Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region

Overview


In August 2025, there were around 949,500 people employed in the Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Professional, Scientific and Technical Services, Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Retail Trade, and Accommodation and Food Services. Together these 5 industries accounted for 59% of employment in the region.

Over the year to August 2025, employment in:

- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services rose by 15.9% to stand at 161,800
- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 5.6% to stand at 147,300
- Education and Training rose by 17.7% to stand at 99,900.

In Professional, Scientific and Technical Services in the Inner Metropolitan Melbourne Employment Region, 82% of workers were employed full-time; 56% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 38.




Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?





Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?




