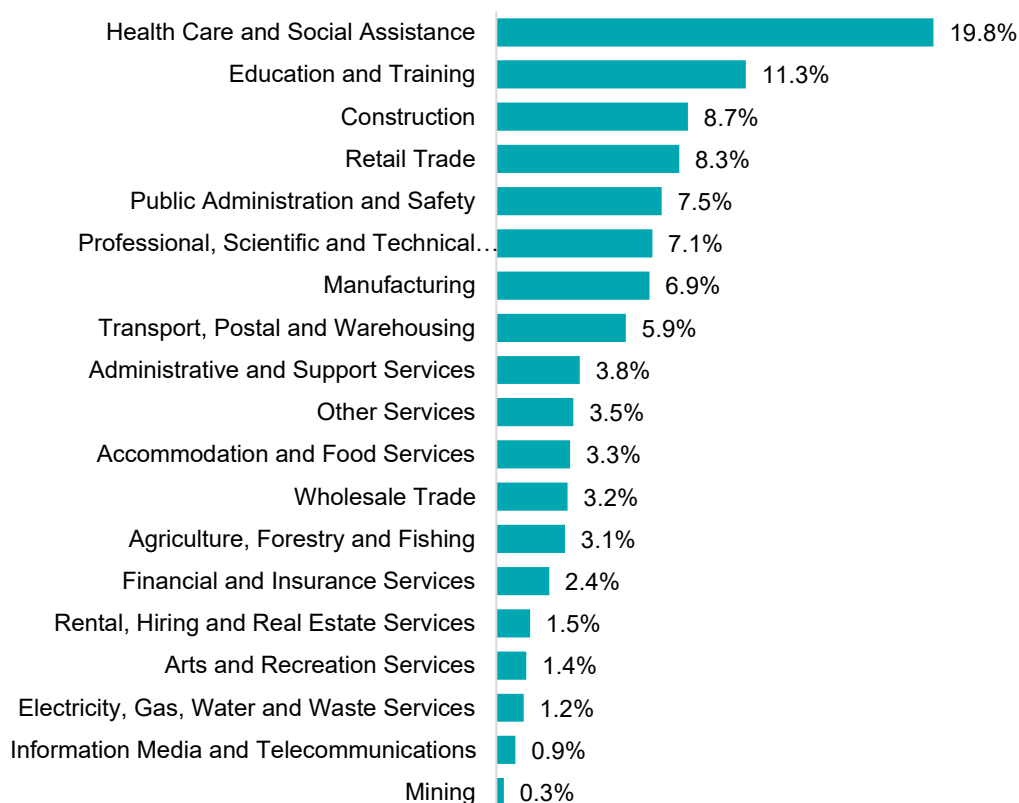

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



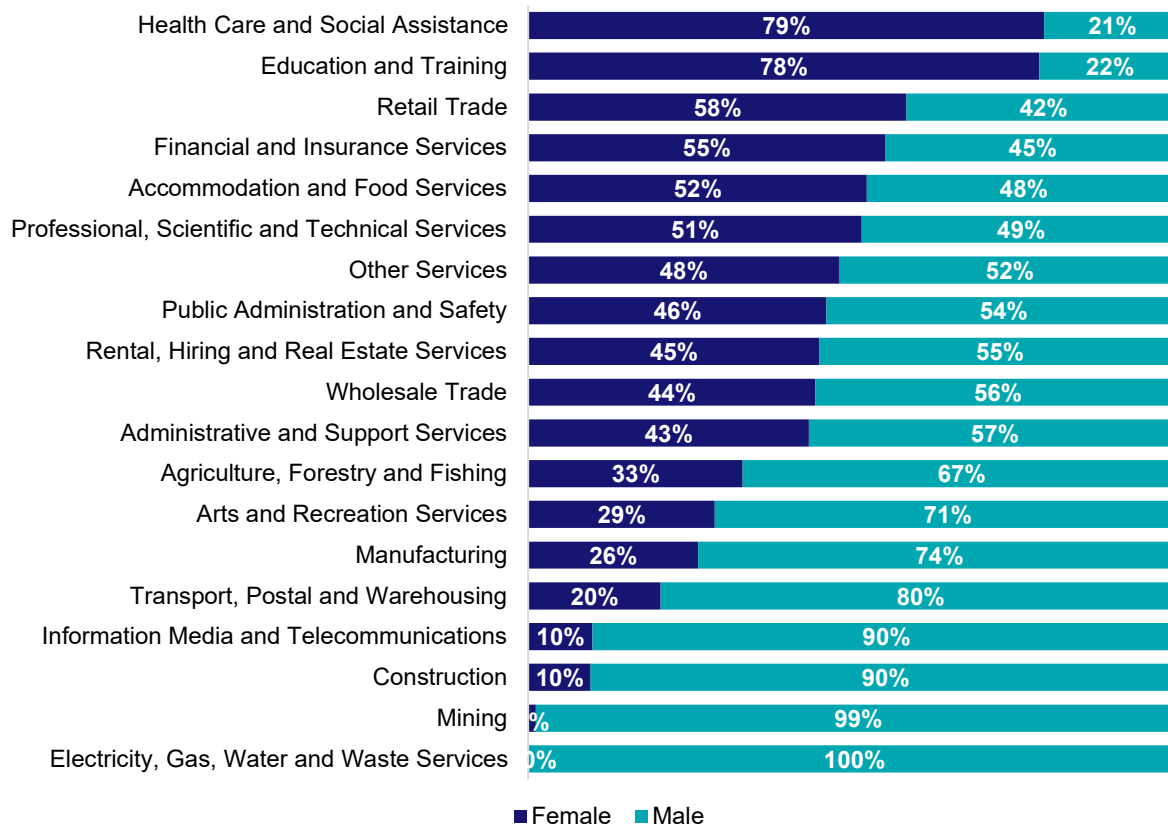

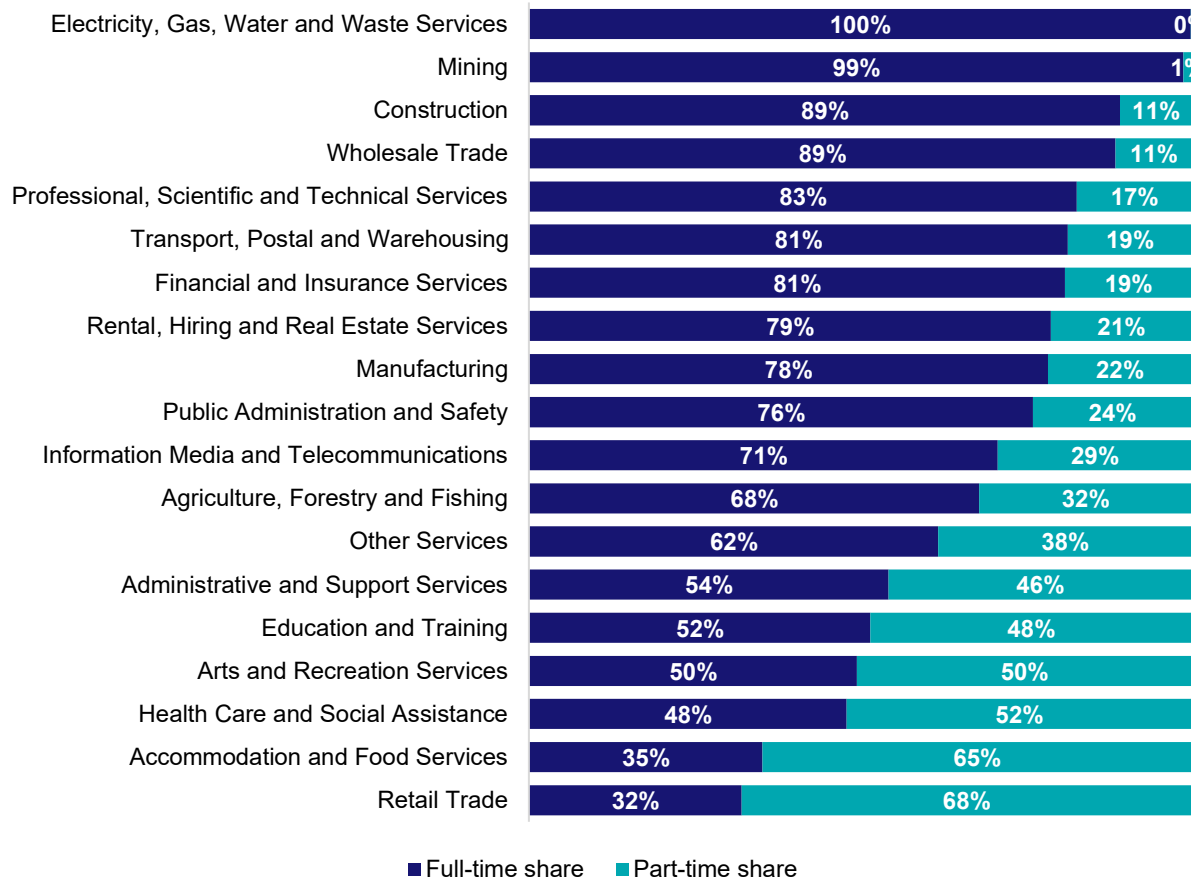

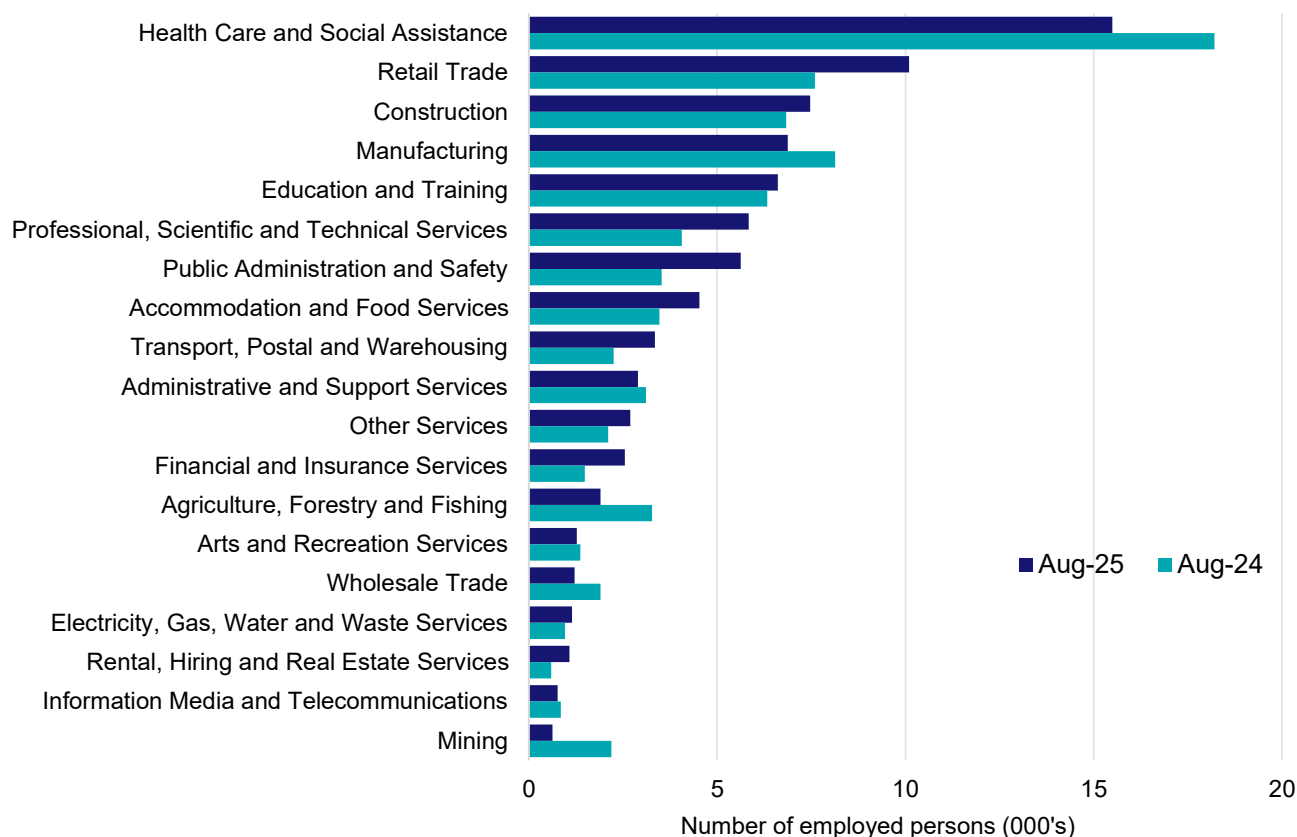

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



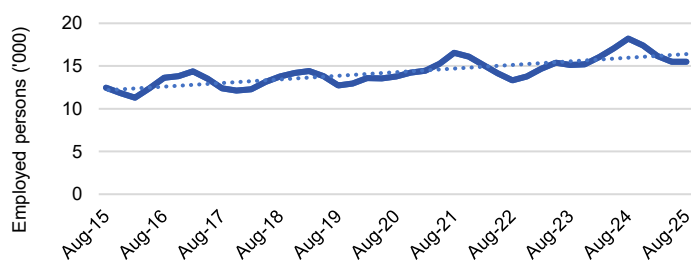

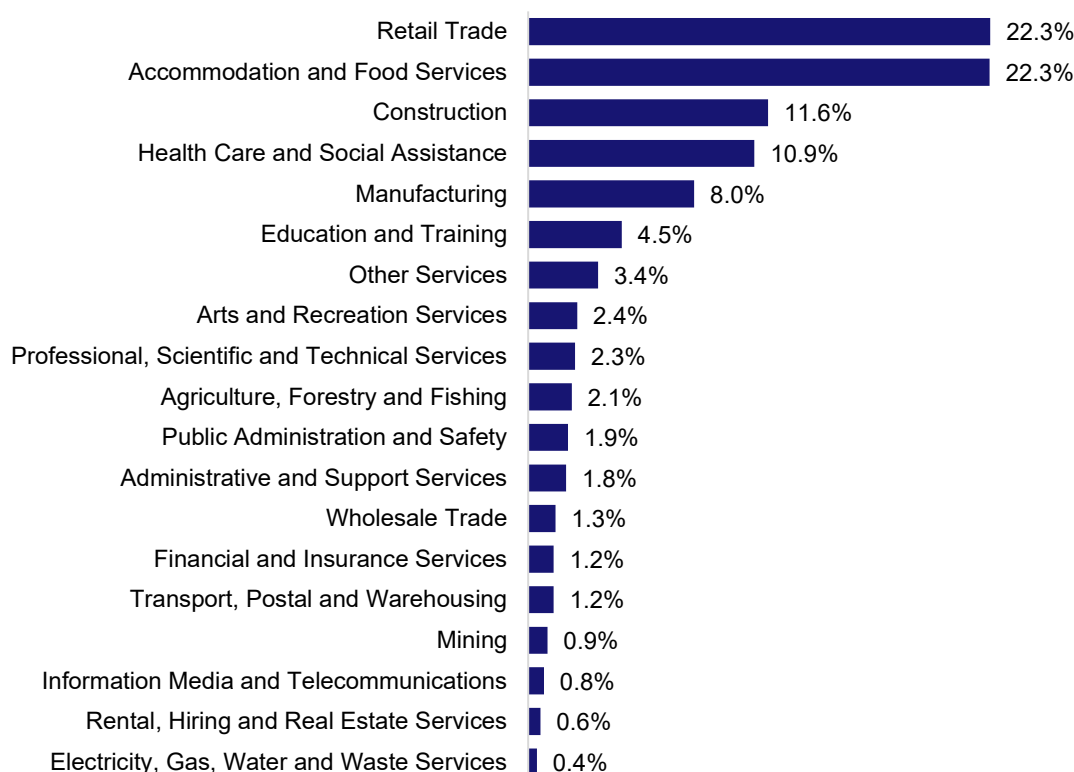

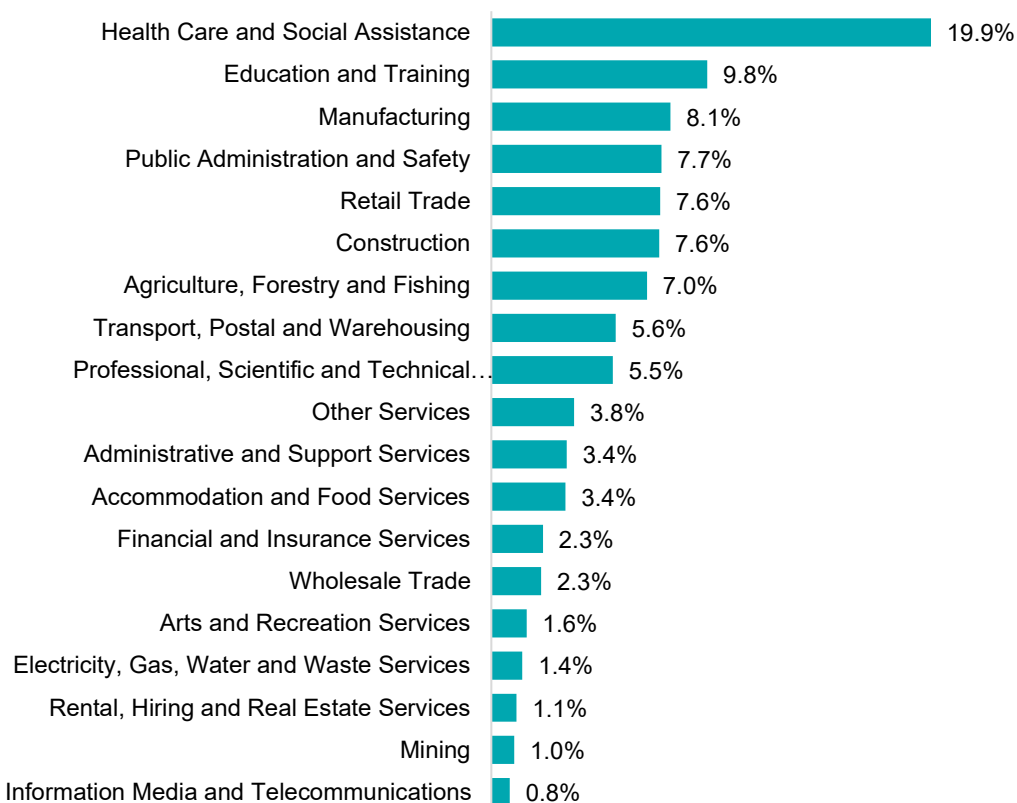

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



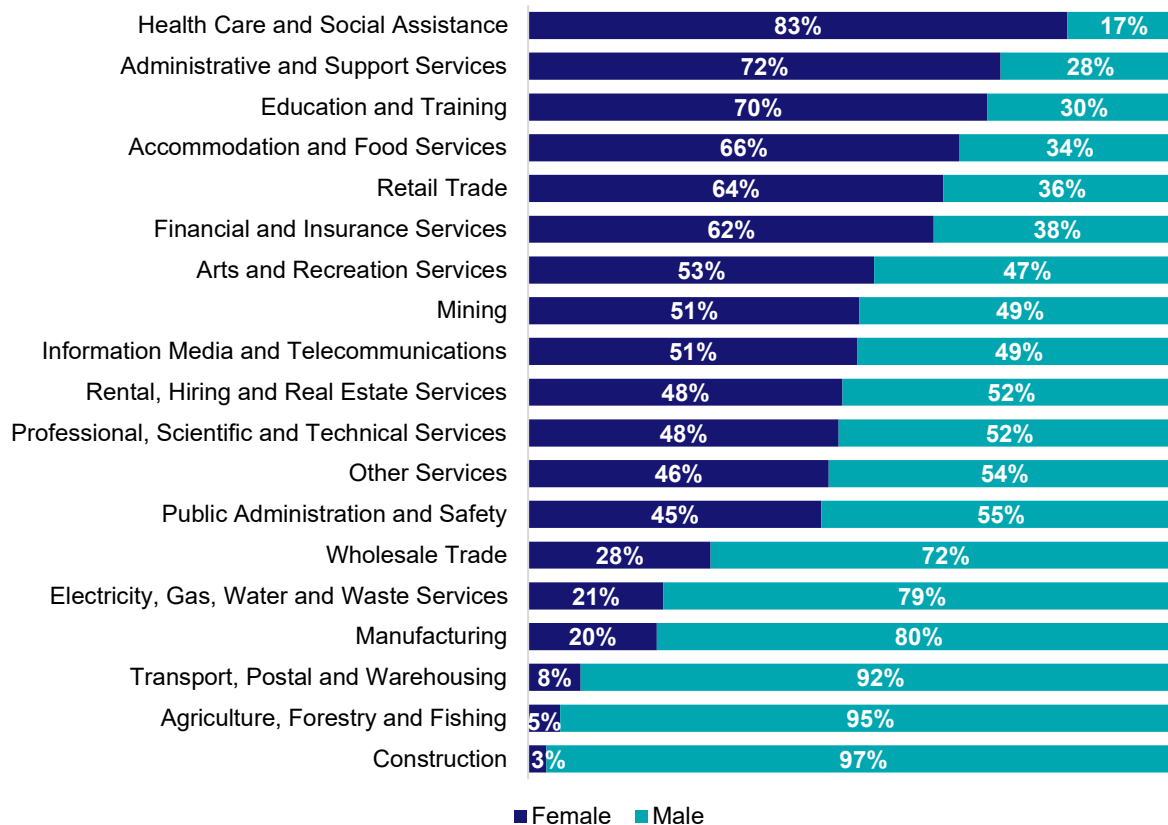

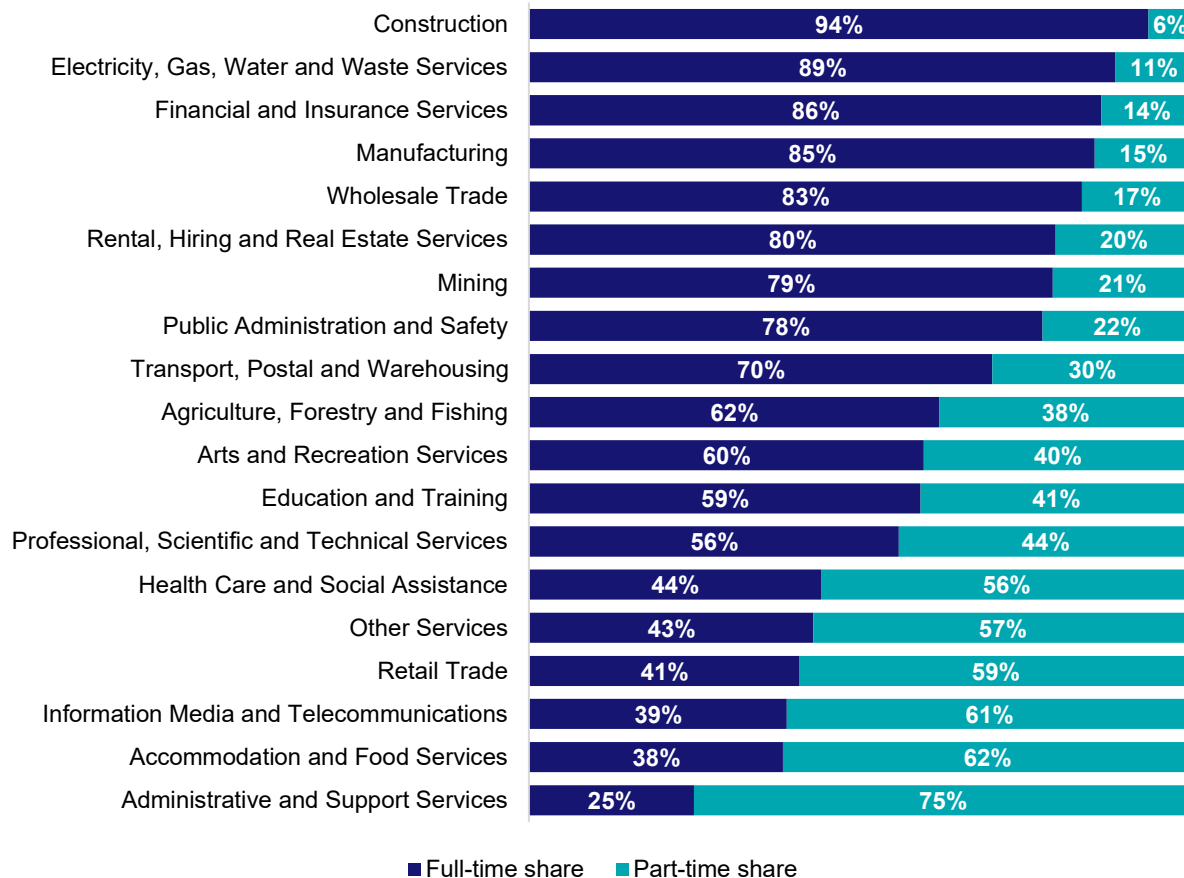

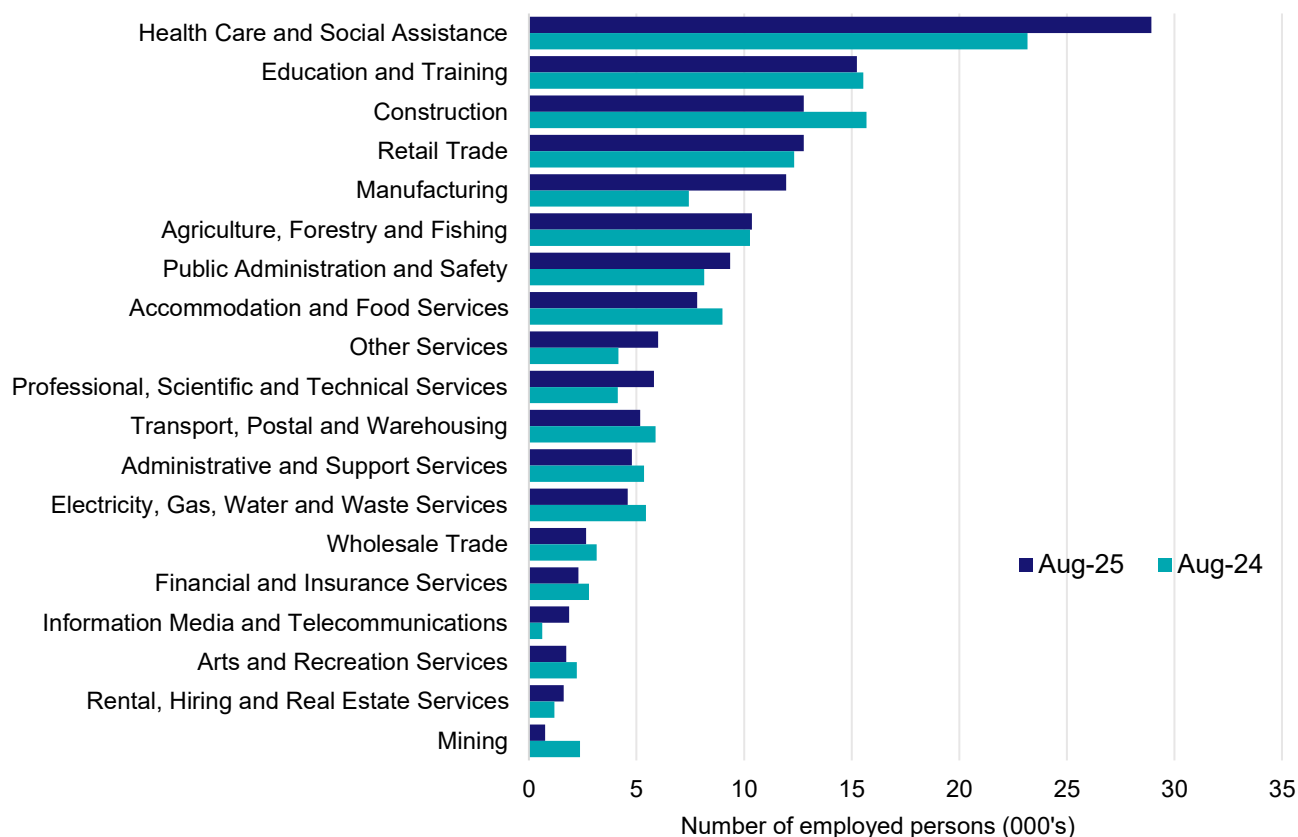

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



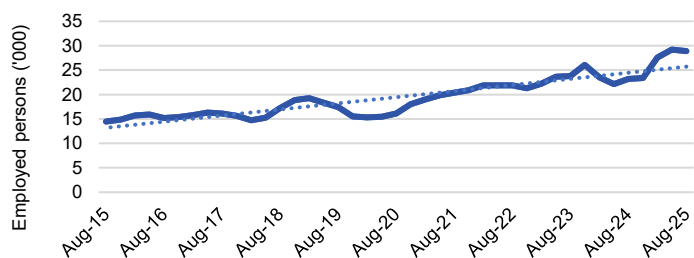

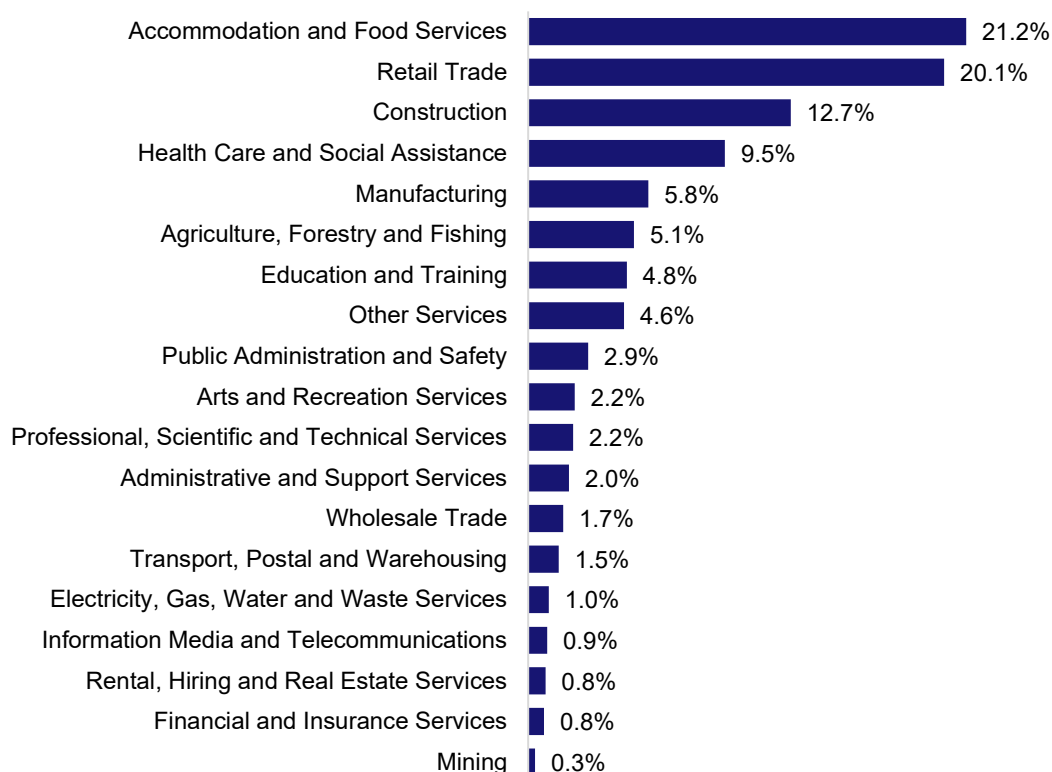

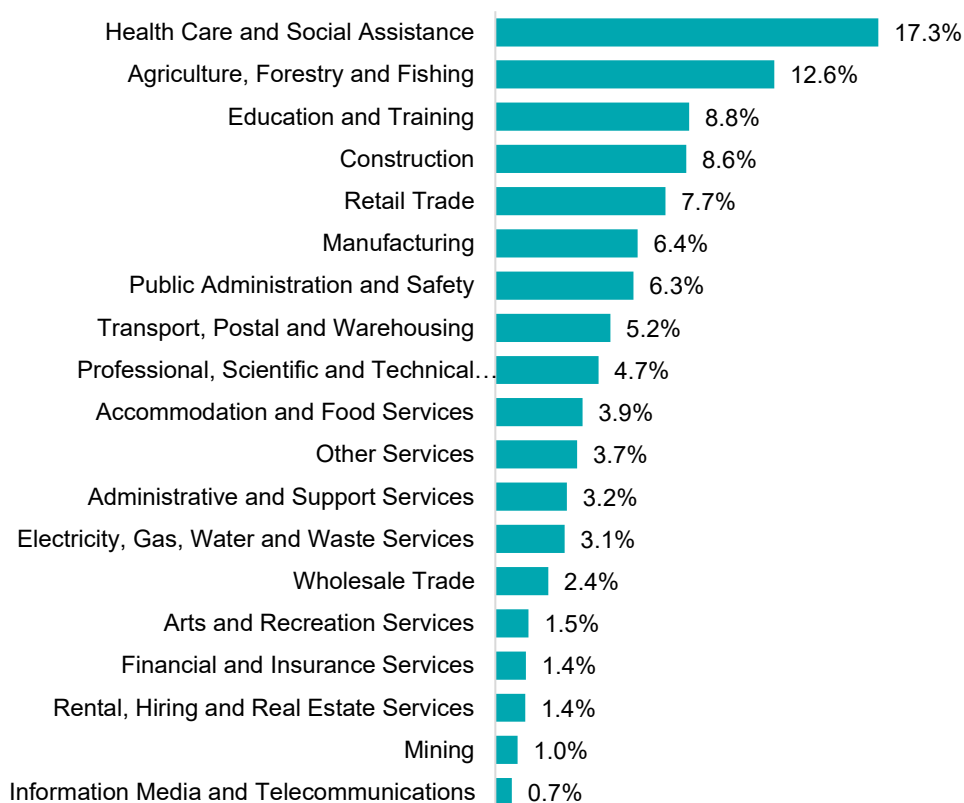

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



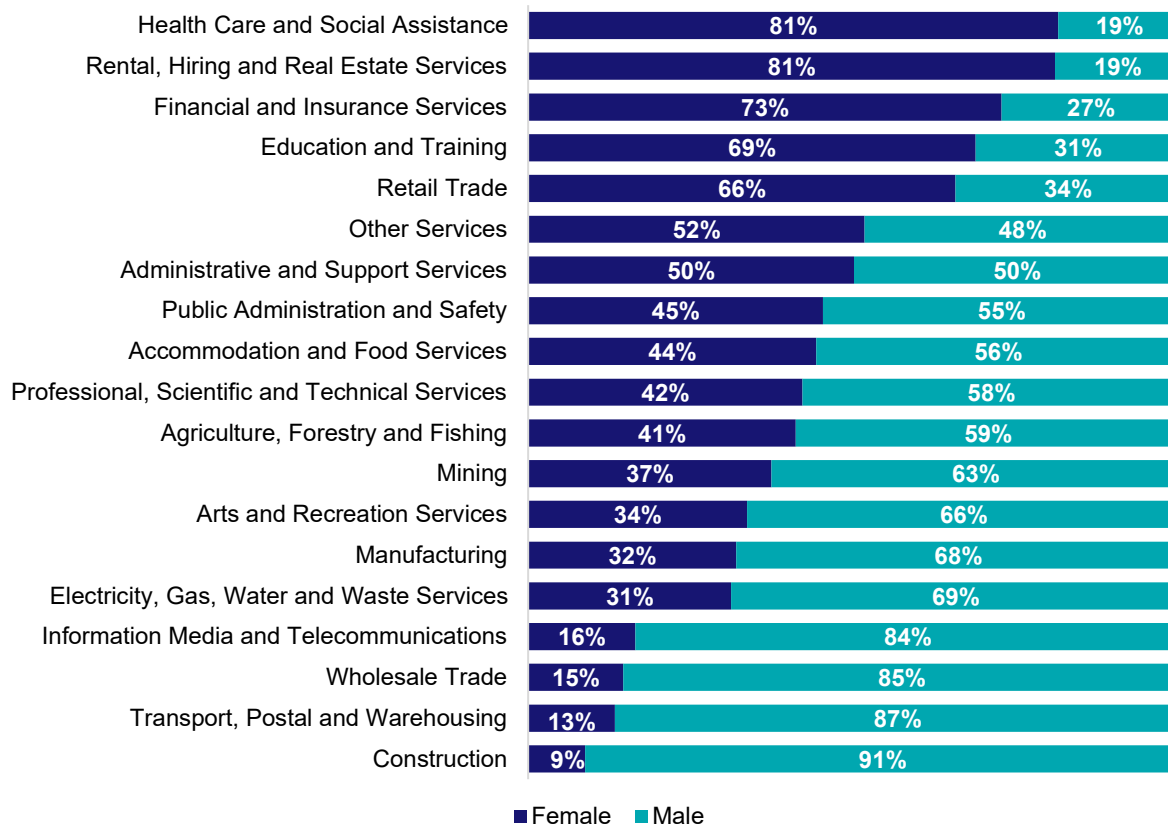

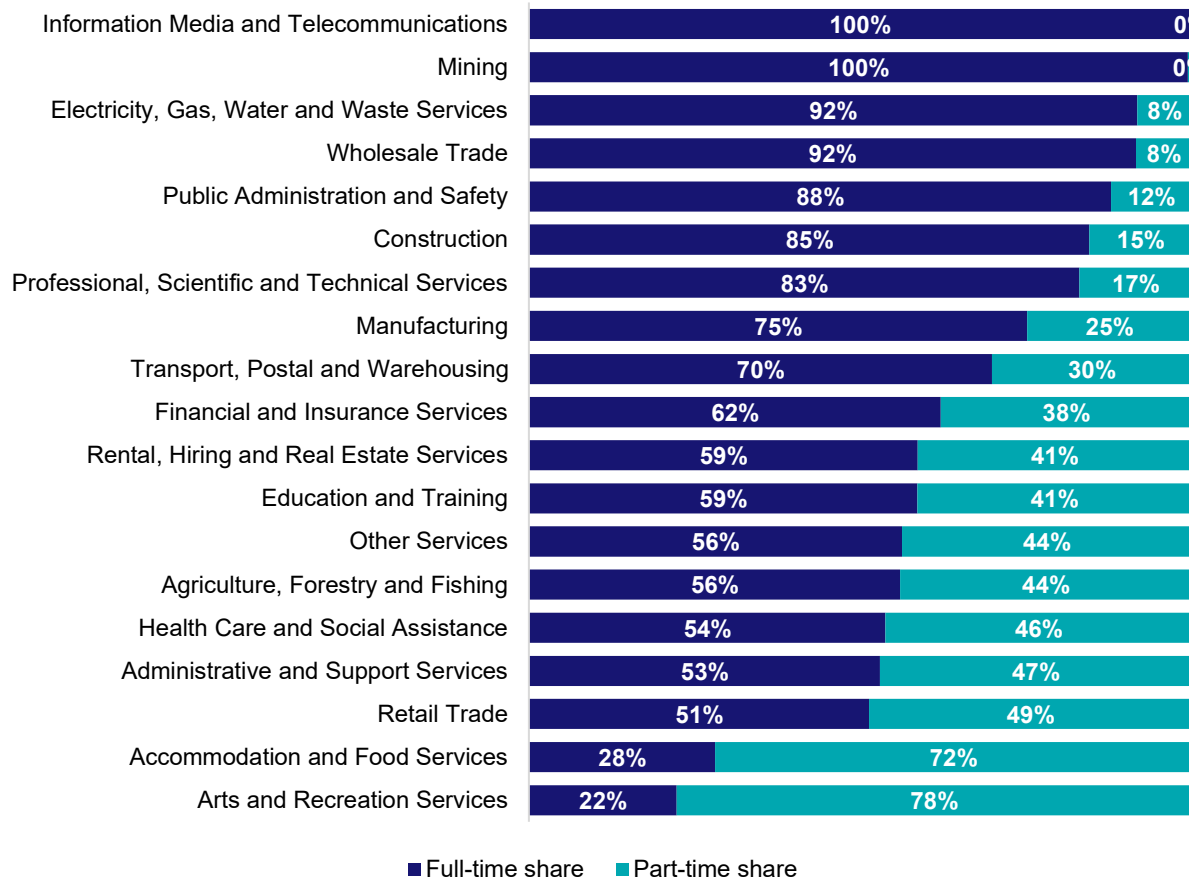

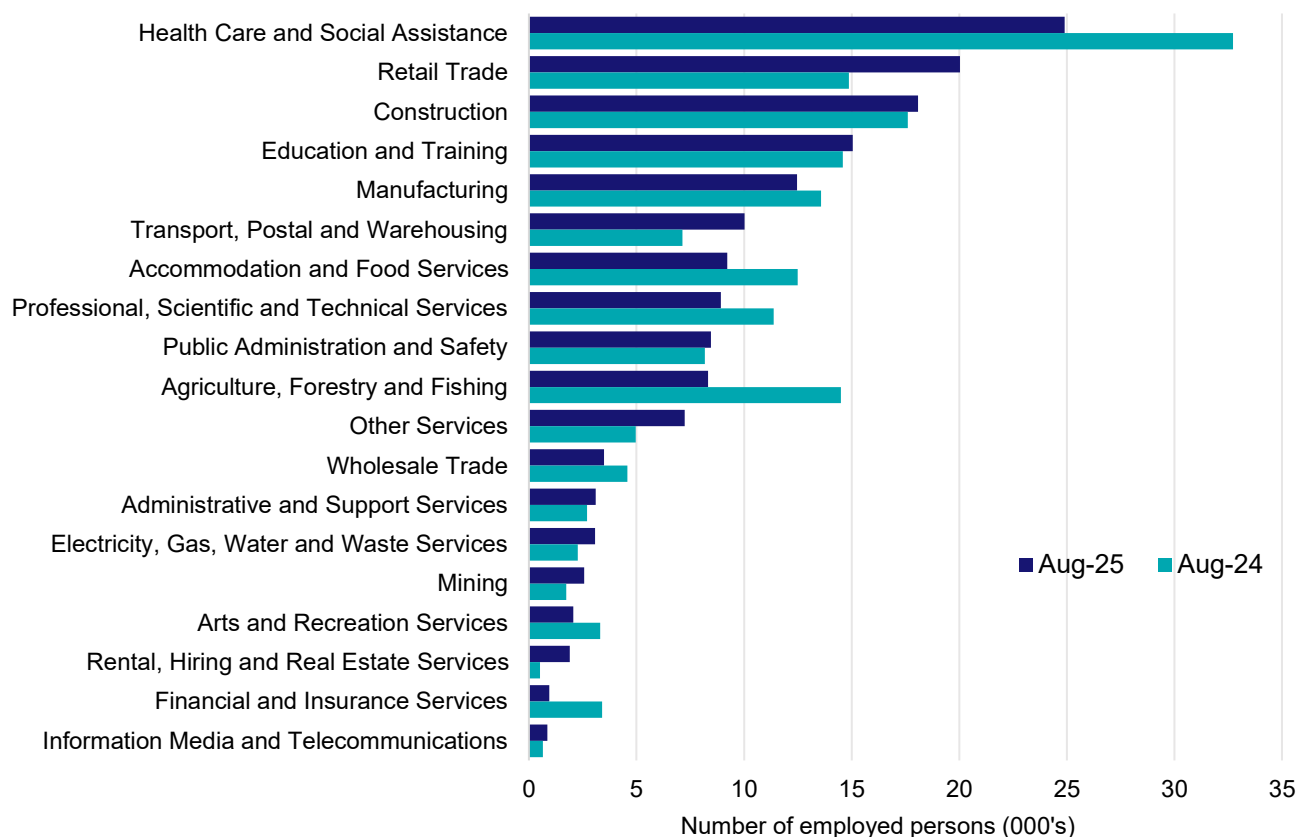

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



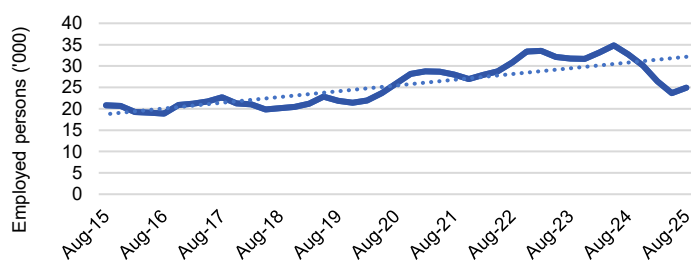

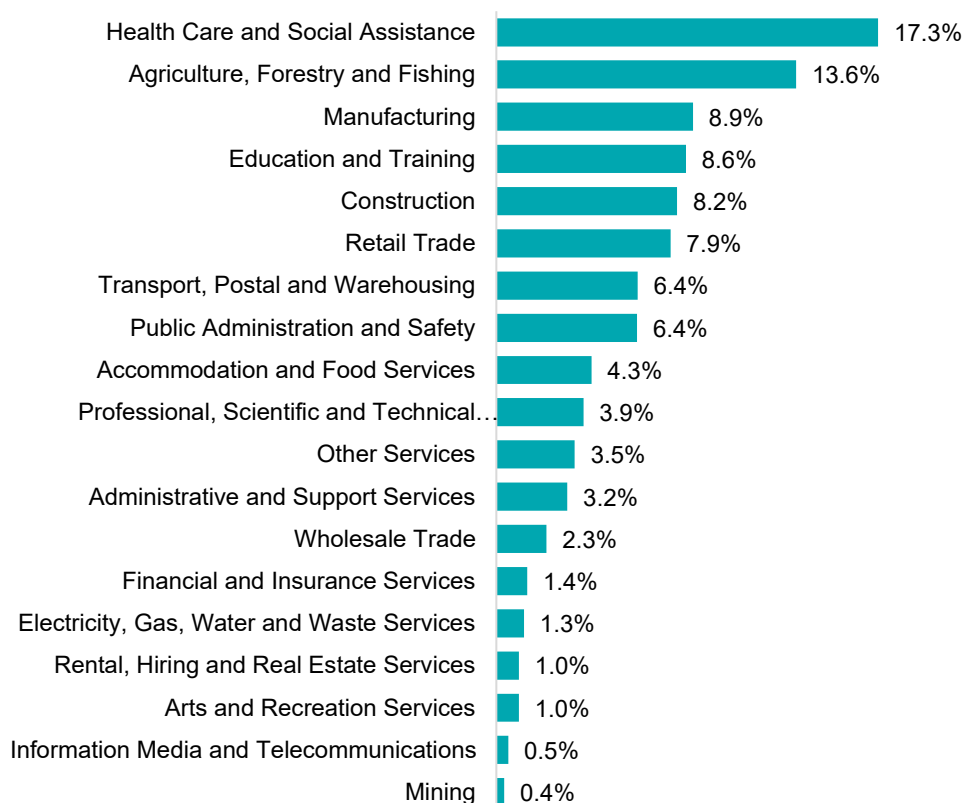

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



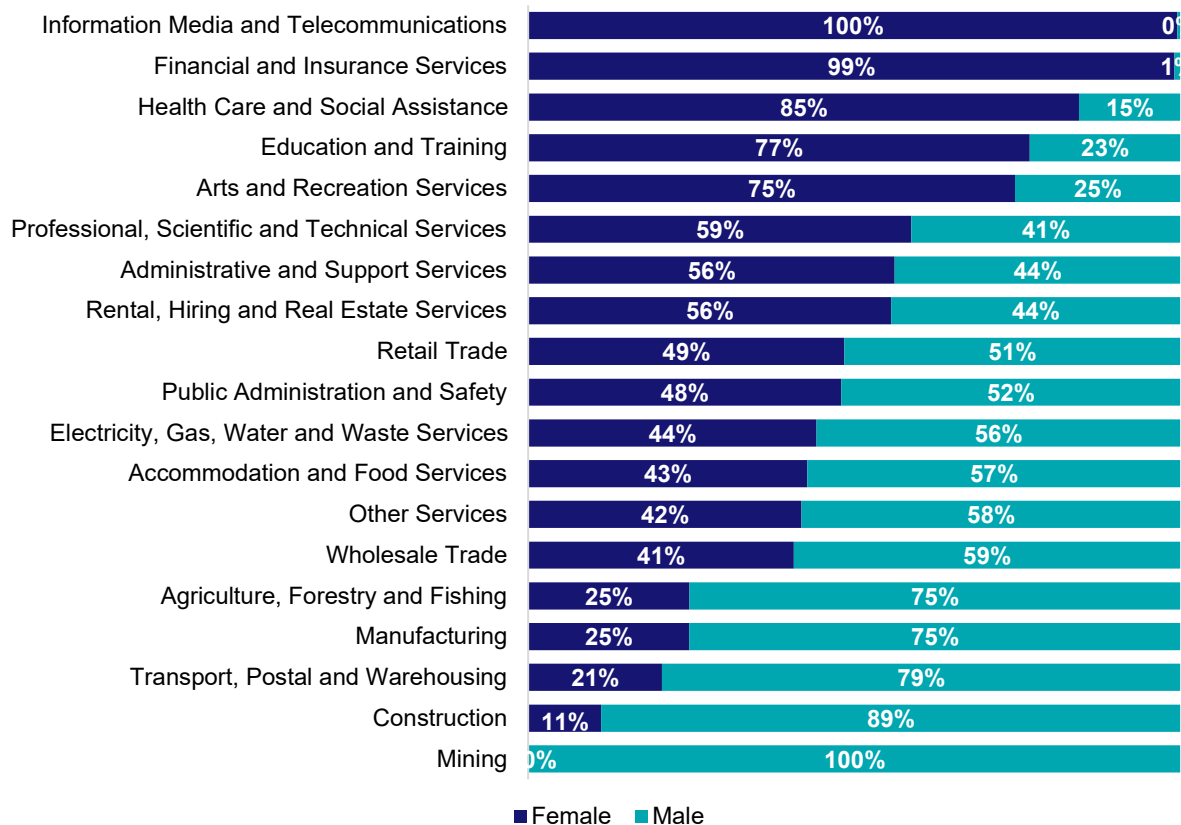

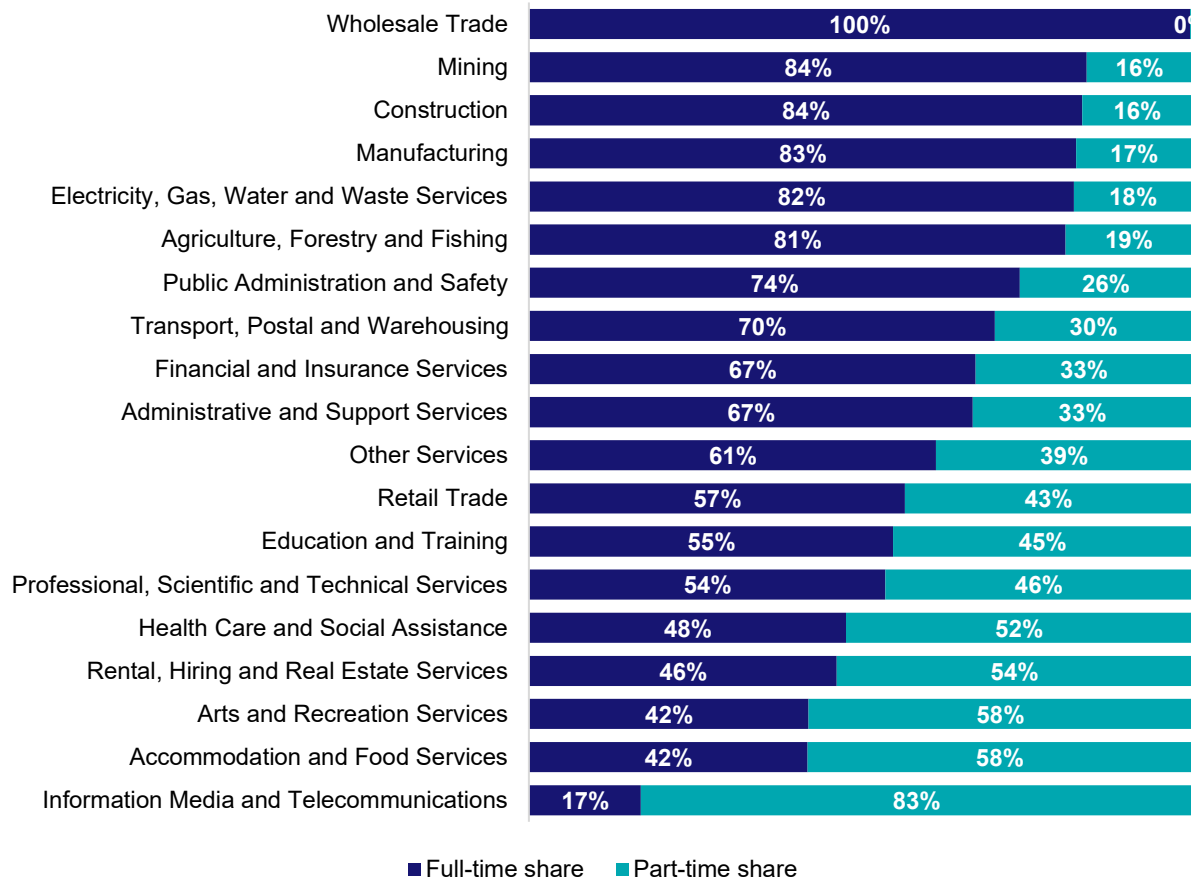

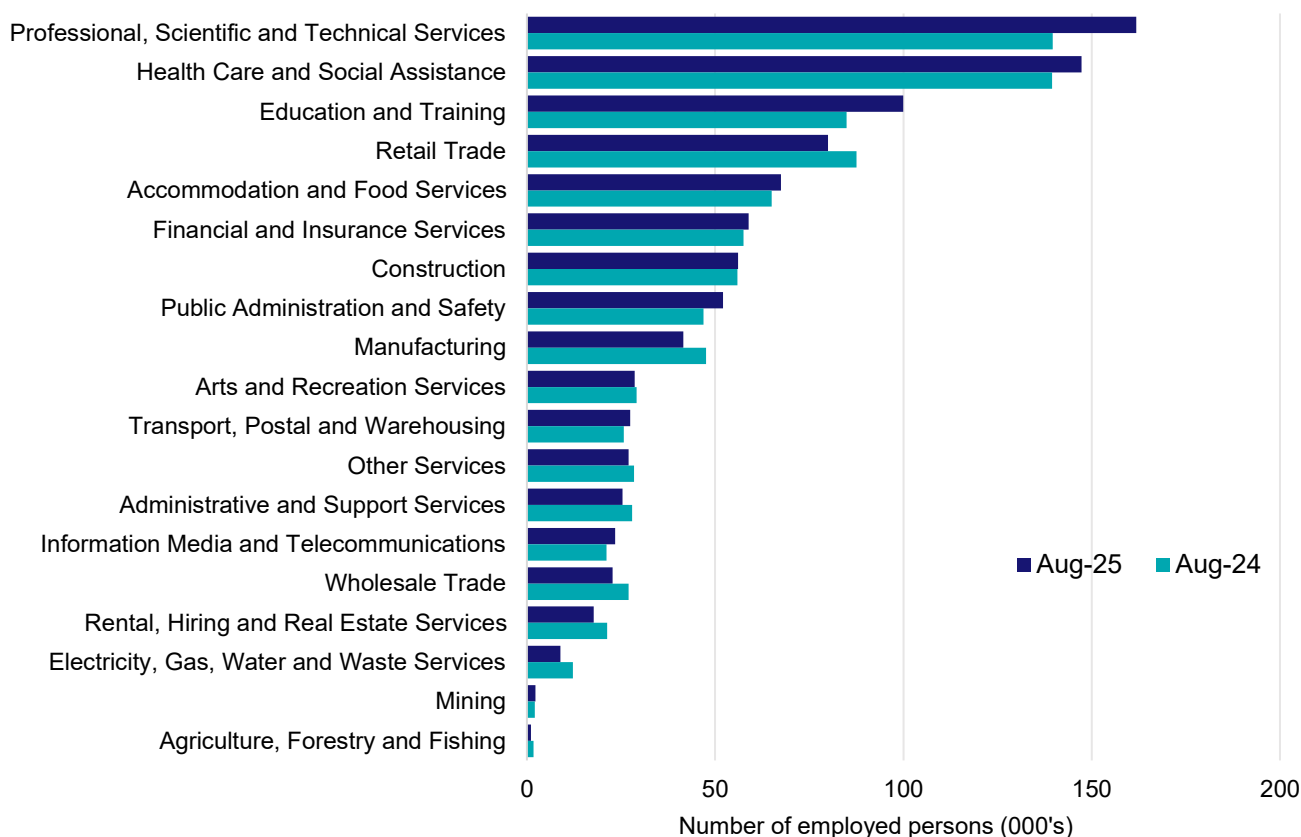

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



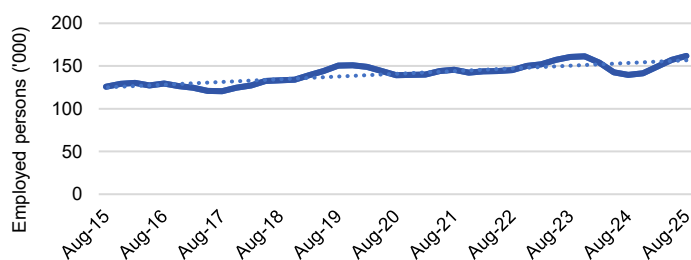

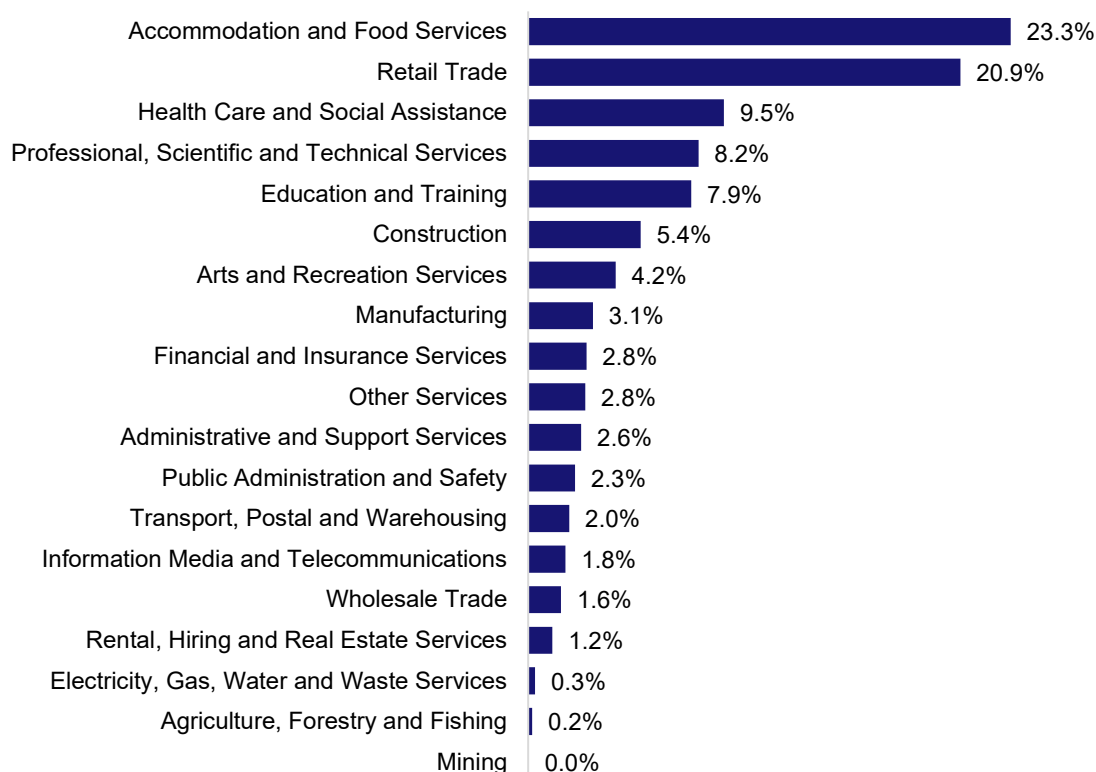

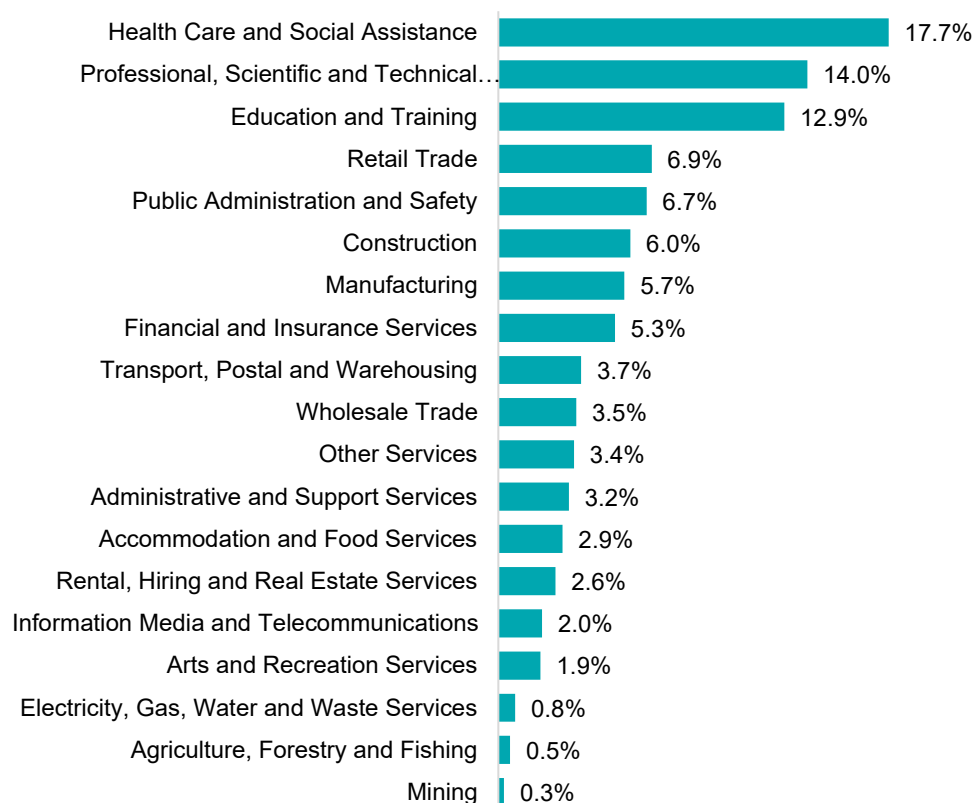

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



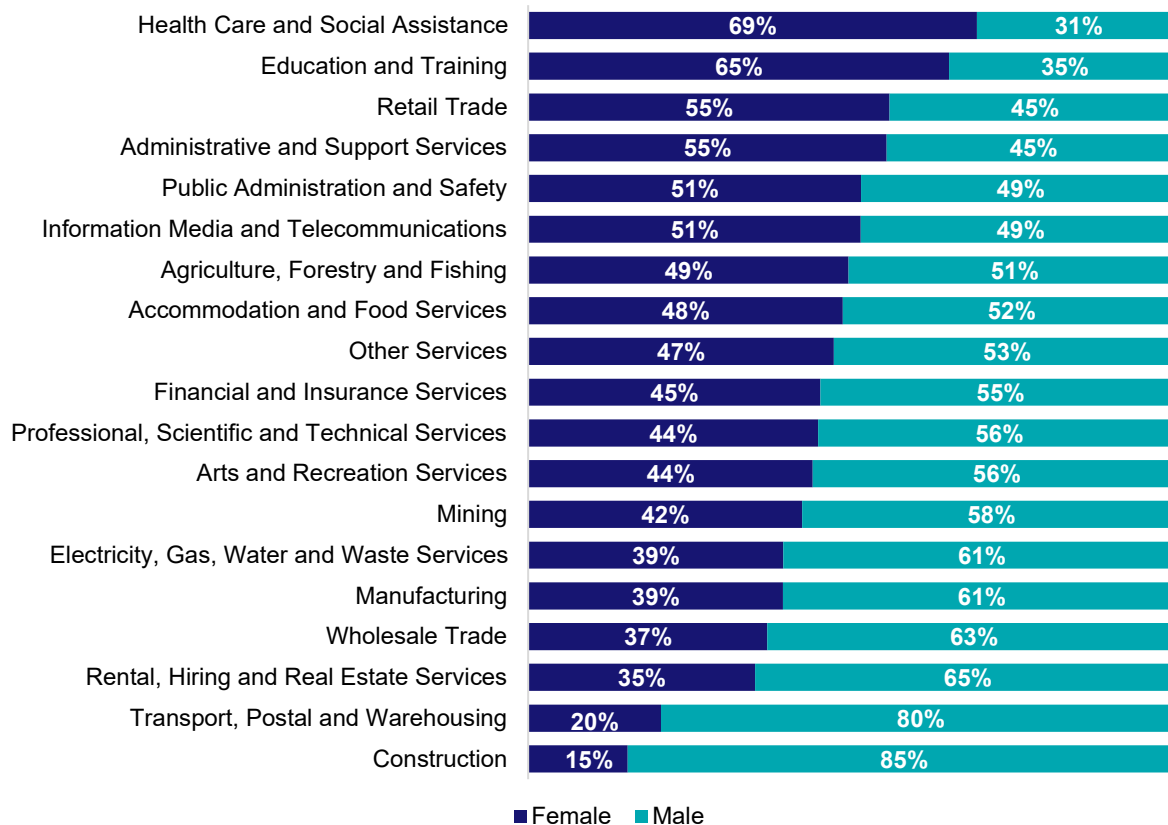

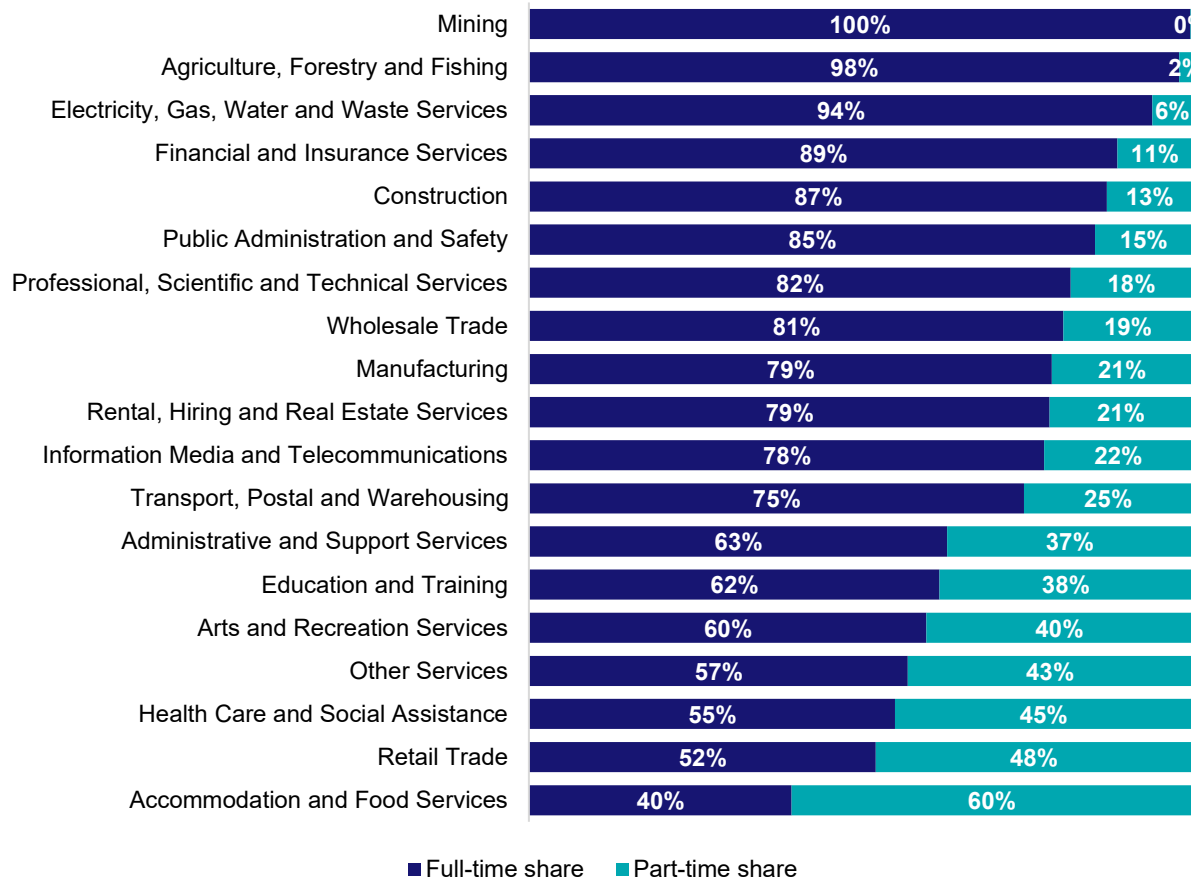

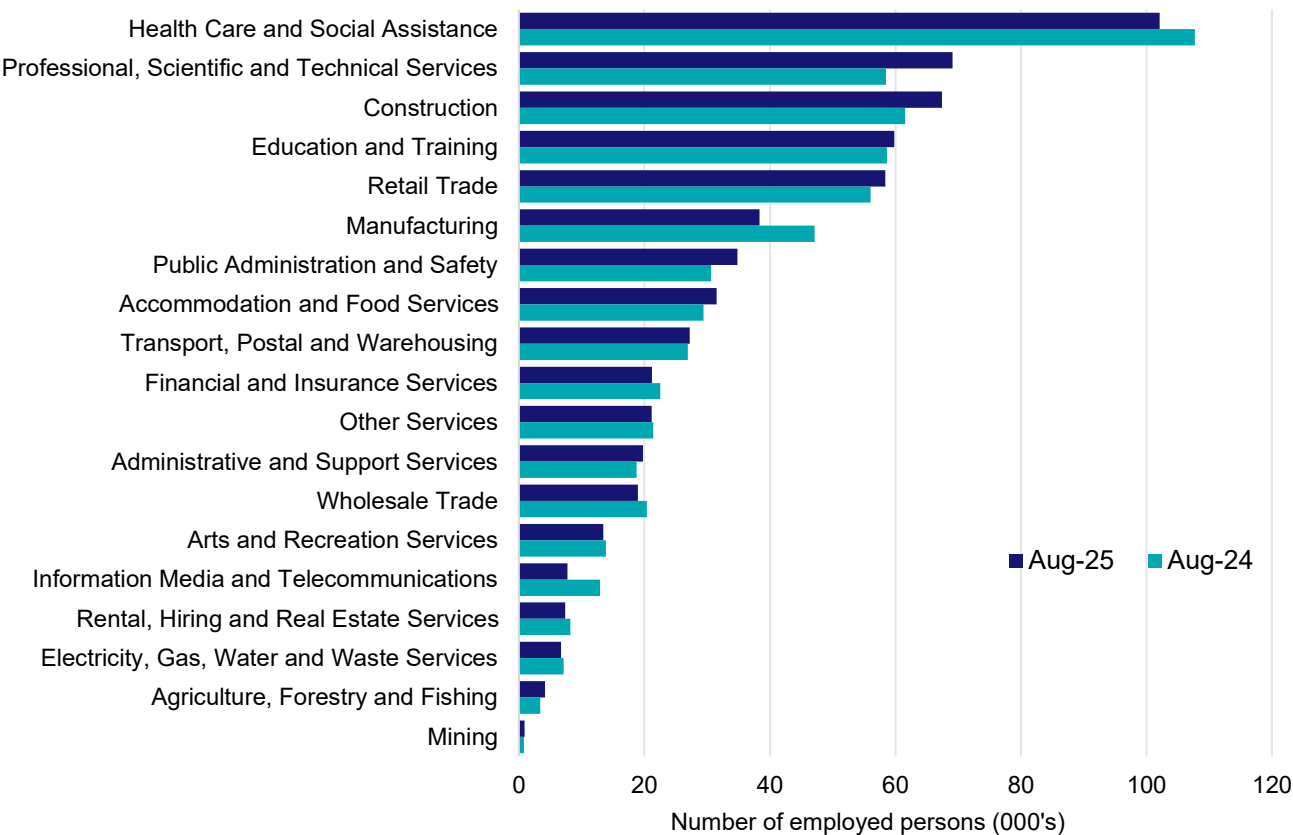

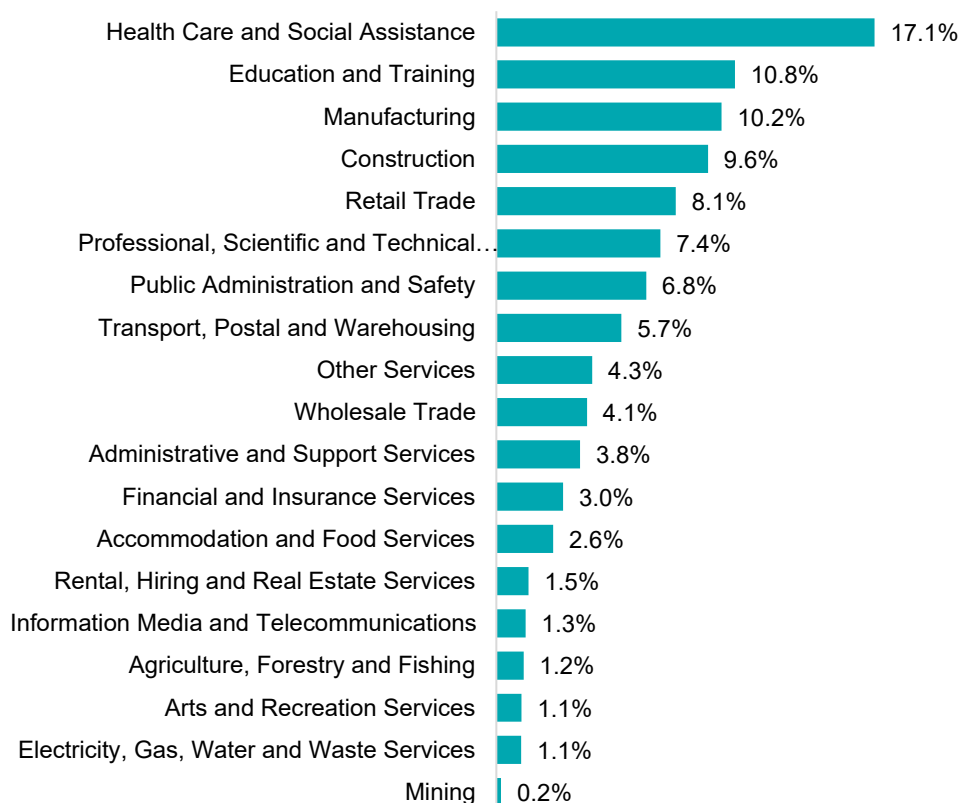

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



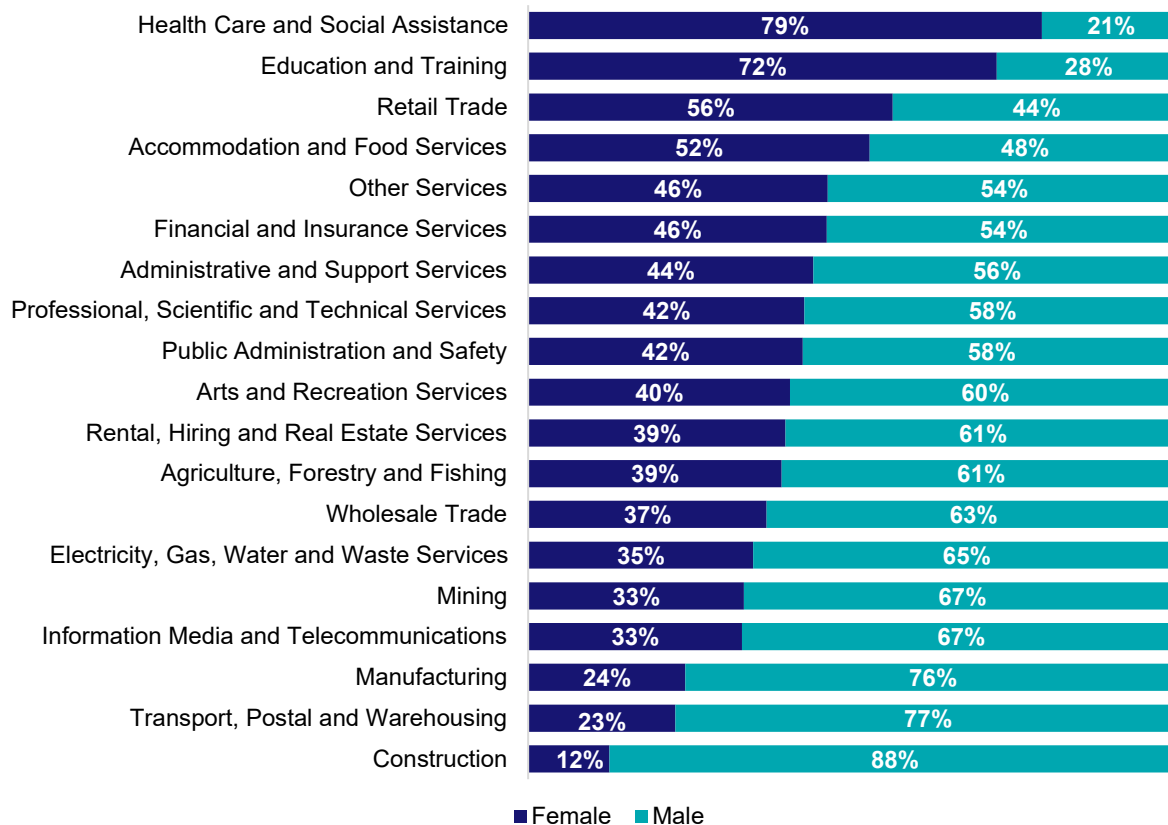

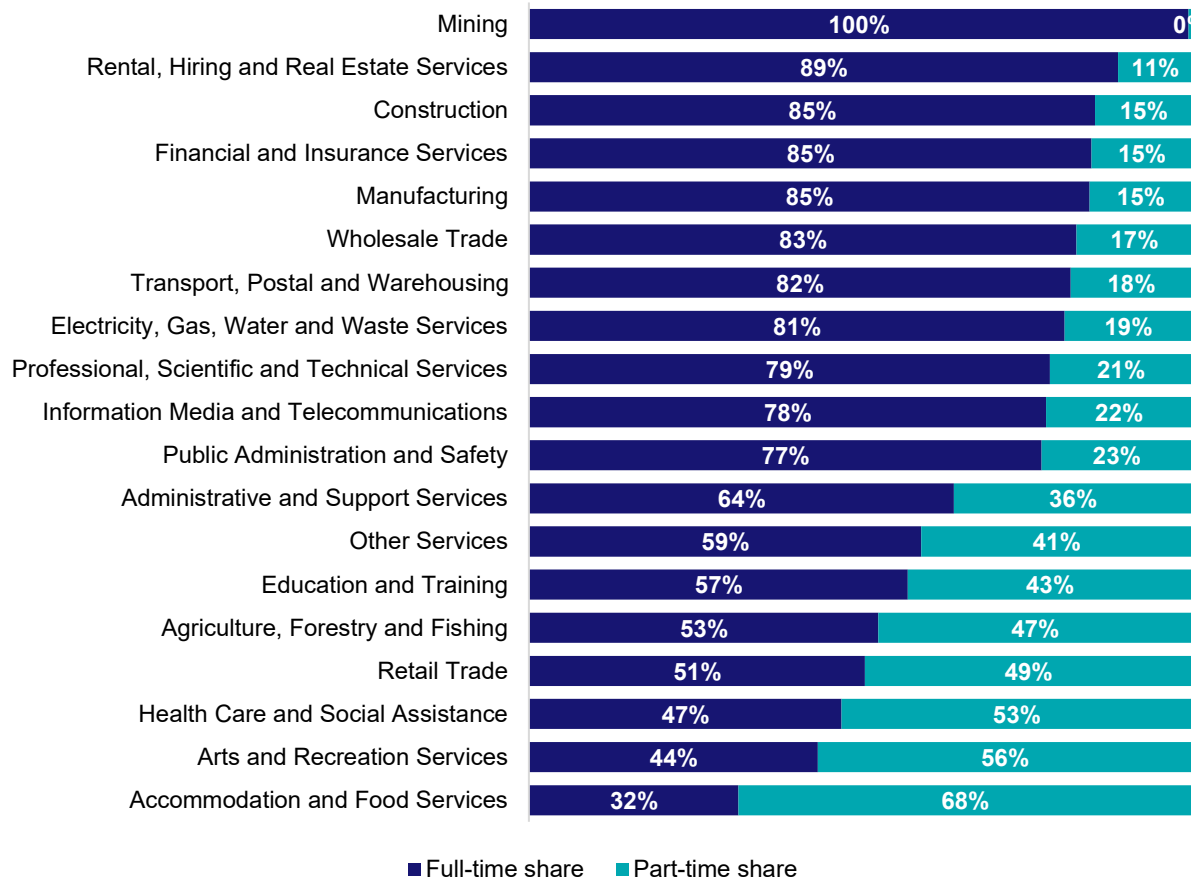

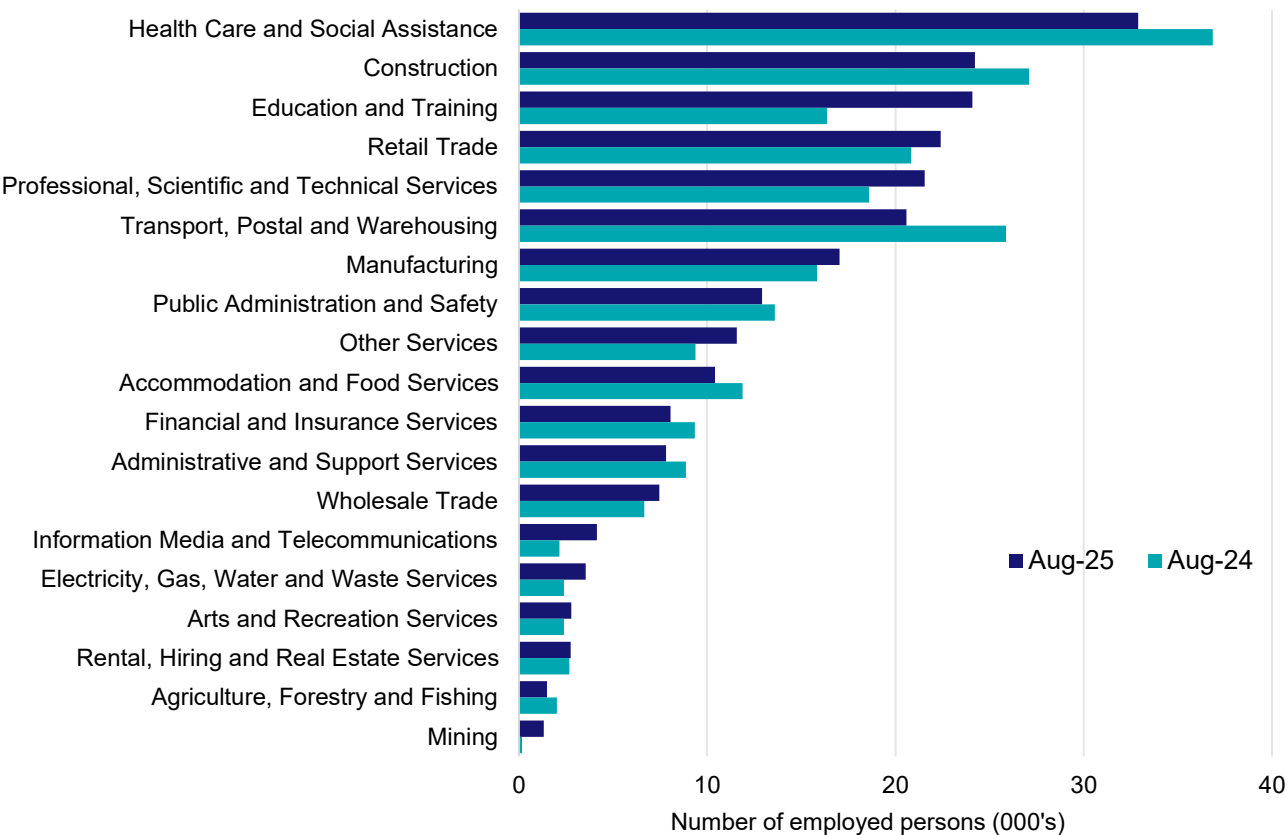

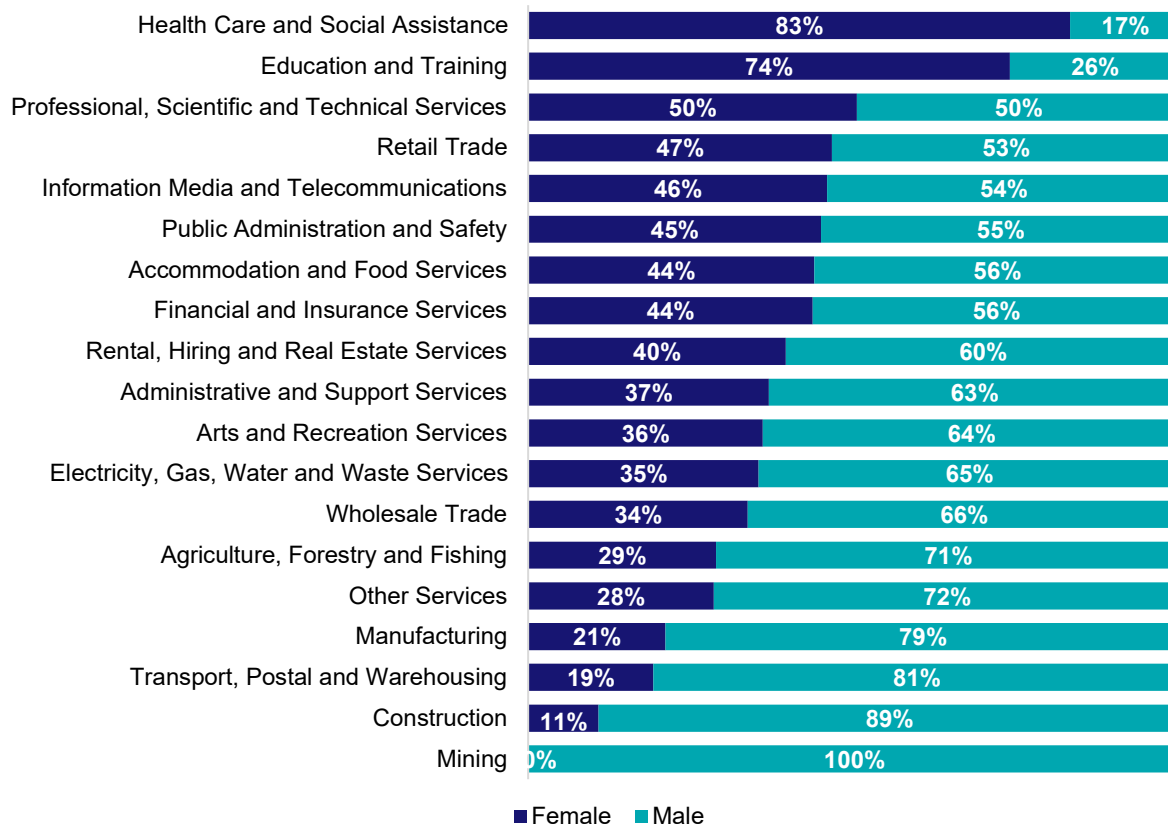

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



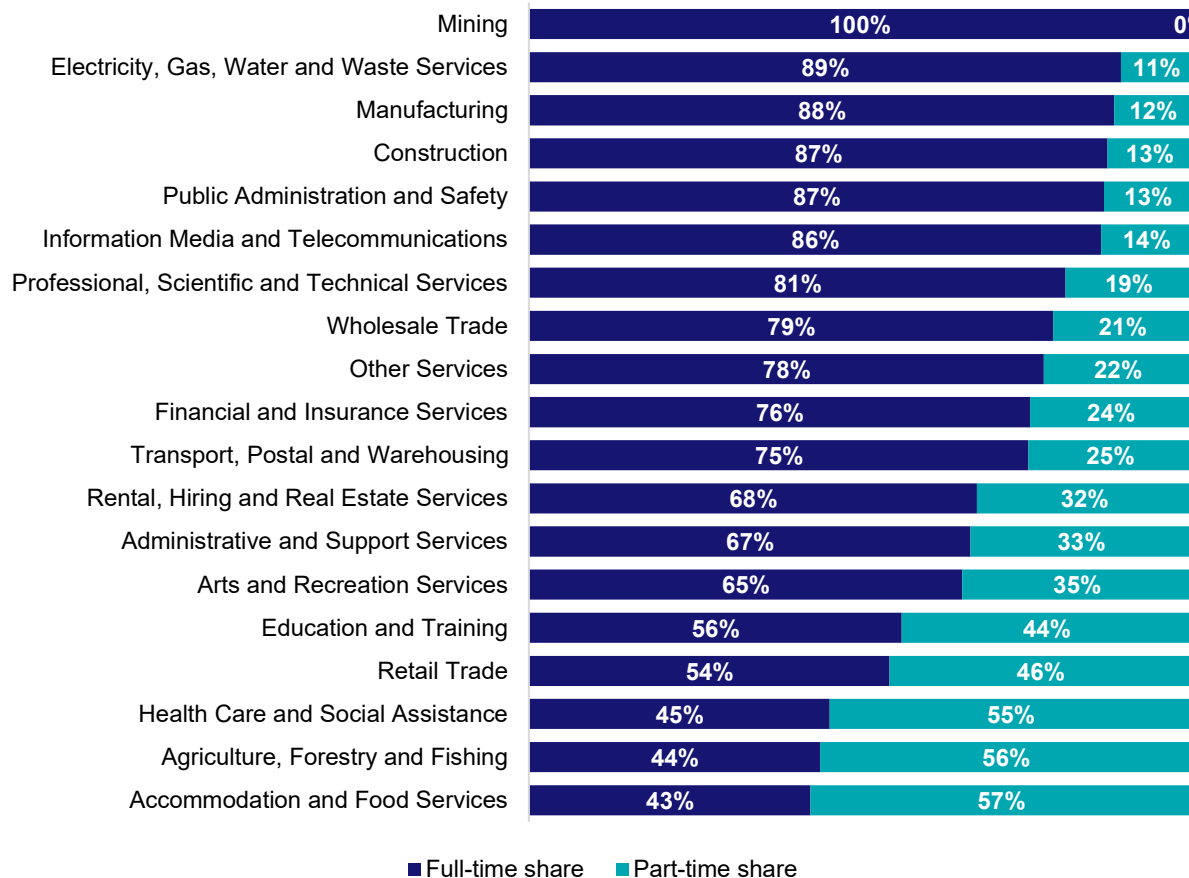

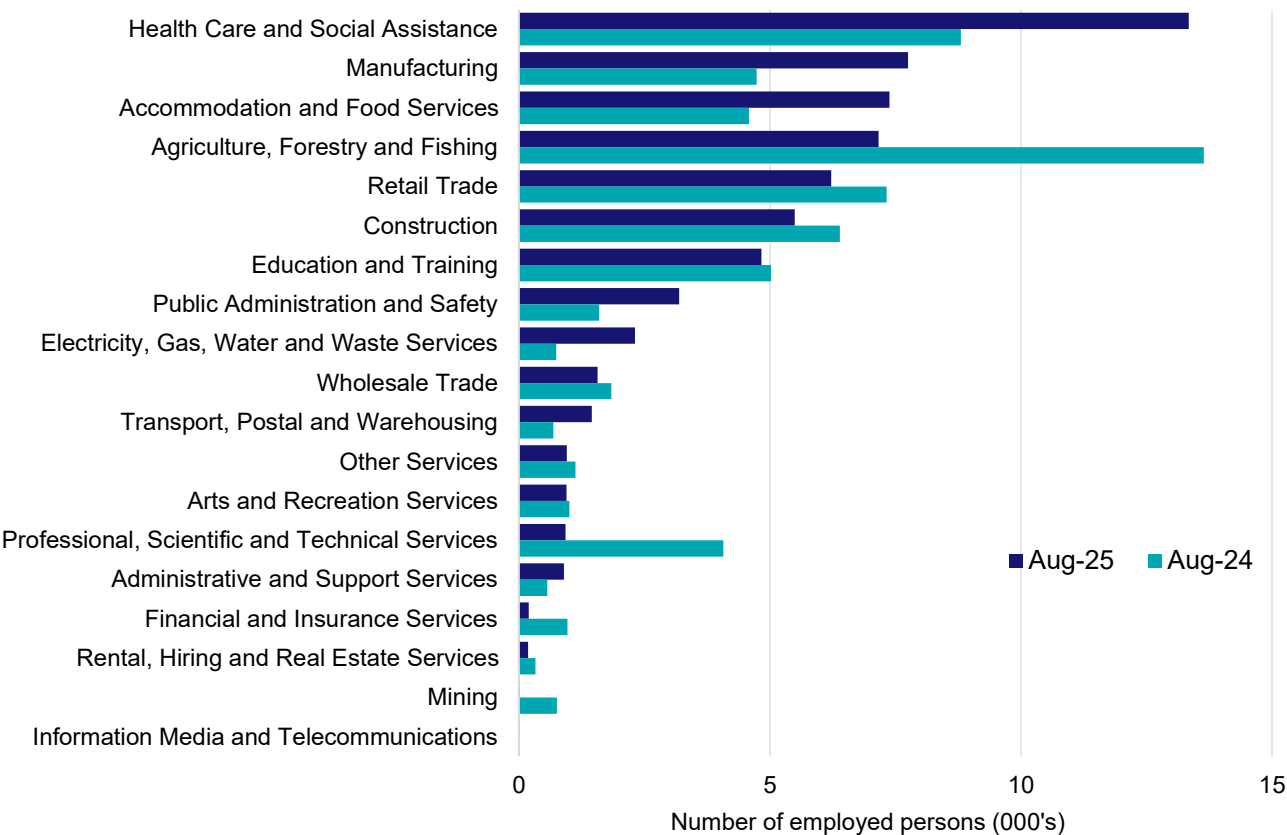

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



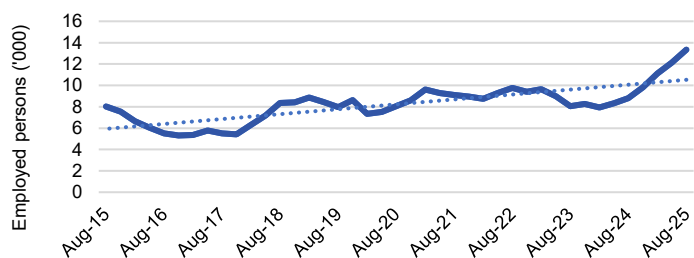

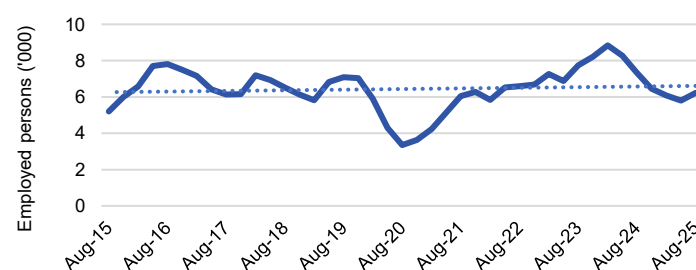

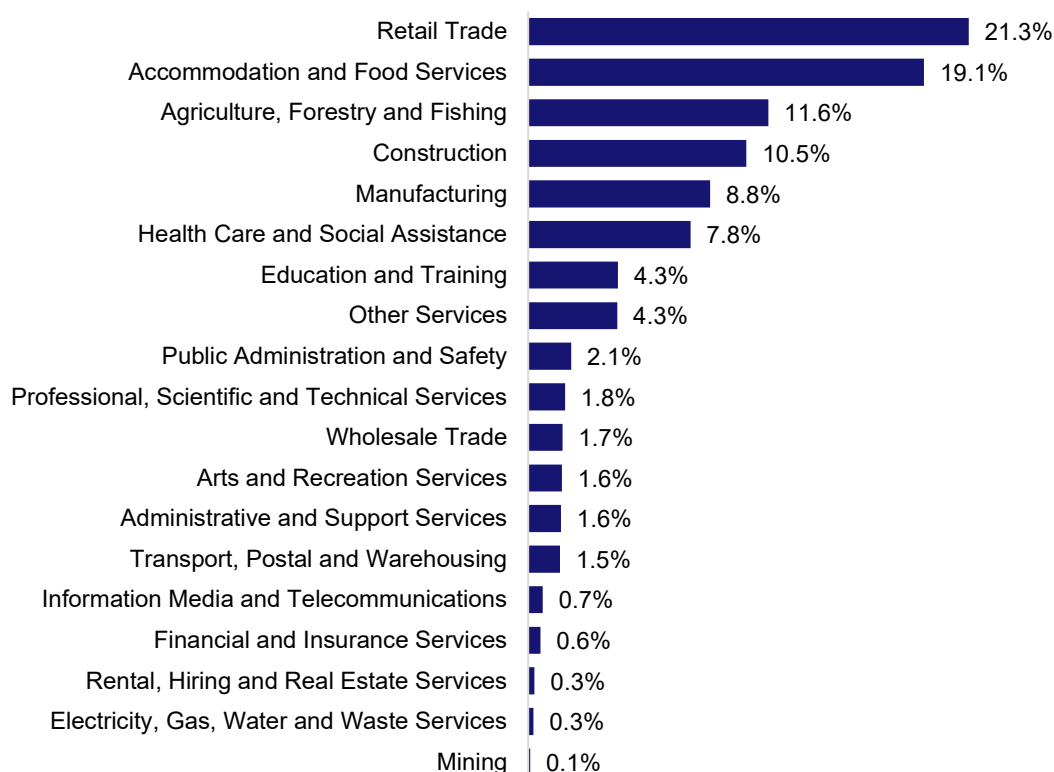

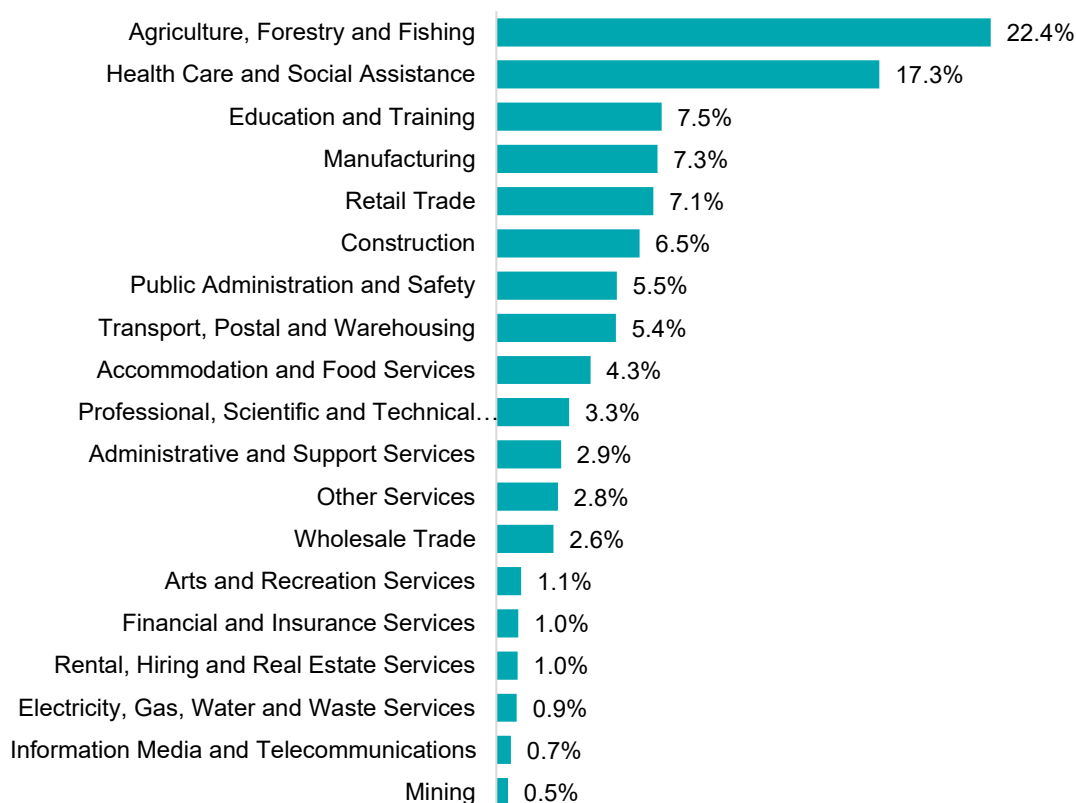

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



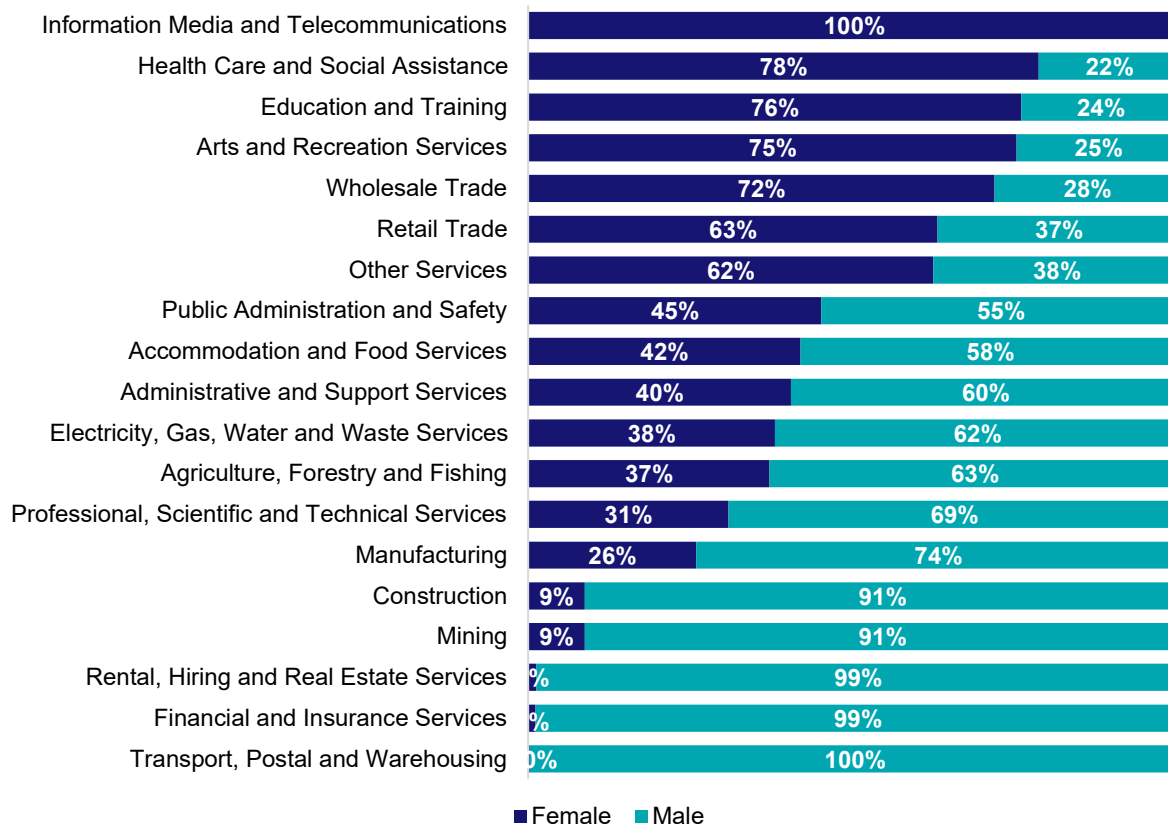

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



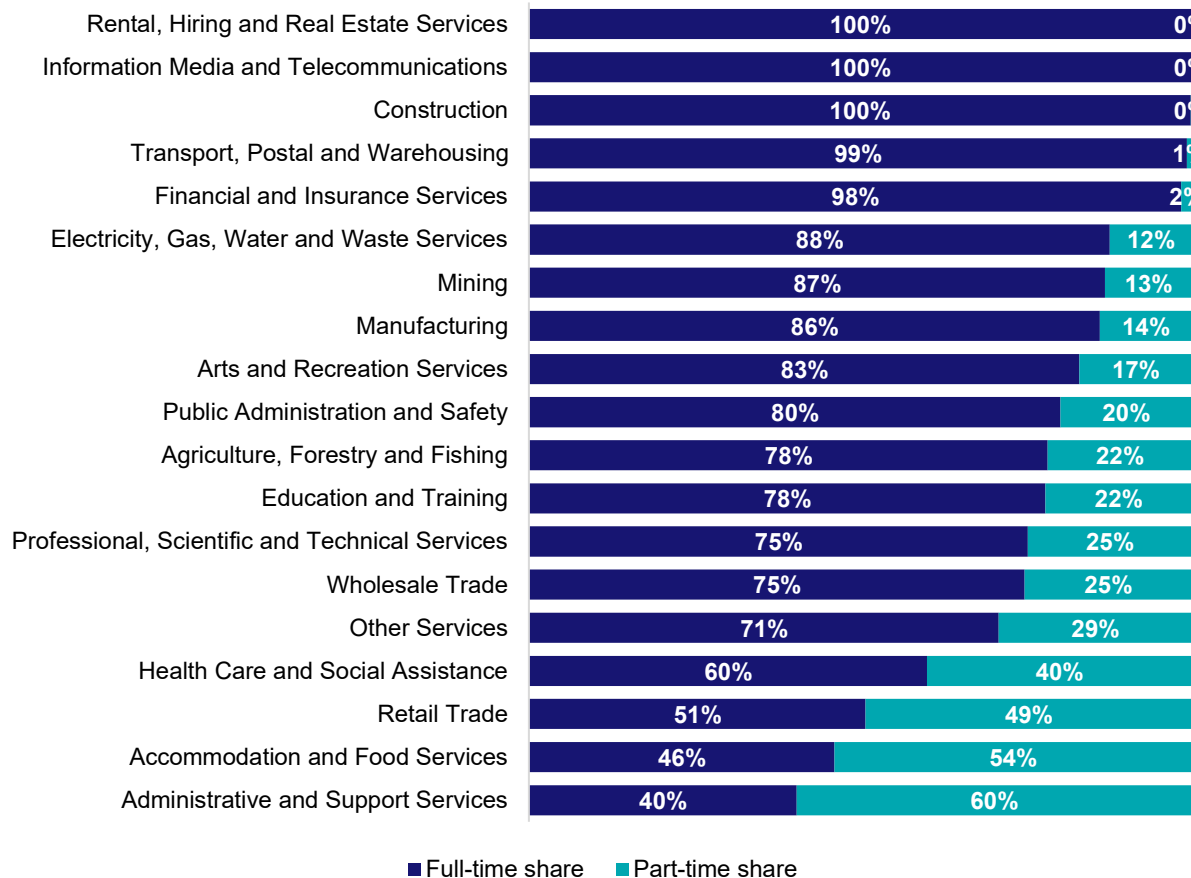

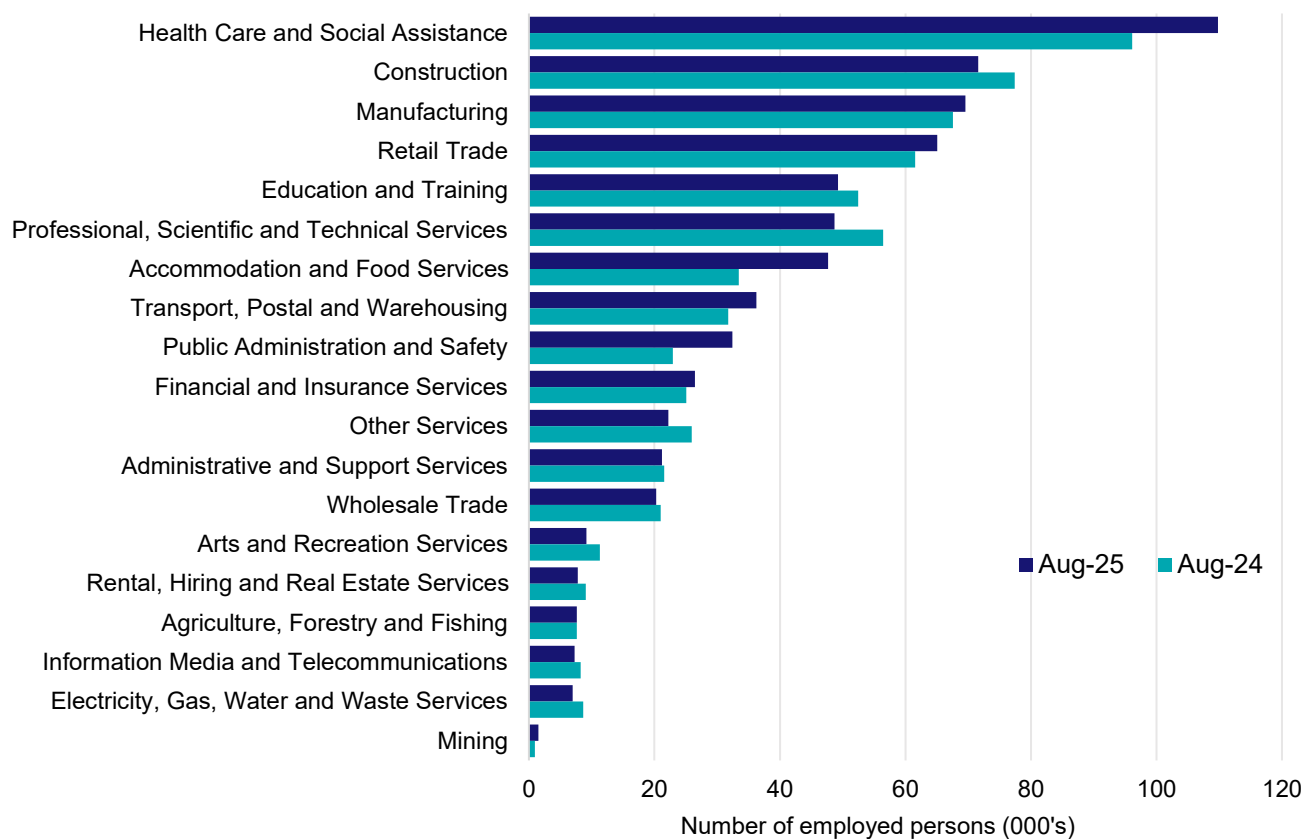

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



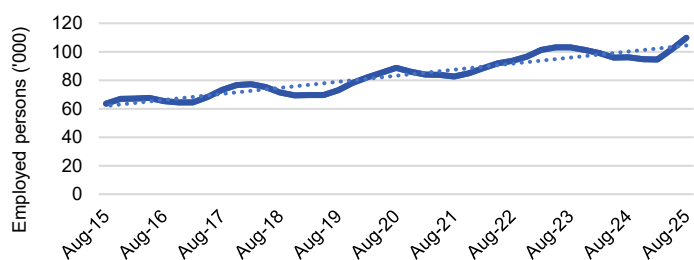

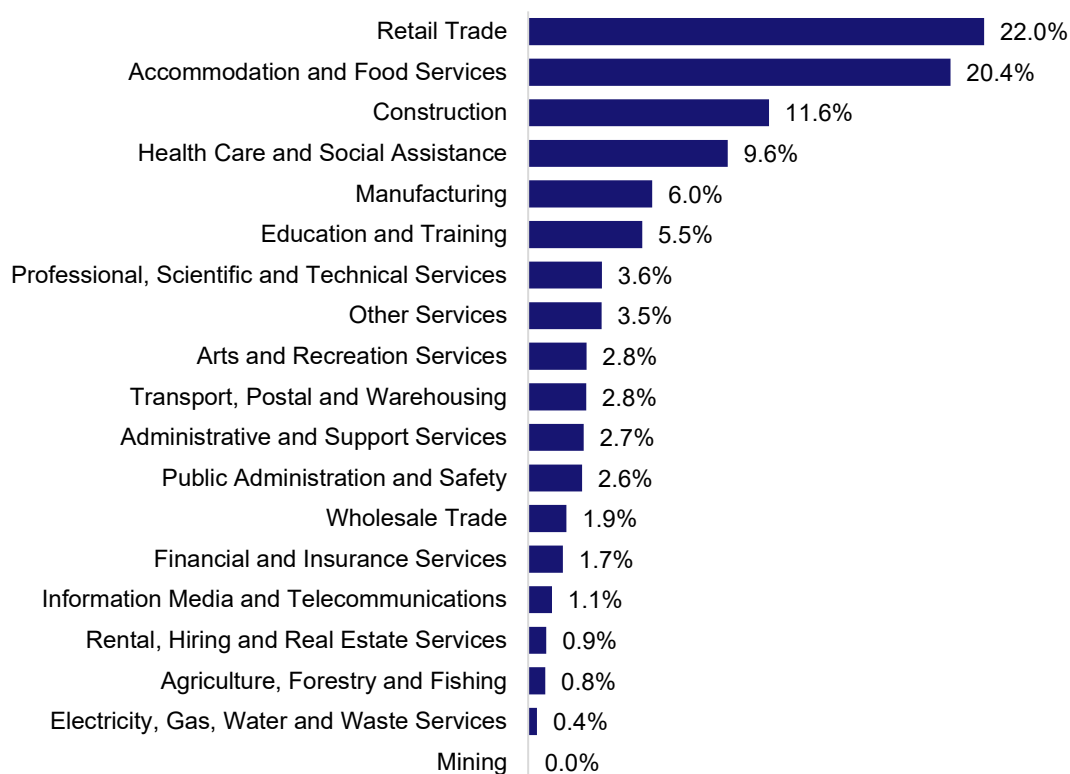

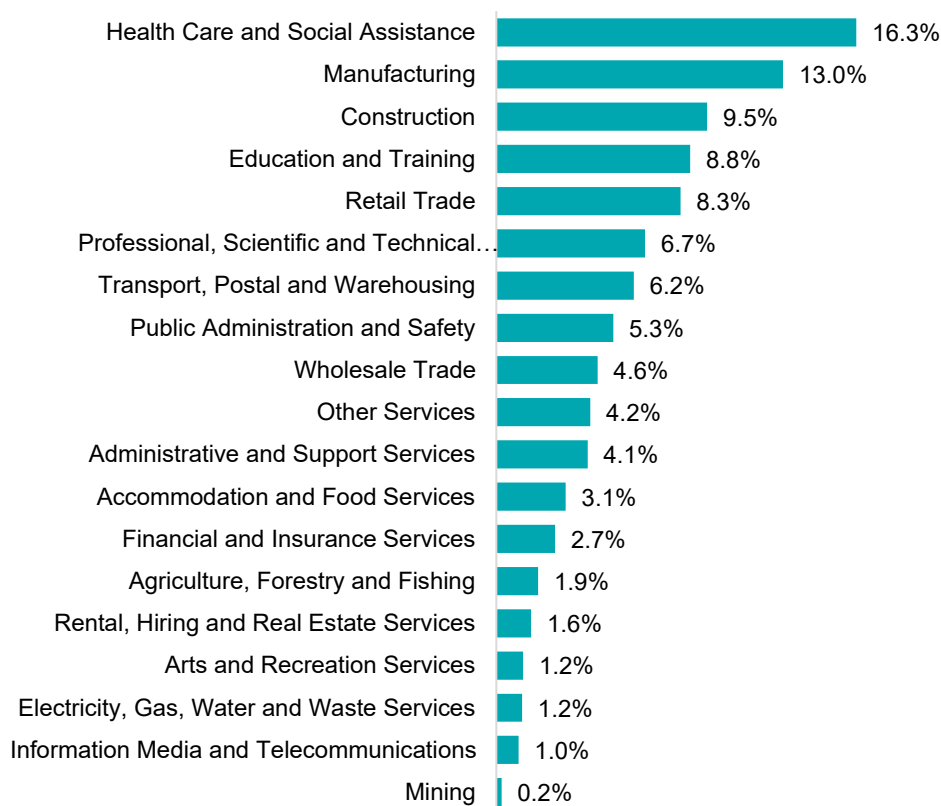

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



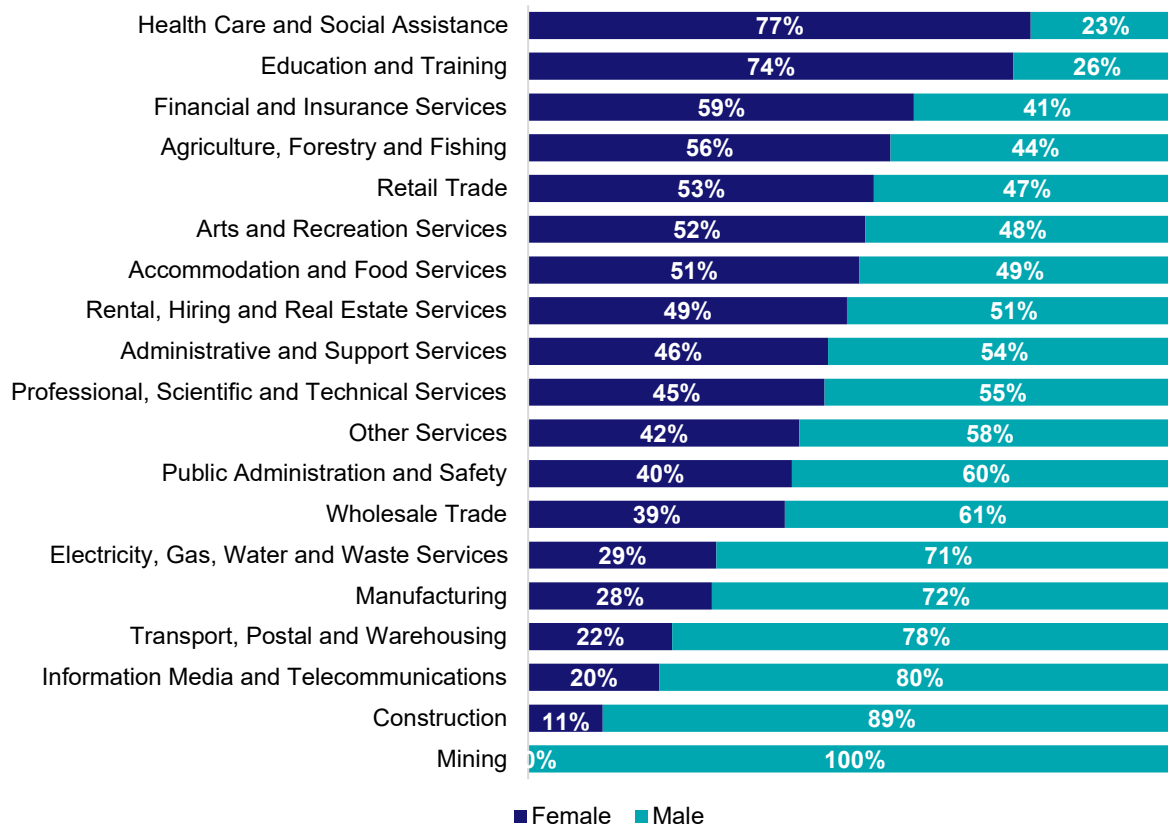

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



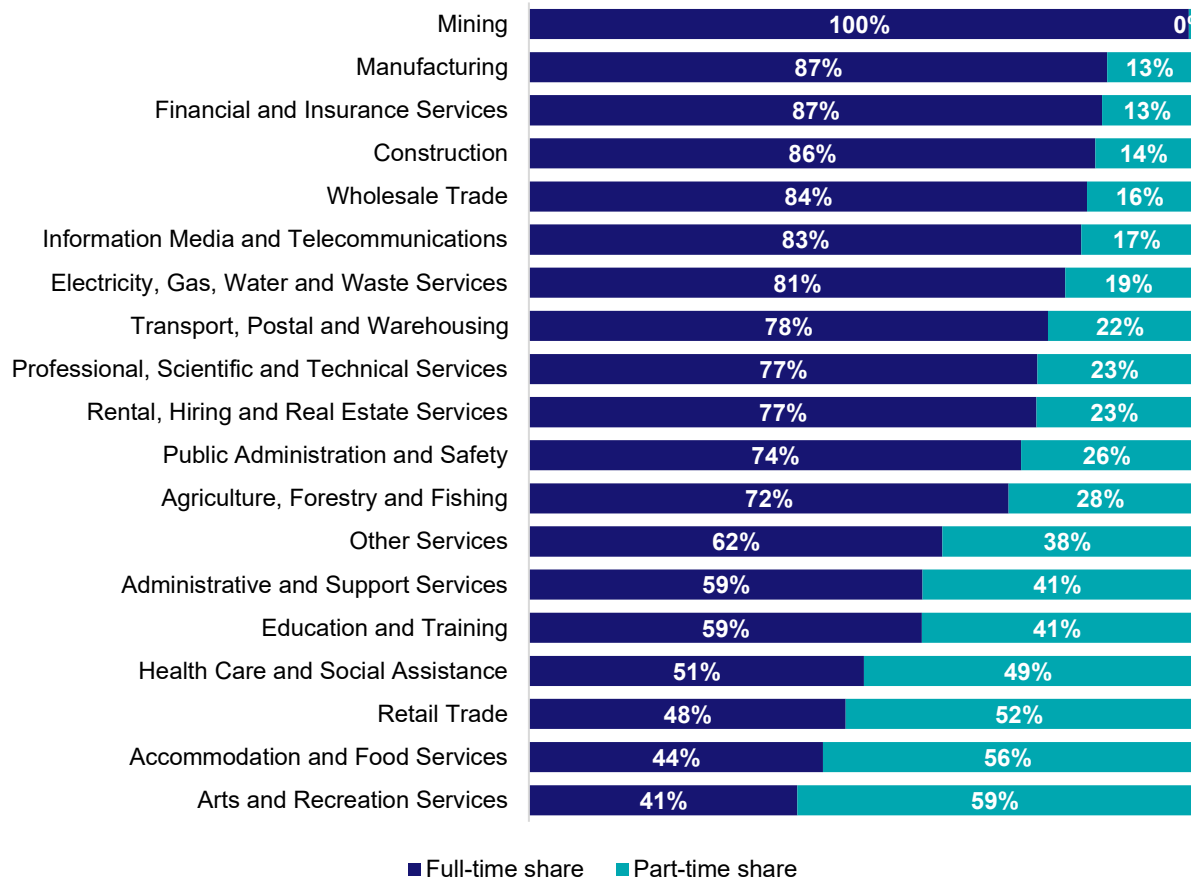

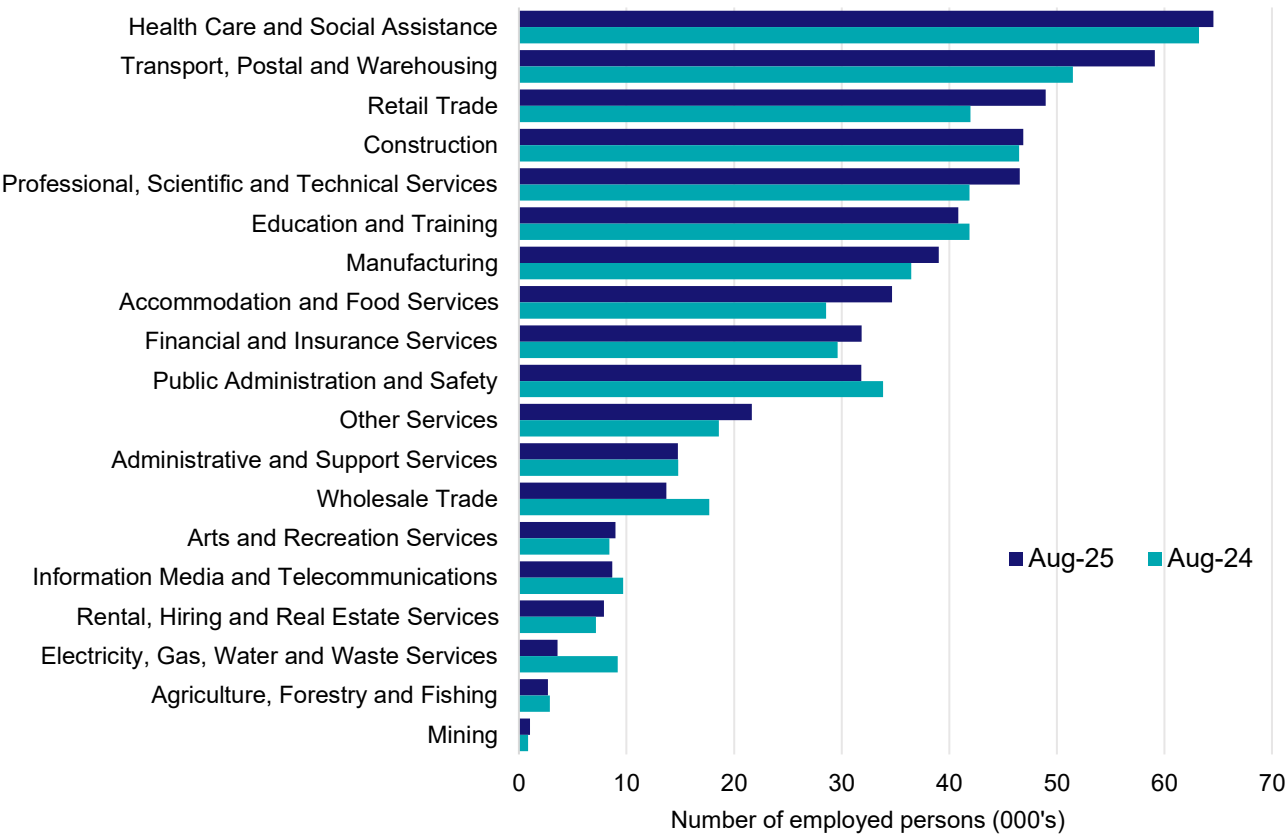

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



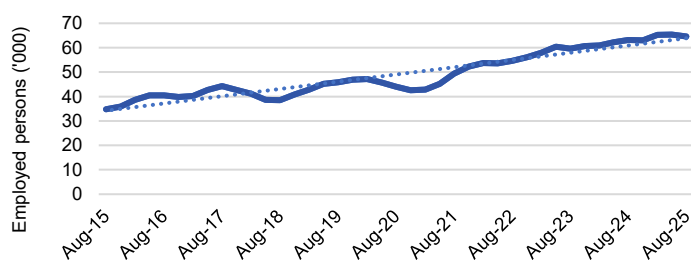

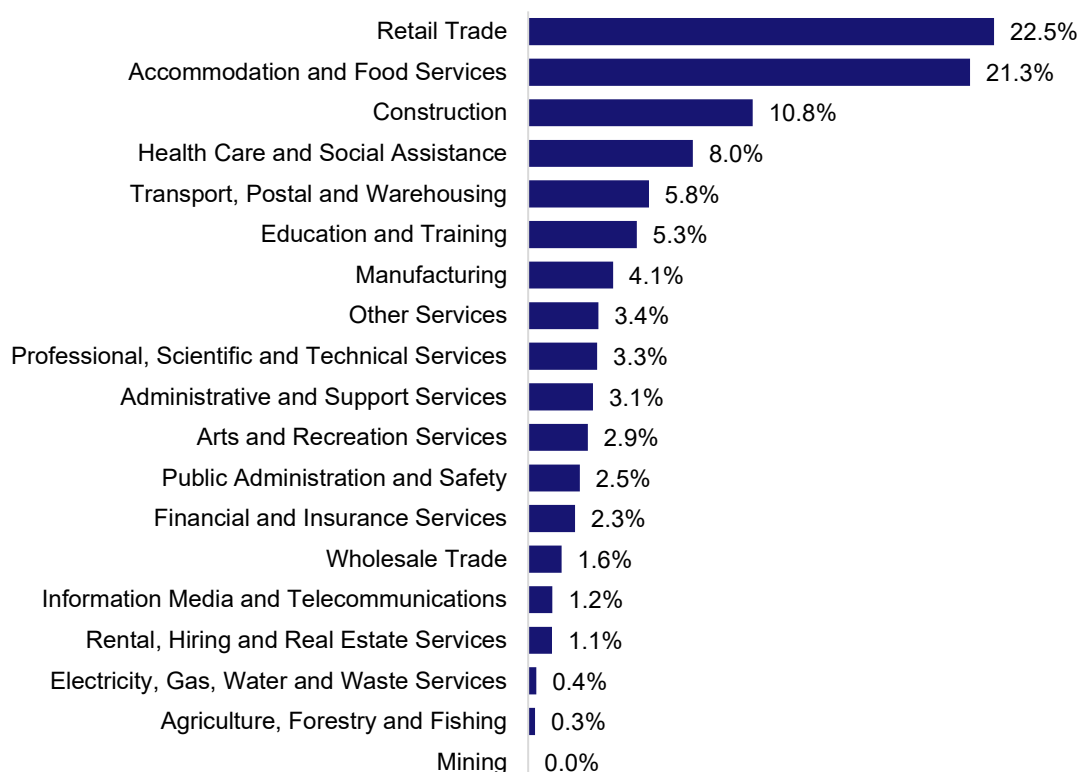

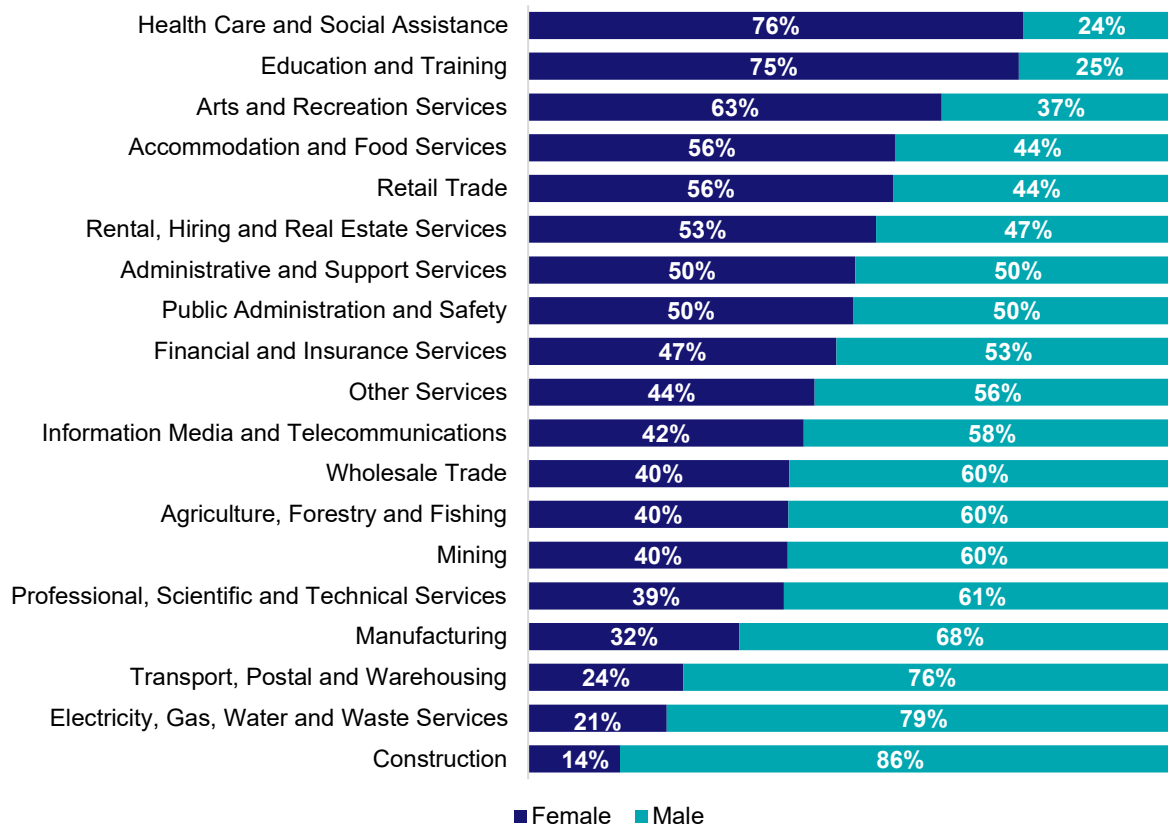

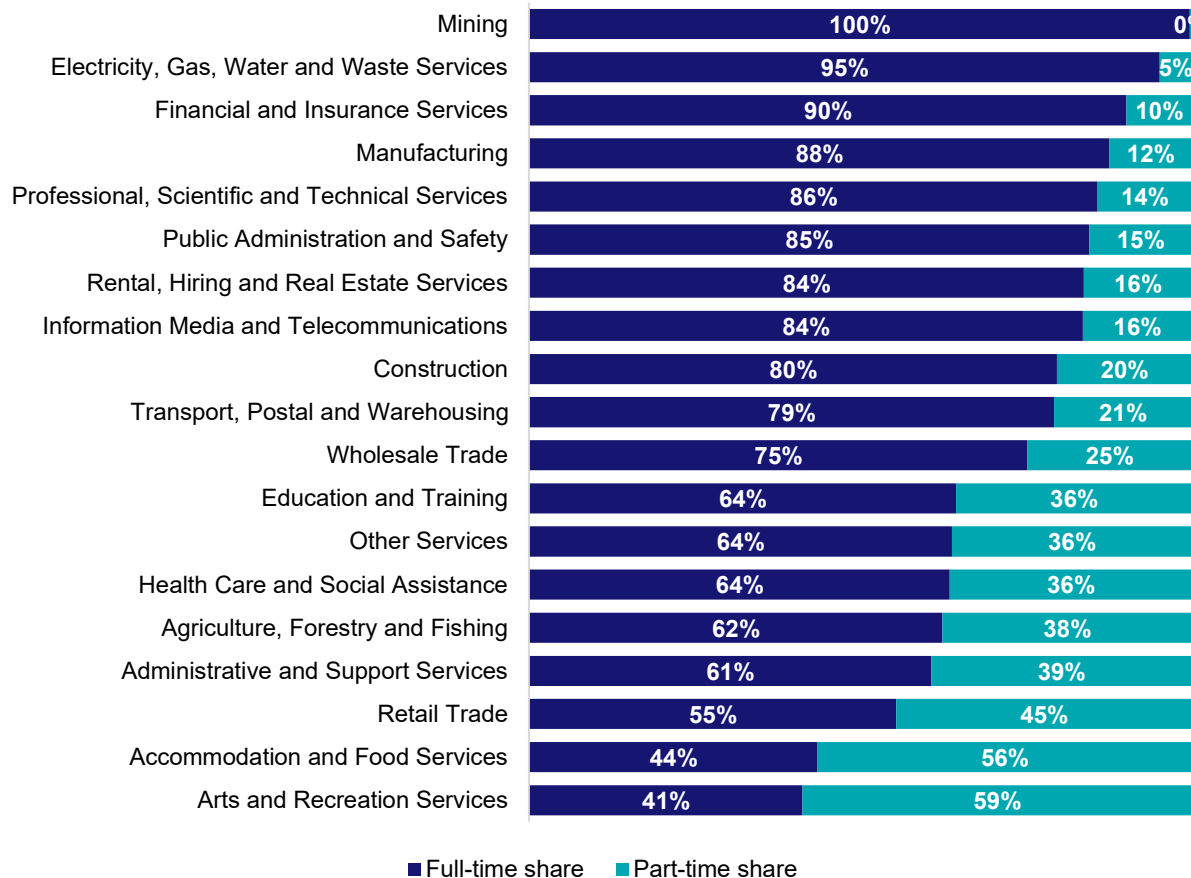

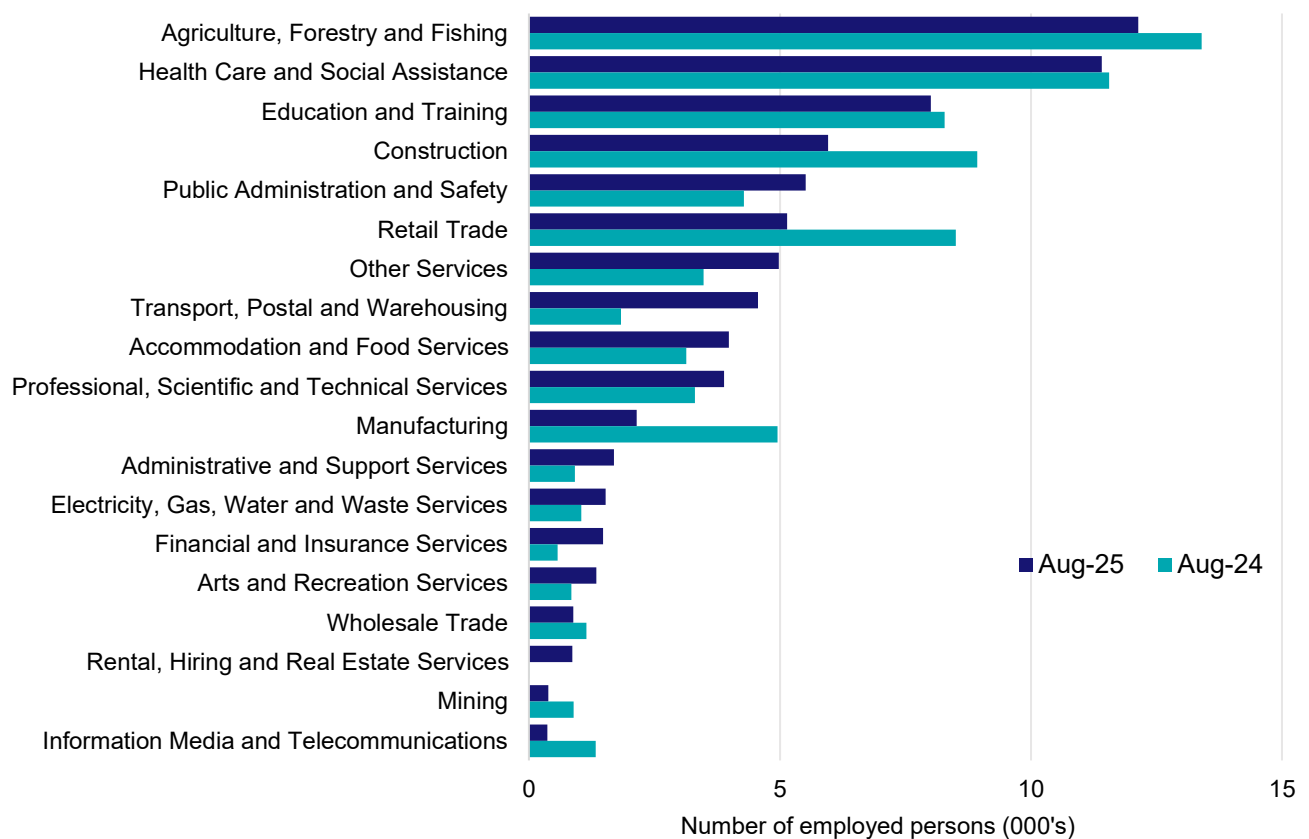

Employment by industry, August 2025 and August 2024



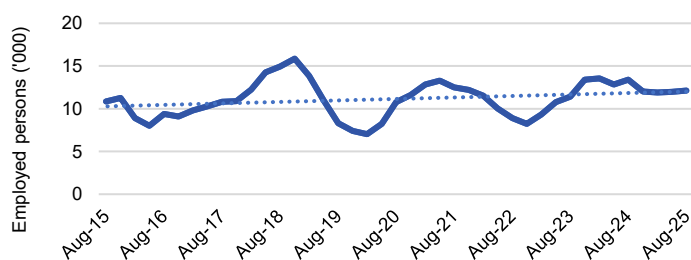

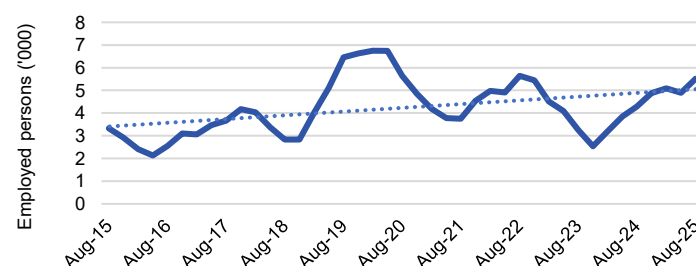

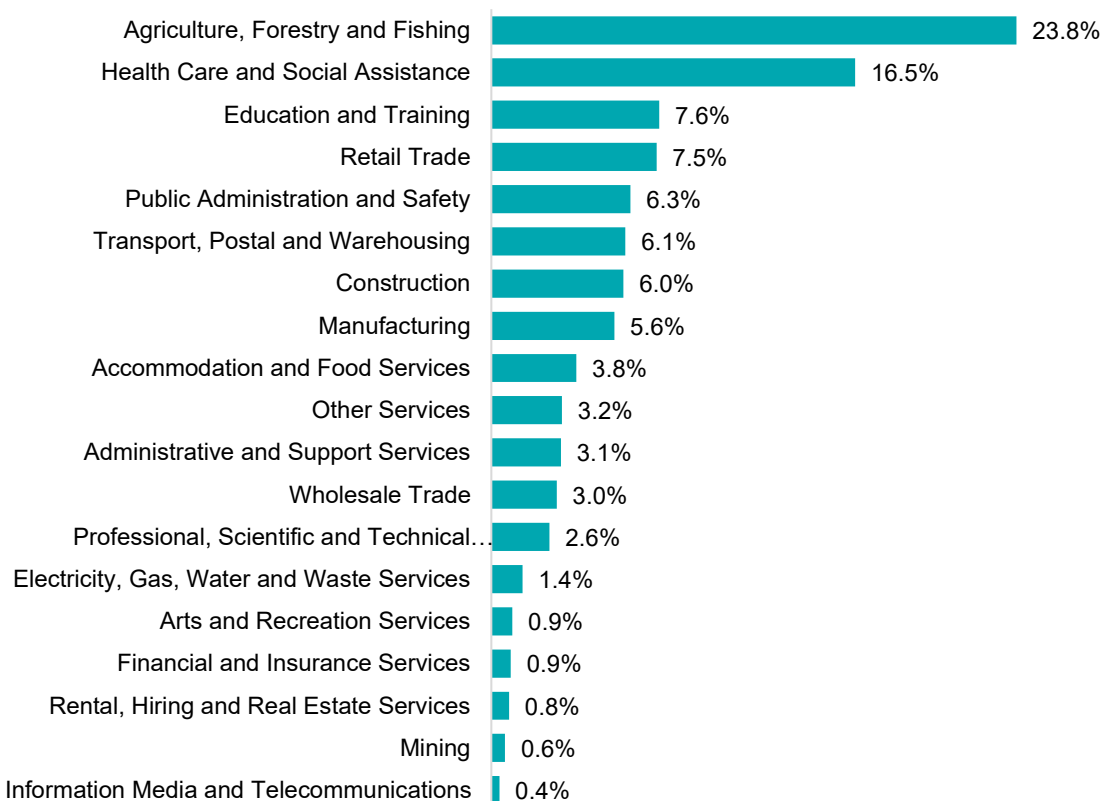

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



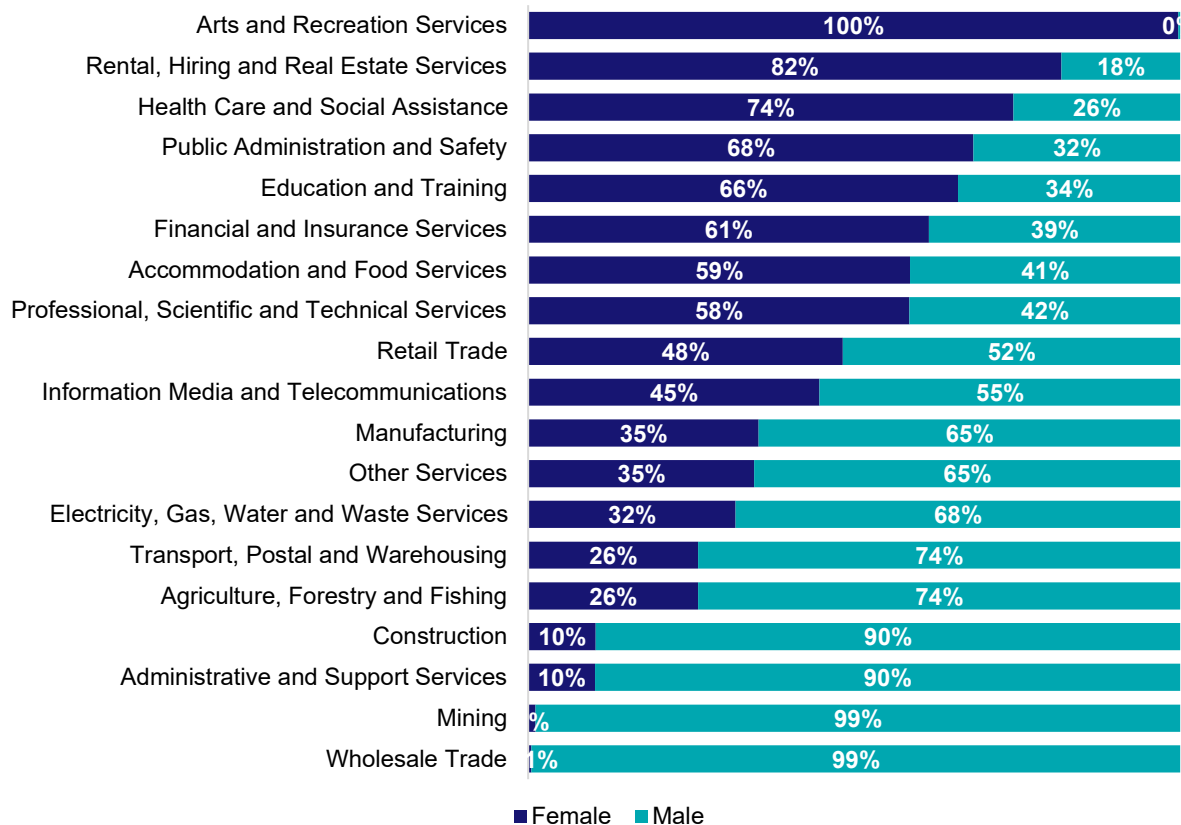

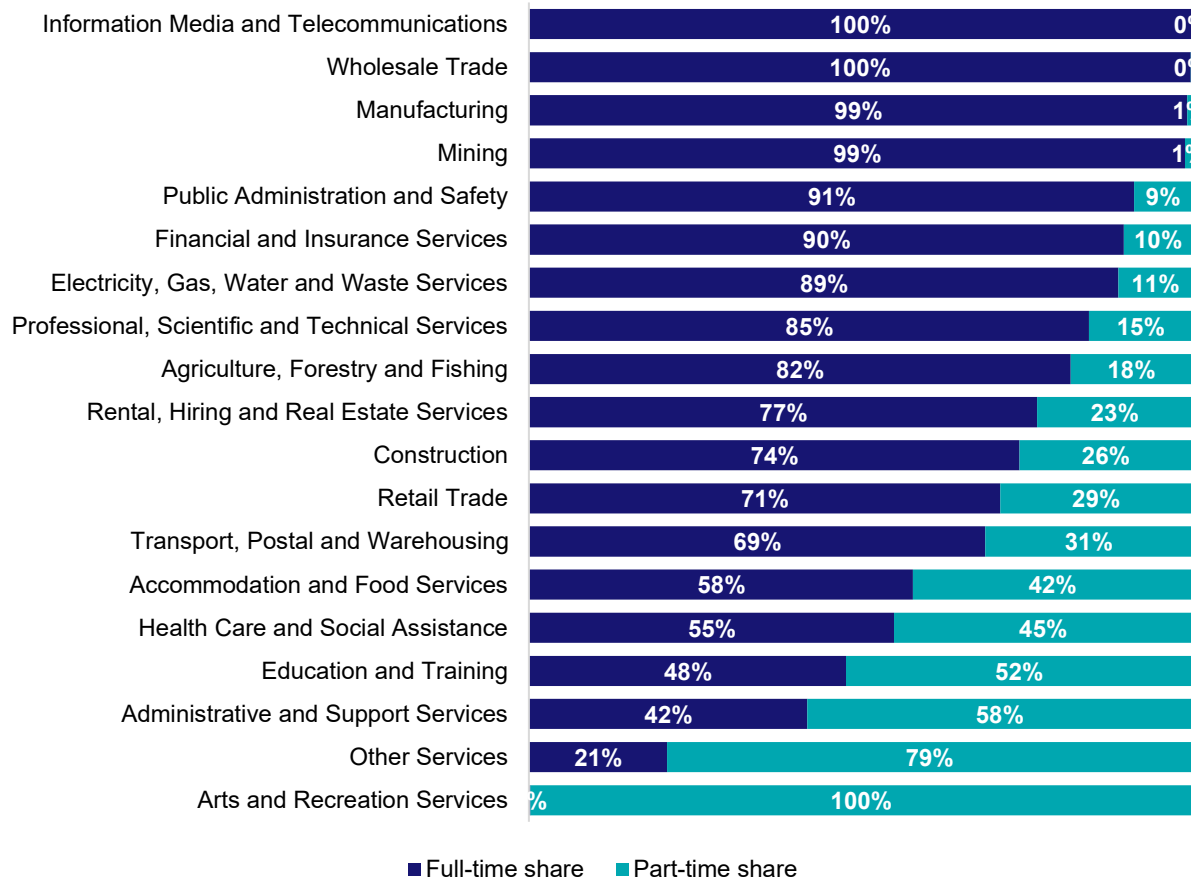
