Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region

Overview

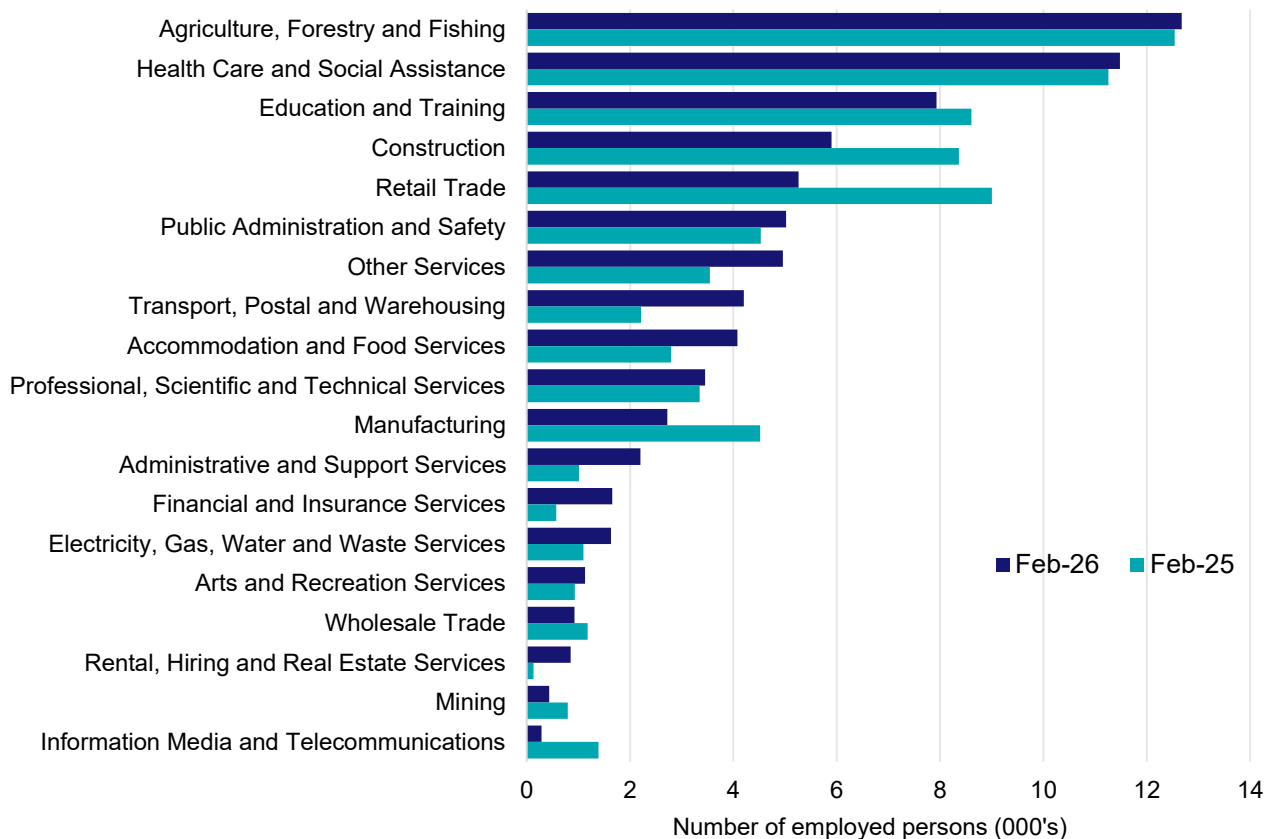
In February 2026, there were around 76,800 people employed in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region. The 5 largest employing industries in the region were Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing, Health Care and Social Assistance, Education and Training, Construction, and Retail Trade. Together these 5 industries accounted for 56% of employment in the region.

Over the year to February 2026, employment in:

- Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing rose by 1.1% to stand at 12,700
- Health Care and Social Assistance rose by 2.0% to stand at 11,500
- Education and Training fell by 7.8% to stand at 7,900.

In Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing in the Wimmera/Mallee Employment Region, 80% of workers were employed full-time; 73% were male; and the median age of the workforce was 49.

Employment by industry, February 2026 and February 2025



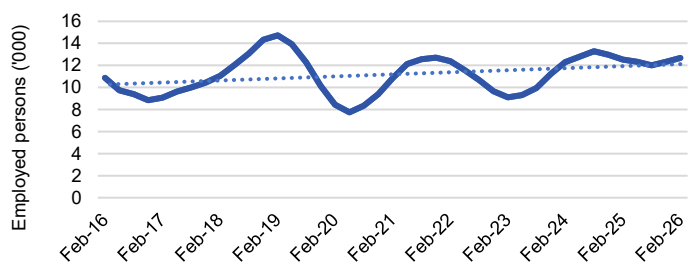

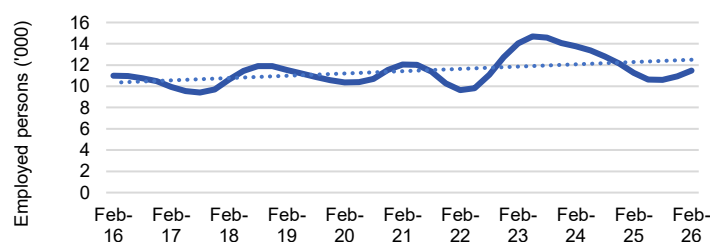

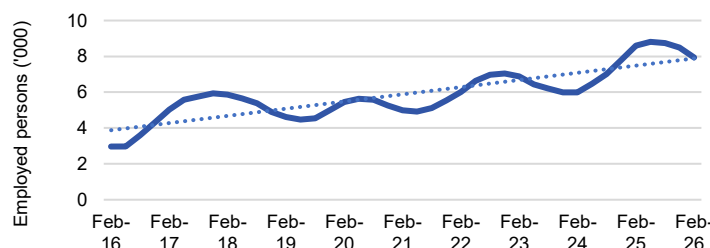

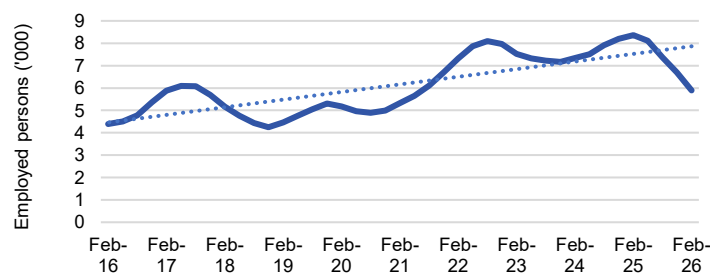

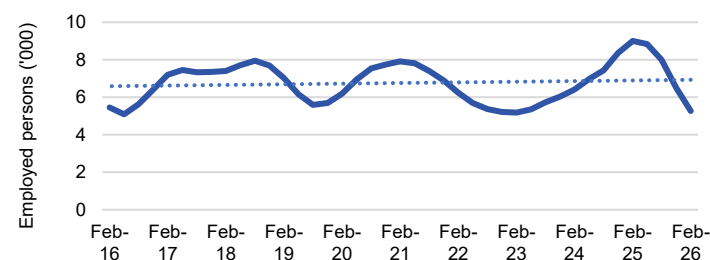

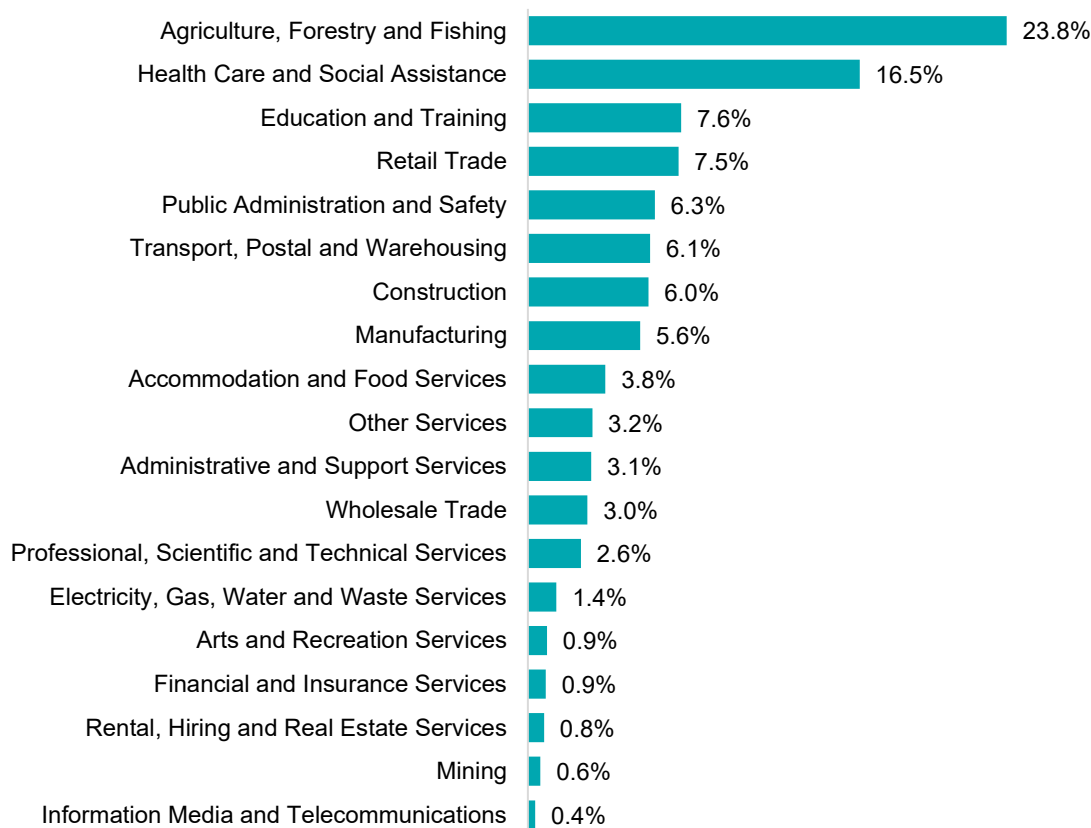
Employment characteristics by Industry

Which industries are youth (aged 15-24) employed in?



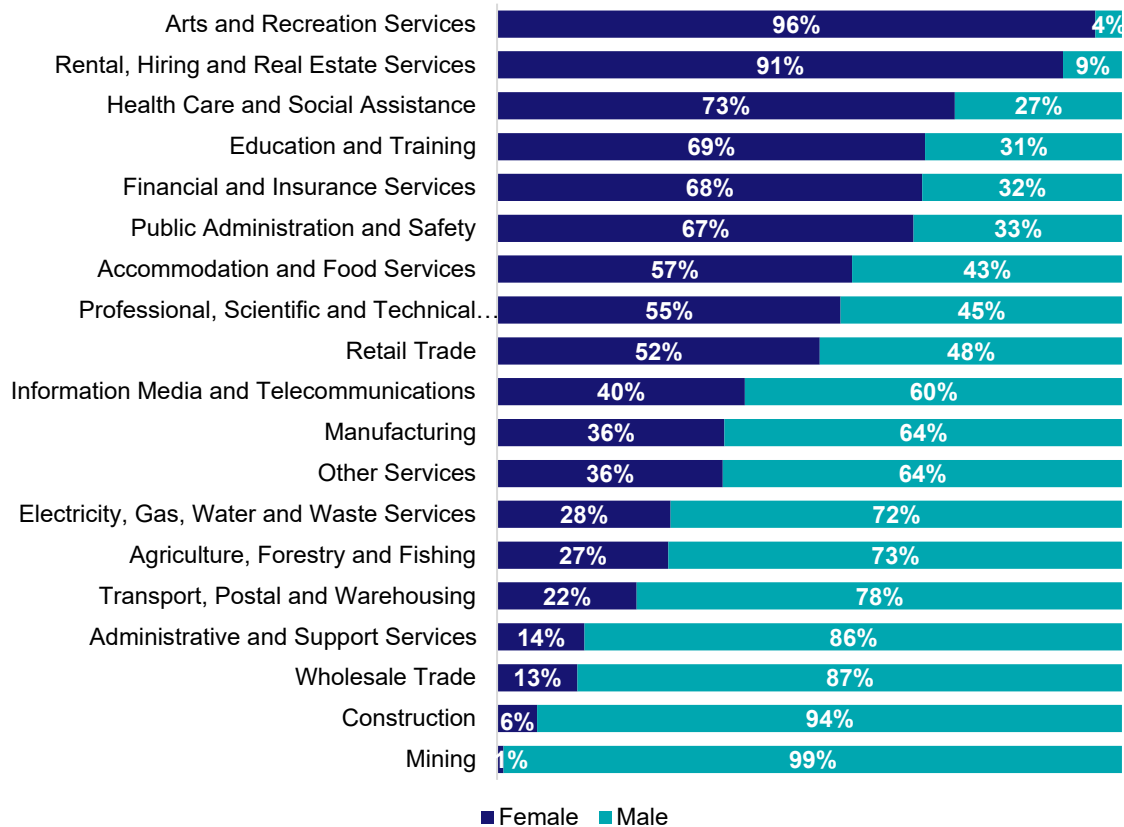

Which industries are mature age persons (aged 55+) employed in?



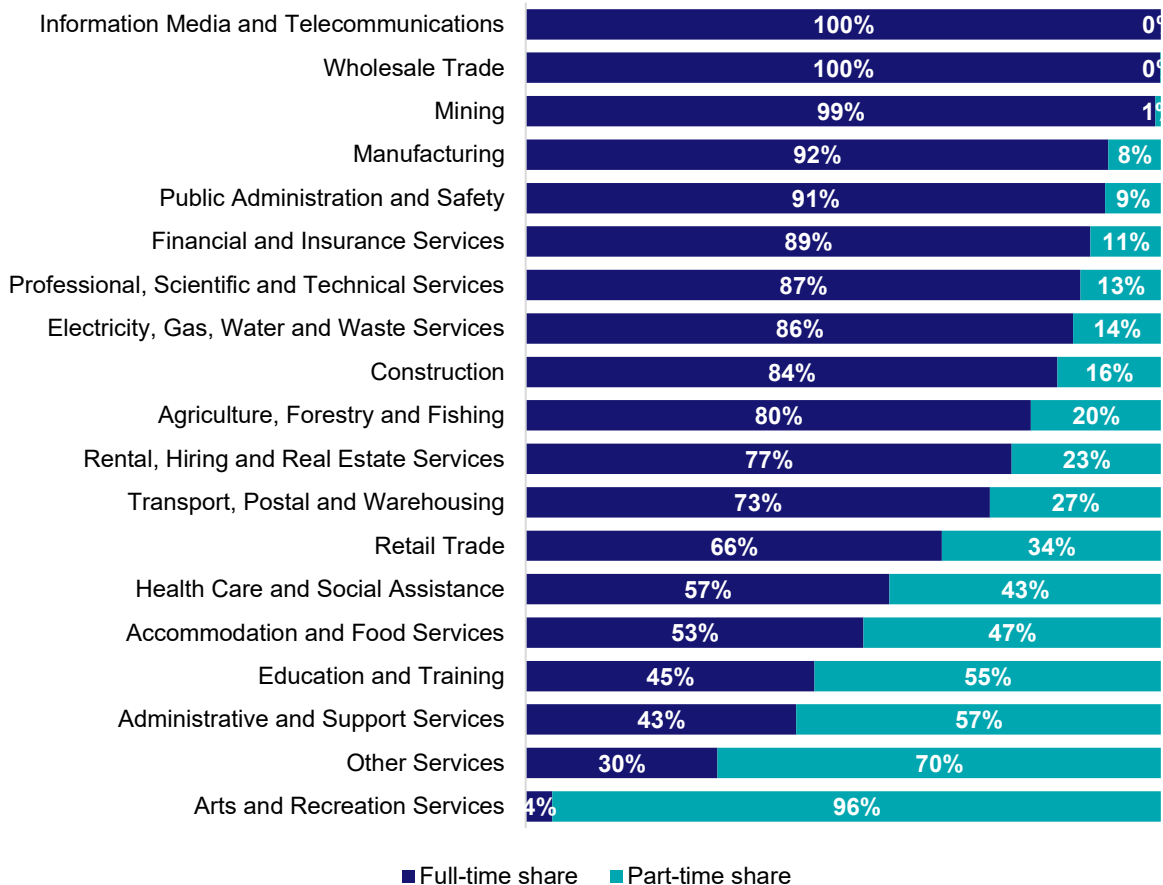
